Dewey Presbyterian To Open 50th Anniversary Celebration

Special services Sunday morning will be the first of three events commemorating the 50th anniversary of the founding of Dewey Ave. Presbyterian Church. Participating will be the Rev. Albert L. Jeandheur, minister, preaching at the 10:45 a.m. service on "So What's The Difference?"; also the Rev. G. Kent Keller, assistant pastor, and Dr. Stanley F. Gutelius, pastor emeritus.

The Anniversary Committee, under chairmanship of Norman Walker, will sponsor a drama in the spring when it is hoped that a regular department of Religious Drama of the church will be established.

There will also be an open house in the spring at which time original photographic work depicting the various activities of the church will be displayed. The pictures will become a permanent part of the church's interior decor.

Church Is Started
Dewey Presbyterian was begun by the Rev. George H. Fickes who held a meeting on Dec. 17, 1911, the outcome of which was a petition to the Presbyterian Union to take action to establish a church. Soon after this a Bible School was started at 58 Electric Ave., with 47 pupils enrolled.

The church was organized at a Sunday service in the Kirby block on Dewey Ave., just south of Albe-Marie St., on April 21, 1912. Officers were elected and the official name was adopted. Twenty-five persons were received on confirmation of Faith and 100 by Letter of transfer. As the congregation grew action was taken to purchase three lots at Dewey Ave., and Seneca Parkway, and later two more all the way to Magee Ave. were purchased. Timbers of the new church building were laid June 18, 1912 and the following Sunday, services with 350 persons present, were held within it. The building was constructed wholly by volunteers

from the congregation. The Rev. Mr. Fickes was installed as the first pastor.

Growth was rapid and ground was broken for the present building costing \$56,000 on June 18, 1917. Dedication took place on Feb. 9, 1919.

The church prospered under leadership of Dr. Gutelius who was minister between 1923 and 1930. During the pastorate of the Rev. Andrew H. Neilly, from 1930 to 1946, the church became debt free. While the Rev. Gustavus H. Warfield was minister from 1946 to 1959, the renovation and extension program was accomplished at a cost of \$200,000. The redecorated sanctuary and the new chancel were dedicated on Nov. 13, 1955 and the new Christian Education wing was dedicated on March 9, 1962.

A move to bolster the faltering Lake-Edgerton Neighborhood Council was instigated last Saturday and another meeting has been scheduled for next Saturday morning at 9:30 in Christ Presbyterian Church.

David Mullins, vice president of the council, and the Rev. Lawrence Black, pastor of the church, called the meeting which was attended by Mrs. Raymond Graham, who has submitted her resignation as council secretary; also Councilman William Malley, Supervisor Harold (Jeff) Wilkin and Sebastian Schauseil, Democratic leader of the ward, all of whom came by invitation.

Action of the Zoning Board in granting a zone variance to a nursing home at Seneca Pkwy. and Lake Ave., as well as other zoning actions was the principal subject of the meeting. The neighborhood council has taken the position that zoning protection is the basic need in the upper Tenth Ward area.

The council has protested in vain against some of the Zoning Board decisions and having no funds to appeal for a review of the decisions feels frustrated.

(A group of neighbors in the Seneca Pkwy. area are reported to be collecting a fund to hire a lawyer and make an appeal. They have until Nov. 2 to file).

Ostertag Opens His Campaign

Representative Harold C. Ostertag has appointed John E. Maier of Greece as manager of his campaign for re-election to Congress from the new 37th Congressional District. Maier, 35, is a graduate of Aquinas Institute and Virginia Military Institute.

Congressman Ostertag scored the present Congressional leadership for delaying adjournment to the latest election-year date since World War 2.

"There was no need for it," he maintained. "Disagreement over a few minor programs kept us tied up for weeks. They should have been settled long ago. It was another example of the kind of indecisive leadership we have in Washington today."

He said he regretted "all the engagements with area groups that I have had to cancel in recent weeks. However, I am sure the people agree that my first responsibility is to represent our area in Washington, and that is what I have done. During the remaining days before election I will make an all-out effort to visit every part of our area to report on this elongated session of Congress."

Representative Ostertag has been a Member of Congress for 12 years and serves as a ranking member of the Defense and Independent Offices Appropriations Committees.

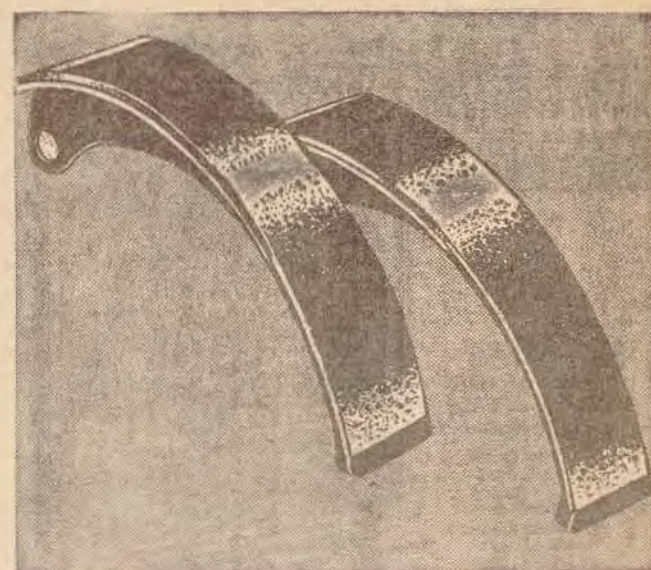

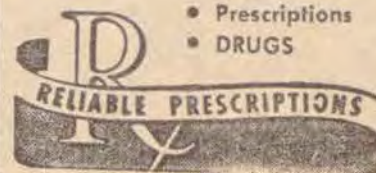

The New Family Court
By JUDGE EMMETT J. SCHNEPP

For the first time in 115 years New York State has reorganized its Court System. A constitutional amendment approved in 1961 by the voters authorized this reorganization which was effected by twenty-three (23) Bills approved by the last Legislature. Under this reorganization every court in the state was brought into close working relationship.

Among the changes was the establishment of a new Family Court for each county. The joint Legislative Committee on Court reorganization gave early priority to the new Family Court because of its great importance to the people of our state.

Among the major features is the assurance of due process of law for children and families involved in proceedings of the new court. Provision is made for the appointment of law guardians for children in certain cases so that each youngster is properly represented and the Court aided in making proper decisions. Personal liberty is at stake and counsel is an essential factor in fair treatment.

Family Counseling
A modern and effective intake procedure is provided and cases which do not require judicial attention are screened and handled by trained personnel on a helpful and friendly basis. A new family conciliation procedure, which will use family counselling and social

work technics, is designed to aid the family in trouble. Civil proceedings for dealing with disorderly conduct and assaults in the family replace previous methods of handling such problems through criminal processes. The treatment of these matters as a civil and not a criminal charge and the use of conciliation procedures may salvage what otherwise might be a broken home.

