G. W. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shiplasters and to fraudulent banking.

THE WAY THE MONEY GOES.—If enquiry is made how the expenses of Government under a retrenchment and reform administration are swelled from twelve to forty millions, a clue to the answer may be found at home. But recently \$3,000 was paid a single steambot for transporting some 400 troops from Buffalo to Detroit, and we notice by the last Buffalo Commercial the arrival of four companies of 2d Artillery in that city from Detroit by steambot, at probably a still greater expense. The expense of transporting the Regiment of Artillery that came up the Lake a few days since from Trenton, to their several stations, must have been some 12 or 15,000 dollars, as the troops probably did not march ten miles of the whole route. This is but a single item of extravagance and trifling in itself; but it shows the prodigality of the administration in small matters, and the people can readily see how it is that the army appropriations including the Florida War have increased to so many millions.

Does the state of the country require such expenditures in the transportation of troops from point to point? Is certainty of movement required by any threatened invasion on the frontier? Is there any reason why the old democratic way of marching on foot, camping out, and enduring the privation and toils of a soldier's life, should be changed to rail road speed and steam palace luxuriousness? Are better soldiers, a better drilled and disciplined phalanx formed by the change?

Ask the old Revolutioner whose pulses still leap madly at the tap of the drum, if such was the service he saw in the "days that tried men's souls." In addition to the wasteful expenditure in transportation of troops by steam locomotives instead of the locomotives nature has provided, (I recollect the expenses of troops in garrison are but a trifle less than while marching,) it strikes us that an effeminacy is encouraged and cultivated in the American soldiery, unworthy so honorable a service and the right arm of the national defence.

But to how the money goes in these reform and retrenchment times we wish mainly to direct the attention of the reader.—Cleveland Herald.

BONAPARTE'S BURIAL PLACE.

The solitude of Napoleon, in his exile and his his tomb has thrown another kind of spell over a brilliant memory. Alexander did not die in sight of Greece; he disappeared amid the pomp of distant Babylon. The bird of the tropics, harnessed to the car of the sun, as Buffon magnificently expresses it, spending his flight downwards from the light, rests alone, for a moment, over the ashes, the weight of which has shaken the equilibrium of the globe.

Bonaparte crossed the ocean, to repair to his final exile, regardless of that beautiful sky which delighted Columbus. Stretched, upon the ship's stern, he perceived not that unknown constellations were sparkling over his head. His powerful glance, for the first time encountered their rays. What to him were stars which he had never seen from his bivouacs, and which had never shone over his empire? Nevertheless, not one of them has failed to fulfill its destiny: one half of the firmament spread its light over its cradle: the other half was reserved to illuminate his tomb.—Chateaubriand.

THE AURORA ISLANDS.—The re-discovery of the Aurora Islands by the New York Exploring Expedition creates considerable interest here, and it appears incredible that six Islands in the longitude of Rio Janeiro, and latitude 53 deg. 21 min., should have remained to this period, when so many navigators have cruised expressly for them without being known.

They were originally discovered in 1679, since which months have been spent in searching for them, in vain, and they have been excluded from the latest charts.

Commodore Sullivan, the English naval commander on this station, applied to S. E. Burrows, Esq. of New York, the proprietor of the expedition, for the particulars of the discovery, which were furnished, and forwarded to the British Government, with a high compliment to the American spirit of enterprise.

Commodore Sullivan has despatched a Government vessel to the Falkland Islands, to proceed to the Auroras as soon as the season will permit; and hereafter the voyager will not be exposed to being wrecked without knowing his danger.

ROBBERY AND MURDER.—On Monday last week, a farmer named Stewart, who resided two miles this side of Youngstown, disappeared under the following circumstances: On that day he carried a crop of wheat to Youngstown, for which he received \$250 in money; and after having drunk pretty freely, as he sometimes did, started at evening for home; since which time nothing has been heard of him. Suspicious of foul work having been excited, search was made, and his handkerchief and pipe was found on the shore of the river, near the water's edge, and the earth and bushes on the bank bore mark of a struggle having taken place. His dog, which had followed him towards home on Monday evening, was found near the same place, howling and moaning in a singular manner. There is no doubt of the fate he met. Two persons were arrested, but no proof being found against them they were discharged. Stewart was about sixty years old, a Scotchman by birth, and was once a merchant in extensive business in Albany; but having failed in business, he retired to a farm near Youngstown, and attracted some attention by the seclusion in which he lived, until near the period of his death.—Lockport Democrat.

HOW TO SETTLE THE ATTORNEYS.—Dingle is a small town in the south-west of Ireland, on the peninsula which forms one side of Dingle Bay. Lady Chatterton, in her recent travels in the south of Ireland, gives the following amazing specimen of the primitive manners of the people: "Law, sir," repeated the man of Dingle with a look of astonishment and affright, "Law, sir! we never mind the law in our court. We judge by the honesty of the case that comes before us: and let me tell you, sir, that if every court were so conducted, there would be but few attorneys, and the country would be quiet and happy." "But what would you do, if any person brought an attorney these twenty-two long miles and hilly road (from Tralee,) and introduced him into your court, and that he started some points of law, which required professional skill to reply to?" "I'll tell you what I did myself," was the reply to this apparently perplexing question: "when I was deputy sovereign, two fools in this town employed each of them an attorney, whom they brought at a great expense from Tralee. When the attorneys went into court, and settled themselves with their bags and papers all done up with bits of red tape, and one of them was getting up to speak, 'Crier,' said I, 'command silence.'—'Silence in the court,' says he. So I stood up, and looking first at one attorney and then at the other, I said with a solemn voice, 'I adjourn this court for a month.' 'God save the king!' said the crier; and then I left them all. And I assure you, he added, 'that from that day to this no attorney ever appeared in our courts; and please God, we never will mind law in it, but go on judging by the honor and honesty of the cases that come before us.'"

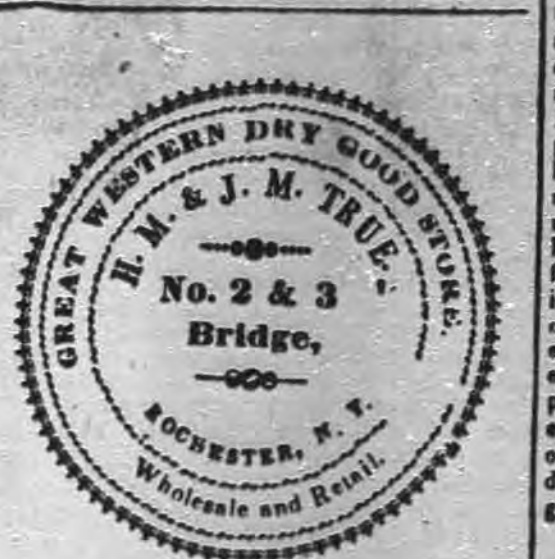

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY
—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shuplasters and to fraudulent banking.

"Interference with elections by Executive officers or their subordinates, is sufficient cause for removal from office.—Jefferson's Circular in 1801.

"We are informed that our very obliging and excellent Post Master, Mr. Reilly, is uncommonly active in electioneering efforts this fall. We hoped better things of him. The confidence our citizens of both parties have reposed in him, should not be perverted, nor prostituted to sustain measures which he cannot but reudiate. If it is he may, and perhaps will find his means of usefulness in this community, greatly diminished at no distant day. We give this hint in perfect good will, and hope we shall not find it necessary to use harsher language. Every man has a right to advocate the election of his favorite candidate, but there is a zeal which Jefferson thought did not become Executive officers or their subordinates."

The Democrat rebukes the Post Master as gently as a "sucking dove." It does not wish to use "harsher language" in a case that Jefferson thought "sufficient cause for removal from office." That paper, which is usually so rabid in its attacks upon its political opponents, cannot rebuke O'Reilly for conduct *deserving removal from office*, without complimenting him at the same time. Do the democrats of this city and State who have suffered the unsparing abuse of the Rochester Daily Democrat for years, know why this distinction is made? Why the Post Master of Rochester is treated to "soft sawder," whilst Messrs. Flagg, Dix and Crosswell of Albany and Gen. Gould, Judge Gardiner and numerous other Republicans of this city, are abused without measure? We can tell them.

The Post Master of Rochester, before he obtained that office, *was needy*—and his personal services and supposed political influence were wanted by the spectators and whig aristocrats, to get up an excitement in favor of a speedy enlargement of the Erie Canal.

The Republican State officers at Albany, were in favour of enlargement only so fast as the revenues of the canal would warrant. This slow but sure method of enlargement did not suit the views of certain whig gentry in western New York, who were willing to incur a 40 million or 400 million State debt, provided they could get fat jobs on the enlargement, or make the State pay an exorbitant price in cash for certain lots and mill sites that would be damaged by the enlargement. Hence the clamour for a "speedy enlargement," which was got up under the auspices of Mr. O'Reilly. He it was, who (as the tool of certain knowing whigs behind the curtain) induced some prominent Republicans here to join, the hue and cry for "a more speedy enlargement." About this time, great efforts were made to procure the charter of a new Bank in this city. To enforce the claims of Rochester to more bank capital, a committee was appointed to procure statistical information of the business of the city. At the suggestion of certain whig speculators in mill sites, water lots, and other kinds of fancy real estate here, Mr. O'Reilly availed himself of the labours of the Bank Committee, and cooked up a kind of *salmagundi*, which compilation he christened a History of Rochester and Western New York. This "History" gave quite an *eclat* to lot speculators in Rochester for a time, enshrined the "Historian" in the hearts of the whig speculators. Mr. O'Reilly's recommendation in a letter to the editor of the Albany Argus, of a State debt of 30 millions for walling the enlarged canal with stone

from Albany to Buffalo, sealed his apostasy from the true Republican creed of "no great public debt," and made him the idol of Rochester whiggery. Hence the mild and gentle rebuke administered to him by the whig press for conduct which Jefferson thought a "sufficient cause for removal from office"—and which the Daily Democrat fears will "impair his means of usefulness (to whiggery) in this community"—that is, his ability to wheedle his political friends into the support of "more speedy enlargement" or 30 million walling debts!

"We intend taking casts of the heads of several of our eminent men. Cockrobbin O'Reilly's Brutus like pate, we shall keep to adorn our library, and in after ages, our posterity may show it at shilling a head, as the original cast of the "great unappreciated" historian. It would also be assistance to the phrenologist, to prove his theory; he could show his bump of constructiveness, and then refer to his great wall project. We must have a facsimile of Cockrobbin's "dome of thoughts."

"Notwithstanding the meeting held in New York by the citizens, to approve of the course pursued by the Banks, in relation to specie payments; they will be obliged to suspend at last, and that at no distant period. If our banks should suspend at once, it would instantly relieve the pressure upon our mercantile community, which now threatens to overwhelm them with disaster and destruction. We prophecy that a general suspension will take place before the holidays, after the ruin of half the country has been accomplished. Talk of honor among the New York banks! Fiddlesticks; it is like Bob Acre's courage, it will soon begin to ooze out at their fingers ends.

"We come out this morning with a new head cut. It is from the graver of a pupil of John W. Orr, now in the employ of V. R. Jackson.

"We have appointed Mr. Fisk our agent to receive the promised "funds" for having those blinds stopped. Now you "troubled ones" shell out, we have performed our part of the contract.

LATER FROM ENGLAND.

The Liverpool packet ship Independence, Capt. Nye, anchored off the bar last night and this morning, we have received our papers by her, which are to the evening of the 28th from London and Liverpool.

The letter we give below, from our London correspondent, embraces the principal items of intelligence, but as it is dated on the 24th, (the regular day of sailing of the Independence was the 25th) and as we have papers four days later, it is necessary we should make some slight addition to its contents.

That the bills of the U. S. Bank on Messrs. Hottinguer & Co. had been accepted by Messrs. Rothschilds, as is stated by our correspondent there cannot be a doubt. The fact was officially published in the *Moniteur*, and transmitted to Lyons, Bordeaux, and Marseilles, but it appears notwithstanding that on the 26th September, Mr. Jaudon, as Agent of the Bank of the United States, was compelled to make an application to the Bank of England for a loan, which was granted him under the guarantee of Messrs. Baring, Morrison, Denison and Huth, to the amount of 100,000 pounds sterling payable in Consols. The claims which this sum is to meet is entirely independent of the Paris affair; and is stated to be for the payment of post notes and bills of exchange.

To the latest hour the accounts of the weather are decidedly unfavorable to the crops of grain, and a suspension of specie payment by the Bank of England of course becomes more probable.

There is no very important feature in the news from the Continent, unless it be the apprehended scarcity of grain in France.

The N. Y. Com. states: Private letters say that the harvest has turned out better than the papers represent it. The Barings write that the Bank of England will not suspend specie payment.—The merchants and banks in this city who have remitted post-notes of the Bank of the United States, must feel greatly relieved by the knowledge that provision has been made for their payment, by the advance of consols to Mr. Jaudon.

Miss Julia Webster, daughter of Daniel Webster, was married at the fashionable St. George's Hanover Square, on the 24th of September, to Samuel Appleton, Esq., of Boston. A large and fashionable company was present at the ceremony.

FROM THE WEST INDIES.

We have a file of Barbadoes papers to the 29th of September, containing late advices from most of the other West India Islands.

From one of them we learn that a proposition is on foot to establish a great West India Bank in Barbadoes, with a capital of \$2,000,000, divided into 20,000 shares, and with branches in British Guiana, Trinidad, St Vincent, Antigua, and other Islands, and agents in Great Britain, the United States, British America and elsewhere.

The emigration agent from Guiana, whose endeavors to get laborers to remove thither gave so much offence to the Barbadians, has publicly announced the cessation of his agency, the emigration ordinance of Guiana having been disallowed by the home government. This disallowance in turn has grievously afflicted the good people of Guiana, who complain bitterly that they can obtain laborers neither from Calcutta nor Africa, nor the West Indies, and where else to look for them they know not. They say that the ruin of their magnificent colony must be the consequence.

The good people of Trinidad are indignant also, but for another cause. Their grievance is, that their island has been included in the government of Sir Evan McGregor, governor general of the Windward Islands; not that they have any fault to find with him, but because they think they ought to have a governor all to themselves, acting on his own responsibility, and communicating directly with the Colonial Office in London.

The Barbadian of September 28 mentions that no more cases of small pox had occurred, and that a bountiful and most welcome rain had descended.

