"PHILOSOPHY OF COMMON SENSE."

Purchase a share in one or both the theatres, and attend with your wife two or three times a week.

Attend all the fancy balls in splendid costume. Purchase your furniture and clothing on credit, regardless of the enchantment of price.

Speculate largely in the stocks. By a lucky hit, you may realize a handsome fortune.

Take an occasional stroll into a gambling house, and be on the watch for an opportunity to "take the flats in."

When you are pressed for money, purchase large quantities of goods, on pretence of sending them to your customers in the western country; but despatch them clandestinely to New York or Baltimore, to be sold by auction.

Frequent the bars of the large hotels, under the idea of seeking customers. You may there refresh yourself, and enliven your spirits, by occasional mint-slings, and other exhilarating potations.

Attend all horse races and fox chases, and bet largely on the former.

When you fail—as fail you must—take care of "number one." Reserve at least ten thousand dollars to begin the world anew, as an agent. He is "worse than a heathen or publican," who does not take care of his own family.

By pursuing this system for three or four years, you will crowd into those years as much of what is commonly called 'enjoyment,' as might be spread over your whole life,—you will, at the close of that period, be cleared of the cares and anxieties of business by a failure for thirty, forty, or fifty thousand dollars, as so many are occasionally, pay your preferred creditors ten or twelve cents in the dollar—your other creditors not a single cent—rob and plunder those who have trusted you with their labor or property, of whom some will probably be totally ruined—clear yourself by the insolvent law, and you will have the honor to be long, for the remainder of your life, to a large "committee of ways and means,"—billet your wife and children on your father-in-law in

his old age—and henceforward pass through the world with a tarnished character. "Utrius horum movisacipe."

Florida.—We learn by accounts from St. Augustine, to the 17th instant, that six more Simulacres who had come into Smyrna for provisions have been secured and sent off. Sam Jones, the present burglar, and successor to Osceola, is described as having recently (Aug. 11th) had an interview at New river, with Lieut. Tompkins, wherein he made sundry warm professions of good faith, indignation at the late massacre, promises of punishing the murderers, &c. He is represented as a tall thin gentleman, in plain dress, with long flowing locks, white with age, a long imperial nose, small eyes, &c.—N. Y. Whig.

AN AWKWARD FIX.—The Detroit "Spirit of '76" tells a good story of one of the Michigan Senators, who having occasion to travel to New York, found it convenient for reasons which can easily be divined, when it is remembered that the provisions of our non-imprisonment law do not extend to citizens of other States, on stopping at the Astor House, to enter on the register the name of an acquaintance instead of his own. In a short time he was inquired after by the Sheriff's officer, and pointed out as the person whose name he had assumed. In answer to the polite invitation of the officer, he assured him repeatedly he was not the person he wanted, and that in jest he had just put down the name of an acquaintance. "Well, sir," said the Sheriff, "pray what is your real name?" After a little hesitation the real cognomen was given. "It is all the same—you will leave to come." "Why sir? what do you wish?" "I have a paper by that name too." So away they went.

FIRE AT NEWBURYPORT, MASS.

The Newburyport Herald of Wednesday evening, in its second edition, contains an account of a large fire in that place. It broke out in a block of ten-story brick buildings in the rear of Pleasant street, near Pleasant street Church. The block contained six tenements, occupied by Messrs. H. T. Pecker, Hatch, Hovey, Norman, E. Davis, and Mrs. Conden. Two or three of the dwellings were occupied as boarding houses. In a few minutes the whole range was in flames—the fire having first caught among some shavings in a cellar. The barn of Mr. Sergeant was consumed—also a large dwelling house on the corner of Green and Pleasant streets, occupied by Capt. Chase and A. Chute. A number of buildings in the vicinity were injured. By this fire eight or ten families were driven from their homes. The only insurance is \$4000 on the buildings, at the Rockingham office, Exter. The fate of three children, who slept in the third story of the brick building, is uncertain. The impression, however, is, that they were saved by some unknown person.

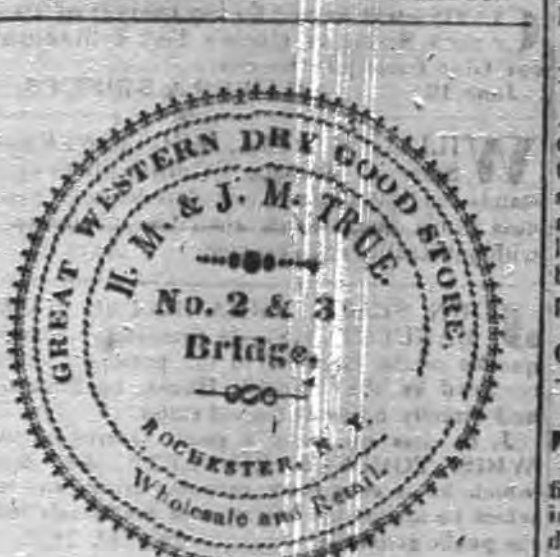

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shimplasters and to fraudulent banking.

THE CHARTISTS.

We are not by any means certain that out of our own country, there is at present a more interesting question for us to consider than this—"What is to be the end of the Chartist movement in England? It is connected, and not very remotely, with all the other questions on which we speculate, in relation to the domestic affairs of Britain. For instance—suppose the Chartist agitations continue to increase, even to the burning of cotton mills and the destruction of machinery, or even to a pretty general suspension of labor in the cotton mills—how are our planters to get ten pence sterling a pound for their five hundred thousand bales of cotton? Or suppose there should be a dosultory civil war, precluded by runs on the banks, a great increase of taxes, a serious interruption to agricultural pursuits, and a suspension of specie payments by the Bank of England—how will all this effect us in our commerce?

Suppose the Chartist commotions should ripen to insurrection, and finally to revolution, and timid capitalists in England—noblemen, and great land owners, and overgrown bankers—should bethink them to gather together their effects and flee across the Atlantic for safety; or on the other hand, suppose the strong arm of Government should prove too mighty for the "white slaves," as their stimulators call them, and thousands of the "white slaves," ignorant, reckless and excited as they are, should find their way to our shores; what would be the effect upon us of one or the other alternatives?

These are questions—and there are more of the like nature—which we may as well put to ourselves in season; for although such extreme consequences as we have hinted at are not, perhaps, very probable, they are still possible, and in the event of their occurrence, we shall be none the worse for having looked at them and thought of them beforehand.—Men did not foresee the French revolution, yet it came; and a terrible breaking up of the foundation of society in England is not without the range of things that may be.

For our own part, we confess that, although we have watched the commotions in England with close attention—predicted them, our readers may remember, months before they began to attract notice either there or here—yet we have not been able to arrive at any definite conclusion as to their results. As we said nearly a year ago, much will depend on the condition of the harvest; if that shall prove abundant, or even sufficient, the storm which now seems hanging over England will probably pass away, for a season, at least; but if there should be a scarcity—if the discontent of the million, already so threatening, should be heightened by another winter of privation and distress—which heaven in its mercy forbid—we fear that England will become a scene of events on which the world will look with grief and the most painful anxiety.

In the meantime it is well for us, we have already said, to be looking into the matter, and gathering up such information as may come within our reach. To which end a place before our readers to-day an article in the London Spectator, that seems to us deserving of attention.—N. Y. Com. Adv.

ALARMING RAVAGES OF YELLOW FEVER AT NEW ORLEANS.—It is with deep regret, not unmingled with feelings of indignation at the obstinate and perverse opposition to quarantine laws in the South, that we have to record as one of the consequences of this fatal and suicidal policy, that the tropical pestilence of yellow fever has now made such progress in New Orleans that it has become epidemic, and is mowing down its victims in every direction. The New Orleans Bee of the 29th, says:—

By the report of the Charity Hospital, we perceive that 136 cases of yellow fever have been admitted during the past week. This is 54 more than was received during the preceding week. The deaths are fewer in proportion, only 42; last week 35 out of 82 cases. In private practice the disease is alarmingly on the increase. Every physician has his hands full.

The total number of interments from yellow fever last week, was 96, viz: 86 in Potter's field, 9 in the Protestant cemetery, and 1 in the Catholic cemetery.

SENTENCE OF DR. DYOTT.—Yesterday morning Dr. Dyott was sentenced to three years imprisonment in the Penitentiary.—Sunday Morning News.

ANOTHER BRITISH STEAMER.—A new steamer or called the North America has just been finished at St. Johns. N. B. to ply between that place and Boston. She is about 500 tons burthen, and two engines of 90 horse power each. She is to be commanded really by Capt. Howes, an experienced yankee steam boat captain, but nominally by somebody else.—There has been no regular steambot on this route since the burning of the Royal Tar, in September 1836.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.—A friend at Foggonsnook writes us the following particulars of a distressing accident which occurred in that place.—On Monday noon, two or three girls went into the cotton factory of Soper and Clark, in Rainbow, and descended into the wheel pit. The overseer, returning from dinner, started the wheel as usual, it being an "overshot" the water rushed over the top. While attempting to make their escape, one of the girls, named Hannah Eno, about 14 years old, was pushed against the wheel, which immediately caught one of her hands between the large gears, drawing her on to the wheel then down until wedged in between the wheel and the side of the building. In this situation the wheel stopped. But on account of the pressure of the water in the buckets, she was extricated with much difficulty. Her left leg was much torn, and her hands were nearly stripped of their fingers. It was found necessary to amputate her leg, and she bore the operation with great fortitude and patience. She survived however, but half an hour afterward.—Hartford Courant.

They all immediately started and ran towards Ann-st. The scene was witnessed by several boys, who think they can identify the man who struck the fatal blow.