The law of juvenile delinquency has been revised and there is introduced in the new act the concept of a "person in need of supervision". Recognition is thus given that through the powers and auxiliary services of this Court a youngster in need of supervision may be helped before he gets into real trouble.

The act revises the law of support and the law of neglect and generally encompasses within its provisions all matters of importance relating to families.

Each Child Studied

The philosophy of individualized justice and an objective which is remedial and preventive is evident throughout the law. In connection with matters involving juveniles the basic philosophy of the act, after an adjudication, involves inquiry to determine why each youngster has committed a specific offense and what the physical, mental and social make-up of each child may be. Even if it is the first offense of an erring teenager the public has a right not to have the same offense repeated, and the auxiliary services of the Court are designed to provide help and assistance to this end and to screen out the hoodlum and to save the potential usefulness of our boys and girls.

All the processes of the court are designed to strengthen the family unit — and the aim is not necessarily punishment but practical help.

Penalties prescribed for offenses are designed to uplift him and to help him become a worthy citizen. The purposes of the Act demand the

are designed to reform the young, united and aroused efforts of the entire community, and a dedicated effort to help youngsters from becoming criminals and to lead back those who are treading the downward path. This requires the concern and cooperation of all and an all-out community wide effort, using every youth, social, church and service club facility available and the establishment of new services to unite families and help erring youngsters.

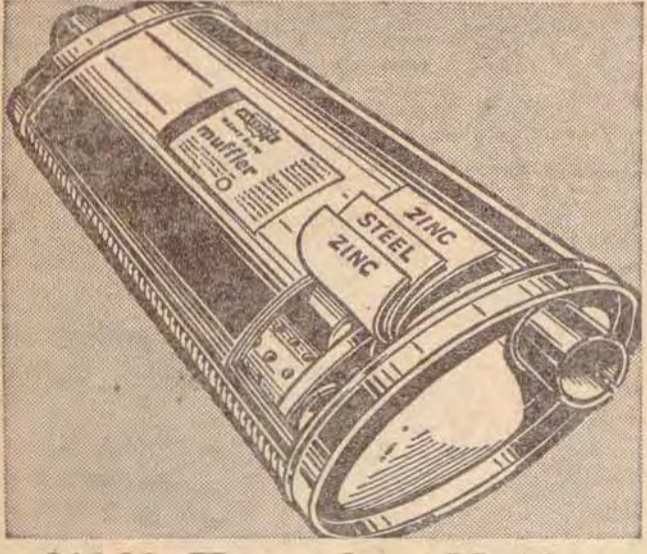

Traffic Safety Campaign Opened in Local Schools

Green pennants will become the symbol of student traffic safety achievement in a traffic safety campaign which started Monday in city, county, and Catholic schools.

Designed to make every student of every school conscious of the need for traffic safety, the Green Pennant Safety Campaign will give recognition to schools with outstanding traffic safety performances.

Slated to run throughout the entire school year, the drive is being sponsored by the Democrat and Chronicle, Times-Union, and the two Rochester General Motors plants; and will be conducted with the cooperation of the city and county public schools, parochial schools, the Rochester Police Department, and the Monroe County Sheriff's office.

Penalty For Accidents

Large pennants embossed with the image of a school patrol boy are to be given each school to signify accident-free periods. Each school can fly its flag only so long as there are no traffic accidents caused by its students. Should such an accident take place, the school involved must withhold its green pennant from the flagpole until another 30-day period has elapsed without an accident.

The initial pennants will be hoisted on the flagpoles within the next two week periods. Schools who have not had a chargeable traffic accident since the opening of school will receive their pennants during this period.

The Rochester Police Department in the city and the Sheriff's office in the county, in cooperation with some of the participating town police departments, will determine the chargeability of all accidents and the school safety officers in the city and in the county will notify the school principal when a chargeable accident occurs.

Immediately after being notified of a student-caused accident, the principal involved will have the pennant withheld from the school flagstaff for 30 days.

The Green Pennant campaign will be in effect 24 hours a day, seven days a week until the summer vacation begins. All schools having a perfect accident-free school year (September through June) will be awarded a "Perfect Safety Record" banner at the conclusion of the campaign.

Car Must Be Involved

Accidents chargeable against the school must involve a car and would cover car-pedestrian, car-bicycle, or motor scooter accidents.

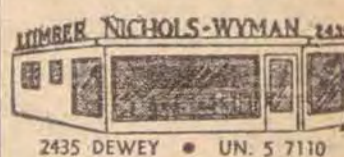

Ostertag Calls For Reduction In Taxes

Representative Harold C. Ostertag declared Tuesday that sweeping Federal tax reform, including reduction of income tax rates, should be the first order of business of the new Congress in January. He was speaking in North Chili.

The Congressman said tax reform legislation is needed to free the economy from the burdens of excessive taxation and to give consumer purchasing power a strong shot in the arm.

"Despite government pump-priming measures of the past two years, the plain fact is that the economy has not rebounded as it should," the Congressman noted. "Economic growth is lagging, unemployment is rising again, and business failures are hitting record proportions."

Representative Ostertag said Congress should act quickly in the next session to counter the sagging economy. He promised to work for new tax legislation as the best means of improving conditions.