The sickness among the troops in garrison at St. Vincent had in some degree abated.

Incendiaries have been at work, it appears in the Island of Barbadoes, as well as in our Southern cities. Three alarming fires had taken place on plantations near Bridgetown, during the week ending on September 21st., and the Governor, with the commander of the forces, had been on the spot making inquiries. A reward of £200 was offered for the discovery of the offenders by the Governor, and another 100 by the vestry of the parish.

The steamer *Pinto*, Captain Luon, which left Bridgetown for St. Vincent's about the 1st of September, had been detained there by some accident, and the return mails were brought by a sloop.

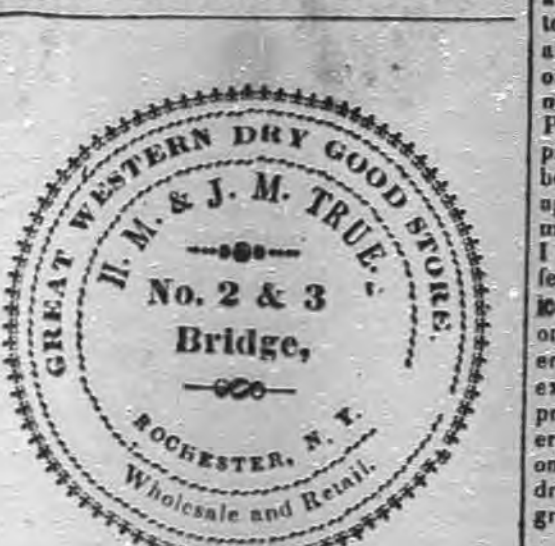

Disgraceful Outrage.—We understand a serious riot occurred last night, between nine and ten o'clock, which resulted in wounding, more or less badly, some half a dozen men. As nearly as we

can learn the particulars, two or three men from some vessel in the harbor got into a dispute with some persons in Fore street, and were afterwards chased down to Wiggery's wharf, where they took shelter on board of a couple of fishing schooners lying there, and thence made their escape in their own boat, which had been made fast to one of the schooners. The schooners were then furiously attacked by the pursuers, with rocks, staves, pieces of timber, and various other missiles, and the poor fishermen suddenly found their heads in jeopardy, without knowing any thing of the cause. One of them, not exactly relishing such treatment, after begging the rioters to disperse, and threatening them, also, without success—and after, too, a gun charged only with powder had been fired among them—at length discharged a musket loaded with shot, and wounded a man, by the name of Wm. Foye, very severely in the head. Some others were wounded, also, we believe, though not seriously. An examination will probably be had of the matter before Judge Fitch; when other circumstances may be developed concerning it.

Fire at Charleston.—We learn from a postscript in the Charleston Courier of the 23d, that a fire broke out in that city about 12 o'clock on the preceding night in a frame house in market street, occupied by C. Jugnot as a grain establishment, which, with a steam grist mill in the rear, was speedily destroyed. Three or four frame houses were then successively blown up by which means the flames were arrested and subdued. The wind was very high and it was feared at one time that the destruction would be extensive. The origin of the fire was not ascertained.

Inquest.—An inquest was held on Monday, at 23 Monroe street on the body of Harriet, wife of William Blanchard, a native of Albany, aged 47. Deceased was, it appeared, subject to temporary fits of insanity, pending which she had been often heard to threaten to take her own life. On Saturday evening she procured a quantity of laudanum which she took, and from the effects of which died about noon on Sunday. Verdict suicide by laudanum.—*Cour. & Eq.*

New Branch of the Wooden Nutmeg Manufacture.—A young woman named Catharine Ann Ray, residing in Grafton, N. H. lately commenced a suit against a respectable young physician, Dr. Truman Abel for seduction and breach of promise. The young man stoutly denied the "soft impeachment;" but as suits are ticklish things, and as Miss Catharine's appearance warranted the belief that somebody had seduced her, the friends of the Dr. persuaded him the best thing he could do was to compromise the matter. Accordingly he gave his notes for two hundred dollars, and they were deposited in the hands of a mutual friend, to be paid upon the contingency that the child should be born before the first of September. On 25th of August, Mr. Long, the trustee, in this negotiation, received news that a dead child was born; and though he had retired to bed, he rose, proceeded to the house of the mother, and insisted upon seeing the corpse. When it was produced, ready attired for the grave, he found, by taking hold of the fingers that the nails were insinglass, and stripped of the vestments of the tomb, he carried on his post mortem examination with more zeal than tenderness. Instead of arteries, veins, muscles and viscera, he found a pretty compact body of dough, and ended his visit by throwing the babe at its mother's head. The young man of course received his note back and the girl immediately ran away, to escape prosecution. So well had the plot been matured and arranged, that notwithstanding this discovery notices of the death of "an infant son of Dr. Abel" appeared in several newspapers to which it had been sent before the denouncement of the tragedy. We have seldom heard of a more daring and ridiculous attempt at villany than this.

We learn that the office of the Collector on the Morris canal, at Newark, was broken open on Saturday night, and \$1300 stolen therefrom.—The whole amount was in one, two and three dollar notes of the Morris Canal Company.

VAN AMBURGH.—The most absurd statements about Mr. Van Amburgh are making the round of the French press. In a sort of biography of that gentleman we are told that his favorite amusement in America was to walk into the woods and tame bears, which he left at liberty, and visited from time to time as old acquaintances. One bear, which he called Job, was, however, his travelling companion. Being at sea with this bear, Mr. Van Amburgh saw a shark, and jumped overboard with an iron bar in his hand, to tame the monster. The shark, however, got hold of the bar, and having let it drop to the bottom, was about to make a meal of the man who had volunteered the task of civilizing him, when, in despair, Van Amburgh called to Job, who was quietly looking on, confident of his master's power, and expecting to see the shark come on board a docile pupil. Job obeyed the call, and jumped overboard to assist the shark tamer. He immediately (says the biographer) caught the monster round the waist, and with one fraternal hug squeezed the breath out of his body. The shark was drawn into the ship by means of a hook; and Job, as the reward of his valor, was permitted to partake of the soup which the crew made from his fins.

HORRIBLE AFFAIR.—The peaceful neighborhood of Washington, Tazewell county, was recently the scene of one of the most diabolical acts ever perpetrated. The particulars are briefly these, gathered from a gentleman who was on the spot the same day.

On Tuesday morning of last week, a Mr. Bogar, a Frenchman, who had resided with his wife in Washington for two years past, and of whom he was known to have had several matrimonial quarrels, threatened her so severely as to cause her to determine to leave his roof the following opportunity. Bogar having, after breakfast, paired to his work as usual, at a tan-yard in the suburbs, Mrs. B. obtained a horse and set out for the house of her brother at Patridge Point, intending to claim his protection. On the way she was compelled to pass the tan yard, and was seen by her husband. He instantly returned to his house, took two pistols which he had purchased in Peoria the Saturday before, went in pursuit of his wife, and overtook her a mile from town. Seizing her with the fury of a fiend, he dragged her from the horse to the ground, and deliberately drew a pistol and shot her in the head. At that moment a young man approached on horseback, when Bogar drew the other pistol and fired another ball into the head of his victim. He then proceeded to load his pistols again, as he walked away on the prairie. All this was done while the young man was in sight, and who passed sufficiently near the sufferer to hear a groan, which he supposed was her last. He hastened towards Washington, and the next moment heard another discharge from the pistol.

As soon as he could make the horrid circumstance known, several citizens repaired to the place, and found Bogar weltering in his blood with the upper part of his face blown off by the contents of the pistol, which he had himself discharged in his mouth. But his wife was not there! Incredible as it may appear, she had survived the two pistol shots, had risen from the ground, and ran to the nearest house (Mr. Trimble's) a quarter of a mile distant. She remembered and related distinctly what passed until the first pistol was fired, but knew nothing more until she found herself at the house spoken of. Surgical aid being had, it was ascertained that the first ball did not pass through the skull, but was found in the hair, flattened by the resistance it had met with. The second ball had penetrated the skull, and was found just within it, split in two. The pieces were extracted with some difficulty; in a few days the wound was healed, and Mrs. B. raised as it were from the grave, is now in perfect health.

Bogar, as already stated, was a Frenchman. His wife is a native of Germany, about 30 years of age, of sprightly manners and rather handsome person. They were married in France about four years ago, had a child still living, two years old, and had been about that length of time in this country. Jealousy is said to have led the wretched man to the perpetration of this act of revenge, which through the mysterious agency of Divine Providence, has resulted in his own death and escape of his intended victim.

LABOURING MEN WITHOUT BREAD!

Who are to suffer by the times! It must be obvious to every man of reflection, that the period is rapidly approaching, when extreme suffering is to visit this city. Already large manufacturing establishments in various parts of this city, have been compelled to discharge their hands—already hundreds, and including their families, thousands are without employment. A hard winter is before us, and what is the prospect of employment for the industrious and honest laborer for a year to come? Our paternal government have been employed for ten years, with all its immense powers, in breaking down the best currency and most admirable system of business and exchanges—that any nation ever possessed! they have succeeded in throwing every thing—banking, currency, the mercantile, manufacturing and mechanical interests of the country, in a utter confusion. After ten years of Experiments upon us, every one of which has sunk us deeper and deeper in embarrassment. Here we are—every kind of business is at a stand—and no man can penetrate the thick darkness of the prospects before us. No man can tell, or conjecture where it is to end or what consequences are to follow. Others may save something from the wreck; but what can the laboring man do without wages and employment? Laboring men! we do not address you in the language of partizans! Look for yourselves at the state of things around us—at the prospects before us! The administration have produced, and are pledged to continue them—to drive the plough share of ruin over all your interests, your hopes, and your pursuits. When the tempest of rain is impending over us all, what are they doing to provide us a shelter? They have left you shelterless—and their office holders are bawling "Sub-Treasury with the specie clause!"—"Down with the banks!"—"Perish credit, perish commerce!" Labouring men! think of these things!—think of the true causes which have produced them!—think of the long period of suffering ahead, and you will feel that the heaviest infliction of these evil measures is visited upon you! We must have a new set of men at the head of this Government! Any change will be for the better! Laboring men lend your hand to effect it!—N. Y. Whig.

SEVERE STORM.—On Friday night last, Lake Michigan was visited by a severe storm, which has done much damage to the shipping. At this place the brig John Kinzie, schooner Virginia and White Pigeon were driven ashore. One of these vessels had 2900 bushels of wheat aboard, which we fear is much damaged. The Ship Milwaukee is reported to be ashore

at Southport, W. T. and the Schooner Illinois between here and Chicago. Owing to circumstances beyond our ken, the harbor at this place is not yet fit for vessels to enter. When we get started fairly, and have time to look around, we shall examine into the reasons for this delay.—Michigan City Gaz.

DEATH OF THE HON. JOSEPH M. WHITE.

It is with no ordinary sensations that we record, at a late moment of the morning, the death of the Hon. Joseph M. White. This melancholy event took place in this city, between the hours of ten and eleven o'clock this morning, at the house of his brother, Dr. T. J. White.

Col. White had been, for some years laboring under a fever, which had assumed a congestive type of deep malignity that refused to yield to the application of medicine and baffled the skill of his medical attendants.

It is needless, even if there were time, to dwell upon the distinguished character and worth of the deceased. As a lawyer—remarkable for the perseverance and profoundness of his researches; as an orator, eminent for the force, elegance and dignity of his address; as a public man, distinguished for his unwearied and patriotic exertions in the service of his constituents and the country; he requires no eulogy at our hands.

We witnessed the death-bed scene. We watched the ebbing breath as pulse after pulse became fainter in that manly frame and noble form. We saw the deep struggles of an affectionate wife, absorbed in her devotions to a dying husband. But we dare intrude no farther upon the sanctity of private grief, or depict the deep anguish of a heart laboring under the crushing weight of its afflictions.

The Suspensor. On Saturday morning last the Bank of Tennessee likewise suspended specie payment. We understand that Yretman, Woods & Co. having but a very small amount of paper out, and abundant specie means to meet it, have come to no determination on the subject.—Their omission to suspend, however, would not add a dollar to the ordinary circulating medium of the country, as their paper, being equal in value to specie, would immediately become an article of merchandise, and purchased as such.—Nashville Banner, Oct. 21.

MONEY MARKET.—The money market is exceedingly tight in this city. Yesterday was the severest day yet experienced. The banks are doing little or nothing, either from inability, or with a view to the early resumption of specie payments. Obligations from the country are not promptly met, and merchants have consequently to attend to both sides of the book. Money yesterday could not be had at 2 per cent a month.

What was asked readily commanded from 3 to 4, and some as high as five per cent. The prospect truly gloomy. Northern funds cannot be procured at any price. The notes of the mother banks are at a premium of 2 per cent over other notes. James River and Kanawha scrip, though bearing interest, yet not being receivable at bank, sold at a discount of from 10 to 15 per cent.

The times indicate a harvest of plenty to the shavers, and ruin to all else.

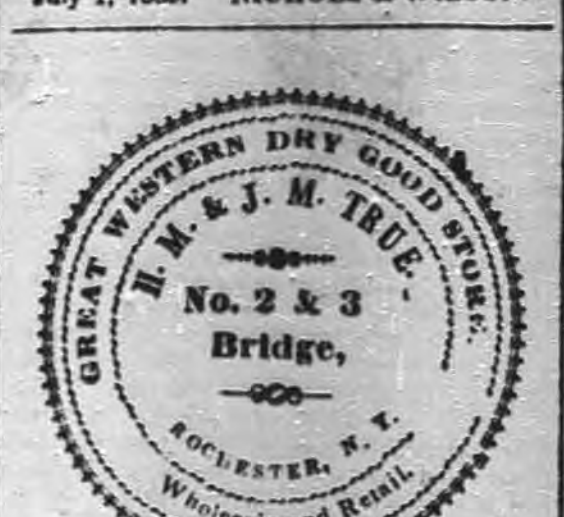

ARRIVAL OF THE GREAT WESTERN.

We are indebted to the kindness of Mr. McNulty, for a copy of the Sunday Morning News, which contains the arrival of the Great Western, on Saturday night at half past ten o'clock, making the passage in fourteen days, and bringing out 113 passengers.

There was no probability whatever of the Bank of England suspending.

Russia has offered to the Port 25000 men to defend the capital against Ibrahim Pacha if necessary.

LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET OCT. 11.—There is no change in the market since Tuesday, prices continue steady, in a great measure to be attributed to the export demand. The sales to day are about 4,000 bales, 300 American for export; yesterday 5,000 bales, 1,500 bales for export.

The harvest has generally failed throughout the Ottoman Empire, particularly the fine wheats, with prices of grain rapidly rising in the Black Sea markets.

The Morning Chronicle of the 17th ult says: "Intelligence from the American money markets are received in rather a favorable light, although it has not produced any improvement in British funds. The consols market was rather in an agitated state throughout the day. The United States Bank shares were at 163 1-2, to 163 1-4. On the 10th, shares of the United States Bank were sold to the amount of \$100,000. The same paper says, that while the high rates of interest continued, causing the bank to keep money tight, it is not expected that a great deal of business will be done in that kind of investment.

The London Courier (evening paper) of the 18th ultimo, says: "There has been more business transacted in United States bank shares during the present week, and from six to seven hundred shares have been dealt in at 20 1/2 per share, at which price there are now sellers: The new debentures, or new stock, of that institution, lately contracted by Mr Jandon, have been sold at 95 1/2, or 1 1/2 per cent, premium; they may now be purchased at 94 1/2, indeed they are offered at that."

Oct. 16.—Our market had rather a flat tone to day, but no decided change took place in the value of any description. The sales amounted to a fair quantity, 4,000 bags having changed hands; 1,200 were taken for export. The sale consisted of 500 Surat, from 5d to 5 1/2d; 100 Pernam, 11 1/2d; 1000 Egyptian, 11 1/2d to 13 1/2d; and 3,200 American, 6 1/2d to 6d.

Louis Philippe is scheming to marry one of his sons with the young Queen of Spain. The Commerce says such an alliance is anxiously desired by him. The French government has recalled its squadron from the coast of Spain.—The British Queen arrived out on the 15th ult. in 42 days and 22 hours. The Great Western arrived out in 12 1/2 days.

Important experiments have been made in the propelling of steamboats by the adaptation of the Archimide's screw. A vessel has been propelled a mile in 4 1/2 minutes.

Some serious riots have taken place between the English and Irish laborers employed on the Birken head and Chester railway. The military were called upon to suppress the fracas.

There had been fair weather in England for some time and the crops were better than had been expected.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT OLD CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—On Tuesday morning, at Old Cambridge, a fire broke out in a wooden shed, in the rear of the house occupied by Mr. Harvey, an ice man, which communicated to his house and the dwelling of Mr. Lyman Thurston, of the University Press; Mr Webb's boarding house, Mr Mason's, and others, whose names are not stated. Four houses were entirely destroyed, and Mr Thurston's and Mr. Coolidge's partially destroyed.—Supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. Damage from \$8 to \$10,000.

FIRE.—A fire broke out about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, in a store occupied by Geo. W. Porter, near the bridge in Medford, and in a short time extended to a small building occupied as a barber's and hatters shop; and also to the Town House, in the basement of which were two stores, one vacant, and the other occupied by Mr Coburn as a dry goods and tailoring establishment, together with a small building used as a tin shop by Mr Chamberlain. All these buildings were entirely destroyed. The fire is supposed to be the work of design. There was an insured of \$5000 on the Town House.—Boston Atlas.

[From the Richmond Whig, Oct. 29.]

MONEY MARKET.—The money market is exceedingly tight in this city. Yesterday was the severest day yet experienced. The banks are doing little or nothing, either from inability, or with a view to the early resumption of specie payments. Obligations from the country are not promptly met, and merchants have consequently to attend to both sides of the book. Money yesterday could not be had at 2 per cent a month.

What was afloat readily commanded from 3 to 4, and some as high as five per cent. The prospect is truly gloomy. Northern funds cannot be procured at any price. The notes of the mother banks are at a premium of 2 per cent over other notes. James River and Kanawha scrip, though bearing interest, yet not being receivable at bank, sold at a discount of from 10 to 15 per cent.

The times indicate a harvest of plenty to the shavers, and ruin to all else.

Inquest.—An Inquest was held on Monday, at 28 Monroe street on the body of Harriet, wife of William Blanchard, a native of Albany, aged 47. Deceased was, it appeared, subject to temporary fits of insanity, pending which she had been often heard to threaten to take her own life. On Saturday evening she procured a quantity of laudanum which she took, and from the effects of which died about noon on Sunday. Verdict: suicide by laudanum.—Cov. & Eng.

THE "WOOLY HEADS" TRIUMPH-ANT.

Abram Dixon the abolition candidate for Senator, is elected in the Eighth District. Cinquez, the captured African pirate now in jail at New Haven would have been equally fortunate, had he happened to have been the Anti-Van Buren candidate. Isaac R. Elwood Esq., our much respected fellow citizen, the Democratic Candidate for Senator; although superior in point of talents, acquirements, industry and honour to any other Loco Foco west of Cayuga Bridge, stood no chance from the beginning. Lawyer, with a sulky, his horse took fright and one of the wheels struck the gate post with so much violence as to precipitate him out against a wagon upon the opposite side, and injured him internally to such a degree, that notwithstanding all the aid which our most skilful physicians could afford, he died about 12 o'clock last evening. We understand that he has left a wife and several small children, besides numerous and respectable relations to mourn his untimely loss. His wife arrived about an hour before he expired, and had the satisfaction of conversing with him, who enjoyed his senses to the last moments.—Scholaric Patriot.

It becomes our painful duty to announce the death of Midshipman H. Waddell and two privates, belonging to the U. S. steamer Poinsett, of the brain fever. We deeply sympathize with the friends of the deceased, who were thus cut off among strangers, deprived of the voice of affection from a parent, brother or sister, to soothe the last dying moments.—Key West Floridian.

There is a report in the city this morning, that a dreadful affray took place at Bockspoor or Orland last evening. A party of young people were returning home from singing school in merry mood, when a man and two sons, living in a house which the company passed, supposed themselves insulted rushed out and attacked them. One of the sons stabbed one of the young men, who died in five minutes. We have been unable to ascertain the names of either party.—The man who stabbed the other, fled, and the officers of justice are in pursuit.—Bangor Whig.

SHOCKING ACCIDENT.—A Miss Draper, daughter of Mr. Benj. Draper, of Roxbury, and in the employ of Mr. Glover, of Dedham, was burned to death on the 22d inst. Her clothes caught from a fire which she had just kindled, it being early in the morning, upon which she ran up stairs, where she was met by a young lady, who threw a cloak round her, and in the fright and hurry of the moment, accidentally pushed her so that she fell to the bottom of the stairs. The lady immediately ran for assistance, and on returning the clothes of the sufferer were found entirely consumed, and her person shockingly burned. She survived but thirty-six hours. Miss D. was thirteen years old.—Boston Post.

Paper Mill in Morris county N. J. Burnt.—The valuable new paper mill recently erected by Wm. Knight, a mile and a half from Morristown, N. J. was burnt about 11 o'clock on Sunday night. Loss from \$15,000 to \$20,000. Not insured. The Jerseyman says that it had been in operation only a few weeks under Messrs. Duckat & Sheer, whose loss in stock is considerable. All Mr. Knight's machinery for turning iron, &c. was destroyed, and several families were thrown out of employment. Origin of the fire unknown.—Newark Daily Ad.

A RARE HAUL.—The sum of \$7,500, in counterfeit bills, purporting to be principally of the Merchants' and Planters' Bank, at Chicago, (Ill) but a few also of the Planters' Bank of Florence, and small lots of others too tedious to mention—was lately taken from the person of a passenger on board the steamboat Havana, while descending the Mississippi, below Helena. There is no such bank in existence as either of those named. The counterfeit was chained, but made his escape from the boat during the night. In his saddle bags were found many papers, from which it

appeared he had been dealing largely in Texas lands, these being among the papers numerous certificates not filled of citizenship, with which to swindle the government out of 640 acre head rights, or to forge and sell them to emigrants. The Memphis Enquirer, from which we obtain these particulars, says that the name of this trader is doubtless Lafayette Thompson, from Hardeman county, Tenn. and that his seat of operations in Texas was at San Augustine.—Baltimore Post.

PRETTY GOOD, WHETHER TRUE OR NOT.—The following is vouched for by the Baltimore Clipper:

A Dutchman from the West went to pay his Excellency the President of the United States, a visit. He happened to call just as the President and four others were sitting down to dine. The President asked him to be seated, at the same time inquiring if there was anything new or strange in his country.

"No, I think not, except that one of my cows has had five calves."

"Ah! Indeed—and do they all suck at one time?"

"No, sir," replied the Dutchman; "four on 'em sucks while de toddler looksh on, such as I dash."

The hint was so significant that a clean plate was immediately ordered, and the Dutchman seated at the table where he partook of a comfortable dinner with his excellency the President.

Magnificent Bequest. On Thursday the executors of Wm Young Birch, Esq. late of Philadelphia, made over to the Pennsylvania Institution for the Blind, as directed to his will, cash, stocks and mortgages to the amount of one hundred and sixty seven thousand dollars; together with a debt due his estate of twenty-five thousand dollars, making in all the noble sum of one hundred and ninety two thousand dollars.

Melancholy Rail Road Accident.—There was a collision this morning on the New Jersey rail road, near Bergen Point, which seriously injured several persons; and which will probably cause the death of at least one individual. It appears that some time last evening a large rock fell across one of the tracks, and obstructed the road, thereby compelling the train each way to ply on the same track.

This morning, as the first train from New Brunswick, Newark &c. was on its way to Jersey City, it encountered at the turn of Bergen Hill the cars from Jersey City, and the two trains came together with great force, doing much injury to the cars, and we are sorry to say, breaking the legs of a gentleman who was a passenger in the first car, and wounding two or three of the persons attached to the engine.

The gentleman passenger, we learn, was standing on the platform in front of the car, when the cars came together, and the platform on which he stood was carried away. He of course fell between the meeting cars, and his legs were crushed. This is the second instance of injury from standing on the platform.—N. Y. Com. Ad.

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY
—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shinplasters and to fraudulent banking.

THE RESULT IN THIS CITY.

We never knew our election attended with less excitement, and apparently so little effort on both sides, as the one just passed. The result is, a decrease in the aggregate vote of the city, of about 150 and an increased whig majority since last fall of about the same number. The falling off is nearly all on the Democratic side, which is accounted for by the indifference generally felt as to the result. In our opinion, the County of Monroe was never so fully ripe for a political revolution in favour of Democracy as she was this fall. The whigs had every thing to weigh them down. They had to carry Dixon and the abolitionists—Seward's 40 million debt—the bad management of the city shipmaster corporation—and the bankruptcy of the U. S. Bank. They were also dreadfully divided upon the question of a Presidential candidate. Why then, it will be asked, did not the Republicans take advantage of all these circumstances, to make a vigorous rally and carry the county? The reason is obvious. The destinies of the democratic party in this county have been placed by the President in the hands of men in whom the party have no confidence. The Post-Master of this city, not satisfied with receiving the salary of his office, (his appointment to which was consented to by the party here out of mere pity and under a conviction that he was destitute of capacity to obtain a living in any other way,) must needs undertake to dictate to the Democracy in all other appointments and nominations. In this dictatorial course he was aided by the Printer of the Laws. Unfortunately, the President overlooked the advice of his old and tried friends—disregarded the plainly expressed wishes of the people—and yielded to the "malign influence" of the office holding junta. The result was, the importation of Smith from Mondon as Custom House Officer—the nomination of Tucker on the Assembly ticket—and consequently, the disgust and indifference of most of the active and efficient members of the party. Unless the President retraces his steps, and discards this junta from his confidence, he will not have the skeleton of a party left in Monroe County at the great contest of 1840.

PORT OF ROCHESTER.

The Custom House is located in the 5th Ward. Judge Smith the Collector, who was imported from Mondon against the wishes of the Democratic party, also resides in the ward. In former contests the whig majority in the 5th has ranged from 0 up to 40. Now it is over 100! Can O'Reilly cypher out a "Republican gain" in this ward?

FROM FLORIDA.

We have St. Augustine papers to the 25th ult. from which we have copied the following intelligence:

[From the St. Augustine News of Oct. 25.]
INDIAN NEWS.—A detachment of dragoons, of post No. 17, were fired on while crossing the Ocilla river, by a party of Indians, killing seven and wounding others.

Messrs. Burnes and Beard, of Mickaskie, were attacked by Indians near the Ocilla, both severely wounded.

The house of Mr. Jerraghan, near Ulmer's, was attacked by the enemy, who were beaten off.

IMPORTANT FROM RIO GRANDE.

The brig Ontario, Doly, 14 days from Rio Grande, which arrived here (New York) yesterday, reports that the capital of the province, Porto Alegre, is still besieged by the rebels, who have had several skirmishes with the government troops. The latter suffered considerably in an encounter, in which 1500 rebels attacked the government troops, and obliged them to take refuge in the city, being almost cut to pieces.

Arrested Timber—Sir John Harvey, of New Brunswick, has issued a special order, commanding all persons to abstain from trespassing upon the "disputed territory." They are particularly cautioned against cutting timber.

From Texas.—By the arrival of the steam packet Columbia, we have received our files of Galveston and Houston papers, the first to the 18th of Oct. and the second to the 17th, both inclusive. The Houston Intelligencer of the 17th states that the yellow fever was in that city as well as in Galveston. Several fatal cases of decided black vomit had occurred in the former place. Some of the oldest and most respectable citizens had fallen victims to the epidemic. Among others, Hon. Henry Humphreys, chief justice of the County of Harrisburgh; Hon. Robert Barr, post master general, and Dr. Edmund R. Anderson.—N. O. Bee.

[From the Mobile Mercantile Advertiser.]
MOST INFAMOUS!!—Our city was thrown into great consternation on Saturday morning last, from a report that two young men of the most amiable and unexceptionable character had been guillotined the night previous by a company of five men. The facts, as we have heard them, are briefly as follows: These two young men were on guard, as they have been during the last two weeks, for the protection of the city. At about 11 o'clock on Friday night, they were seized in the streets hurried into a carriage, and driven about two miles from the city, where they were stripped, tied, and whipped with a cowhide!! A pile of wood was also placed around them, and threatened by the monsters to be fired. This however was not done. The reasons alleged for this inhuman violence, was that these young men had set fire to the City Hotel, and this information was derived from one of the gang of Lynchers, a man of notoriously despicable character, who would not be believed on oath by ten men in

this city. Yet without any other proof, or any further inquiry, the innocent young men were seized, and their persons most inhumanly and shamefully mutilated. And the actors in this infamous transaction were some of them CONSERVATORS OF THE PEACE!! One holds the office of Justice of the Peace, and member of the City Council!! Another is one of the Commissioners of Roads and Revenue for Mobile county!!! We blush—for the honor of our city, we blush, to tell the degrading truth.