The skull of the unfortunate man was found to be severely fractured, and he continued in a senseless condition until about 1 o'clock yesterday morning when he expired. An inquest was held on the body by coroner Shute, and a verdict rendered that the deceased came to his death by a blow inflicted by some person or persons unknown. Flynn was about 45 years of age, and has left a wife and several small children. The Police are confident that they shall succeed in finding the murderer.—Boston Atlas.

Mr. Editor, I beg to say by the proceedings of the Committee for the reception of Maria Van Buren, as published in the Daily Advertiser and Democrat of this morning, that the military are to be reviewed at 5 o'clock P. M. by the President, accompanied by the Hon. Mr. Poinsett Secretary of War. According to my understanding of the matter, the Committee were to have nothing to do in the arrangement of the Review. I understood the arrangement it was to be as follows:—Capt. Lowd of the U. S. Army, was to call upon the Secretary of War, after his arrival here, and inform him that his company was ready to be reviewed by him (the President accompanying if he wished,) in case he wished to review them. Capt. Lowd was to give information to the commandants of the different companies, two of which had agreed to accompany him in consideration of the very kind and gentleman treatment they had in many instances received from him, and for no other reason. Now how is it that the Committee have been authorized to announce the review in the order that they have, is more than I know, and I can only say that it is directly contrary to any understanding had by the company to which I have the honor to belong. I would just say, that I do not consider myself in any way holden to attend such a review as has been announced by the Committee, and would conclude by saying unless some explanation is given, that "I shall not be there on that day."

ONE WHO IS OPPOSED TO HUMBUGGERY.

MEXICO.

The schr Camanche, at New Orleans, brings Vera Cruz dates to the 8th, and city of Mexico to the 4th inst. There was no truth in the report that Santa Anna had been assassinated.

The return of Bustamante to power has been signaled by two acts which, in our opinion, are a bitter satire on the policy of Santa Anna. The first of these acts restores to the press all the rights and privileges which it formerly possessed. The second annuls the celebrated contract for a loan concluded by the hero of Tanculipa, which would have been extremely burdensome to Mexico. The demand for its being annulled was presented to the senate by a committee of the chamber of deputies on the 29th of July, and that body having given a decision as desired by the chamber, a decree in conformity thereof was published. The contract for the loan had been effected at London for 130,000L.

The United States schooner Foxer, Commodore Nicholson, belonging to the squadron in the Pacific Ocean, anchored in the port of Manzanilla on the 27th June, from a cruise along the western coast of Mexico.

The Camanche brings \$16,500 in specie, and several passengers.

Vera Cruz Aug. 7.—Don Ignacio Mora, general of engineers, arrived here to-day. He has brought with him workmen and tools, for repairing our mole, and building fortifications.

City of Mexico, July 30.—General Canales has asked to be relieved from the command of the Northern division of the army, in consequence of the bad state of his health.

The fictitious leaders, Lemus and Canales, continue their career as freebooters, without daring to face the troops of the Government. Captain Vidigary left them, and went to Montgomery to obtain his pardon.

In Talisco 92 insurgents had come to obtain their pardon.

In Valladolid the famous Rooda and other insurgents had also arrived to ask for pardon.

THE CREW OF THE SLAYER.—We learn from New Haven, that the Marshall and Clerk of the District left that place on Wednesday for New London, to take possession of the Amistad. The revenue cutter Wolcott, we are informed, was dispatched on the same day to New London, for the purpose of conveying the negroes to New Haven, to be examined before the United States Court, now in session there. The cutter was expected to return on Thursday.—N. Y. Times.

In this county, on Tuesday, 16th instant, by Abel Cowan, Esq., Mr. Richard Lafayette Burroughs, (shoemaker) to Miss Eliza Pool. All in favour of a Rail Road running west from Fayetteville—Free Schools—and opposed to Charles Fisher and the Sub-Treasury.

MELANCHOLY.—A young lady, a Miss Compton, aged 16 years, was drowned in the outlet of Chautauque lake, at Jamestown, on Thursday last. She was attempting to cross the stream upon a log, and slipped off. She remained in the water some 12 or 15 minutes before she was taken out, when all efforts to bring her too were unavailing.

ASPECT OF THE SKY.—Four of the largest planets are now visible in the south western sky, early in the evening, namely, Venus, Jupiter, Mars and Saturn.—Pennsylvanian.

ORDINARY DISCOVERY.—The Chronique de Paris relates the following extraordinary scene as having taken place at the Court of Thieves. A youth of about 19 was brought to trial for having broken the window of a baker's shop and stolen a two piced loaf.

The President—"Why did you steal the loaf?"
Prisoner—"I was driven by hunger."
"Why did you not buy it?"
"Because I had no money."
"But you have a gold ring on your finger; why did you not sell it?"

"I am a foundling; when I was taken from the bank of a doeb, this ring was suspended from my neck by a silken cord, and I kept it in the hope of thereby discovering at least who were my parents; I cannot dispose of it."
The Procureur de Roy made a violent speech against the prisoner, who was found guilty, and sentenced to imprisonment for five years. Ane mediator upon this woman, whose words were due by poverty than age, came forward and made the following declaration.

"Gentlemen of the jury, 20 years ago, a young woman was seduced by a young man of the same town, who after deceiving, abandoned her. Poor and oppressed, she was obliged to leave her child to the care of Providence. The child has since grown up, and the woman and the seducer have grown old:—the child in poverty, the woman in misery and her seducer in prosperity. They are all three now in court. The child is the unfortunate prisoner whom you have just pronounced guilty. The mother is myself, and there sits the father pointing to the Procureur de Roy."

THE IRISH SOLDIER.—The Irish make brave and faithful soldiers, and they are also very ingenious in the invention of warlike stratagems. A private of that nation belonging to one of the regular regiments under the command of Gen. Jackson, being on N. Orleans, while performing a tour of duty as one of the advanced sentinels nearest the enemy, stuck a large Irish potato on the point of his bayonete, with a view of inducing his comrade to desert from the British ranks. The device was unavailing and no deserters joined him. Indeed the attempt would have been extremely perilous in open day light, so closely were the British soldiers watched by their officers. When the sentinel was relieved, vexed at the ill success of his curious device—he exclaimed—"all the bloody red coats are English and Scotch."

MATERIA FOR MARRIAGE.—A fashionable lady in this city is going to have a house built soon, on one of the best sites in town. Mr. Van Buren is again trying his hand at his old favorite game. He intimates to his friends that Gen. Scott will not except the whig nomination, and accordingly the faithful are loud in proclaiming that Gen. Scott will not allow his name to head a pure Republican ticket, got up without the aid of office seeking or office holders. The Van Buren hawlers are most cowardly comparing the nomination of General Scott by the Whig Convention, to the base corruption and bribery of Mr. Clay's selling the office of Chief Magistrate of the United States to John Quincy Adams, and receiving for the same the appointment of Secretary of State.

What measures will not Van Buren stoop to, for the purpose of securing his re-election, by traveling through the country. Van Buren has become convinced of Gen. Scott's popularity, and fears no other man in the coming contest. The late elections in the South-west have sent Mr. Clay home sick and despair. While Mr. Van Buren continues his electioneering tour through the State of New York. Yesterday he entered our beautiful city, surrounded by the office holders, backed by the old blue light federalists who composed the grand receiving committee, as announced by the papers of the city. He commenced his regular zigzag course through the city, and finally stopped at the old federal Hall to refresh, &c. &c.

He then withdrew into the house, where friend Morton had prepared a dinner in the best style, and for aught we know there remains for so little sensation did he create, that very few noted his departure.

We saw several would be Scott men who six months since denounced Van Buren in the most violent terms, were yesterday the most faithful in the loco-foco ranks. We are sorry to see so much of the lickspittle in their character.

The Humming Bird.—During the morning service in one of our churches, my attention was attracted by a beautiful little humming bird, which alighted in the aisle, a few feet from my pew door. After a few moments, it appeared uneasy, and rose to the height of the pews, and again rested on the pavement as if satisfied, from the view it had taken, that it was not in danger of receiving injury in that holy temple of peace and love. And then the beautiful hummer would thrust up its head, and survey the scene, and then apply its long bill to its own tiny body, and pick the feathers.

The taster of the sweets of flowers had no doubt been gratifying its instincts in a neighboring garden, and, finding an open window, had entered. I could almost fancy that, not satisfied with making known the praises of its Maker, when sucking flowers on the parterre in the temple of nature, it had designed itself to accomplish the same object by presenting itself in a temple built by the hands of man. After sitting about a quarter of an hour, and while the speaker was occupied in directing the attention of his hearers to that other and better world, it spread its wings, and rose perpendicularly to the ceiling, as if it wished to aid in guiding the thoughts of the audience to death, and purity, and heaven. It almost seemed to be some little angel sent down on an errand of kindness and love, and having accomplished its mission, was returning to its own pure home.

The thoughts suggested by this incident were pleasing, yet mournful. And then the presence of this beautiful and harmless bird caused me to think of an infant, which had just entered into the great temple of nature, and opened its eyes and surveyed the scene, and not liking the prospects spread its wings and looked upward, as if it wished to return to its native heaven. And I thought that the sweet little flower which had just begun to expand its leaves, fragrant with the morning dew, to the first rays of the morning sun, calmly and gently laid its head

on its natural resting place—a mother's bosom—and looked, and smiled, and died. Died!—Life and immortality are brought to light by the gospel. Let not a mother mourn dead her sleeping babe. The flower, prematurely blighted by the winter's wind, as but transplanted to a more genial climate, where it shall flourish in immortal bloom—and she may console herself by adopting the language employed by David, when told that his child was dead, "I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me."—Baltimore Patriot.