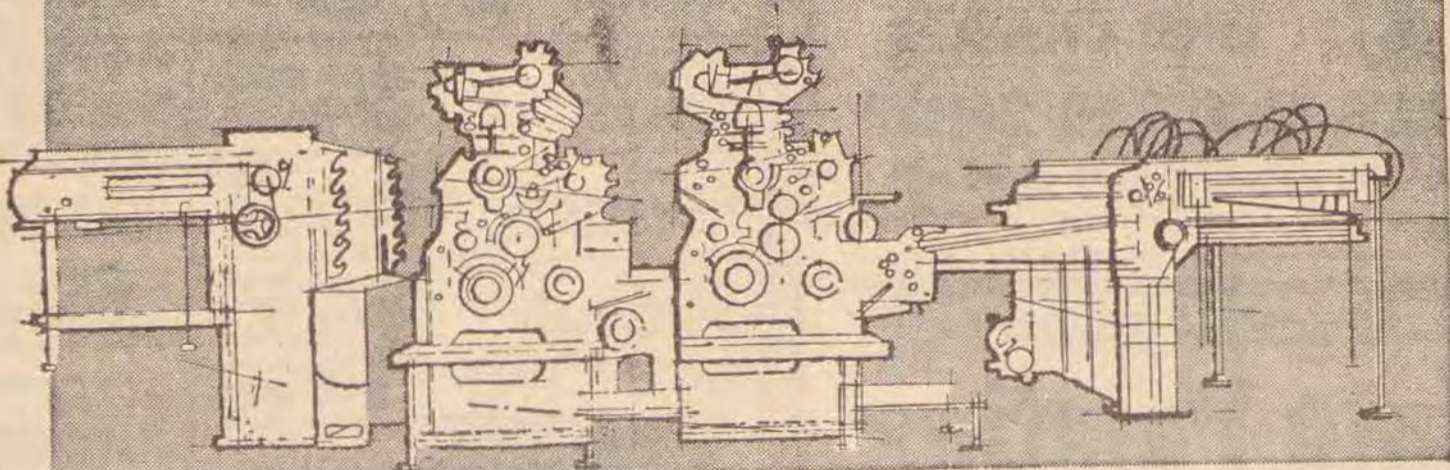

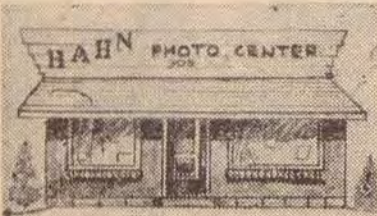

Democrats Lash Out At GOP Candidates

Mayor Henry Gillette lashed out at the "hypocrisy" in the Republican campaign this year in a talk to the Tenth Ward Democratic Club Friday. He says that some Republicans now say they are for Medicare, but they then proceed to qualify their support in such a way that the Medicare program is no longer recognizable. "Republicans are now for time-off for the workman to vote, but it was a Republican legislature that took this privilege from the workman," he stated.

Charles Stockmeister, candidate for Assemblyman, promised a new attack on utility rates if he is re-elected. He stated that he has saved the taxpayers of Monroe County and his district, a half million dollars in gas rates, in the face of an effort by the Rochester Gas & Electric Corporation to increase their gas rates some \$900,000.00.

Andrew Celli, candidate for the State Senate, promised to support Assemblyman Stockmeister's fight to reduce utility rates. He said he can't understand why Rochester should pay 55 per cent more for gas than Buffalo, Geneva, or Syracuse. He pledged to the members an effort to return the two-hour time-off voting privilege, and he went on record as seeking to have Election Day made a legal holiday. He criticized his opponent, Senator Frank Van Lare, as "a tool of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company and big business," and he claimed that the New York Times has categorized Van Lare as not useful as a legislator in Albany.

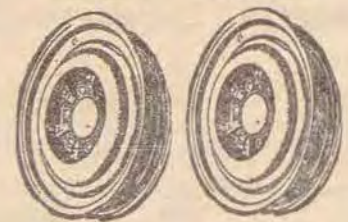

Tenth Divided In Election; Stockmeister Its Favorite

The Tenth had five winners and four losers in the elections Tuesday. At least that would have been the outcome had this ward's votes been the deciding factor in any contest. As usual, the local voters showed their independence of party labels.

In leading his administration to a statewide victory, Governor Nelson Rockefeller came through with a plurality of 478 against over 800 four years ago. He had 7570 and Robert Morgenthau 6874 Democratic votes plus 218 Liberal.

The big winner on both sides was Assemblyman Charles Stockmeister, lone Democrat to come through in the county. He was swept back into office easily, aided by 2500 plus votes here. He ran up 8613 against 6131 for A. J. Agostinelli.

Democrats Andrew Celli, Thomas Meagher and John Scileppi lost, but were favored here. Celli ran 1125 ahead of State Senator Frank Van Lare, who was re-elected.

John Lomenzo carried the Tenth, leading the ticket here, but lost in the state for comptroller. Congressman Harold Ostertag had a sizeable plurality, some 1249 votes ahead of Norman Katner. Senator Jacob Javits nosed out James Donovan by 28 votes.

A Tenth Warder who resides in a central area of the ward called the Tenth Ward Courier last week with an all too-familiar story:

"We love our home, have spent a lot to fix it up, but that family next door is breaking our hearts. . . . They own their own home, too, but take no pride in it; let it run down, have a back yard full of junk, spilled garbage and even rats. They have five children who are not much disciplined. The father has a fairly good job and the mother works, too, occasionally.

"We would like to do more with our own yard and so would some of the other neighbors, but this one family is like the rotten apple in the barrel, spoiling all the rest. We've set them an example, like the Neighborhood Council says, but it's just no use. What can we do about it?"

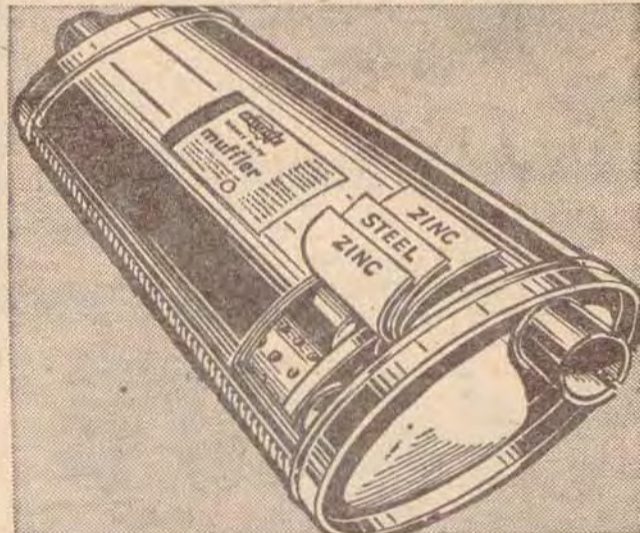

YMCA Purchases Site In Bergen For New Day Camp Program

The YMCA has completed purchase of property for a new day camp for boys 8 to 14 years old living on the west side of Monroe County. It will absorb the former day camp operations of Arnett, Greece and Maplewood Y branches when in full operation.

The newly acquired day camp site comprises 103 acres including 20 acres of woods. It is located on Route 19 between Bergen and Brockport. Almost adjacent to its western boundary is property which the state recently purchased to add to Churchville Park. About 1000 feet of Black Creek frontage will provide for adventures in boating and canoeing. The creek is navigable upstream through Bergen Swamp and downstream through the village of Churchville as far as the dam.

Bergen Swamp Wildlife Sanctuary is within easy hiking distance which means opportunities for extensive and unusual nature study impossible in ordinary day camp locations.

First steps in development will be to build a usable road to the interior of the property, and to provide simple sanitation facilities. An adequate water supply will also be developed near the center of the area for use by campers.