As soon as the transaction was known in the city, the city patrol promptly took steps for the arrest of the offenders, and before morning, three of them were lodged in jail. The other two were not to be found. The three were brought before the mayor in the morning, and all the facts being fully proved, they were fined to the extent of the law. They were then immediately arrested on a warrant from a justice of the peace—brought before justice Lane, and bound over to court in a bond of \$5000. The Justice of the Peace (!) gave bonds, and immediately took the Pascagoula stage. The other two being unable to give security, were committed to jail. In the afternoon the two others came in—gave themselves up—and executed bonds in \$5000 each for their appearance at court. Never have we known such indignation in a whole community as was exhibited here on Saturday. Not a breath or suspicion of guilt rests on the young men, and the sympathy for them is unbounded and universal. Whilst toward the vile and unprincipled monsters, who have thus inflicted on them this personal injury; who have violated the sanctity of the law, and disgraced our city, there was one universal feeling of deep indignation, contempt and scorn. Never have we known a feeling so universal, and at the same time so intense. Not a single breath has been heard in their defence. For their conduct there is not a single palliating circumstance.

Notwithstanding the deep indignation, and the unprecedented excitement which prevailed, we are proud to say, not a single attempt was made at violence—even the degraded conservator of the peace!! was suffered to pass quietly to the stage, and made his exit. Our citizens have acted nobly in thus abstaining from doing what their indignant feelings must have prompted.—The unprincipled men who have thus caused the blood of injured innocence to flow—who have thus trifled with the feelings of this deeply affected community which has straining every nerve to maintain the supremacy of the law, and preserve its own honor inviolate amid all its trials—these men, aye, and men of property too! who have thus wantonly, and inhumanly inflicted on Mobile—yes it is on Mobile—this degradation, we trust never will have the impudence again to show their faces in her streets. It is a transaction, under all the circumstances, of the most revolting character, and the actors in it can never hope to be forgiven by the citizens of Mobile.

CAUTION.

We feel it our duty to caution the public against remitting money through the Post Office. Since the resignation of Doct. Elwood about a year ago, the mails have become a very unsafe medium of remittance in this neighborhood. Rumours of a very unpleasant character have reached our ears, and we warn the public to be on their guard.

THE BANKS

As the deplorable state of the currency and the depreciation of the safety fund bills in value together with the bills of the Banks under the General Banking Law, have become so ruinous to the trading community, that when there swindling operations are understood, we should not wonder if an abused people should commence such a run upon them for specie, that would place them where they belong, among the things that have passed away and are no more. In the first place all the western Banks in the State of New York are 5 and 7 per cent discount in the city of New York. Why is this, have not the Banks means to redeem in the city of New York according to their arrangements? Let us see, in the first place it is well understood that the merchants do not get any assistance from the Banks, by way of a commodation, who gets the money then that is put in circulation? the millers on their conditions of depositing the flour with a forwarder and taking his receipt for the same, make a draft at thirty days payable in the city of New York, for \$4.50 per barrel, is the only manner which millers can obtain means to purchase the wheat, it will be seen that when these drafts arrive at maturity they are paid in New York, and of course are city funds. The money obtained for those drafts is taken by the millers, and sent to their agents to purchase wheat. Now suppose every dollar put in circulation in this manner, finds its way to the city of New York in thirty days.

Here is our city funds for the payment of the draft all in time to redeem the money put in circulation to buy the wheat, and something more. As the Banks only discount up to the price of the flour where it is manufactured leaving the forwarders to collect charges from the millers. Hence it appears that the Banks have abundance of money to redeem all their money in the city of New York. And do you wish to know why they do not do it? we will tell you why they put their city funds into the hands of the brokers, and instead of redeeming as the banks are bound to do at 3-4 per cent, they charge 7 per cent. This is the way the Banks make 7 per cent a month.

Well, may it be said that Banks have no souls, and it might be well applied to there managers. There is NO MISTAKE IN THIS MATTER.

It is of the utmost importance to the little band of federal office holders in this city to satisfy Mr. Van Buren that they have done their duty at the recent election, and that there has been no loss to them in votes. Consequently the old federal Daily of yesterday assures its "friends abroad" that the whig majority now is less than 50 more than it was last fall! When we get the official canvass we shall see that the aggregate vote of the county is much less than was last fall, and that the falling off, has been chiefly on the Van Buren side.

Do read an article in yesterday's Daily Advertiser headed "Internal Improvements." It squints awfully towards "statistics" and "historical reminiscences." It is the most laborious effort to cypher out a hard sum, we ever saw. Mr. Wright and the President will have copies sent them marked no doubt. Will they swallow such indigestible "statistics?"

Let us have a UNION MEETING of the Republicans of Rochester, opposed to Van Buren and in favour of SCOTT. What say you democratic whigs, and Scott Republicans? Away with jealousies and old grudges. In "Union there is strength"

The old federal Daily calls the Republican friends of the gallant Scott a "litt handful of apostates!"

It is a significant sign, that Tucker runs behind his ticket in this city. Here, he is known.

There is a project on foot to establish at Barbadoes a Great W. Bank with a capital of £2,000,000, divided into 20,000 shares, and with branches in British Guiana, Trinidad, St. Vincent, Antigua, and other islands, and Great Britain, the United States, British America and elsewhere.

THE VALUE OF A MAID'S REPUTATION.—The following is copied from a London paper, and exhibits a case of heartlessness too common among the poor class of England:

Mr. Combe: And how much more?

Sikes (hesitating): And a sovereign.

Mr. Combe: And how much more?

Sikes (after a pause): Well, supposing I say two sovereigns besides the 18s.

Mr. Combe (to the complainant): Well, what do you say to that?

Complainant: That I am perfectly satisfied, Sir.

Sikes paid three sovereigns into the hands of the mother, and the parties left the office.

AWFUL CONFLAGRATION!!

About 2 o'clock Sunday morning, the 27th, a fire broke out between the buildings belonging to Henry Brown and D Hatch, and could not be arrested until it had destroyed nearly all the block bounded by Lake, Clarke, South Water, and Dearborn Streets on the south side of the alley, and a violent rain alone prevented the remainder of the block and several adjacent ones. FRON TEXAS.

By the arrival of the steam packet Columbia, we have received our files of Galveston and Houston papers—the 1st to the 18th, and the second to the 17th inst., both inclusive. The Houston Intelligencer of the 17th states that the yellow fever was in that city as well as in Galveston. Several fatal cases of decided black vomit had occurred in the former place. Some of the most and oldest respectable citizens had fallen victims to the epidemic. Among others, Hon. Henry Humphreys, chief justice of the county of Harrisburgh, Hon. Robert Barr, post-master general, and Dr. Edmond R. Anderson. A letter from Austin, the new seat of government, dated Oct. 1st, mentions that the city presents quite a commercial and business like appearance. The boarding houses were full to overflowing. Wagons were constantly arriving, laden with goods and chattels. Three spacious hotels, besides many smaller buildings, were in process of erection. The first number of a new paper to be called "Austin City Gazette," was soon to make its appearance.

At Matagorda on the evening of the 30th ultimo, Francis L. du Fallois, a resident of that place committed suicide by cutting his throat with a razor.

In the St. Augustin congressional district the election for member of Congress has been very spirited, Gen. S. Houston and Major W. C. Duffield, were the principal candidates. Gen. Houston was elected by a small majority.

The 18 Gun Brig Brazos, Wm. Oliver, commander, arrived at Galveston of the 11th from Baltimore. She is pronounced by the journals a splendid specimen of naval architecture.

ANOTHER OF THE CAPTURED AFRICANS DEAD!—We learn that another—the fifth—of these poor prisoners is dead, and ears are entertained that more will die, as the inclement season approaches. They suffer for want of warm clothing. The committee of superintendence have again and again urged upon the Marshal of the District that sufficient clothing agreeably to the direction of the District Judge, is not provided for them. Humanity requires that this should be looked to.

WASHINGTON BANK OF MIAMI SEBOURGH, OHIO.—A writ of Quo Warranto has been granted against this concern. It is well for the public that it is so, that they may know on what ground it issues bills. Some thousands are already in circulation, and much of it too in this vicinity. It is unseizable at the brokers, and is skin to fraud.—being nothing more or less than a Library association.—Buffalo Commercial Ad.

BANKS OF MICHIGAN.—The Detroit Banks have suspended, and their example will probably be followed by all the others through the State. In a notice published in the Advertiser, signed by H. K. Sanger, Cashier of the Bank of Michigan, and John A. Welles, Cashier of the Farmers' and Mechanics' Bank, in behalf of their respective boards of direction, it is said:

The ordinary business of these Banks will be conducted as usual without interruption, and their notes will be received by each other for all purposes: No distinction will be made between the notes of the Branch and Home offices.

It is not designed that this measure shall affect, unfavorably, the rates of exchange for bills upon the Atlantic cities, on the contrary, the Banks will endeavor to afford reasonable facilities for converting the currency, and to promote, by all the means in their power, the purchase and shipment of the surplus produce, of the country.

RIOT AND BLOODSHED.—A riot occurred on Saturday night last, between several citizens of this county, and several individuals belonging to the Circus and Menagerie of Messrs. Raymond, Ogden, Warning, Hobby, Weeks & Co. then exhibiting in this town. The riot, we are informed, commenced at the entrance to the pavilion, and originated in a quarrel between the parties about the admission, or the refusal to admit the aforesaid citizens. After a considerable scuffle inside and out, in which several severe blows were dealt on either side, the rioting ceased. In a few minutes after, one of the company was overtaken a few yards from the pavilion, and had his head so severely cut by a club, that it was found necessary to resort to a physician to dress his wounds. This highly incensed his associates of the Circus and Menagerie, several of whom, to avenge his injuries, went immediately in pursuit of the citizens who had inflicted them. The parties met in the passage and bar room of Mr. Hall's Hotel, where a most desperate and bloody conflict ensued, leaving 3 of our citizens apparently lifeless upon the floor, cut and mangled in the most shocking manner.

Indeed it is surprising that life was not sacrificed in such a sanguinary conflict. Daggers and clubs were used without mercy, and if murder was not the consequence, we must attribute it to a Providential interference rather than to the forbearance of the ruffians who used them. But one of the party who made the attack in the bar room received any material injury, which was a wound in the back, inflicted with a knife or some other sharp instrument; but several of them received severe blows at the pavilion, in the commencement of the riot.

An effort was made on Sunday morning to investigate the whole affair, and to bring the offenders to justice, but those of the company who participated in the fight being strangers, they could not be identified, and nothing could be elicited from those who were examined calculated to lead to a disclosure of their names.

Surgical aid being at hand, instant assistance was afforded to the wounded individuals, who, we believe, with one exception, are out of danger.

Our city is again filling up with inhabitants although the fever still prevails, to a very small extent. The news of the suspension of the Philadelphia and other banks, created some little sensation here, and the general impression is that it will operate decidedly in favor of the mercantile interests of Mobile. The Planters' and Mechanics' Bank and the Bank of Mobile, which you are aware have continued specie payments in the face of the suspension since last February of the State Banks of Alabama, have resolved to maintain the stand they then took and meet their responsibilities, as they always have done, in gold and silver. Exchange on New York remains about the same, ruling from 8 to 9 per cent, premium when purchased with the bills of the State Bank, which are at 7 per cent, discount for specie, or the notes of the other banks.

The ship John Baring from New York, and the brig John from Boston, arrived last night.

There is every prospect that the ensuing business season will be a very brisk one.

VAN AMBURGH OCEAN.—The lion emperor (as we suppose he must be called, to distinguish him from Van Amburgh.) Mr. Carter, made his first appearance at Astley's on Monday evening, in a piece entitled "The Miracle or Afghan, the Lion King." In the first act of this piece, Mr. Carter fought with a tiger. The beast of prey in the outset mastered the man, and dragged him from a platform down a flight of steps, and after a contest for superiority for some time the animal is mastered, and is led off tame as a kitten. All this takes place on the open stage, without the restraint of a cage—the tiger has the same latitude as all his brother performers uncontrolled.

In the second act he introduces the novel and beautiful display of a lion in harness, peacefully and docilely drawing him in a chariot. The lion is a magnificent animal, but meek and mild, and seems to manage itself rather than be managed. In the third act he brought out a beautiful leopard, and played with it, attached to a leading string, as he would have done with a lap dog. His performances, of course, comprehended all the experiments of thrusting his arms and legs in the mouths of the creatures, and all that was done with ease, elegance and perfect safety.

When the curtain dropped the audience called loudly for the Lion King, and he presented himself to receive the congratulations of the house, leading in his favorite tiger, who partook of the repast of praise, as if he had been taught to expect it.

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.
—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shiplasters and to fraudulent banking.

A Philadelphia letter writer mentions as one of the principal cause of the Bank suspension in that city, the fact that a large amount in specie has been withdrawn from the banks, and hoarded by the farmers of the interior. It is estimated, that in Bucks, Montgomery and Berks counties alone, there is now not less than four millions of specie hoarded; and that in the State of Pennsylvania there is hoarded not less than fifteen millions of dollars!

The above estimate probably exceeds the utmost amount hoarded; but the fact that there exists among the people a disposition to hoard the precious metals, is a practical commentary on the sordid, debasing and destructive spirit of Loco Focoism. The war upon the banks in this form is assuming a more deadly aspect, than in any other that has been presented; for not only is the basis of a sound currency thus withdrawn from the banks, but the people are made to suffer, and the vast sums hoarded up are rendered of no use whatever to the holders or to the world.

If this spirit now prevalent in the great Loco Foco counties of Pennsylvania, should become general, the doctrines of Ming, Fanny and Hertell might as well be established at once—until the people have enough of them. There is a miserable faction in this city who go for a hard currency, and against banks, like the Loco-Focos of Pennsylvania; but their cry here does little harm, any further than it encourages the spread of evil elsewhere. The great body of the people of New York, and of the State, are sound in their views of what should constitute a currency and in spite of the existing evils, they will bear up successfully against them, and show to the rest of the Union a spirit worthy of praise and imitation.