Williams, Mr. E. Bronson, and W. C. Bronson, with nearly all their contents were wholly destroyed. Nine valuable horses were burned in the stables of the Hotel; the buildings consumed were surrounded by dwelling houses and stores, situated within a few feet. And it was only owing to the stillness of the night, that they were not all burned.—*Glen's Falls Spectator.*

GOLD BY THE POUND.—A keg containing several hundred pounds of gold coin—the value of which was \$125,000—was brought to this city on Thursday from St. Louis, and has since been conveyed eastward.—*Balt. Amer.*

A most foul and unprovoked murder was committed in this city on Monday evening last, just before sunset. The facts in the case, as we learn them, were these:—Mr. William Sandy, a discreet and respectable laboring man, residing just over the river, was in this city, and went into a small grocery kept by William G. Harrison, to get some chewing tobacco. After purchasing it some slight altercation between Harrison and Sandy took place, whereupon Harrison caught up a very heavy bludgeon and struck Sandy across the head which brought him to his knees. Instantly the blow was repeated in nearly the same place—and Sandy was a lifeless corpse. They were both stout, able bodied men. Harrison bustled about after the murder was committed, armed himself, procured a horse, and rode off. As he left the stable, we understand several persons were standing by, one or two of whom attempted to arrest him; but he presented a pistol and got away. Directly afterwards several persons started in pursuit, but up to last evening at sunset no news had arrived of his arrest. The Mayor has offered a reward of \$250 for his apprehension, and it is expected that the Governor will offer a reward also on behalf of the State. Previous to this murder Harrison bore a bad character.—*National Intelligencer.*

AURORA BOREALIS.—On Tuesday evening, about 9 o'clock the Heavens exhibited a scene of the most resplendent beauty ever beheld. The sky was perfectly clear, and the Aurora Borealis burst forth suddenly at a point near the zenith, in a form resembling a blazing sun, with radiations toward every point of the compass, which gradually extended until the rays reached on either side completely to the horizon. These rays were of a pale reddish hue, assuming a darker shade as it approached the centre. This singular phenomenon lasted but a few minutes; but for a considerable length of time the Aurora presented a scene of unusual splendor and beauty.—*Cour. & Enq.*

ARREST OF A BIGAMIST.—Yesterday afternoon, a gawky looking fellow, named De Witt Brown, was committed at the Upper Police by Justice Palmer, on a charge of bigamy, in marrying an amiable and respectable spinster, named Josephine Rogee, during the life time of his lawful wife Eliza.

From the affidavits in the case, it appears that on the 4th of January, 1836, Brown was married to one Eliza Baily, by the Rev. Samuel Cochran, at the time a clergyman officiating in this city. It did not appear how long he lived with his wife, but on the 15th of July, 1838, he married Josephine Rogee, and came in possession of \$1000 belonging to her, with which he purchased a sloop and commenced sailing up and down the North River, and continued living with her until the 20th of August last, when she discovered that his first wife still living, and immediately left the house, taking with her an only child, the fruit of their union.

Brown acknowledged both marriages, but said in his defence that his first wife had another husband living at the time he married her, and that she had been living in a state of prostitution on the Five Points for two years past.—*New York Post.*

MURAT.—The history of Murat's desperate—almost frantic, descent upon Naples is well known. The following is the touching letter which he wrote to his wife the moment he was informed of a commission having been appointed to try him:—

My dear Caroline—My last hour is come, in a few brief moments I shall have ceased to live, and thou to have a husband—I die innocent. My life has never been sullied by any act of injustice. Adieu, my Achilles!—adieu, my Lotiza!—adieu my Lucien!—adieu, my Louise!—show yourselves to the world worthy of me. Please you without kingdom—without fortune, amidst numerous enemies. Be united and superior to misfortune. Think of what ye are, not of what ye have been, and God will bless your weakness. Do not reproach my memory. Believe, that the greatest anguish which I feel in this extremity of life, is to die at a distance from you all—my beloved family. Accept my paternal benediction; receive my embraces and my tears. Have always present the memory of your unhappy father,

MARTIN VAN BUREN.

The recent visit of the President to this city, together with the many circumstances attending it, must convince every one who is not blinded by party prejudice, that his onward progress must be impeded, or that Republican Institutions can survive his administration but for a short time. At every place he visits, his intriguing inclination displays itself; and the very anti-democratic measures which have been condemned, time and time again by the people, are again urged upon their acceptance.

A State Abolition Society was formed at Whippany, New Jersey, a few days since. The following resolution was adopted by the Convention—yes 52, noes 13:

Resolved, That we will neither vote for, nor support the election of any man for President or Vice President of the United States, or for Governor, or for any lucrative office, who is not in favor of the immediate abolition of slavery.

FIRE AT MASSILON, O.—A saw mill attached to the Massilon rolling mill company, was destroyed by fire on the 1st inst. Loss, \$5,000. No insurance.

FIRE.—The Steam Saw mill of Wm. Neil, situated near the Penitentiary in Columbus, was burned a few nights since, with 40,000 feet of Lumber. Neil's loss estimated at 4,000. The Journal says the public voice ascribes the fire to the fiendish act of an incendiary.

The French armed brig Voltigeur, Berard, of 20 guns and 110 men, arrived at New York on Thursday last, from Vera Cruz.

A MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—At Relliville, on the 2nd instant, while the Artillery company, commanded by Capt. B. CHAPMAN, were going through with the exercise of firing the cannon, the Infantry company, commanded by Capt. R. 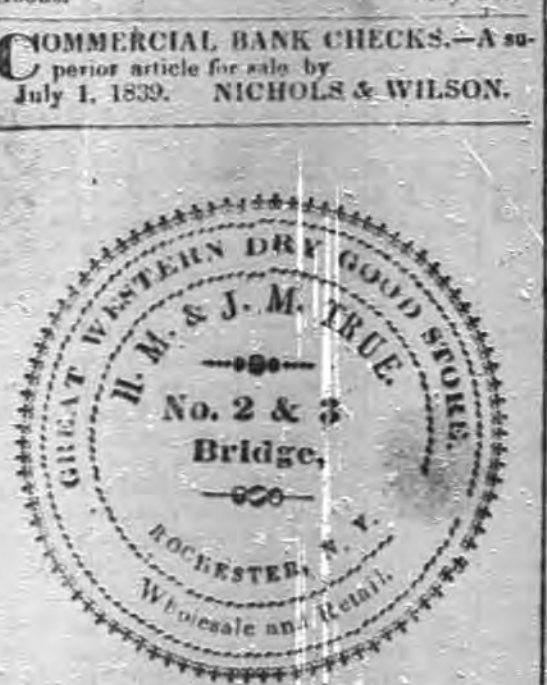

THE NEWSPAPER PRESS.—A great diversity of opinion seems to prevail in reference to the uses, purposes, and responsibilities of the newspaper press, and the mode in which it ought to be conducted. Others look upon it as a medium merely for recording awful accidents, strange incidents and dreadful catastrophes. Others again would confine it to giving the latest news of the state of markets, prices current, and passing comments upon the fashions, manners, and customs of the day. Even those who regard a newspaper as a political engine, frequently entertain very strange views as to its uses and abuses. To please some men, a political editor must consent to become a species of party bull-dog, to bark and bite only as he is bidden by his generous keepers, who chain him up when his services are not needed, and feed him because his strength may be serviceable to his master. These men imagine that an editor must have no volition of his own—no perception of right or wrong, except such as their vision may reflect—no compass to guide his course except their will—no independence, no manliness—no principle except their pleasure.—When it can answer their selfish aims that he should attack a particular individual or set of individuals, or oppose or defend a given measure, no asperity of remark—no bitterness of epithet, no boldness of denunciation, can be too exaggerated to meet their approbation.

Not a murmur do we hear from them at such times, that the decorum of discussion is disregarded, or that charities and courtesies are violated. They would have an editor indulge in large and loud-mouthed professions of his regard for the rights and interests of the people at large, they would have him profess a holy horror of iniquity wherever it may exist—and deal in general declamation, as a gulltrap, to catch the confidence of the middling classes—but this is all. The moment an editor attempts to reduce his profession to practice—the moment he gives an earnest of his sincerity to the people, the attempting to un-look hypocrisy, and drag before the public gaze the secret practices of some pliant tool of an exclusive coterie,—then come, from such men, the whispers of discontent—the secret rebuke—the threatened vengeance—the malignant scowl—and finally, the last and meanest resort of little minds, and attempt to control the liberty of the press, by indictment for libel. Then does he hear, with astonishment, for the first time, that men, who have applauded the most direct and unequivocal attacks, when levelled in other directions, "cannot submit to countenance personalities; and condemn the practice of assailing private character, even though the individual assailed, be over so guilty." Beautiful consistency! Private character indeed! For example; suppose that individual, entrusted with a responsible station in an incorporated company—an officer perhaps, of our courts of justice, sworn to discharge the duties of his office honestly and honorably—a man holding within his hands extraordinary means of oppression, one who of all others, should set an example worthy of imitation, instead of becoming a shun board to others, suppose an individual thus circumstanced should be specifically charged in a public paper with oppressive conduct in the discharge of his duties, and that his friends should claim for him the immunities which belong to private character—what become of the rights of the community? Where is the laboring man to look for redress—where is the mechanic to seek compensation for injury, if the press buzzed against his complaints? If an obscure individual, friendless, destitute, ignorant, violate a moral or social obligation, or trespass ever so slightly upon the most dubious privileges of certain classes, a minute account of the transaction, with name, circumstances, occasion, and reprobatory comments find a ready admission into the most "respectable public prints," and give no offence to the most fastidious reader. There is no indelicacy in disclosing the names and offences of the humble—no promulgation of the liberty of the press, no un-

justifiable personality in the matter! Why should not the same rule apply in all cases and to all persons? Has one man immunities and privileges that another man has not? Do we not all live in a land where the rights of individuals are the same? By what standard of justice, by what rule of propriety shall knavery escape censure because it is exalted? Is villainy to go uncouraged because it has crept up in the scale of society? Must the press speak in courtly phrase, and lip a delicate disapproval only, whenever it refers to professional rapacity, which, if displayed in the conduct of a mechanic, or a man in an humble vocation, would be denounced as downright scoundrelism? Away with these shallow artifices—the baseless distinctions of weak and wicked minds. Seek to restrain with cobwebs the mightiest engines of the age. The functions of the press, powerful as they have become, are not half developed yet. Its duty to society is so co-extensive with its power. Already its thundershakes the foliage of the tree of corruption, ere long its lightning will rive its trunk to its roots.