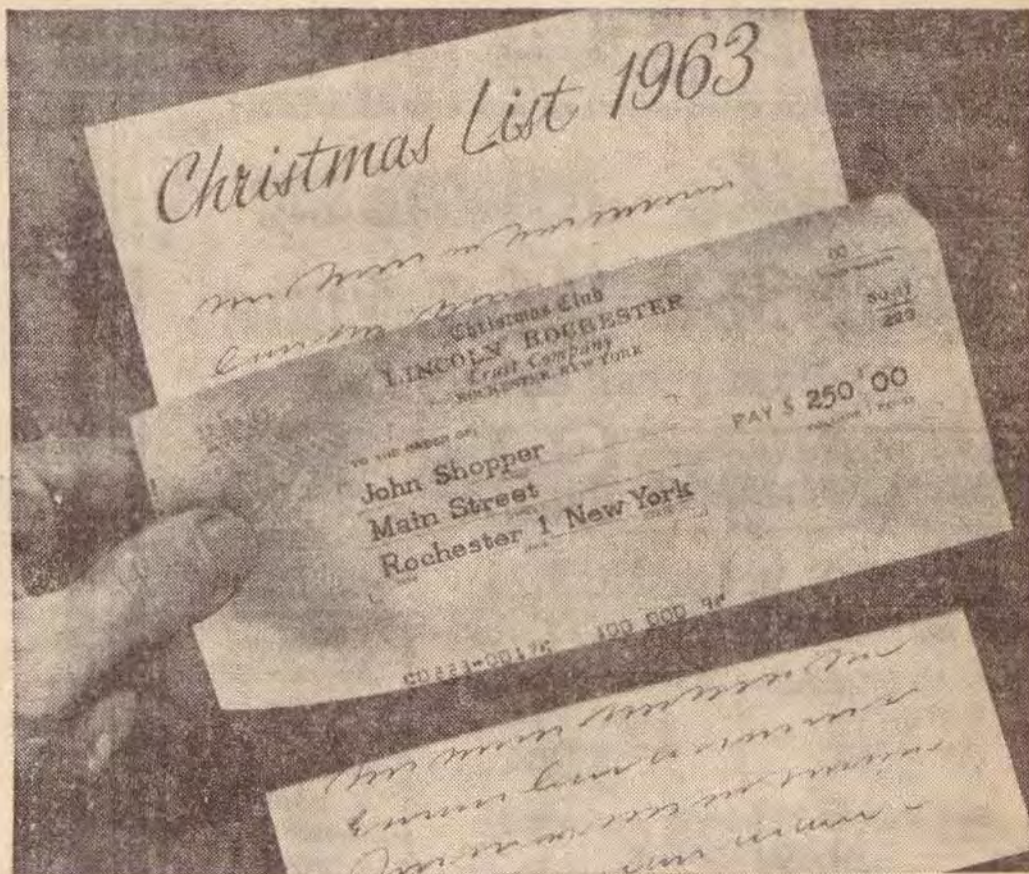

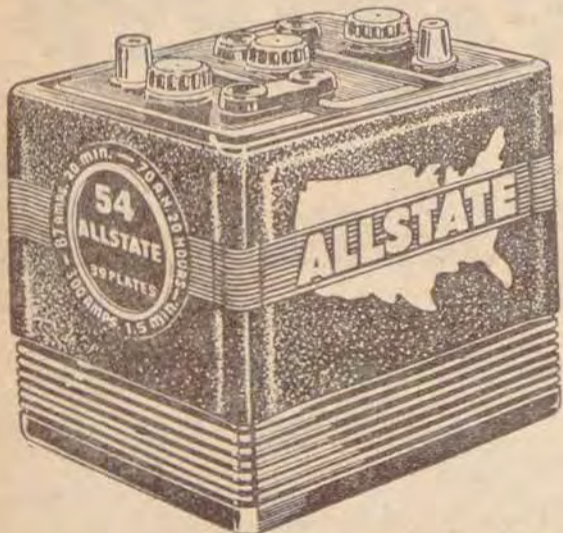

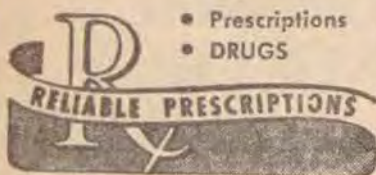

Tenth To Be Tri-sected

The Tenth Ward will be divided into three parts, Supervisor Harold (Jeff) Wilkin of Alameda St. will become a Ninth Warder and two major party political organizations in the ward will be torn asunder. A quick appraisal of the proposed re-alignment of city wards made just as the Tenth Ward Courier went to press indicates these approximate new boundaries:

Green Pennants Fly At Schools On Dec. 3 In Safety Campaign

Distribution of green pennants to schools participating in the first Green Pennant Safety Program will be concluded by Dec. 3, designated as "Green Pennant Safety Day."

Pennants will be distributed to 160 city and county public and Catholic high schools taking part in the project sponsored by The Democrat and Chronicle, Times-Union, the two Rochester General Motors plants, and city and county law enforcement agencies.

All of the participating schools who have completed 30-accident free days will be permitted to fly the pennant over their respective schools.

The pennants are embossed with the image of a school patrol boy and may be flown after Dec. 3 by each school so long as it has no traffic accidents caused by its students. Should an accident take place, the school involved must withhold its green pennant from the flagpole until another 30-day period has elapsed without an accident.

The Rochester Police Department in the city and the sheriff's office in the county, in cooperation with some of the participating town police departments, will determine the chargeability of all accidents and the school safety officers in the city and in the county will notify the principal when a chargeable accident occurs.

Accidents chargeable against the school must involve a car and would cover car-pedestrian, car-bicycle, or motor scooter accidents, and mishaps involving one or more cars.

The Administrative Committee has been meeting regularly to map plans for the Dec. 3 celebration. It is composed of Sheriff Albert W. Skinner, Police Chief William Lombard, Sgt. Jerry Monaghan, Sgt. John Kinnicutt, Nicholas Zona, director of Health and Physical Education, Rochester Public Schools; William H. Keeler, director of the Safety Council; James F. Hughes, director of public relations, Rochester Products Division, General Motors; William Blackmon, director of public relations, Delco Division of General Motors; and Ira C. Sapozink, campaign coordinator.

Traffic Officials To Discuss Plans

Top traffic officials and civic leaders from Rochester and the surrounding area will meet in Rochester tomorrow (Friday) for a workshop program aimed at reducing traffic accidents and highway congestion.

The day-long session will be co-sponsored by the New York State Citizens Council on Traffic Safety, the Rochester Safety Council of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce and the National Safety Council. It will be held at the Chamber of Commerce building, 55 St. Paul St.

Details of the National Safety Council's Annual Traffic Inventory will be presented to show participants how they can use the appraisal program to focus on community traffic problems.

The inventory, in which 1,200 American cities are enrolled, analyzes and rates a city's traffic program in eight areas, including accident records, engineering, courts, police supervision and school and public safety education.

Specific deficiencies are pointed out and recommendations made for possible improvement. Also serving as a yardstick for progress, the Inventory's appraisal helps stimulate interest among officials and citizens in meeting traffic needs.

Get Social Security Number, Christmas Workers Advised

Students, housewives, and others who plan to make extra cash by working during the pre-Christmas rush were advised to avoid possible delay by getting a social security account number now.

J. M. Tomaino, district manager of the Rochester social security office, reminded students who have never had a social security number to apply for one without delay at their nearest social security office.

Housewives should check their social security cards to make sure that the account is in their married name. If the card is still in the maiden name, application should be made to change it, Mr. Tomaino suggested.

The key to the benefits which are paid to workers who retire, die, or become disabled is the number on your social security card. Any person who cannot locate his or her card should take immediate steps to make application for a duplicate one by obtaining a form for this purpose at the nearest social security office or post office. The duplicate social security card will have the same number originally assigned to the worker.