The confidence of the people here in their banking institutions is unimpaired—the idea of an exclusive metallic currency is laughed out of countenance, and is entertained only by those who have brazen faces and brains of molten lead. Hence there is no hoarding. Instead of hiding away gold and silver, in old stockings and tills of chests, our people carry it to the banks, and deposit, sell or exchange it for small bills, which being equal to the specie, are quite as convenient for all the common transactions of life.—N.Y. Whig

LAW SUITS, LAWYERS, &c.—Perhaps at no former period in the history of this city, has there been such a general rage in the way of suing and persecution, as at the present. In such times as these, while in the absence of trade and business, and a dreadful scarcity of money, it becomes all men in business to exercise the utmost lenity and forbearance towards each other in the collection of debts—that man is a bad citizen, who will commence suits at law against his solvent neighbour, for debt in these times, when all kinds of merchandize will not bring 33 per cent. or the cost, under the Sheriff hammer, and that lawyer who will advise persecution and litigation under the present state of circumstances, is a bad member of society and deserves the contempt of all well meaning men—circumstances have recently come to our knowledge, when lawyers have commenced costly suits without even asking the debtor for the demand, thereby harassing a man with a taxed bill of costs, and filling their own pocket.—Shame on such men, they deserve to be hoisted out of society, for it is in fact no other than a species of robbery.

THE STEAMSHIPS.—We learn from the New York Commercial Advertiser, that the trip of the Great Western, commencing on the 15th inst., will be her last for the season. On her arrival at Bristol she is to be laid up until spring, for the purpose of undergoing a thorough examination, and such repairs as may be found necessary. If needful she will be entirely new coppered.

The British Queen will continue to make her trips monthly, leaving each port on the first of every alternate month.

The Liverpool will also make her trips through the winter. The new ship belonging to the same company, named the New York, will commence her trips early in the coming year.

SUPREME COURT OF NEW YORK.
(Sitting at Albany.)

EZRA WHITE ADS. THE PEOPLE, &c.—The defendant in this case was convicted of the murder of Peter Fitzpatrick, in the Court of Oyer and Terminer, in this city in June last. He was last week removed to Albany, to be heard by counsel on a motion for a new trial. The bill of exceptions set forth that the convictions were illegal—first that the judge (Teglis) who presided at the trial, was not empowered by the statute to preside in courts of criminal jurisdiction, and second, that the indictment under which the defendant was tried, was defective in having therein but one count, and not setting forth distinctively the allegations, as required by the statute.

The Court, on Thursday Morning, delivered a long opinion confirming the judgment of the Court of Oyer and Terminer.

The prisoner, in custody of the keeper, returned to the city yesterday, and was committed to the city prison, where he now awaits the sentence of death.

Mr. Stevens gave notice to the Court that an appeal would be made to the Court of Errors for a reversal of the decision.—Courier.

A CURIOSITY.—A gentleman informed us a few days since, that a short time previous, while in pursuit of wild turkeys, in Hart county, Kentucky, in company with a friend, they discovered on the summit of a knoll or elevation a large hole, that would admit a man's body without much difficulty. Curiosity led them to make preparations, and by an accession, they entered this mysterious place. At the length of about 60 feet they found themselves in a subterraneous cave or room apparently cut out of solid rock, through which they had passed many feet, which appeared to be sixteen or eighteen feet square. Our informant was the first that entered the room, and he was not a little surprised that the first object which met his eyes was a human skull with all the teeth entire. Upon further examination, it was found that the whole place was filled with skeletons of men, women and children.

Under the small aperture through which they descended, the place was perfectly dry, and the bones in a state of preservation. An entire skeleton of the human body was obtained. They concluded to examine how deep the bones were laid, and penetrated through them in one place between four and seven feet, but found them equally plentiful as on the top, but there seemed to rise an offensive effluvia as they approached where it was a little damp. There was not outlet to the room, and a large snake which they found there, and which appeared to be perfectly docile, passed round the room several times while they were in it. The discovery is a subject for the speculation of philosophers with regard to the period and circumstances attending this ancient charnel house.—Central Watchtower.

TRUTH.—The subjoined epilogue, beautifully enforcing the utility and beauty of TRUTH, at all times, has probably appeared before in our columns. But such an article can scarcely be published too often:

"A Persian mother, in giving her son forty pieces of money as his portion, made him swear never to tell a lie, and said, 'Go my son, I consign thee to God, and we shall not meet again till the day of judgment.' The youth went away, and the party he travelled with was assaulted by robbers. One fellow asked what he had got, and he said, 'Forty dinars are sewed in my garment.' He laughed, thinking he jested. Another asked the same question, and got the same answer. At last the chief called, and asked him, and he said, 'I have told two of your people already, that I have forty dinars sewed up in my clothes.' He ordered the clothes to be ripped open, and found the money—and how came you to tell this?' 'Because,' the child replied, 'I would not be false to my mother, to whom I have promised never to tell a lie.' 'Child,' said the robber, 'thou art so mindful of thy duty to thy mother, at thy years, and art insensible, at my age, of the duty I owe to my God? Give me thy hand, that I may swear repentance on it.'—He did so; his followers were all struck with the scene. 'You have been our leader in guilt,' said they to the chief, 'be the same in the path of virtue,' and they instantly made restitution of spoils, and avowed repentance on the hand.

SURGICAL OPERATION.—The Taliacotian or Rhinoplastic operation was performed on Saturday last at the anatomical theatre of the Albany Medical College, by Doctor Alden March, Professor of Surgery, in the presence of the entire class now in attendance upon the lectures, and a large number of the physicians of the city and its vicinity, who were attracted by its novelty and interest.

It consisted in supplying the loss of the nose: which in this instance was entire, by detaching sufficient skin from the forehead, leaving it connected between the eyebrows, and bringing down, and moulding it into the form of a nose, the raw and bleeding surface being closely applied to a similar raw surface made upon the margin of the former nose, to which adhesion is effected.

The patient is a resident of this city, and sustained the painful and tedious operation with signal fortitude, and at its termination rose from the table, and walked into an adjacent room, whence he was soon removed to his house, and we learn thus far is doing well, and every confidence is entertained of its complete success.

This operation is an instance of the triumph of surgery over one of the worst deformities inflicted by disease, and by its success reflects the highest honor on the operator, as well as the profession.—Argus.

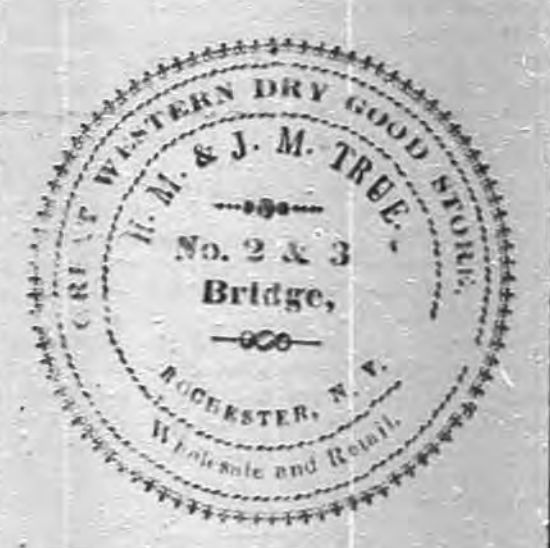

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shipplasters and to fraudulent bankers.

UNWRITTEN MUSIC.

In imitation of John Quincy Adams, Senator Niles and the great political characters, who print their *unspoken* speeches in Congress, we this morning enlighten, enliven and electrify our readers with the speech we intended to have made at the Great Scott Meeting. We went there cock'd, primed, and loaded—ready to go off like Col. Webb's famous "percussion lock and mahogany stock" pistol—but we were so terrified at the immense multitude, that our courage, like that of Bob Acres, "oozed out at our finger's ends."

Mr. Oakley being called for, arose and (meant to have) addressed the meeting as follows:

MR. CHAIRMAN:

I make no pretension to being an orator, and prefer generally to address the public through the columns of the Sun; the first paper established in the United States, to advocate the election of General Scott to the Presidency, (cheers). I certainly feel highly flattered, upon being called to address such a numerous and highly respectable meeting of my fellow citizens as this is. (Immense applause). We have met together for the purpose of considering the character and services of the gallant Hero of Chippewa, and devising proper means to ensure his election as our next President, (*cries of hear.*) It is not necessary that I should occupy your time in examining the character of Scott. His exemplary conduct in private life and honor as soldier has never been called in question—enemies he has not—unless among the foes of our common country. Neither is it necessary that I should recount his services; they are written in the pages of his country's history, (great cheering.)

His skill and bravery as soldier has never been denied. Upon the plains of Chippewa and Niagara, he has freely shed his blood for the People, who will ere long show their gratitude by elevating him to the highest office in the Republic. (Hear, hear, hear.) It is not as soldier alone, that Scott stand permanent. His successful and humane removal of the Cherokee Indians—his skill and success during the trouble in Maine, and on this frontier, show him to be a statesman of the first order. (Tremendous applause.) It is a remarkable fact that no newspaper in the United States has ventured to assail his character since his name was brought forward for the Presidency. This fact speaks volumes. Sir, the name of Winfield Scott, is unassailable. (Long and loud cheering.) Why then should he not be elected to the Presidency? If services in his country's cause entitle any man to that office, Scott is the man. If you want courage, skill, talents, honesty or patriotism, you will find it in Scott. Do you ask for his politics? They are the honor, the glory, the prosperity of the United States of America. These are the politics of Winfield Scott. (Cheers.) He never has and never will condescend to flatter the prejudice or excite the passions of a faction. Point to the bristling bayonet of the foe—bid him to the cannon's mouth and you will find him *if on hand.* But ask him to play the sycophant or court the applause of a fickle mob, and he will shrink from the ignoble task. (Great applause.) Let us then forget our party prejudices and animosities, let us unite under the banner of UNION AND THE CONSTITUTION, and suc-

cess will crown our efforts. (Three rounds of applause.) With SCOTT for President, fraud, corruption, and defalcation, will be scourged from power, and our country will resume its onward march to greatness and to glory.

Mr. Oakley sat down amidst thunders of applause, which shook the Court House to its very foundations.

At the great Scott Meeting held at the Court House on Wednesday evening last every thing went off perfectly right.—The large Court room was literally cramed full to overflowing of the bone and sinew—the real working men of both political parties. The Address and Resolutions presented by the Committee were enthusiastically adopted by the meeting; and were spirited, patriotic and democratic. We hope every man throughout the whole country will read them. They are exactly to the point at this important crisis. Several excellent speeches were made, and the name of the Hero could not be mentioned, nor any allusion made to his generous character, or his noble acts, without producing the greatest applause, and the most deafening cheers by the whole assemblage.

We have 20 per cent bid from Mr. Morgan—thank you sir—going at 20 cents. Mr. Faulkner are you going to let your debts be struck off for that, shame, come up to scratch at once and bid it in.

The meeting at the Court House last night was a "Buster." The friends of General Scott turned out well. It was without doubt the largest meeting ever held in this city.

SCOTT MEETING.

An immense meeting of the citizens of Rochester in favour of the election of GENERAL WINFIELD SCOTT to the next Presidency was held at the Court House on the 13th inst., the meeting was temporarily organized by calling Joseph Medbery to the chair, where a committee consisting of S. K. Faulkner, Henry W. Davis, John Hawks, S. H. Packard, and Benjamin Clough were appointed to report suitable officers for the meeting, the committee reported the following names who were unanimously appointed. Joseph Medbery, President. Derick Sibley, Silas H. Frink, Elias Pond, Erasmus L. Smith, E. F. Smith and S. H. Packard, Vice Presidents, And Erastus Shepard, Robert Haight and James Miller Secretaries.

On motion of J. W. Gilbert Esq. a committee consisting of J. W. Gilbert, L. K. Faulkner, E. P. Smith, R. L. McCollum and J. C. Chamesero were appointed to present an address and Resolutions to the meeting. This committee by J. W. Gilbert Esq. reported an address which on motion of Mr. A. Erickson was unanimously adopted, E. P. Smith Esq. from the same committee reported the following resolutions which on motion of John Hawks Esq. were also unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the last elections held in this State have demonstrated the facts that Mr. Van Buren can not receive the vote of New York, if a candidate is presented for the suffrages of the people upon all who are opposed to party prescription and federal dictation, whatever may have been their former political associations, can cordially and consistently unite.

Resolved, That WINFIELD SCOTT, by his distinguished services in War and Peace, by his purity of heart and integrity of purpose, his lofty patriotism and brilliant intellect is worthy to be the successor of WASHINGTON, that his eminent success in the most difficult diplomatic employments has demonstrated not only his rare discretion, splendid civil talents, but a practical ability and untiring industry honorable to him alike as the workingman and the statesman.

Resolved, That we deem the character and services of GENERAL SCOTT to be more generally appreciated by the whole people without distinction of party or location, than those of any other public man. He has had no strife but with the enemies of his country, no ends, but the common defence and the common welfare, untainted by party conflicts, party malevolence dare not sally his name, party discipline can not prevent his receiving the highest distinction which can be conferred by a grateful people.

Resolved, That we have seen with high gratification, the enthusiastic demonstrations made by the people of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Vermont, Massachusetts, Michigan and other states in favour of the people's candidate for the Presidency and that we deem it unwise for either party to resist the swelling current of popular feeling.

After the adoption of the Resolutions the meeting was ably and eloquently addressed by several gentlemen.

The thanks of the meeting were presented to the presiding officers for the able manner in which they had discharged their duty.

On motion of A. Erickson Esq.

The proceedings of the meeting were directed to be published in the several papers of this city, and such others as may give them an insertion.

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.

THE PRESIDENCY.

It is a singular fact that this year every county in the 8th Senatorial District except Monroe has given a reduced whig majority from last fall. CANONS OF GOOD BREEDING.

This is the title of a small volume just published, by the author of "The Laws of Etiquette." There is much good reading in it, apart from the rules which it lays down respecting social intercourse, the author having illustrated his meaning with divers pleasant anecdotes and elegant allusions. We commend the "Canons" to such young persons as are about entering society, but who may not have a very accurate acquaintance with its forms. We make a few extracts.

In paying a visit, or seeking the company of any one upon foreknowledge, it is manifestly a compliment to be well dressed, and an insult to be slovenly.