STORM ON THE COAST.

The following appalling accounts is by a gentleman who was on the spot, and beheld the scene which he describes:—

Our coast has recently been visited by a storm more violent perhaps than any heretofore known. On Monday evening, 26th ultimo, the roaring of the surf gave evidence to the practised ear of approaching danger; while a clear sky and Southern breeze served but to fall suspicion in the hearts of those who confide to such treacherous omens. By Wednesday, at noon, the whole coast seemed to tremble under the ocean's surge. The wind then changed to East-North-East, gradually increasing, and by Thursday morning, it blew with tremendous violence.

As night shut in, the storm increased, filling the sounds and rivers with water from the sea, and threatening destruction to every obstacle that offered to impede its progress. By midnight the scene in Portsmouth or elsewhere was fearful and the scene in the extreme. The wind having changed to NNW, blew with unabated fury, driving the angry waters from the Sound completely over the island, with a force that defies description. The rain fell in torrents; while the wind, lifting the waters up, swept them onward, apparently in sheets, that were snow-drifts white. The awful roaring of the elements resembled a continual peal of deep thunder, and seemed to ring the death knell to every ear.

There were few houses upon the island where the rushing waters had not now reached the floors, which were rising and having within as the forcing of a door through which death stood prepared to enter. Consternation filled every breast; and during an hour when the waters seemed neither to raise nor fall, it is difficult to imagine the feelings of those who were alive to the dangers which surrounded them. The storm having now spent its fury, the waters gradually receded; and the first sight of land cheered every heart.

As the day broke, and the gale abated, a heart sickening sight presented itself among the shipping near the island. Vessels were sunk, ashore, capsized, dismantled, with their exhausted crews clinging to the wrecks, and by signals imploring succor. So soon as the sea was sufficiently calm, boats put off, manned by the hardy pilots of the island, and brought the sufferers to shore.

ARRIVAL OF THE GREAT WESTERN.
TWENTY-FOUR DAYS LATER.
The favorite steam packet Great Western was telegraphed this morning, a little before 7 o'clock, and arrived at her berth at the foot of Clinton street at about 11 o'clock. By her we have received our files of European papers—London and Liverpool to the 23d of August, and Bristol to the day of departure, the 24th ultimo.

THE HARVEST.
The most important event to the country is the probable result of the wheat harvest in England and on the continent of Europe. In France most of the grain had been harvested and the crops were remarkably good. In the southern parts of England the wheat harvest was nearly over, and the crops generally good. In Wiltshire very little was cut, up to the 23d, but the crops it is believed, will be tolerably good.

The treaty between France and Mexico has been ratified.

Spain is still in a deplorable condition, and there is no prospect of a speedy change.

Mr. Spring Rice is to be succeeded by Mr. F. T. Baring as Chancellor of the Exchequer.

The U. S. Bank agency of Mr. Jaudon has ceased in London, and hereafter the bank will draw on Baring, Brothers & Co.

The French government is looking to an increase of steam vessels for naval purposes.

Mr. Webster was in Scotland at the close of Aug. He was to be present at the Tournament.

Another thing has taken place, which will tend to keep money in England. We allude to that important act of the repeal of the usury law. By the passage of this bill, money for all purposes, except loans on lands, and on goods left with the pawn brokers, is a merchantable article; and can be loaned on bills, &c. &c. at any rate which may be agreed upon.

Parliament was to be prorogued on the 27th ult. The Penny Postage Bill has become a law.

The Great Western arrived at Bristol after a passage of 12 days 11 hours; the Queen at Portsmouth in 13 days 14 hours—being about one day in favor of the Western.

The British Government has announced its intention to have steam communication with all the West India Islands. The arrangements were laid before the House of Commons by the Secretary of the Admiralty.

The Chartists continue agitating various parts of England, it is believed that little mischief will be done.

THE COTTON MARKET.—Large sales have been made both to the trade and for export at improving rates, and should the weather continue favorable for the harvest, prices will probably improve to the extent of 1-5 per lb.

In the House of Commons on the 22d ult. Lord Palmerston stated there would be no disturbance of the peace of the East, unless some new subject of difference arose, of which there was no prospect whatever at present. A basis for the settlement of affairs between Egypt and Turkey has been agreed on by the five powers and accepted by the Turkish Government.

The Mechanics in Western New York, are as well situated to conduct, and profit by, exhibitions of this kind, as their Brethren of the Metropolis, whose Fair is now in progression. A committee appointed from the Institution here are in attendance, by a particular invitation from that Association, from which we shall receive a correct account before the Fair here takes place.

It is not to be expected that the exhibitions in Rochester will come up to New York at this time, as this is the first attempt; but the committee are conscious that the enterprising Mechanics or a large portion of them, are sufficiently aroused, to make a splendid display of their skill and usefulness. The time of receiving articles will be the week previous to the exhibition, which takes place the first day of October. The place will be made known hereafter in the public papers; or any one may learn, by calling upon the Committee.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—As the large omnibus employed to carry passengers between the Southern and Northern railroad depot was crossing the canal on 12 street this morning about 25 minutes before 6 o'clock, a portion of the bridge suddenly gave way, and the wagon and its contents precipitated a distance of 18 or 20 feet into the canal. The passengers, 40 in number, and the horses were rescued from their perilous condition with but trifling injury, by the prompt assistance of several persons in boats; but we regret to add that a young man connected with the steamboat line, and, we are informed, the principal support of a widowed mother, was drowned. The accident was occasioned by the imperfect condition of the bridge, many of the timbers being rotten, and the great weight of the vehicle and its contents, and yet this bridge was apparently the safest of any crossing the canal. The situation of the bridge on 14th street is so dangerous, that persons on horseback rarely attempt to cross it.

We understand that the draw on the Long bridge crossing the Potomac is out of order, and the crossing across the bridge will be interrupted until it is repaired next.

THE SCHR. ONECO, OF BELFAST, (IRE) ABANDONED AT SEA.—The brig Caldoni, Manson, arrived yesterday having on board the captain, crew, and two passengers, from the schr. Oneco. Capt. Peary, of Belfast, Me., 4 days from Jefferson, Ga., for Middletown, Ct., which vessel was fallen in with on the 1st inst. lat 34 37, lon. 73 28. No spare standing—full of water and just breaking to pieces—the main deck was all gone. She was capsized in the gale of the 20th—cut away the main mast, when she righted full of water—they lost every thing except what clothes they had on. They had nothing to eat or drink from the time of the disaster till they were taken off.—Journal of Commerce.

FIRE AT ST. LOUIS—LOSS OF LIFE.

BULLETIN OFFICE, ST. LOUIS, }
Saturday, Aug. 31, 11 A. M. }

A fire broke out this morning, between three and four o'clock, in the store of Blaine, Tompkins and Barret, on Front street, which completely destroyed that building, together with the stores of Stebbins & January, G. M. Willing & Co., Alvey & Co., O. Cobb, J. New, Wm. Smith, Robert's clothing store, and several smaller establishments. The stores of J. & E. Walsh, and H. N. Davis, on Broadway, were damaged, and only saved by the greatest exertions.

But the most melancholy part of this fire calamity is yet to be related. A number of persons, among them some of our most worthy and esteemed citizens, have lost their lives. Those already recognized are Benj. L. Turnbull, Esq. James Hayden Esq. a clerk in the store of G. M. Willing & Co. and Arthur Brewer, a carpenter.

CONSPIRACY TO BURN THE PRISON.—One day last week, while the Investigating Committee were in session, a plot to burn the Mount Pleasant State Prison was discovered, which, had it been carried into effect, might have proved fatal to every inmate of the prison. The plan of the conspirators was to fire the bellry of the prison just previous to the time of locking up the prisoners; and in the confusion that would naturally result, accomplish their object. A convict in one of the shops was to furnish a convict in the hall with a skeleton key, by which he could obtain access to the attic of the prison; the convict in the hall had prepared a good supply of combustible materials, and with these and a lamp he was to ascend the attic a little before night, fire them in such a manner that they would burn slowly, and then retreating leave all fast behind him.

The calculation was that the fire would be discovered just before the men would be locked up for the night, so that in the confusion they might cut the hose of the prison engine, (as had been done in a case of fire at the Auburn prison) and with many others effect their escape.

Had the whole of this diabolical plot succeeded, except that the fire should remain undiscovered until the prison was closed, it is altogether probable that nearly every man confined there would have been smothered to death, as it would have been impossible for the keepers to rescue them.

The fellow who was to execute the infernal deed, has confessed his guilt, and says, it was their intention, when the fire should break out instead of assisting to extinguish the flames, to "tear down the prison—as they have done at Auburn."—Hartchester Herald.

THE SICKNESS.—We regret being compelled to state, that the health of our city is worse, and that the number of deaths has greatly increased within the last two days.