It's Official—The Tenth Ward Will Be Divided Three Ways

The re-adjustment of city wards voted Tuesday night by the City Council was greeted with mixed emotions by Tenth Ward politicians. Both Democrats and Republicans are somewhat dismayed at what the tri-section, or division into three parts like Old Gaul, means to their organizations.

Sebastian A. Schausel, Democratic leader, says that from a social and financial point of view the Democrats in the three new wards (the First, Ninth and Tenth) will continue to operate as a unit for the foreseeable future. "Politically, of course," he says, "there will necessarily be separate organizations."

No spokesman for local Republicans was immediately available as the Courier went to press, but the problem for them is the same as for the Democrats.

Independent observers see the likelihood of comparatively little advantage to Democrats in the carving up of the present Tenth Ward and foresee the possibility of Republican victory in two of the three new wards next November.

The only new ward considered safe for the Democrats is the First, which contains election districts that have long had Democratic tendencies.

The new Ninth where Supervisor Harold (Jeff) Wilkin and Constable Larry Burke live and will have to run has Republican possibilities and the new Tenth, as former ward leader Henry R. Dutcher, Jr., pointed out in speaking at the City Council hearing on the ward re-districting, has a decided Republican aspect.

Dutcher acknowledged that the Tenth Democrats have "some reservations" about the new boundaries, but go along with the city-wide plan as "long overdue".

Editor Visits TYO Meeting

T.Y.O. invited the Courier to send a representative to its monthly meeting last Thursday at Ascension Church and the editor chose to go himself.

T.Y.O., he soon found out, stands for Tenth Ward Youth Organization, but does not necessarily mean that the young people of the area are alone in their effort to help solve the problems of youth. There were about 20 at the meeting and there were just about as many adults as young people.

The evening started with the group splitting up into three panels, each with a specific area to cover. Your editor sat in with the half dozen who were concerning themselves with creation of a youth center for the Tenth Ward.

The teen agers came out boldly for some place they could meet and fraternize after school and in the evening — mostly to dance. They deplored the lack of privately run ice cream parlors where they would be welcomed in large numbers and wanted to know why the city or some other government agency didn't step in.

The adults present were quite sympathetic with the problem of the young people, but frankly stated the "practical aspects" of the youth center idea. No decision was arrived at, except that several approaches were suggested and the subject will be continued at next month's meeting.

A general meeting of the entire group followed the panel discussions and each panel leader gave a brief summary. Some were concerned with interesting more adults and more leaders of the community, schools, churches and

other organizations and it was announced that certain T.Y.O. members had been delegated to see specific people before the next meeting. And so it went.

Bob Pierce of the City Recreation and Parks Department then gave a talk on what the city's approach to the youth recreation is and showed slides to demonstrate.

The session ended with a refreshment period, the whole proceedings taking up about two hours.

"What are we trying to do?" said T.Y.O. President Bob Bundy in reply to our question. "We want to get some activities started. We want to get more people interested. We know that our youth are the hope of tomorrow. We want to help them. We aren't moving too fast, since we have decided it is better to creep before we walk. We intend to keep trying."

