My doctor, a homeopathic woman, thinks that it is simply overwork, but my rest will prove whether there is not something else at the bottom of it all. I eat and sleep and go round doing nothing, looking just as well as ever, but I suppose at eighty-one we must naturally begin to feel a change come over us.
