MORAL REFORM. The late reform of the American Female Moral Reform Society at the Washington street Church, in this city, has awakened the public attention to the consideration of the best mode of remedying the evils complained of, and for suppressing the increasing licentiousness of the age.

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THE MAINE ELECTION. The election of Governor, members of Congress, the Legislature, &c., occurred in Maine, Monday last. We have a few returns from different sources but not enough to give any information as to the general result.

The democratic renators, county treasurer and county commissioner are also elected in Cumberland by a large majority. The aggregate vote of the two leading parties has fallen off about 400 from that of 1842—1843.

In addition to the above, we have the Saco Democrat of Tuesday, which gives the result in that town: Appleton, (dem.) 255; Robinson (whig) 193; Anston, (abo.) 35.