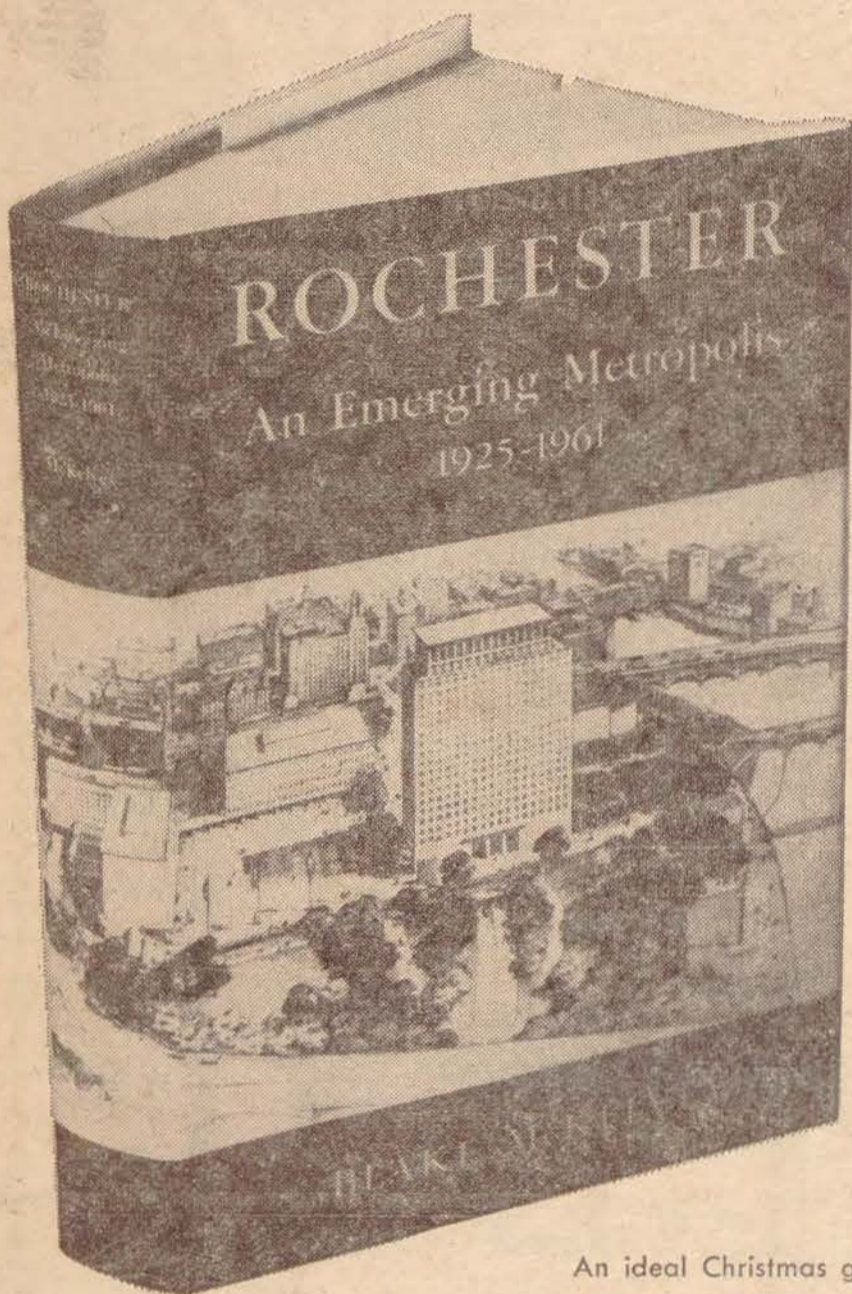

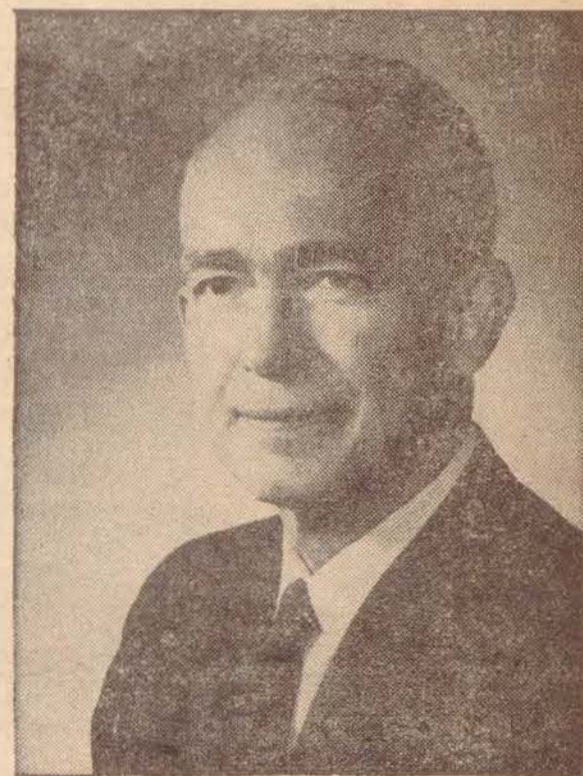

Savings Bonds Continue Drawing Interest Even After 20 Years

Who ever kills the goose that lays the golden egg? Well, unfortunately, many people do, says U. S. Treasury officials. There are flocks of ways of going about it, often concerned with turning what was to be a nest egg into a goose egg, they point out.

One of the ways of going from golden goose to dead duck, financially speaking, is even causing concern to the U. S. Government. The Treasury is well aware of the tendency of people's savings to fly away. It is particularly interested in the tendency some people have to cash their U. S. Savings Bonds just as soon as they reach the maturity date indicated on the bond. The Treasury is sure many of these people would hold onto their bonds if they realized that their bonds are still earning interest — long after the originally announced maturity date.

Without at all going out on a limb, the Treasury states flatly that all Series E and H Savings Bonds now in existence are still bearing interest, even those that are more than 20 years old.

The Treasury's records of bond redemptions, however, indicate some Americans haven't heard about the extensions, and cash their bonds within days after what they think is the final maturity date. As an example, Series E Bonds bought in May, 1941, reached their first maturity date in 1951. They were extended for another ten years to 1961. In March of last year they were given still another ten year extension, to 1971. Yet, in May, 1961, which would have been the final maturity date under the old regulations, there was a drastic increase in the number of these bonds redeemed for cash over the monthly figures for the year before, or the year since.

By not realizing that their bonds are still earning interest, many savers cash them at a time when they are actually earning more interest than ever before—a straight 3.75 percent as opposed to the 2.9 percent paid in the early days of Series E Bonds. Also, when E Bonds are cashed, the income tax on accrued interest is due. By holding on to E Bonds, or exchanging them for H Bonds, this tax can be deferred, perhaps to a time when retirement makes the overall tax burden lighter.

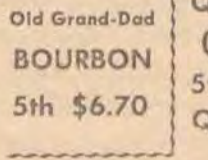

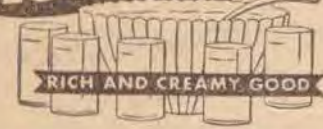

Coughing A Lot?

By the Health Bureau of Rochester and Monroe County

Jim coughs every morning when he gets up. Mary coughs every time she lies down. Bob coughs for a couple of months every winter, though he's all right the rest of the year. All three have what doctors call a chronic or persistent cough. You don't have to cough all the time, year round, to have a chronic cough.

For instance, a person may know that when he has a cold, he usually coughs for about two weeks. If his cough from a cold should hang on for five or six weeks, he has developed a chronic cough and may be battling something more than just a cold.

Heavy cigarette smoking can cause a chronic cough. It is never safe to dismiss a persistent cough as "just a cigarette cough." For one thing, a cigarette cough is serious in itself. For another, there's the danger that a heavy smoker may get so used to his cough that he can't tell when something new has been added. He may be coughing more than he used to, or for longer at a time than he did; he may be coughing up more phlegm, or perhaps he has started to cough up a small amount of blood. Any of these happenings may be a sign that something is seriously wrong.

A chronic or persistent cough can be a symptom of tuberculosis, lung cancer, bronchitis, emphysema (in which the lungs lose their elasticity and hold in too much air), bronchiectasis (in which the bronchial tubes stretch and form pus pockets), and other respiratory diseases. Untreated, these ailments can cause serious disability and even death.