LIBERALITY.—At a fair lately held in Boston, by the Sisters of Charity—a Catholic religious order—the proceeds amounted to the sum of \$3,000. It ought to be noted to the credit of their liberality of feeling, that the population of Boston is almost exclusively Protestant.

MYSTERIOUS.—We learn that the store of C. & R. Alanworth, in East Williamstown, (Vt.) was burnt to the ground on Wednesday afternoon of last week. The cause of the fire is wrapped in mystery, and is an interesting subject for the investigation of chemists. While one of the proprietors and the clerk were engaged in writing, a cask about half filled with New England rum to their great consternation, burst with a loud noise, and the liquor, on fire, was spread over the floor. The whole store was enveloped in flames in a few minutes, and not even the account books or other documents were saved. The Post Office was kept in the same building, and all its contents destroyed. No fire had been in the building to the knowledge of the occupants, and no clue is yet obtained to the manner in which it was communicated to the hoghead of rum. The loss of property is supposed to exceed \$5000, of which \$3000 is insured. This furnishes another fact to prove that rum is dangerous, article; and no man should keep it in his store.—Boston Journal.

We were wrong in stating that it was Mr. Peacock's paper the Lyons borrowed; it was another's.

Crops in North Carolina are suffering for want of rain. The cotton prospects are not so good by 50 per cent. as they were four weeks ago.

GALLANT CONDUCT.—The following notice of the brave and gallant conduct of a son of North Carolina is given to the News and Spectator. That paper states that fourteen vessels, by the late gale, were driven on the bar near that town. The crews of three of the vessels were rescued by the strong limbs and brave heart of one man. The Spectator says:

We cannot close our brief notice of the events of the gale without paying a well merited tribute of admiration and applause to Mr. AMASA STYRON, for his noble daring in behalf of his suffering fellow citizens. During the latter part of the late gale, and at a time when others stood aloof from the perilous undertaking, Mr. S. put off alone in an open pilot boat, and succeeded in saving the lives of three crews who were in imminent danger. The first vessel he approached, the Thomas Winn, was sunk, and in so exposed a situation, that he could not get along side; the gallant Styron anchored his boat a short distance from the wreck, plunged into the boiling surge, swam to the vessel, obtained a "line," and again swam to his boat! The line having been made fast to the boat, the crew of the wreck warped her along side, got on board, and were rescued from a watery grave.

The intrepid Styron next succeeded in boarding the Alabama, and taking off her exhausted and exposed crew, whom he landed at Portsmouth.

With a perseverance which does him everlasting honor, the dauntless Styron again put to sea in his boat, determined to save the crew of the Wm. Gray, or perish in the attempt. Her situation was so exposed that he could not approach nearer than about twenty yards of her, to leeward, where he anchored. He leaped among the breakers, encouraged the crew to throw their baggage overboard and accompany it, assuring them that, the boat being to leeward, all would be saved. After some hesitation they complied, reached the boat, and were saved. At this time a strong ebb tide prevented their return to Portsmouth. Styron landed them, thro' the breakers, on the sea-ward side of Dry Shoal point, where all remained till the flood tide made, when they launched about 11 o'clock at night, almost exhausted with fatigue and exposure.

LOWER CANADA.

The trial of Jalbert who has been tried for the murder of Lieut. Weir, is creating a great deal of excitement in Montreal. The Jury have gone out on his case, and thus far have not been able to agree, though they have been out a long time. It is not probable they will agree. There does not appear to be any doubt that Jalbert killed Lieut. Weir, but the defence is technical and palatial, on the ground of a state of war existing, as far as we can get at it. The Courier says:—If the case occurred in the United States, Judge Lynch would, infallibly, be Jalbert's executioner. As it is, here, such is the exasperation of the British-inhabitants, that, if acquitted, as we believe he will be, there will be some risk to his carcass. We say, we believe he will be acquitted, because the majority of the Jury are French, and it is seldom that a man found who will hold out against a majority—the three Britons on the Jury may not be firm men, and may yield their opinions to the majority.

EARTHQUAKE.—It is stated in Cincinnati paper that a severe shock of an earthquake was experienced at Maysville on Friday Morning, about sunrise. It lasted several seconds, and made quite a rattling of the furniture and glass in the city.

Correspondence of the New York Times. Extracts from a letter, dated London, Aug. 18th.—On Thursday I visited the House of Lords for the first time, and obtained a place on the floor of the House through a letter of introduction to the Lord Chancellor. Viscount Melbourne was speaking when I entered, and I had a good view of him. There is nothing remarkable in his face except a cunning yankee expression. I cannot say I was much pleased with the Premier's speech. He appeared confused and lacked that fluency, without which no man can be an orator. The venerable Duke of Wellington replied. Age has made some inroads upon the old hero—his head is silver white—his eyes are a little sunken, and his voice tremulous. He is no Demosthenes, but a straight forward soldier; yet his remarks were full of good sense, and his language was nervous and to the point. Webster has been overwhelmed with attentions ever since his arrival. The Ministers and most of the Nobility paid their respects to him and the Queen invited him and Mrs. Webster to dinner.

Two large arrivals of flour and wheat this morning. The schooner Franklin, Martin, master, brings 2227 bushels wheat, and 663 barrels flour from St. Josephs, Michigan, and the Havre, has 4358 bushels wheat, 310 barrels flour and 30 barrels corn from Cleveland. The cargo of the Havre is of the new crop.—Buffalo Ad.

THE WAGES OF INQUIRY.—We are informed that the captain of a slave schooner owned in Matanzas by an American and an Italian, put into Porto Rico a short time since, sold his load of negroes, and swartwouted with the money, about \$70,000. The owners have no redress.—Jour. Com.

We learn from the N. H. Herald of Wednesday, that another of the Africans, called Bootah, died that morning in the jail of that city. This is the twelfth of the party that has died since they left Havana.—N. Y. Com.

Mr. Chequer, the gentleman who was so badly hurt by the accident on the Camden and Amboy Railroad, on Wednesday, died this morning.—ib.

CAUGHT AT LAST.—On the 22d of July, 1836, the treasury of Brazil at Rio Janeiro was robbed of 400 millions of reis. For a long time nothing could be discovered of the perpetrators. It is now satisfactorily ascertained that they were Pedro Pelechi (a blacksmith) and Rufino Ignatio does Santos, a seaman. These men have been arrested, and have confessed the crime. They had accomplices but no others assisted in the actual commission of the robbery, except a slave. We do not find that any of the money has been recovered.

MONROE COUNTY—REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

The Republican Electors of Monroe County are requested to assemble in their respective towns and wards on Thursday, September 16, to appoint delegates to represent them in the County Convention at the National Hotel, late Monroe House, in Rochester, on Saturday the 28th of September.

The County Convention is for the purpose of appointing delegates to the Senatorial Convention—for nominating candidates for the Assembly from Monroe county—and for the transaction of such other business as may be deemed requisite.

The above notice appears in the Daily Advertiser and Rochester Republican, and is a precious specimen of the fraud, impudence, and humbuggering practised by the miserable jays of office holders in this city.

In the first place, no meeting of the Central Committee has been held in the last two months, at which a quorum was present. The Republican Central Committee consists of seven members, and it requires four to form a quorum for business. When I sat Master O'Reilly says that he calls the County Convention "By Order of the Central Committee," he tells what he knows to be false, if he means that the Convention was ordered at a regular meeting of the Committee at which a quorum was present. If a County Convention assembles according to the "orders" of O'Reilly, its doings will be irregular and nugatory. If it makes a nomination for members of Assembly, the nomination will not be binding, because the Convention is got up contrary to the old and long established usages of the Democratic party.

It has always been the custom for the Central Committee to sign calls for County Conventions; but in this case the chairman has "taken the responsibility" of calling a convention himself, assuming to act in pursuance of orders he never received. The Republicans of Monroe ought to reflect seriously upon the conduct of an officer of the General Government, a man who is receiving from \$2000 to \$3000 per year out of the public purse; and yet assumes to violate the usages of the Democratic party, and order Conventions to assemble upon his individual authority, or in obedience to orders from Washington. We hope that no real Republican who is attached to the old and long tried usages of the party, will countenance O'Reilly's Convention. Such attempts at dictation in any quarter, and especially in a hired and paid tool of the Executive, should be resisted in the outset. The party ought to rebuke this self-conceited foreigner by passing resolutions at their primary meetings, that the call for the Convention is irregular and void. If they have a particle of manly independence left, they will do so.

Is Mr. Clay the right man for the Whigs to nominate? We answer yes if they want to be sorely beaten. The friends of Gen. Scott claim no agency nor participation in the issue, management, or result of the elections lately held in Tennessee, Indiana, Vermont, or Maine, and what can Mr. Clay or his friends boast of in the result of these elections judging from this fact, that the issue was with Mr. Clay, and him only, as the whig candidate for the Presidency in opposition to Mr. Van Buren?

We think that it would be far better for the whigs in the end, to make no nomination at all, than to nominate Mr. Clay, for if they should nominate him, and get most sorely beaten, as every intelligent man knows they must, they will most certainly lose the confidence of the rank and file of their party throughout the Union. The choice of a candidate at this particular time is every thing—and if they will canvass the voice, the wishes, and the feelings of the people, they will nominate the right man.

We would recommend in candour one other very important thing the whigs ought to do, in order to be successful, and that is, come out with their principles, avow them, and let the people know what they intend to do, if fortunate enough to be successful. Mere opposition to the Administration and its measures will never satisfy an enquiring mind.