A man of sense, as well as a man of the world, will always dress in the fashion.

When you are going out to walk, you should draw on your gloves, and make all the other adjustments in your attire, before you open the street door. It is offensive to see a man dressing himself in the street.

It is offensive to offer a gloved hand to a person, unless he, too, is gloved. If two persons meet one another and both have their gloves on, they should shake hands without removing them.

When company enter the room at an evening party or ball, the gentlemen of the house should go up and bow to them before they present themselves to the lady.

If you are at another house than your own, and see a lady coming in, unattended by a gentleman, you should offer her your arm, and take her up to the lady of the house. You should do the same to ladies who are taking leave, and you should conduct them to their carriages.

If a lady is going to her carriage, or is alone in any public place where it is usual, or would be convenient, for ladies to be attended, you should offer her your arm and service, even if you do not know her. To do so in a private room, as in the case above mentioned, might be thought a liberty.

At an evening party you should make a point of going all round the room, after you have saluted the lady of the house, and bowing to every lady with whom you are acquainted.

When you receive a card of invitation, you should return an answer immediately—in the same hour that you receive it.

At an evening party, a gentleman should abstain from conversing with the members of the family at whose house the company are assembled, as they wish to be occupied with entertaining their other guests.

When you send a book to a gentleman or lady, as a gift or loan, or return one which you have borrowed, you should enclose it in a white paper under seal.

When you salute a lady, or a gentleman to whom you wish to show particular respect, in the street, you should take your hat entirely off, and cause it to describe a circle of at least ninety degrees from its original resting place.

At a house where you are intimate, you may drop in and take tea without being invited; but it is otherwise with dinner. Never dine with your most intimate friends without being invited in particular.

In company, you should never tilt your chair

back upon its hind feet; especially not at a dinner table.

A man should make it a point to avoid all singularity of manner. Unconscious eccentricity is a defect which every one should labor to overcome; and every voluntary attempt to deviate from the usual manner of doing ordinary acts, is a terrible unworthy of a man of sense.

A young man, during the first years of his entrance into company, should direct his efforts and attentions chiefly to women. Among them he should spend his time, and with them should become as familiar as possible. It is by intimate society with accomplished women, that men become accomplished.

There is nothing more diligently to be avoided than every species of affectation. It is always detested; and it always disgusts.

To endeavor to be thought possessed of vices or defects, is a form of vanity; and of the most ignoble. A man of sense will always resolve to present himself to the world in his real character; to do nothing that is not genuine, and say nothing save in a natural manner.

Absence of mind should be most carefully shunned, both in conversation and action. In the former, it makes a man odious; in the latter, ridiculous.

ADDRESS.

Freemen of the Union:

A large portion of your fellow citizens have assembled under the solemn conviction of the necessity of immediate, vigorous and united political action in opposition to the present administration of the Federal Government. They feel that the present momentous crisis in our public affairs, will afford an abundant justification for a brief exposition of the views which they entertain in respect to the obligations resting upon the citizens of this union. To the sordid and grovelling spoiler, whose best aspirations all concentrate in the loaves and fishes of office, or the Agrarian leveller, who contemplates an equality of social and political degradation, as the millennium of man's condition, an appeal were unnecessary. But to the free, honest and enlightened yeomanry of the land, we are persuaded we shall not speak in vain. You have ever been, under every vicissitude, the most faithful preservers of political truth, the foremost asserters of the rights of the people, and the most vigilant guardians of civil liberty.—Upon you, then, we call to bestow your efficient aid, in repairing the dilapidated institutions of our beloved country, and in resuscitating the decayed and expiring spirit of patriotism. We ask you to bring the principles and practices of the men who are invested with the administration of the Government, to the test of those political truths which were asserted and maintained by the Fathers of Democracy at an early period of our history, and which embodied in harmony and impregnable strength, have since become the genuine touchstone of political faith.

The limits of this address will not allow us to make a full application of this test. An allusion merely to a few particulars must suffice, with an earnest commendation of the subject to your calm and candid reflections. The most remarkable and most alarming departure from the true Democratic path, consists in the enormous and overshadowing influence which, through fraud and sinister appeals to individual avarice, to local interests and to geographical jealousies, the Federal Government has acquired. By a process so gradual and stealthy as scarcely to be perceived, enlarged and urged forward by the prosecution of measures of extraordinary interest and excitement, it has at length effected a practical revolution in our political system.—Instead of being what Mr. JEFFERSON truly defined it to be, the mere agent of the confederacy, strong to execute the national will, but impotent to coerce it, it has centralized and consolidated in itself the preponderant political power of the union. The states, by a process of corresponding depression, have fallen into the humiliating condition of conquered provinces. A vast empire now stretches with colossal strength, from Nova Scotia to Mexico, and from the Atlantic to the western wilds, exerting every moment a more tremendous and terrific power than ever before existed under the form or the semblance of free institutions. Our boasted system of checks and balances, has indeed become reduced to an error of despotic power.—The executive will is all-potent to crush or to sustain. The co-ordinate branches of the government, established by our fathers as the sure safeguards of our liberties, it is true, exist in name, and are still copied in the reprints of the glorious charter of our country's union. But their practical efficiency has fled. Like Aaron's rod, the executive has swallowed them. Treachery to the people, and subserviency to executive dictation, is openly and shamelessly proclaimed as the only passport to office. What would be the amazement of the judicious and patriotic Founders of our republic, could they behold this early and fearful perversion of the noble fabric which they had reared, and cemented with their best blood, and to which they fondly trusted, as the safe and impregnable citadel of their country's freedom!

To the present generation, upon whom the foul reproach must rest, in deep and indelible stains, of having treacherously violated the sacred trust committed to them, a prompt and severe retribution has awarded a just punishment. Throughout the land, the people, of all classes and conditions, are every where groaning under the burdens of a cruel and oppressive government. Their chosen servants have not only proved faithless, but are actually wielding, with ruthless violence, the rod and lash of tyranny. Government has ceased to afford pro-

tection to the rights, or support to the interests, of the people, but has abandoned its plain and legitimate duties, and turned away from its most imperative obligations. Flushed with the possession of unjust and usurped power, our rulers, in servile imitation of their infamous prototypes, the Egyptian task-masters, now command the people to make brick without straw. Let the government take care of itself, and the people of themselves.

This is the language which is uttered, there are the sentiments expressed by Republican Tyrants, to a deceived and down-trodden people. What measure of expiation, how much earnestness and repetition of entreaty will suffice to cause that people to rise in their might and assert their rights, vindicate the sacred principles which are treasured up in their dear-bought political inheritance, and re-establish the glorious landmarks of American freedom? We feel that we are addressing men whose minds and hearts are alive to the spirit of '76—men who know their rights, and knowing dare maintain them. Up, then, fellow citizens, to the work of regeneration. Blush from the seats of power, men who smilingly court your favor, for the deliberate and unfeeling purpose of abusing your confidence. Crush the conspiracy of office holders to barter their own birth-rights, and the birth rights of their countrymen, for a mess of stolen pottage.

How is this glorious object to be accomplished? Under what banner is the battle to be fought? These are momentous inquiries. We answer, by expressing our conviction that our country has descended so far the declivity of corruption, the loathsome demon of avarice has made such tremendous inroads among our public-men, and has absorbed so much of the spirit of patriotism, the people have become so far entangled in the meshes of arbitrary power, that a complete union of all the opponents of the Federal Administration only can secure the victory. There must be a full gathering upon the broad and elevated basis of national honor and national prosperity. Our vows must be made on the sacred altar of the Union. No local feeling, no sectional interest, no geographical jealousy must be allowed to create division in our ranks.—Thus banded together, the power of the people must prove effectual.

A candid survey of the general policy of the Federal Executive, the appliances which he uses in different sections of the Union, variant as the diversified interests of the country, cannot fail to produce conviction of the necessity for this union and harmony. His appeals are made solely to selfish passions and local interests. Such are the means by which he obtained power, and by these means only does he seek to preserve it. To his purchased and prostituted partisans in the North he offers the emoluments of office, and the vast wealth of the people, profusely distributed in the form of Government jobs. He proclaims himself the friend and protector of the commercial interests, by boasting asserter the paternity of the Safety Fund Banks; while at the same moment, and in the face of the same community, he insults the intelligence of the people by unfurling the Flag of the Specie Sub Treasury, and acknowledging the shouts of the Agrarians of New York for his uniform and consistent opposition to all monopolies.

In the South he unites with the Prince of Nullifiers, in the base project of prostrating the commercial prosperity of the North, and of building up on its ruins, that of the cities of the South. He ungratefully discards and tramples under foot, the interests and demands of the State of his birth, and wears with complacency the badge of treason bestowed upon him by his chivalrous friends at the South, labelled "The Northern man with Southern principles." He affects an especial regard to their peculiar institutions; and, as if to defeat in advance, a contingency which might happen in a moment of temptation, or of honest reflection, he enchains his reason and his will, by an unqualified and detestable pledge, to use the extraordinary veto power, in order to defeat the will of Congress, should it ever be exerted so as to impair those institutions.

To the growing and enterprising States of the West, he holds out the splendid bribe of the public domain. This rich treasure, purchased by the blood of our revolutionary fathers, was committed to the Federal Government as a sacred trust for the common benefit of the whole people. Every individual in the land has an equal interest in it. And yet we behold Martin Van Buren, coolly and deliberately striving to and robbery to fraud, in order to gratify his inordinate cravings for political power.

Fellow-citizens—We have endeavored to show with great brevity, that the present is not an ordinary contest for mere party supremacy—that it is not an opposition to principles and measures, respecting which, men may honestly differ—but that it reaches back to the original theory and the fundamental doctrines of our political system. It is the old contest of the Crown on one side, and the People on the other. Popular freedom against arbitrary power. A similar contest has occurred only once before in the course of our national existence. The memorable revolution of '98 originated upon the same grounds and resulted in the signal triumph of the democracy. That contest occurred in purer times than the present, and was characterized by none of those difficulties, which a long course of political corruption has thrown in our own path. Our opponents dare not give us a fair fight. They seek, through the discordant union of hostile interests, to affect our overthrow. Their only hope rests on the folly or the baseness of the people. But with an united force we shall be able to defeat their machinations, and effect another revolution as signal and effectual as that which secured the ascendancy of the Democracy in '98.

The great battle in 1840, must be fought under the broad and time-honored banner of the ancient democracy. Let it be spread forth, and

Let the call be made for the people to gather under its ample folds. Under the guidance of our chosen leader, victory, complete and effectual, will then crown our efforts.

Fellow citizens—In seeking for the individual who is to be the chosen instrument in effecting the consummation of our wishes and exertions, true patriotism loudly demands that we let him who will best secure the great end of harmony and union, whose feelings are in unison with our own, and whose ability and experience will supply the resources which are necessary in this great work of political reform. Among the distinguished patriots whose names have been brought forward as candidates for the Chief Magistracy of the Union, we are impelled by a solemn conviction of our duties as patriots, and an ardent regard for our cause, no less than by the impulses of personal esteem and of gratitude to express our choice in favor of GENERAL WINFIELD SCOTT.

His commanding talents, his comprehensive and liberal experience, his long and patriotic devotion to the interests of the people, his brilliant achievements in support of the national honor, and more than all, his free and elevated position, removed from the associations of mere partisan warfare—uncontaminated by party pledges and commitments, and exempt from the prejudices which spring from sectional interests and local jealousies, give him an unquestioned claim to popular confidence and support.

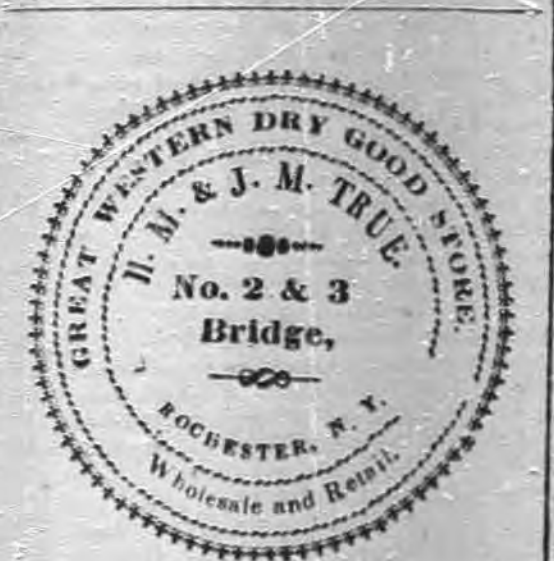

PACKET SHIP OXFORD.**

**THREE DAYS LATER FROM
LIVERPOOL.**

The packet ship Oxford, Captain Rathbone, arrived this morning from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 21st October, bringing advices from that port three days later than were received by the Great Western. Not yet having received our files, we are indebted to Captain Marshall, the acting owner for a file of papers to the latest dates. It will be seen that the London stock market continued to wear rather a gloomy aspect, the quotations of Saturday ranging generally one quarter per cent lower than those of the previous day.

The Oxford has been only fifty three days absent from this port.

[At one o'clock we received our files—London of the 19th, and Liverpool of the 22nd, both inclusive.]

The intelligence by this arrival is of precisely the same character as that by the Great Western; and indeed it could not be expected that two days would produce any change of moment. The worst feature of it is the continued decrease of specie in the coffers of the Bank of England, as shown in the quarterly average.

We quote an article from the London Spectator, in which it is stated that application has been made for an order in council authorizing the issue of one pound notes. The same statement was made in papers brought by the Great Western.

Mr. Stevenson, the American minister and his lady, were on a visit to the Earl of Fitzwilliam at his seat in Yorkshire.

Another suicide by leaping from the Monument was committed on the 18th. The victim was a mere lad, only 15 years of age named Hawes. He deliberately climbed over the iron railing and sprang off, falling about 40 feet from the base.

The packet ships Columbus and Rochester arrived at Liverpool on the 21st October. Captain Rathbone, when in lat. 40 35, long. 67. 10, saw a ship with a black cross in her foretop-sail. [General Washington, hence for Liverpool.]

By express from Paris on the 19th, intelligence was received of ministerial disagreements. M. Cousin had resigned his title of extraordinary councillor, because he had been struck from the list of active councillors, and publicly accused M. Villemain of inflicting that disgrace upon him. M. Villemain retorted by accusing Cousin of idleness and inattention. The real secret is said to be that Cousin wished to bring M. Thiers into the Cabinet while Villemain was intriguing in favor of the Duc de Broglie.