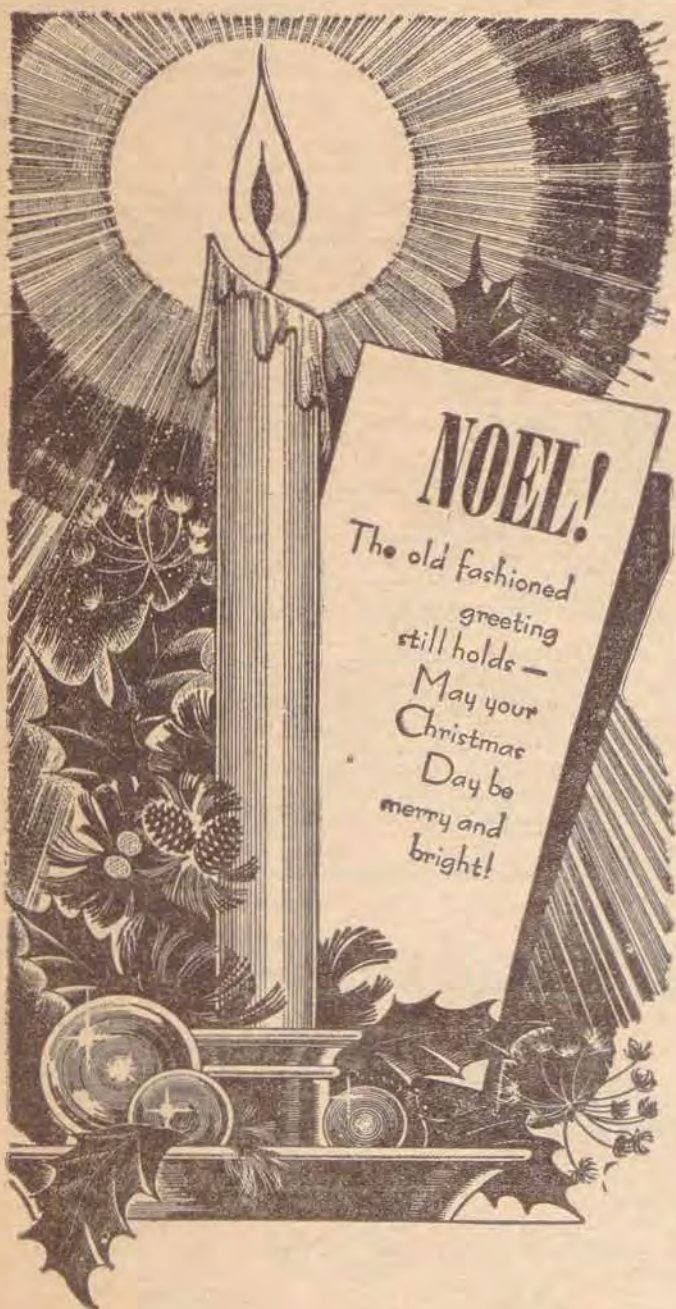

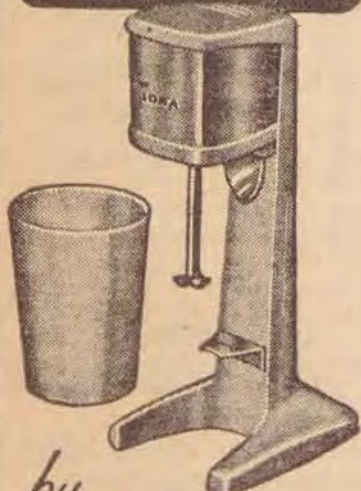

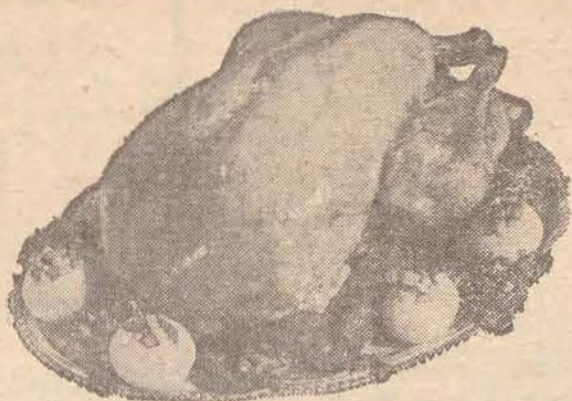

**"Lights On For Education"
To Be Held Here Jan. 7**

"Lights on for Education" is sponsored statewide by the New York State Teachers Association, New York State School Boards Association, New York State Council of City and Village Superintendents, New York State Association of Secondary School Administrators, New York State Association of Elementary School Principals and the New York State Association of District Administrators. Locally, the program is sponsored by a corresponding local school district committee. Purpose: "Lights On for Education" will develop and promote a

deeper and more widespread understanding of the purpose, achievements, problems, and needs of our public schools.

"Lights On for Education" will encourage greater participation by parents, laymen's groups and the general public in developing plans, programs, and procedures for desirable improvements in our systems of public education and will see that the needs of the school are met by stimulating proper action toward that end.

Some Questions and Answers About the "Lights On" Project:

1. Exactly what is the "Lights On" project?

On the night of January 7, lights will be shining in school buildings throughout New York State wherever there are PTAs. The "Lights On" project is a united effort on the part of the major lay and professional educational groups in a community to focus attention of the public on the schools and the citizens' role in supporting them.

2. Why was January 7, 1963, chosen as "Lights On" Day?

The legislature will be meeting for the first Monday of the 1963 session. On "Lights On" Day it is hoped to focus attention of the legislature on the importance of education legislation to their constituents as the session begins, so they will give it the consideration it needs and deserves.

3. Is the "Light On" project just a one-day effort?

Definitely not. The project will begin with the preparation for the program when informative material about the schools will be brought to the public. This will be followed, by continuing action, not only in support of legislation, but also of an educational nature through informative programs at meetings of other organizations, PTA meetings and any other opportunities that present themselves.

4. What is being done in the Genesee Valley District?

"Lights On for Education" meetings are being planned by area

PTA councils and units.

There will be a "Lights On for Education" telecast on WHEC-TV on Wednesday, January 2, 1963, at 8 p.m.-8:30 p.m. A panel discussion about the problems of one of the "big six"—the problems facing the Rochester Public Schools. Panelists: Dr. Walter Crewson, Associate Commissioner of Education, N.Y. State; Dr. Robert Springer, Superintendent, Rochester Public Schools; Dr. Herbert Greenberg, Parent Education Consultant, Rochester Schools; Mrs. Walter R. Bloss, District Director, Genesee Valley District of the New York State Congress of Parents and Teachers, and Warren Doremus, Moderator, Director of News and Public Affairs.