KNOWLEDGE IS POWER.—CURIOUS ILLUSTRATION.—At a meeting which took place the other evening for the purpose of forming a North London Mechanic Institution, Mr. Basil Montagu, as an illustration of the maxim that knowledge is power, related the following anecdote:—He was walking a few months ago in Portland Place, when he observed a large crowd of people assembled, and found that it was in consequence of a large mastiff dog having a lesser one in his gripe. Several persons tried, by splitting the mastiff's ears, and by biting and pinching his tail, to make it let go its hold, but in vain. At last a delicate and dandified young gentleman came up, and making his way through the crowd into the circle requested to be allowed to separate the dogs; assent was given amid jeers and laughter, when the dandy slowly drew from his pocket a large snuff-box, and having taken a pinch himself, inserted his fingers again into the box, and deliberately applied it to the mastiff's nose. The snuff operated so powerfully on the animal's olfactory nerves, that it not only immediately let go its hold, but made its escape as fast as he could. The dandy was loudly cheered; upon which he stopped for a moment, and said, "Gentlemen, I have merely given you a proof that 'Knowledge is power.'"

ACCIDENT.—We are sorry to state that on the arrival of the Steamboat Carroll, on Thursday evening, from the battle ground, Mr. John Pidgeon, one of the oldest printers of this city, and a soldier at the battle of North Point, fell into the water while attempting to land. He was drawn out, and seemed to revive considerably, inasmuch that his final recovery seemed altogether likely, but he died during the night.—Baltimore American.

Mr. Pidgeon was for some time a resident of this city. In one of the battles of the late war he received a wound which caused him to be lame till the day of his death. On this account he received a pension of \$90 per annum from the government.

The editor of the St. Louis Republican publishes the following letter as having been received by him from a respectable business firm in Alton.

Alton, Sept. 2, 1839.

Messrs. Editors:—Our town was the scene of much excitement yesterday, in consequence of a report that "F. G. T. M. DAVIS," an attorney at law of this place, had swartwouted on Saturday having in his possession a large amount of money belonging to his clients.

It is said that he has about \$15,000 or \$20,000 belonging to clients living in New York, Philadelphia and Boston, and has left a host of inquiring creditors here.

Under pretence of going a few miles into the country he engaged a horse at one of our livery stables, just at night on Saturday. Late in the night he was seen wending his way to Carrolton, with the view, no doubt, of overtaking the Chicago stage. To some, who have known Davis this step is not much unexpected. Still he has

been enticed with a large amount of business for collection by distant creditors.

He left his daughter on her death bed, and under circumstances the most inhuman. She died yesterday about the time the excitement first broke out. Some of his creditors have this morning gone in pursuit, and may possibly overhail him before he reaches Canada, whether he doubtless has fled. He is about 32 or 33 years of age, 5 feet 8 or 10 inches in length, slender, sandy hair; light complexion and stooping in his gait; shrill voice, loud talker and a very hard dog look.

Handbills are in circulation in every direction. Some of your citizens, I believe, are interested in this elopement, to what extent is not known. As the chase is all directed to the north, he may play fox and hen south.

DETECTIVE OF BURGLARS.—Large amount of stolen Property Recovered.—Early in the month of August, the extensive dry goods warehouse of Messrs. Wagoner & Ripka, North Front street, Philadelphia, was entered with false keys by some burglars, and property to the amount of nearly \$1000 carried away. Among the property taken was about 2000 silk shawls, pieces of velvet, boxes of shawls &c. &c. Information of the robbery having been immediately sent to this city, and a reward offered for the recovery of the stolen goods, some of the officers set about looking them up. From some information which they soon obtained, they went to the warehouse of the United Transportation Line, and there recovered three boxes of the stolen goods, which had probably in the first instance been sent on here by the burglars, and were now being reshipped for Philadelphia. From thence they were enabled to trace out the shippers, who proved to be two old English rogues, named Charles and James Webb, the former having served out a term of imprisonment at Sing Sing, and the latter in the Maryland State Prison. They found them occupying apartments in a respectable house in Third avenue, on searching which, several copies skeleton keys, sealing ladders very ingenious construction, and also a very beautiful Jack, (an instrument for forcing doors,) besides a great variety of other house-breaking tools. Yesterday Mr. Christian Miller made a report of the robbery and of the identity of the thieves stolen and recovered, upon which the two Webbs were fully committed for trial.—New York Whig.

REAL ESTATE, OR "RED DOG" BANKS.

These lazy, idle, selfish concerns, are springing up like mushrooms all over the country, and the speculators and land sharks concerned in them are alike busily in making the most of their short lived shaving, grinding establishments. RIOT IN OHIO.—A violent outrage was recently perpetrated in Marion county, Ohio, by the retainers of an alleged runaway slave. On the day of the trial an unusual number of persons assembled at the court house to learn the result. The witnesses were examined, and counsel heard, but the judge reserved his decision till the next morning. In the morning the judge decided in favor of the prisoner. We copy an account of what followed from the Marion Visitor.

As soon as the decision was ended, the pretended owners seized the prisoner—the bystanders resisted and endeavored to rescue him, declaring him to be free and desiring them to let him run at large, but the Virginians still maintained the possession by force, and presented pistols, bowie knives, dirks, etc, threatening the lives of all those who would lay hands on them or the negro, and all this in open court. Our citizens and friends from the country stood out in defence of their trampled and insulted laws which were thus set at defiance.

In the scene of confusion the negro was taken down stairs, and dragged by his captors through the streets. Those who forced him onward were armed with pistols, bowie knives, and daggers.—At this unusual and horrible sight, the populace became enraged, and attacked them with stones and whatever missiles they could get hold of—they at length succeeded in getting him into one of our justice's office, and there guarded him, (as is stated for a new trial.) Before the door of the office the excited multitude assembled, demanding justice and the negro, but of no avail, the entrance was guarded with pistols and bowie knives. At this time the Sheriff arrived and begged to be heard, and requested the mob to disperse, but this was also of no effect. At length the cry for the public arms was made, the arsenal broken open and the arms obtained, which presented a horrible spectacle. The excited populace under arms still demanded entrance which was refused. All the orders of the Sheriff and court to restore order seemed to be of no effect. Pistols and bowie knives were all the law.

At length one of the Associate Judges, (Judge

Anderson) left the bench, and in defiance of cocked pistols and flashing steel, forced his way into the office, after which others followed, and burst open the back door, by which means the negro made his escape. He had run but a short distance, when he was overtaken by his pursuer who threatened, with presented pistol, to shoot him if he did not stop. At this time a number of enraged multitude fell upon the pursuer and knocked him down, another who came to his assistance, shared the same fate. This confusion continued until orders were given to arrest the rioters. During the arrest of the rioters, the negro made his escape and has not since been heard of. In order to give our readers an idea of the spirit that prevailed, we quote one of the threats thrown out by one of the rioters; "By the living God in heaven, I will shoot that fellow!"

We should farther remark that the rioters (we believe eight in number,) were the same day arrested, and recognized to appear from day to day, under bonds of \$600 each.

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

MEMORIAL OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand.—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress.—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shrapnelers and to fraudulent bankrupts.

Public expectation is an apt tool to ascertain the names of those mean spirited pretenders to Democracy, who will obey the orders of O'Reilly and degrade themselves by consenting to act as the tools of the Tipperary Post Master. His Republican Majesty, Martin the First, has ordered O'Reilly, Tucker and Smith to draw up their forces, nominate a county ticket, and endeavor to show a "Van Buren gain" this fall in Monroe County. It is our private opinion, that the federal jack will find hard sledding in these parts. Most of the old Jackson "corp's guard" are in favor of Scott, and the whole democratic party in the city are disgusted at the insolence of the President's official menials. That the poor scamps who keep soul and body together by feeding upon the bones thrown to them by the Executive, should dare to insult freemen by taking the lead in political matters, is so bad. Let them do the dirty work of their master the President; it is their vocation—but let them not dare to ask Republicans to sanction federalism at the polls. Toryism will show a "small yield" in Rochester, at the end of the "three days."

Hundreds of citizens from the surrounding towns came to Rochester when the President was here, expecting to see Mr. McKenzie, as it was rumored that he would be, set at liberty by the President. But alas! the "laughing Hyena of Kinderhook" had not soul for such a noble act. The firm and bold advocate for Liberty; the sincere and zealous (though somewhat indiscreet) champion of Canadian freedom, remained incarcerated in a lousy dungeon in the city of Rochester; whilst the perfumed and whiskered dandy that fills the Presidency was making his triumphal entry into the same city! Poor McKenzie is imprisoned for an alleged violation of the infamous "neutrality law"—a law, which if it had existed in France during our revolution, would have consigned Franklin to a dungeon. The authors of the outrage at Schlosser are honored and rewarded by the British Government—whilst the friends of freedom are persecuted in "free and happy America!" The truth is, that Van Buren is at heart a Tory and Tyrant, and he has attained his present station by hypocritical professions of Democracy.

On the arrival of the train at the station, the bride was placed in one of the first rate carriages, and the luggage placed in a proper place of security, but while the bridegroom (M. D.) was taking leave of a number of friends who had accompanied him to the spot, the conductor gave the word "all right," the engine turned on the steam, and in an instant it (the train) shot off at so rapid a rate as to be out of sight. The feeling of the gentleman on being deprived of the society of his lovely bride so soon and under such circumstances, may be more easily conceived than described; and what was to be done upon the emergency seemed naturally to perplex him much, but he at length determined "posting it to Southampton," and that no time might be lost, four horses were at once put to one of the carriages, and he having taken his seat in it the vehicle was driven off at a pace little short of railroad speed.—English paper.