Another cause of dispute was the course to be pursued with Don Carlos; the King and Marshal Soult being disposed to set him at liberty, and the other ministers insisting on continued surveillance. It was reported that passports would be granted to the Don as soon as intelligence should arrive of a victory gained by Espartero over Cabrera.

No farther progress seems to have been made, in settling the affairs of Turkey and Egypt.—Letters from Constantinople say that Reschid Pacha was holding frequent conference with the Russian ambassador, and that he had declared his determination to stand by the treaty of Unkiar Shelessi in all its parts.

As the gentleman had no penny left, he put the little girl in the way of a ten cent loaf. GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.
—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—Uniform currency of gold and silver; bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable paper money, and to fraudulent banking.

THE CRISIS OF THE PRESIDENCY.

There can be no mistaking the signs and portents of the present day. We are now in the midst of the Presidential election, to be held in November next year. On the 22nd of December, a convention of delegates from the opposition or whig party, throughout the Union, will meet at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, to make choice of a candidate to run in hostile array to President Van Buren. This state, on which so much depends, is now engaged in the selection of delegates—and next Tuesday the delegates to represent this city will be selected.

According to all and every appearance, the candidate of the opposition will be Henry Clay of Kentucky. No doubt but General Scott would be the most popular candidate, but the trammels of party are too strongly intertwined with the former to afford any chance for a less obnoxious and more popular candidate. Around Mr. Clay are clustered a band of adventurers, office suckers, loafers, expectants just as numerous, as hungry, as voracious, as unprincipled as those that congregate around Mr. Van Buren.—Indeed, a large section were formerly hungry expectants around General Jackson. They are led on by the hope of public plunder, and will destroy the chances of such a pure, untrammelled man as General Scott, rather than abandon their own favorite and their own hopes.

In such a state of things, it is much better for the friends of General Scott to withdraw from the contest—let the present game of roguery be played out—and wait with patience till time and fair weather ripen the fruit. The result of the election in this state, in which both parties are so nearly matched, will only add to the pertinacity of the friends of Mr. Clay. The whigs have imbibed a belief that their chances to defeat Mr. Van Buren and elect Mr. Clay are very fair—Let them try it.—*N. Y. Herald.*

When J. Whipple Dwinell of *** memory was turned out of the Daily Advertiser office we never thought to pollute our columns with the name of the pitiful thing. Not having credit to obtain a decent business, and prompted by his malignant spirit, this miserable pettifogger has made a tool of a scamp of his own kidney, and calibre, whom we detected purloining our property, and commenced a suit for slander. Having proved successful in two different suits, which he persuaded two apprentices, to institute against Hyatt, for which he was to have half the plunder, he thinks to get part of winter's board out of us; but he reckons without his host. We are not "learned in the law," but we don't believe our sapient fathers have any more right to carry the resolution into effect, than they have to take the teeth out of our head. The owners of real estate in the Second and Fourth Wards should look into this matter.

How does Dwinell settle it with his conscience, when he "reads the papers" the greater part of Saturday night, and then partakes of the Lord's Supper next day!!!—We are somewhat afraid your moral principles are not more than skin deep.

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT

PRINCIPLES OF THE SCOTT REPUBLICAN PARTY.
—One Presidential term—No interference in elections by Government Officers—A uniform currency of gold and silver; or bank notes at all times redeemable in specie on demand—An Independent Treasury under the exclusive control of Congress—Opposition to monopolies, to irredeemable Shinplasters and to fraudulent banking.

THE WHIG NATIONAL CONVENTION.

The result of the Whig Convention which meets at Harrisburg on the 4th of December will determine the question whether Martin Van Buren shall be re-elected almost without opposition, or whether the elements of opposition to his federal measures shall be united under one banner in a vigorous effort to revolutionize the Administration of the General Government. If that Convention should throw aside personal feelings and predilections, and discarding the counsels of bigoted and designing politicians nominate Scott for the Presidency, the democratic Whigs, Conservatives, and old Jackson Republicans would unite as a band of brothers under the banner of SCOTT AND THE REPUBLIC. This Union of the elements of opposition, would shake federal Loco-focoism to its center, and the chances would be against Van Buren. If HARRISON the Hero of Tippecanoe is nominated, the great opposition party would make a pretty vigorous rally, and might possibly succeed. If CLAY is the Candidate, it would be but a choice of evils between him and Van Buren. Such a nomination would secure an easy victory to the destructives, and end in the complete overthrow of the Whigs next November in this State and in the Union. We wait with intense anxiety for the result. Can it be possible that the Harrisburg Convention will commit suicide, by nominating Mr. Clay?

Gen SCOTT passed through this city yesterday, on his way east.

Letters from St. Augustine to Nov. 8, are received. On Sunday the 3d Nov., a baggage waggon with an escort of seven men, proceeding from Fort Micanopy to Fort Wheelock, was fired upon by a party of 50 Indians, killing 3 mules, 1 horse, and wounding 2 others. The teamster was mortally wounded, and a private named Bosson, was very severely so. The firing being heard at Fort Micanopy, a relief was sent out; but before they came up to the ground the Indians had succeeded in plundering the waggon of tents, powder, provisions, &c., and made their escape.

It is said that the wounded Indian, who some time since went into Fort Lauderdale for medical assistance, has informed Major Childs that Coacoochee has placed the women and children in the Pai-hai-okee, or grass water for security; and that he is prepared for a vigorous defence of himself and followers. On the accession of troops, sufficiently strong to reinforce those now South, the Indian offers to take them to Coacoochee's ground of defence.

Commodore Mayo, of the U. S. steamer Poinsett has gone into the Everglader with 50 men. A bottle was found on the 23d ult., about four miles south of New River, containing a piece of paper, the writing scarcely legible; but the words 'Schr. Antarctic' were visible. A \$4 gold piece was found at a short distance.

TEXAS.—The prospects of this young republic are improving daily. The foundation of the government is beyond doubt secure; and it cannot be very long before the national revenue of the country will call in every dollar of its outstanding debts. She is now in a flourishing condition. Her crops of cotton are already beginning to be of much importance to the southern portion of the United States. Foreign capitalists are gaining confidence in the integrity and capability of her rulers to meet all demands, and it would not be at all surprising, if, before a twelvemonth expires, the treasury notes of the young republic should stand at par with those of our government. We stated yesterday that the Texian Congress have passed a law granting 2982 acres of land to every good woman, who will marry, during the present year, a citizen of that Republic, who was such at the time of the declaration of their independence. This may induce many young English girls to leave their own green isle of the ocean for Texas. But they must be told one fact; if they reside on the sea board, they will either die of fever, or be tormented to death by mosquitoes; if they go far into the interior, the Indians will kill their husbands and run off with them. If they like an Indian husband come on. A party of religious people have left Baltimore for Texas. The brig Edwin carried out among other passengers the Rev. Mr. Bayless a Minister of the Presbyterian Church, who designs to settle in that country, so that they'll become pious there in time.

CURE OF CLUB FOOT.

One of the most important discoveries in surgery of which we have heard, is that made within a few years by Dr. Stromeyer of Germany. It is an operation for the cure of club foot; by which, after the division of the great tendon passing from the calf of the leg, to the heel, the foot is brought to the proper position, and the deformity entirely remedied.

Since 1839, when this method of treatment first made known, it has been frequently adopted in Europe, and within the last year, in several of the larger cities in this country, and as a general thing with great success. It is attended with very little pain.

In a case lately operated upon by Dr. Bingham of this city, both feet being subjected to treatment, the patient a lad from Saybrook, did

not suffer an hour's pain, and was able within a fortnight, to put his feet flat upon the floor, and walk in common boots.

We trust, the time is not far distant, when those afflicted with this distressing deformity, will be cured, by this new and safe method of treatment.—Hartford Pat.

While sitting one morning, at quite an early hour, working hard to concoct an article for our next day's paper, we were disturbed by the entrance of a long, slab-sided, gawky looking chap, whom, at first glance we supposed did not know a dictionary from 'sundown.' Gov. EVERETT.—It was reported from Boston yesterday, with a good share of solicitude, that Gov. Everett was dangerously ill of scarlet fever. We are enabled however, to announce that his disorder assumed a more favorable type, and that he was yesterday considered out of danger.

CANADA.—The present aspect of this unhappy country is pacific; but is very likely that there will be an out break here before long; according to the opinions of the leading journalists there, as the elfin page shrieked to Deloraine, Canada, is "doomed! doomed! doomed!" Governor Thomson is in favor of a legislative union of the two provinces, and of allowing all (even the rebellious Canocs) the same privileges in every respect, that the most loyal British subjects possess. This decision, of itself, will breed intestine commotions in Lower Canada, and disturb the quiet of that unfortunate country, even if no invasion is undertaken by the loafers and discontents on this side the border.

But from the present appearances, we are led to believe that the patriots, (so called) will create considerable trouble on both sides of the line this winter. The Secretary of War has ordered General Scott to make the tour of the frontier, in order to take such steps, and make such arrangements, as shall preserve our national relations. Gov. Arthur has also authorized the formation of a limited police establishment along the Niagara frontier, for the purpose of checking the acts of incendiaries, so frequent of late in that quarter. Sir George Arthur has issued his proclamation convoking the Provincial Parliament for the actual despatch of business on Tuesday, this does not look as if a dissolution was contemplated.

DEATH OF SOLOMON SOUTHWICK.

We are called to announce the death of another of our oldest and most distinguished citizens SOLOMON SOUTHWICK, who has filled a large space in the public eye, for nearly forty years, is no more! Misfortune succeeded misfortune until his abundant wealth vanished away; and for the last twenty years he has been struggling with strong hands, a stout heart and ever bright hopes against a fate which proved inexorable.

Mr. Southwick was among the most ardent, ardent, generous, warm hearted men that ever lived. While rich, his purse was opened and emptied for all who came to him in distress. Though profuse in his expenditures and abounding in his charities, he was ever distinguished for his personal frugality and temperance, always living upon the plainest diet and drinking only nature's beverage.—He was in his manners, feelings and sentiments a REPUBLICAN.

Oppression and tyranny always found in him an enthusiastic and fearless opponent. He was ever inclined to espouse the cause of the weak against the strong. But we cannot even enter upon his history now. His life has been full of instruction, and we shall look to one who is familiar with it all, for an obituary sketch of the history and character of a man who has so long and so prominently identified with the history of our City and State.—Alb. It was but a few days, however, before the fickle lover, through the intercession of a friend, and the plea of love caused hallucination of mind, succeeded in obtaining a reconciliation with the disappointed lady: through her family, among whom was a fond brother, could not well resist their minds to forgive the treatment they had received from the new repentant lover.

They did not, however, throw any obstacles in the way of the reconciliation and reunion of the high contracting parties, and the result was a

second appointment of a wedding day, and a second preparation for the due consummation and celebration of the union—and a second disappointment of the lady, and mortification of her family, because her faithless wooer had again changed his mind!

This was too much for the family to bear, however it might have been with the lady; and her indignant brother took upon himself the task of avenging the insult and ridicule that had been cast upon the household by the deceitful wooer of his sister. About two o'clock on Friday afternoon he repaired to Delmonico's and, as he expected, there found the object of his anger, and a large collection of other gentlemen. Nothing at all daunted, however, by the congregation present the angered brother seized hold of the refractory suiter with one hand, and with the other he applied to him most lustily a heavy cowhide, which made the agonized recipient of his weighty and rapidly descending favors jump, and yell, and writhle, with agony and rage. HEALTH OF NORTHAMPTON.—On a Sabbath day, near the close of the year 1767, six infant boys were presented for baptism at the village church in Northampton. THE ROCHESTER FIREMEN.

We learn from a correspondent in France, that our Minister, Gen. The King gave orders that horses should be provided, that they might accompany him to the great review and sham battle which took place. Such attentions ought to be known as they evince what the King feels [to testify his regard towards the Americans, and of which many of our countrymen have been the witnesses at Paris.

BURIED ALIVE—A BRAVE IRISHMAN.—The Piqua Courier, (Miami County, Ohio) has the following account of a fatal accident, and a noble though ineffectual attempt to rescue a fellow creature from impending death.

On Friday, the 1st inst., a man by the name of Scott, living on a farm about 7 miles north of Piqua, on the Hardin road, in attempting to deepen his well, was buried by the caving in and falling of stones and earth all around him. In this situation he continued alive for some time, before any one would volunteer to descend to his assistance, at length an Irishman by the name of TOOLEY, came forward and offered his services. He was let down and had succeeded in releasing one of the unfortunate man's arms, and conversing with him until he was warned of his danger by a large stone falling on him. Those above had barely time to raise the brave fellow to the surface when about eight feet more of the wall and earth fell in and literally crushed and buried poor SCOTTY alive!

MURDER WILL OUT.—About forty years ago, a family apparently well off, and who seemed to possess an abundance, and were proud overbearing, and suspicious in their character and way of living, resided in Peters Township, Washington county, Pa., about 20 miles from Pittsburg. A middle sized boy lived with them, whom they treated harshly and severely, insomuch that his case excited the notice and sympathy of the neighbors. All at once he was missing, and the family reported he had run off. Suspicions were excited, but as nothing ever leaked out, it died away. The family, it was generally remarked, became poor and unhappy, and finally they were sold out for debts, and moved away. The farm and property passed into other hands. A short time ago the house was torn down, and on moving the hearth, the bones of a middle sized human being were found buried under it, and suspicions are now strong again that these are the bones of the boy who it is believed was at that time murdered and buried there. Georgetown Advocate.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.—On Thursday morning at about 4 o'clock, whilst the Passenger train of cars, night line, from Philadelphia to Harrisburg, was passing west, over the Harrisburg and Lancaster rail road, two miles below Middletown, one of the leading wheels of the engine broke, and it ran off the track, rushing to the side of an embankment 40 feet high, dragging the baggage car with it, rolling over four or five times in its way down—literally dashing the engineer to pieces, and casting the fireman some fifty feet

beyond the base of the embankment. The baggage car very providentially broke the fastenings which connected it with the one containing the passengers, or the large number of persons in the cars, would have met a fearful and sudden death. The name of the engineer so suddenly killed was Rudolph Groeff, residing in Lebanon, and leaving a wife and four young children, in very reduced circumstances.—Harrisburg Reporter.