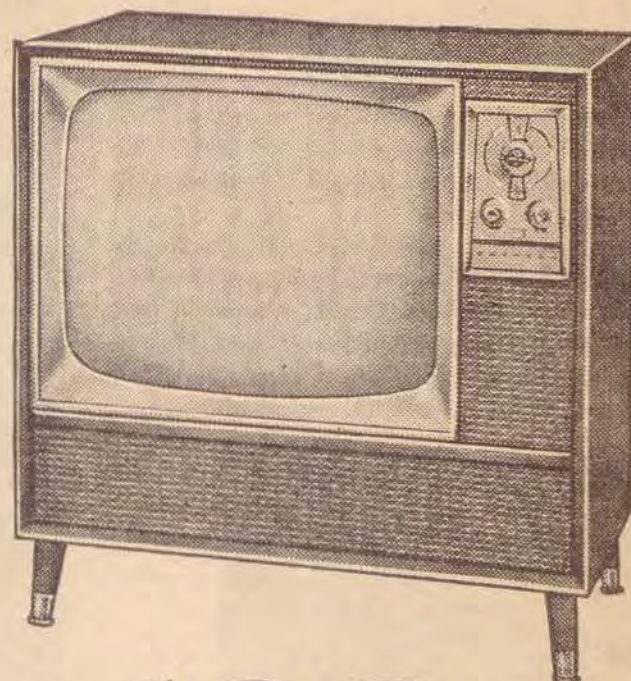

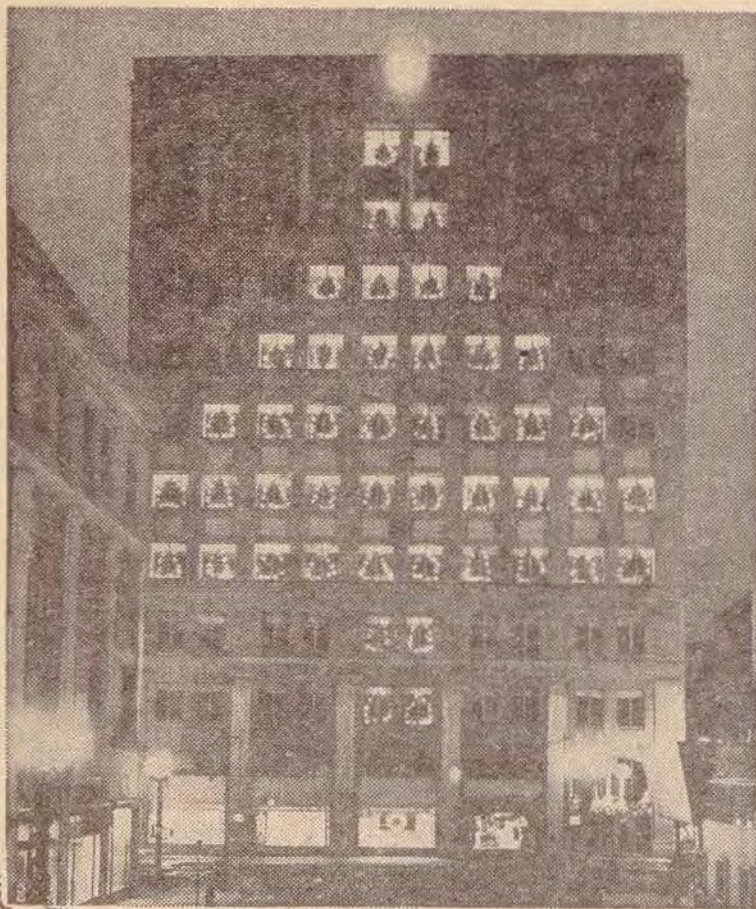

Gray Lady, Gray Man Volunteers Sought For Hospital Program

Once again the Red Cross asks the community to respond to an increasing need for additional volunteers for the Rochester State Hospital Gray Lady - Gray Man Service. Mrs. William J. Pfaff, chairman of the service, stated that there is no limit in terms of what the volunteer can do to help the mentally ill patient today.

"Volunteers are doing things today we never dreamed they could do two years ago," she says. "Things that only a volunteer can do because the patient realizes they are not 'paid' to be kind and that the volunteer is motivated only by a sincere interest in humanity."

Explaining the volunteer's role further she stated that there are two aspects to treating the mentally ill patient: The medical and the humanistic. "Only the volunteer can administer the humanistic aspect because only the volunteer has a pure humanitarian interest; while the staff assumes responsibility for the medical aspect of treatment," she stated. "Strictly speaking the staff is limited in restoring trust and love in the patient's life because they are professionals, and that the mentally ill patient must be convinced that there are people who care. Thus, the volunteer role in the treatment of the mentally ill is becoming an increasingly important one. Socialized companionship is gained through group activity."

The volunteer work is a group-working-with-group program in such activities as: Planning and leading parties and games; group singing; book cart and library aides; assisting in arts and crafts; and planning play for disturbed children. A special need exists for persons who can play piano, especially by ear. Daytime and evening volunteers are needed—men and women.

Interviews will be granted on Mondays, Jan. 7 and 21 from 7 until 9 p.m.; Tuesdays, Jan. 15 and 22 from 7 until 9 p.m.; and on Wednesdays, Jan. 9, 16 and 23 from 12 until 2 p.m.

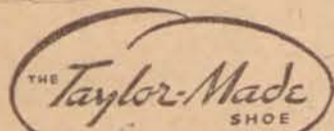

Formula for Exercising Outlined by 'Y' Director

Bob Orozco, Physical Education Director of the Rochester Central Branch Y.M.C.A. said that the week-end athlete is his own worst enemy. Like anyone else who has not exercised regularly, who suddenly gets the "bug" and goes at it with enthusiasm and ambition, the results are apt to be most undesirable, perhaps disastrous, he states. Orozco continues:
"He forgets he has done relatively nothing for years; that his whole body is in a state of mild atrophy and lacks the strength and stamina to take the beating he suddenly inflicts upon it. Like anything that is not strong enough to take the strain imposed, it breaks down.

"Scientific evidence also exists to show us how to exercise. We should first find our level of physical condition. From which we progress in easy stages by increasing the severity, and repetition of the exercise. This is progressive physical training and is the only way to exercise to achieve results with safety.

"The shock to our physical system is minimized and we allow the muscles and organs the opportunity to adjust to the new demands. Your muscles are tough; they will respond to the challenge by growing stronger and more supple if you give them the time.

"The human entity is a whole thing. So is the human body. Too many people seem to feel they should exercise to improve only a specific part of the body, reduce the waistline or increase the size of the biceps or decrease the size of the hips, etc. Often, people ask me, what they can do to reduce their waists or eliminate the fat rolls on the side of their waist. My answer usually leaves them somewhat frustrated because I try to explain that isolated exercise does not produce results as fast nor as desirable as total exercise. The whole body best responds when all parts of the body are exercised. Just doing deep-knee bends will not help the arms or neck. Nor will arm pressing a heavy weight help the abdominal region. Your exercise routine must include the whole body. The major areas that should always be included are the following: Arms, hands, neck and shoulders; rib case (upper back and chest), abdominals (including the lateral groups), lower back, upper and lower legs, ankles and feet.

"Unfortunately, most sports, as such, while they require the expenditure of great energy, do not provide for total exercise because each, in the course of play, calls on special muscle groups to perform specialized skills. The best way to exercise the whole body is through a progressive calisthenics program as offered at the Central YMCA or at your home.

"Use an exercise routine and make certain that it takes you through every area mentioned above. Run gently before you exercise as it warms-up the body by promoting the flow of blood thereby readying the body tissues for action. If you don't have sufficient time to use the Central YMCA track, substitute it with rope skipping, running or hopping in place.

"Once you've established a calisthenic routine and it becomes easy to do, substitute more difficult exercises and increase the repetitions. Remember, the exercise must go beyond the comfortable range if it is to be of real value. Don't neglect your routine. Be regular. Be consistent. Three times a week is a recommended minimum.

"You can safely play sports on a vigorous level once you've conditioned yourself through your rou-

time of progressive calisthenics. Don't fall into the trap of playing your game strenuously without the conditioning aspect or you'll surely be asking for trouble. After all, do you know of just one top-flight athlete that plays his game without first conditioning himself?
"If you want further advice and counselling of a fitness program see your YMCA Physical Director. He's a well-trained professional dedicated to the service of his fellow man. He not only knows his business, he's interested too. You will live better, happier and longer as soon as you develop the habit of regular work-outs (exercise)."

Drinking Drivers Invite Disaster

The New York State Citizens Council on Traffic Safety estimated today that more than half the fatal accidents in the State over the 102-hour New Year's weekend will involve drinking drivers.

The Council pointed out that special studies of previous year-end holiday accidents showed drinking drivers had a part in 55 per cent of the crashes that caused death. The percentage is almost double the year-round figure for fatal accidents involving this group of motorists.

William S. Renchard, president of the Council, said the drinking and driving problem was one of the major factors which have made the holiday season the most dangerous time of the year for those using the highway.

Mr. Renchard, who also is the president of the Chemical Bank New York Trust Company, explained that contrary to the belief of many motorists, even a few drinks impair driving ability.

"When alcohol is taken—even in small amounts—the first part of the brain affected is the section which controls judgment. Then reaction time, vision and coordination are weakened," Mr. Renchard said.

A motorist who has had alcoholic beverages may not show any visible sign of intoxication. But he may well have lost the clearness of mind and critical judgment needed to drive—especially at this time when road conditions are hazardous.

Mr. Renchard asked motorists to celebrate wisely and drive cautiously. "Last year, 35 persons died during a 78-hour New Year's weekend," he said. This time many New Yorkers will mark the holiday with four-day weekends, there-