THE FAITHFUL DOG.—In Youatt's "Harmanity to Brutes" is recorded the following anecdote of a Newfoundland dog:

"A vessel was driven on the beach, off Lloyds, in Kent. The surf was rolling furiously, eight poor fellows were crying for help, but not a boat could be got off to their assistance. At length a gentleman came on the beach, accompanied by his Newfoundland dog. He directed the attention of the animal to the vessel, and put a short stick into his mouth. The intelligent courageous fellow at once understood his meaning sprang into the sea, and fought his way through the waves. He could not, however, get close enough to the vessel to deliver that with which he was charged; but the crew joyfully made fast a rope to another piece of wood, and throw it towards him. He saw the whole business in an instant; he dropped his own piece, and immediately seized that which had been cast to him; and then, with a degree of strength and determination almost incredible, he dragged it through the surf and delivered it to his master. A line of communication was thus formed and every man on board was rescued from a watery grave."

The whole of the inside roof of St. Paul's Church in Montreal fell last Tuesday with a terrible crash, destroying nearly every pew in it.

William B. Annin, engraver, and formerly of the well known firm of Annin & Smith, of Boston, committed suicide on the 12th inst., his boarding house in that city. He hung himself by his handkerchief to the corner of his chamber door, and was found there by his landlady, when she went to his room to look for him in consequence of his absence from the breakfast table.

A SCENE.—A poor miserable looking Irishman, named Patrick McCaffrey, was put to the bar of the Court of Special Sessions, yesterday morning, to answer to some complaint of petty theft. There being no evidence, however, to convict him, he was ordered to be discharged. The moment this was proclaimed, a man jumped up in the middle of the room, and said, addressing himself to the Court—"If you discharge that man, I shall arrest him as a deserter." The Recorder told him if he did do so he must do it at his own peril, and that he must wait until the man got out side the court.

Caffrey walked out, followed by his claimant, who seized him by the collar within a few yards of the door of the court room, saying—"I arrest you as a deserter."

"Fait," said Caffrey, "I'm no deserter."

"Isn't your name Caffrey?" said Mr. Caffrey's claimant.

"Sharejan' it is now," said Caffrey.

"Then that's enough for me," rejoined the other, and he doubled his grasp upon Mr. Caffrey's coat, so much so, as to put it in danger of "suffering some."

At this moment, up stepped a little gentleman of the imperial school, who sympathizing with Caffrey, said to him, "why the d— I don't you take him, (pointing to Caffrey's claimant,) before a magistrate, and have the matter settled?" This advice coming from such a quarter, and being moreover delivered in an imperial tone, struck Mr. Caffrey to be "first rate." So he seized his claimant by the collar and they went together, each grasping the other, to the police Office. Here it came out that Mr. Caffrey's claimant was a watchman named F. E. Scofield—that he had heard a reward of \$10 having been offered for the arrest of a deserter of the same name as Caffrey, and hearing that name pronounced in Court,

he had thought this was the man. Mr. Caffrey, swore he was no deserter—preferred a change of assault and battery against Mr. Scofield. Mr. S. was locked up for several hours, and finally released upon giving bail in the sum of \$100 to appear and answer when called upon.—N. Y. W.

ARRIVAL OF THE BRITISH QUEEN.

It is with gratification we announce the arrival of this noble ship— anxiously looked for during the last 48 hours, as her time was up.

A QUARTER PAST 2.—The papers have just come in. We have time to make but a hastily sketch. We learn that she left Portsmouth on the third of this month.

Parliament was prorogued in August, the 27th, by the Queen in person. She says the government are determined to uphold the integrity of the Ottoman Empire, she will do all she can to persuade all the powers of Christendom to unite in a general league for the entire extinction of the slave trade; she alludes to the Chartists, and says their attempts to subvert the institutions of the country will be put down by their enforcing the laws.

TURKEY.—The Augsburg Gazette of August 26 publishes a letter, dated frontiers of Turkey 16th, mentioning that the European Ambassador, had been dismayed, by the announcement of Mehemet Ali's determination to disarm the Ottoman fleet, as they felt that it was a ruse of the Viceroy to avoid acquiescing in the demand of the united Powers for its resituation, or at least to gain time.

It does not appear from this letter that the British and French squadrons were to be employed in wresting by force the Turkish fleet from the Pacha, but that the Admirals had been ordered to oppose any landing attempted by the Egyptians on the Ottoman coast, or the occupation of any portion of its territory.

The tournament has come off—amidst torrents of rain. The Earl of Eglington, in a splendid suit of brass armour, broke two spears in a conflict with the Marquis of Waterford, and was awarded by the Queen of Beauty (Lady Seymour) with the crown of victory. The deluge of rain broke up the whole concern, and the age of Chivalry is departed.

A great banquet was given to the Duke of Wellington at Dover Castle, by the inhabitants of the Cinque Ports.

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.
—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable State plasters and to fraudulent banking.

We cut the following from the New York Herald.

It is still the decided opinion and the wish of many of the leading politicians of this city and state, that General Scott may be the candidate of the Whig party, nominated at the National Convention, for our own part, we have very little doubt but that he will be the candidate. Two or three gentlemen, who were presumed to be thoroughly conversant with the tone of feeling amongst the mass of voters in the river and western counties of this state, arrived in town yesterday, after a close and systematic canvass. They mention several states that will give Scott a majority if he is run, but will go for Van Buren if Clay is the candidate. We will give an instance; Ulster county will give Gen. Scott a majority of from 2500 to 3000, if he is the candidate; but if the Convention nominates Mr. Clay, the state will go for Van Buren.

The simple fact of the matter is this, and he recally, lying, cheating politicians may as well say so, and come at the point at once. Henry Clay has no strength in this state, and if a certain clique determine to try him in opposition to the wishes and feelings of the great mass of the whig party, they will break down. The only available candidate is Gen. Scott; if the whigs cannot succeed with him, they can succeed with no one. But there is a certain contingency to be provided against; those persons who are to be the members of the National Convention, have made up their minds in this wise: if the State of New York goes for Mr. Van Buren this fall General Scott is the candidate at the Convention; and if it goes for the whig party, still General Scott stands an equal chance with Mr. Clay, to receive a nomination. And if those whigs who have bargained for offices in the events of Mr. Clay's election, can make equally good bargains with General Scott, in the event of his election, then General Scott will be the candidate for the Presidency under any and every circumstance. So is the shuttlecock of power handed about from battledore to battledore! Thus are the strings pulled to work the political machine! and thus runs the world away.

We could not imagine why Hyatt looked so good natured yesterday. But we presume it was the idea he had poked it into the Scott party, in such beautiful style. We know of nothing else, that could make him look merry.

We are indebted to the politeness of Mr. Thompson, the poor master, for some of the largest peaches that ever grew. They are called the Scott peaches.

DEPARTURE OF THE CONVICTS.

Yesterday morning early, eleven male and one female convicts, who received their sentences the present week and before, left the city prison under charge of Capt. Knapp and Mr. Deputy Keeper Stewart, for their state prison home at Sing Sing, there to drag out a miserable existence. Amongst the number who thus went was Smith Davis, convicted of forgery, in putting in to circulation an immense quantity of counterfeit money which business he has practised with great success for the last twelve or fifteen years. Davis was a man of genteel appearance and address, and pleasing and prepossessing manners, and had an amiable wife and a fine family of six interesting children who had been well taken of and educated, as far as their tender mind were susceptible of literary instruction. This care and attention he had been enabled to bestow out of the large profits accruing from his nefarious trade. On Tuesday afternoon the wife and children of Davis were admitted into his cell to take a final, perhaps an eternal farewell of their husband and father. The scene was one of the most painful and affecting that can well be imagined. The wife and the children of the convict hung upon his neck and poured out their sighs and tears, and groans in his bosom, which mingled perhaps for the last time, with the burning drops of a father and a husband which he shed. For a while the whole group were incapable of utterance, grief and overwhelming emotion checked the power of speech. After a time when affection had fed itself with conjugal and paternal endearments, and grief had emptied its fountains of tears the wife and children with screams and convulsive sobs departed and left the convict to his fate. Yesterday morning early, one of the prisoner's children, impelled by affection for its father, pressed its way into prison again, and took another painful and affecting adieu of its father. He wept until his face and bosom were wet with tears, and finally took the parting hand of the child, and with his arms on followed his conductors to the boat which was to convey him and his companions in crime to a living death. Such is the unhappy fate of the criminal. He sunders all the sweetest and dearest ties of life for the glittering bauble, gain, and consigns himself to an ignominious prison, secluded from wife, children and friends, a wretched outcast from the world. Let this serve to teach others, who are now running a career of crime, to pause in their cruel course before it is too late.—N. Y. Sun.

The writer will here name one, of which he was a prominent actor. In the town of S—, in A— County, State of N. Y., there lived a respectable and rather a wealthy family, consisting of five persons—Father, Mother, two sons, and their beautiful daughter, Ann. In the usual course the writer became acquainted with the daughter, and was at once captivated and bound fast in the silken cords of love, by the beauty, sincerity and candour of the only daughter. I banded her, that which relieved her immediate wants and departed. Poor girl! she is now beyond the reach of this world's trials, and now I feel the tears stealing down my cheeks as I look in retrospective upon those days when with her I was sun shine and gladness. Farewell poor Ann—may I meet you on the "right hand" in Heaven.

HARTFORD, THURSDAY EVE. Sept. 19.
THE AMISTAD.

The case of the Africans makes little progress, and if the rate at which it was hitherto advanced is to be taken as a criterion for the future, it is easy enough to perceive that there is work all ready laid out, sufficient to keep the lawyers in business for a couple of years at least.