SERVED HIM RIGHT.—A young girl 13 or 14 years old, who carries out bonnets from a Millinery establishment in Tremont Row, had often been followed and insulted by a scoundrel in the shape of a man; and from the frequent repetition of these insults, she became afraid to go out alone after dark. A young man the other night, agreed to follow on behind her, in order to detect the scoundrel. Soon after he left her, thinking her far enough to be safe, the same man came up to her and repeated his insults. Previous to setting out, she had been provided with a paper of No. 1 Red Pepper; and on reaching her mother's door—the man following her all the while, she turned and threw the contents of the paper in his face. The scamp was so blinded that he tumbled down the steps and sneaked off, muttering something very much like profanity. It was a wholesome and well deserved chastisement. Boston Times.

MASSACHUSETTS ELECTION.

No true Jeffersonian Democrat will require any stronger evidence of the ultra federal tendencies of Mr. Van Buren's administration, than the fact that old federal Massachusetts has given in her adhesion to the "powers that be." We have always known that Mr. Van Buren was at heart a federalist. At a trying period of the last war with England, he abandoned that sterling Democratic Madison, and supported the candidate of the New England federalists for President. In his personal habits and feeling he is essentially a federalist and aristocrat, and his sympathies are all on the side of England, that "bulwark of our holy religion." His conduct towards the poor Canadian "rebels"—his persecution of the Patriots—and his wicked abandonment of the brave Woodruff and Von Shultz, to the tender mercies of British Tories, all show that he is at heart a lover of monarchical rule. TRIAL OF THE AFRICANS.

HARTFORD, Monday evening.
DEAR SIR:—The judge has arrived, the counsel come, and the negroes are on the way. The performance commences to-morrow. All parties seem uncertain and perplexed as to the course to be pursued. The Spanish consul, resident at Boston, Senor De Pera, came in this evening. He came for the purpose of deaying the jurisdiction of the court, and to protest against the whole proceedings. The District Attorney, on the part of the government, will insist that the Africans should be delivered up to the Federal officers, for the purpose of being returned to the claimants, through the Spanish minister; and the blacks, by their next and best friend Mr. Sedgewick, will claim their liberty on the ground that they were kings and princes in their own country, and consequently had a right to rob and murder without hindrance or molestation. What the final result of this controversy will be, it is impossible to predict with any degree of certainty. It is rumored that the question will not be finally disposed of at this session of the court. There will be a precious mass of some sort or other, no doubt, and I will keep you fully advised of every thing that occurs.

The negroes who have been selected to manage the case in conjunction with Mr. Sedgewick, will make some curious revelations, if the truth can be drawn from them without distortion, by the interpreter. Bannah, who speaks English imperfectly, is to be present, and if he is thoroughly examined, it will be seen whether the "marvellous fabrications of the Herald," as your statements have been impudently termed by Tappan and Co., are, or not nearer the truth than the authentic representations of Professor Gibbs and Rev. Mr. Ludlow. Bannah left New Haven with much reluctance and great apprehension. He was sick at the time of the previous trial, and was not removed. "Me no go Hartford," said he, "dey kill me, any how, me will be kill in New Haven, no go to Hartford, you kill me first." But Col Peadleton finally pacified the poor fellow, and he was quite happy on the way. I think, however, that he was more afraid of Jinqua than of any thing else. He says Jinqua threatened to kill him on board the schooner, because he interfered to save the white man.

A curious circumstance took place in the prison two or three evenings since, and as it is illustrative of the peculiarly estimable character of Jinqua, perhaps it is worth relating. A gentleman passing through New Haven in the evening, and anxious to see the "persecuted and suffering Africans" was permitted by the keeper to go through the prison after the usual hour of locking up. In passing from one apartment to another, the blacks all followed to see what was going on. The room occupied by the three little girls was visited last. On leaving this apartment it was observed that the heroic Jinqua had come up missing. Colonel Peadleton, who appears

to have had some reason to suppose that this amiable and personage was not absolutely immaculate, immediately returned to the room where the girls sleep, and found the hero concealed behind the door. He was driven out looking as Sawnee when he was going "back again" from the gentleman's garden.

The abolitionists pretend to suppose that their protegee undertook to pass the night with the little girls from motives of humanity—thinking they were afraid to sleep alone. Perhaps so—the abolitionists ought to know.

ANOTHER DIABOLICAL ATTEMPT AT CONFLAGRATION.

Night before last, about half past eight, a girl in Mrs. Barfield's house, fronting on Cotton Square, Franklin street, saw a fire on the roof of one of the out-houses in the rear. She gave immediate alarm, when four gentlemen rushed in and succeeded in putting a stop to the conflagration, which had already made considerable progress, and burned through the shingles and roof.

The spot was well chosen for a most destructive and ruinous fire. It would have swept a range of the most valuable dwelling houses and stores that are still left to our desolated city. The wind was high from the north, and the incendiary had gone up an avenue leading from Commerce street to the cotton yard, (late Bledsoe's) and climbed up on the range of out-houses which were accessible from that point.

No one could tell where the rain would have been stopped, had the fire been discovered only five minutes later. There were, but a short distance from where the fire was communicated, persons sick, whose situation was so helpless that we can but shudder at what might have been their fate had the purposes of the fiend, who fired the out-houses, been accomplished.

Mr. Sevier, of the Jefferson Hotel, picked up, yesterday morning, the fragments of the pitch pine and lucifer matches with which the fire was kindled.

We believe that some negro is the incendiary, and have our eyes turned a little towards two or three black rascals whom we believe capable of doing any thing.

What a strange, out-of-the-way, puzzling, astounding fermentation is going on in this great country! It must be the forerunner of some mighty revolution in politics. It cannot be otherwise. Is it to elect Gen. Scott? The city of New York goes into an election and comes up loco-foco. The State takes the same dive and comes up whig by the skin of her teeth. Massachusetts, good old Massachusetts, opposition for thirty years, is overturned in a twelve month, and is now loco-foco, striped pig, fifteen gallon law, and every thing but the right thing. On the other hand Michigan—always since her baptism a red mouth, wild cat, loco-foco state—has turned up her white bosom and smiles upon us whig, or rather for chivalry and General Scott.

What are the causes of all these somersets?

Various. First, in Michigan. The revolution in that state is jointly produced by the corruption and velacity of the loco-focos, and the open and manly manner in which the opposition to Van Buren expresses their preference to General Scott. Mr. Clay's measures and speeches in Congress, and his ridiculous peregrinations to the north, have helped to ruin the whig cause in the other western states; but Michigan, by sticking to Scott, is all right. The loco-focos there have plundered or mismanaged the state finances to the amount of \$5,000,000, besides destroying the banking system by their flood of "wild cats." The State Bank has been gutted like a codfish along shore. The people of Michigan have, therefore, abandoned loco-focoism, and come out, right side up, for a sound currency and General Scott.

Now, in Massachusetts opposite causes produce opposite effects. There the whigs were in power for a long time, and like all men long used to power, they abused it. They made Daniel Webster a greater man in politics than he is. As a lawyer he is unsurpassed—but as a statesman and politician, he is little above a charlatan. Look at his conduct on the Maine question—saying one thing to-day, and swallowing it like a gin-sling to-morrow—hurting defiance against England in the spring, and crawling with bended knee to the beautiful female royalty of the same England in the autumn. But as if those were not sufficient, the whigs in Massachusetts must get into debt—raise numerous loans, spend large sums of money, pass sumptuary laws, coerce the conscience, and do all manner of foolish things. What is the consequence? Nearly a total defeat of the party, and the triumph of loco-focoism.

What is to be learned from these events? That the people of this glorious land cannot be led by the noses as asses are, that politicians can hoodwink no intelligent thinkers—that no party has any strength or popularity farther than its acts are just, upright, liberal, and public spirited. The whigs in Massachusetts have been trying to substitute party for principles—they are defeated. The loco-focos of Michigan have been attempting the same thing—and they are left in the minority. Nothing can succeed but honesty, truth, sound principles, and General Scott. Already the movement began in Rochester, has been caught here. Read the following and go and rouse your neighbour—

If you feel disposed to interest yourself in the proposition for a public meeting, no means on the part of the undersigned shall be left untried, so that we make a "move" worthy of the man.

DOINGS AT THE POLICE OFFICE.—George Mortimer Wardwell, a genteel and intelligent young man, of about 30 years of age, was brought up this morning on a charge of being drunk in the streets and disturbing the peace. He plead guilty to the charge and evidently labored under the greatest emotion. When requested to give some account of himself, he replied:

"Sir—I have now arrived at the extremity of degradation which, long ago, I became satisfied would one day or other become my portion. Sir, I do not believe I was born to this. In my youth, when I first started in the world, my prospects and hopes were as bright as the sky which bent over me. I see by your countenance that you know something of human nature, and are already satisfied that I am not a common loafer, that I have been driven to the present extremity by some extraordinary circumstances. But I will proceed with my story. Two years after I was married to my wife—who was a young English lady of handsome expectations, and had a beautiful boy to bless me with his innocent endear-

ments, we received letters from England announcing the death of my wife's father, and soliciting me to come to England immediately, for the purpose of settling up the affairs of the deceased, and receiving my wife's portion of the estate. I immediately made preparations for my departure, and leaving my wife under the protection of an intimate friend, whose name was Henry Anson Willoughby, (d-n him!) I set sail for England. My business detained me longer than I had anticipated, and I began to feel the most intense anxiety in regard to my family. The letters which I received from my wife grew brief and infrequent, sometimes startling me with their abruptness. Just before the final steps in regard to my wife's portion were about to be completed, I received a letter from America, written by an old friend of my father's family, warning me to hasten home, if I would preserve my future happiness and the honor of my wife! Imagine my dismay! I hurried home, leaving my business unsettled, and arrived in time to find my hearth desolate, my wife eloped with my friend Willoughby, and my boy, my darling boy, in the Orphan Asylum, an object of public charity.

Willoughby had represented himself as a rich planter, from Alabama, and that he was so sojourning at the north for the purpose of regaining his health. Placing my child under proper protection, I flew in pursuit of the destroyer of my peace, with my heart bursting with revenge. At Montgomery, (Ala.) I learned that Willoughby had been there, in company with a lady, whom he called his wife—that he had been for years a notorious black leg and swindler, and had gone to Mobile, leaving his wife (and wife) behind, in circumstances of destitution. After waiting for some time, and hearing nothing from her base paramour, she borrowed money of some citizens and followed him.

Mad with rage and disappointment, I pursued. At Mobile I lost all traces of the villain and his wretched victim. I proceeded to New Orleans; and, on making inquiries of the different boats, I was told by the captain of one of them engaged in running to St. Louis, that a woman answering the description I gave, had gone up the river on his boat some time since. I immediately embarked for this place, sir; and my money being nearly exhausted, I was compelled to take a passage on deck. I arrived here in a state of complete destitution; and being unable to learn any thing of my wife or the villain Willoughby, I became discouraged and disheartened. The bottle was my resort. I mingled with the vilest of the vile; and last night was persuaded by several others to visit a house of ill fame. I entered—and the first object that met my gaze was my wife, sitting upon the lap of a disgusting ruffian, and resigning her tender cheek, which I had not suffered "even the winds of Heaven to visit too roughly," to his disgusting caresses. He was discharged.

IMPROVEMENT OF THE RAPIDS IN THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER.—The Quincy (Illinois) Whig says—"Government operations on the Lower Rapids, are suspended for the season, all the boats having returned to their winter quarters, up in the Bay. It is said, the work of clearing out the channel and rendering the rapids navigable, has progressed with unusual success this summer, and if a still further appropriation to this object is made at the next session of Congress there would then be an uninterrupted navigation of the Mississippi, from the Gulf of Mexico to the Fall of St. Anthony. The whole west is interested in the improvement of these Rapids, and it is hoped that a liberal appropriation will be made. The sum heretofore appropriated is nearly expended."

ROBBERY ON BOARD THE BRITISH QUEEN.

On Saturday night, when the steamer British Queen arrived at the wharf, a great rush was made on board; and amongst the persons thus pressing onward to find friends were a considerable number of well dressed pickpockets. A third gentleman, named Charles Truck, was robbed of his carpet bag, containing wearing apparel, his dressing case and writing desk and their contents. All the above named gentlemen lodged at the Globe Hotel.—N. Y. Sun.

Fire.—Poughkeepsie was yesterday morning the scene of a conflagration, which, at one time, bid fair to destroy the entire compact part of the village. The fire broke out about one o'clock in the barn attached to the Poughkeepsie Hotel now occupied by Messrs. L. B. Van Kleeck and Son, and was not arrested until it had destroyed all the out buildings connected with that establishment, numbering some six or seven. The night was intensely cold and the wind blowing at times almost a gale and bearing along masses of burning cinders over the most densely built portion of the town. Several roofs caught, but were saved by the prompt attention of the firemen and others, who were prepared at the sentries with water. While the fire was at its height, the wind suddenly veered about, and to this and the most unparalleled efforts of the firemen, may be attributed the fact that our village is not now a heap of smouldering ruins. We never saw fire companies under better organization, or firemen more zealous and efficient than those at the fire yesterday. When we reflect upon the combustible material in the buildings which were consumed, upon the intense cold of the night and upon the violence of the wind, we are surprised that the fire was checked at all. We apprehend there was no man, who saw the efficient work of the firemen with their engines and hose from the hydrants, who does not feel that to them we are indebted for the safety of the town, and that our water works during a single night amply paid for their cost.

The loss in buildings is estimated at about \$2000, which together with the damage to the furniture and contents of the Hotel are fully covered by insurance in the Howard Co. of New York and the Hartford and Aetna Companies of Connecticut.

Upon the contents of the out-buildings there was no insurance. The most valuable property in the out houses was destroyed, consisting of

horses and carriages belonging to several different persons, so that the loss will not be very severe. Of ten horses in the barn, SEVEN WERE BURNED and all the carriages of value.—Three hogs and a dog shared the same fate.—The most costly of the carriages belonged to Gen. Cunningham, he did also the Hotel and the buildings which were destroyed. To him, however, the loss is but as a drop in the Bucket.

How the fire originated is not known, but is supposed like others, which have recently occurred, to have been the work of incendiaries.—Poughkeepsie Jour.

In this position he was suffered to stand until the coroner arrived. When the body was laid down on the floor, so great was the ruling passion strong even in death, that the whiskey bottle was with difficulty taken out of his hands.
