My Dear Mrs. O'Connor,

Here are three little papers on women & public schools – can you not utilize some of their points for the papers — the whole of neither will do — just as it is. What do you think? Should the Council hold any official meetings or make any campaign outside of the men's? Of course it looks from the papers & last evening's cheering every time any speaker alluded to the woman nominee – as if everything were going our way – but all these demonstrations are from the <u>top</u> of <u>society</u> [page 2]

We shall not hear from the bottom layers -- the saloon, gambling, dissolute – until the morning after election – they are open quantities in open and intelligent discussion. Of course if our nominee should be elected -- the Council will be credited with helping – and so – if she is <u>not</u> elected -- it will or may be charged to the Council's not having done aught to educate the prejudiced or ignorant -- I wish you had a telephone to tell me what you think – I shall hate awfully to feel that we women did not do our part toward winning votes for our candidate.