Yesterday by way of pushing on matters a little Mr. Staples moved for and obtained a *habeas corpus* to bring up the three girls, and have cause shown why they are detained in custody. This morning another chapter was opened in the District Court, by the filing of sundry libels and claims, the catalogue of which is as follows:

1. The original libel of Lieut. Gedney and the officers and crew of the Washington, against the schr. Amistad, the cargo and slaves, for salvage.
2. The counter claim of Pedro Montez, to the three girls, and the boy Antonio, as his slaves, legally purchased by him at Havana, and whom he prays to have restored to him, or to the representative of his sovereign.
3. The claim of Jose Ruiz, to the other Africans, on the same grounds.
4. The claim of Captain Greene and some others, alleging that they had something to do with the capture of the Africans, and demanding salvage.
5. A libel, by Montez, similar in tenor to his claim.
6. A libel, by Ruiz, similar also to his claim.
7. An application to the Court by the district attorney, setting forth that formal and official application has been made to the government of the United States, by the Spanish minister, for a restitution of the vessel, cargo and Africans to him, as the representative of her Catholic Majesty, in pursuance of certain treaty stipulations alleged to exist between Spain and the United States.

And finally, application from the Spanish Consul for leave hereafter to put in a libel or claim to the vessel and cargo, in behalf of the owners at Havana, or of the representatives of the captain who was killed.

The afternoon a return was made to the *habeas corpus*. It was exceeding voluminous, setting forth all the proceedings under which the three girls are held, to wit: the commitment of the Africans on the charge of piracy and murder, and of the three girls as witnesses, for want of recognition; the libel of Lieut. Gedney, the libel of Montez, and the application of the district attorney on behalf of the United States—which, by the way, prays an order for the surrender of the Africans to the Spanish Minister, or to the government of the United States for reconveyance to Africa, as to the Court shall seem meet.

When this return was made Mr. Staples, asked for time to examine it, which was granted. The argument upon it will perhaps come on this evening, perhaps to-morrow morning. I apprehend that nothing will come of this movement, as the return is no doubt sufficient, *prima facie*.

A pretty strong intimation was thrown out this morning by Judge Judson, in the District Court, against the Africans, on the ground that only property could be liable for salvage, and that these men could not be regarded in this state as property.

A decree for salvage, he said, could only be carried into execution by a sale of the property saved; and he did not see how a sale of these negroes could be ordered to take place in Connecticut. This you will perceive has, an ugly squint adverse to the pretensions of Senors Montez and Ruiz.

The girls were brought into court, with the return to the *habeas corpus*. One of the poor little things was frightened half out of her wits, and lifted up her voice and wept stoutly. She was fully impressed, the marshal said, with the idea that they were to be sold, or killed outright, and the colloquial between her and her keepers not being very perfect, they could not set her doubts and fears at rest. The other two looked rather sober, but their hearts were not so utterly cast down as was that of their companion.

The Grand Jury has been hard at work all day upon the indictments against the Africans, but as yet without any special charge from Judge Thompson. I have understood, this evening, from one of them, that they will probably come into court to-morrow—or perhaps to-night, to ask instructions. They have had the Spaniards before them all day, and also Lieut. Meade, and other witnesses, and have committed to writing a great mass of evidence.

8 P. M. The court has adjourned, and nothing more is done.

PORTSCRIPT.

We learn that a member of the Grand Jury arrived in this city this morning in the steam boat from Hartford, and states that Judge Thompson decided, that in view of the facts presented by them, the Courts of this country had no jurisdiction in the case, and, that the transaction was to

as the same as if taking place in Havana. Consequently the Grand Jury found no bill against the prisoners.

DREADFUL CONFLAGRATION.

Total Destruction of the National Theatre.—Three Churches and several Dwellings.—About half past four o'clock yesterday afternoon our citizens were alarmed by the cry of fire, which was found to be caused by a dense column of smoke, seen rising from the roof of the National Theatre, at the corner of Leonard and Church street. In a few minutes every part of that beautiful edifice was in flames, and so great was the heat that the roof of the African Methodist Church on the opposite side of Leonard street was in a few minutes also one sheet of fire. This building was with its contents entirely destroyed.

On the other side of the Theatre, the work of destruction was too in progress. The cupola of the new French Episcopal Church of Saint Esprit, at the corner of Franklin st.—the handsomest building of its class in America, took fire which soon spread to the wood work of the interior, which were also destroyed. The devouring element was not yet stayed in its course. The wooden roof of the Reformed Dutch Church in Franklin st. took fire and the entire building was shortly a scene of utter destruction. Such a sight as the conflagration at this time presented has perhaps, never before been witnessed. A theatre and three large churches in a blaze at the same moment, and each not a stone's throw distant from the other.

The brick dwelling house adjoining the theatre, No. 47 Leonard st. also took fire and was completely consumed, and the two adjoining buildings Nos. 49 and 51, nearly destroyed. On Leonard street, next adjoining the African church the dwelling house No. 58 was entirely, and a frame house No. 60, partially destroyed. On Franklin st. besides the two churches above named, the three large brick dwelling houses, Nos. 99, 101 and 103, caught fire on the roofs and cornices, and were slightly damaged, though from the faithfulness of their construction, they were saved from ruin. There were also in the interior of the block, a number of small but dangerous which were consumed, and some twenty or thirty houses in various directions, were more or less injured by their roofs taking fire from the falling cinders.

The National Theatre was erected 9 years since, at a cost of \$110,000, the ground lot costing besides \$25,000. In the fall of 1837, Mr. Wallack became the lessee at the rate of \$10,000 per annum, and in his hands it has remained to the present day. At the time of the destruction of the Theatre, it was the joint property of Messrs. Maurer & Washington Coster. They were insured in London for \$40,000, and in three several offices in this city for an aggregate of \$15,000. The loss of the property to Mr. Wallack is very great, and it is the more to be regretted as he had not a cent of insurance.

The actors of the company, too, have suffered severely, and many of them have lost their entire stock of wardrobe and properties. Of the stock of scenery, wardrobe, properties, &c. in the Theatre, but very few articles of value were saved, except the books and paper in the office which were all fortunately secured uninjured. Mr. Charles Kean, who has just recovered from a severe illness, was to have appeared again last evening, and the stage had been set for the first act of Richard III. when the fire broke out. Mr. Kean yesterday morning sent the entire of his valuable wardrobe to the Theatre, but from the fortunate situation in which it was placed, we have reason to believe, that it was removed in safety.

The French Church was, as we have before stated, one of the most costly and beautiful edifices in the United States. It was commenced seven years since, and has been completed some two years. It is said to have cost upwards of \$200,000, was built of white marble, and supposed to be entirely fire proof—which in fact was the case, if we except some wooden ornaments about the dome, where the fire first caught. The works of the splendid organ were entirely, and we learn, safely removed.

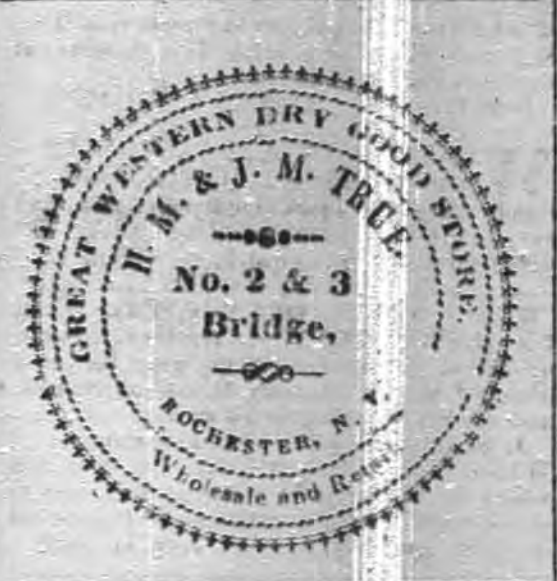

FIRE.—A fire broke out last night in R. P. Hart's barn, attached to the West Troy Hotel, which was entirely consumed. Also, John W. PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable shiplasters and to fraudulent banking.

TO THE RESCUE!

In times of danger, it becomes every good soldier to sleep upon his arms. Vigilance will often accomplish what skill cannot. And disasters is the result of unexpected attacks! The firm defender of Freedom is always on the alert. And whether he sees his rights invaded by a foreign foe or a domestic tyrant, hastily will he march to the Battle Field—proudly will he triumph there.

But a short time will elapse, before a great and we may add decisive battle is to be fought. On the one side, you will see arrayed the friends of our country and our common cause—on the other, myriads of competition and misrule. The one, contending for the good of the PEOPLE—the other, for "the party" and the power. Each have their commandants. One, a gallant soldier and an honest man—the other, an intriguing politician and a designing knave.

The former is, WINFIELD SCOTT. The services which he has rendered his country can never be duly appreciated. They are recorded in the annals of our history, and occupy its brightest pages. Will you elevate to the highest place on earth—the Presidency—a man, who is the chief of aristocracy, the promulgator and firm sustainer of anti-republican doctrines? Or will you support WINFIELD SCOTT, support republican doctrines—discountenance fraud and competition, and act for the glory of the whole country? The latter do you say? Then to the rescue! Deposit your votes for SCOTT. He's spent his time for you—he's split his blood for you—and shame upon the freemen who turn him away unwarded!

We knew not, who it was that first moved that the city should be ruined by the floods of shiplasters, until we heard a man praying that one might choke Andrews, for being that person. We cried "Amen" to it.

But alas! there was too much "Wetumpka" in his composition to square off before he started, for if he had, the idea of paying every body, would have haunted him until the hour of his death.

Hyatt still goes on lying, and encouraging the loco-focos to plunder the State, by upholding the vile sub-treasury scheme. He imagines he'll escape the punishment that awaits him by crawling out through the key-holes of the infernal regions.

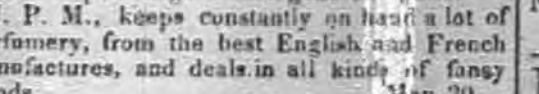
