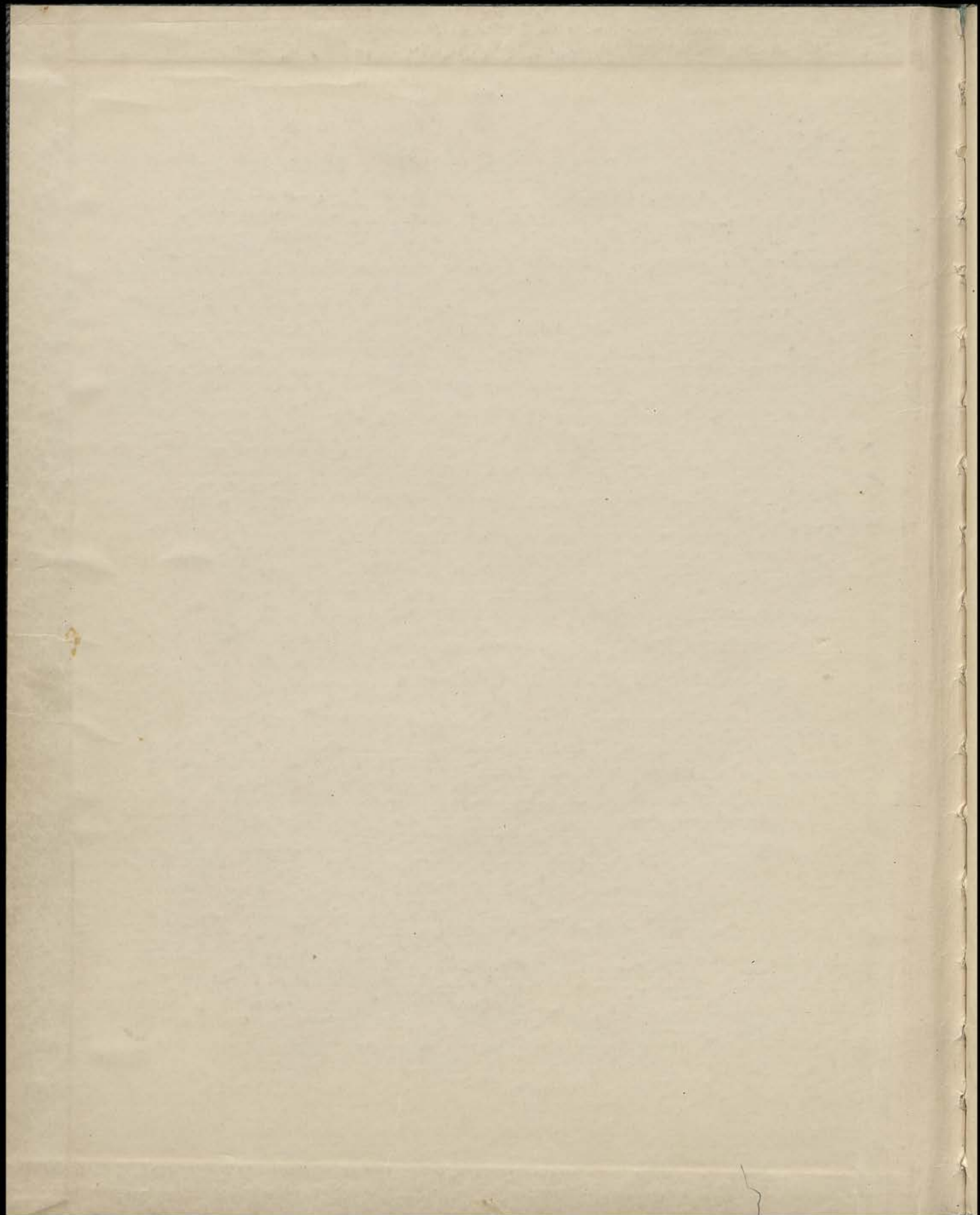

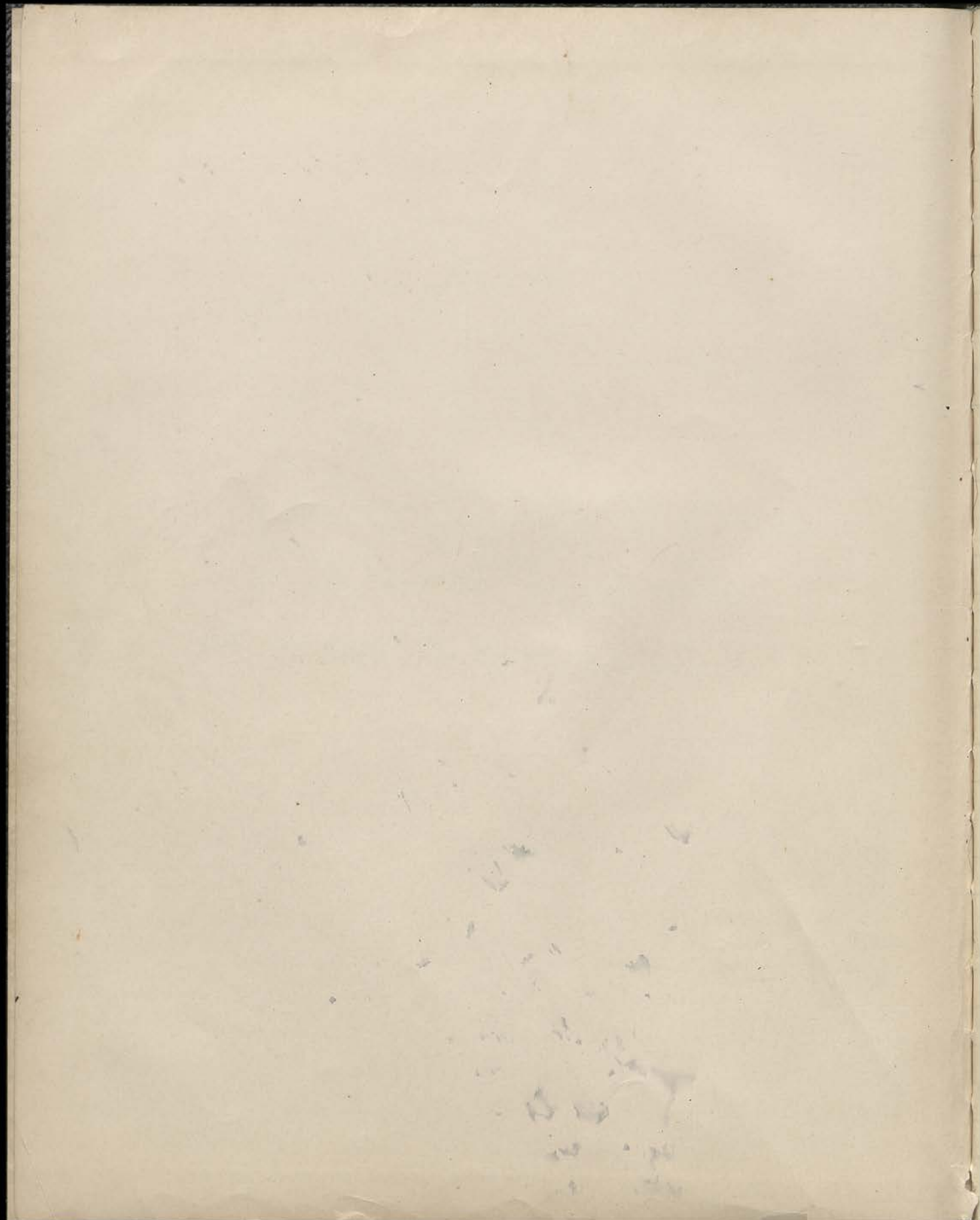

1919-1920

First meeting - Oct. 6th 1919.

The opening meeting of the Scottville Literary Society for the season of 1919-1920 was held Monday evening Oct. 6th. at the home of Admiral Hatford. Judge Brown presided. There were thirty eight present.

The program opened with a piano solo by Miss Virginia Chilcott. It was followed by the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, and the annual report of the year, and election of secretary. A vote of thanks was given the secretary for the years work. The report of the General Committee composed of Mrs. Dr. J. Kujic, Miss Ruth Hatford, and Mr. Edson was read and accepted. The next on the program was a very interesting paper on the early history of Scottville, written by Admiral Hatford and read by Miss Ruth Hatford. Music "Gould Lang Syne" sung by the society, was the closing number.

In the absence of Mr. Brown, and Mrs. Dr. J. Gove - Mrs. William Kujic and Rev. Woodard was appointed to act as committee. After a brief intermission the committee reported on the program for the second meeting.

A motion was read and carried, and a committee composed of Rev. Woodard and Mr. Hazelton Brown was appointed to confer

with Admiral Fenwick on the publication of his papers. See Reminiscences and Early History of Scottsville.

The Chairman spoke of a book entitled "Distinguished Authors" written by Dr. Sanborn a former Methodist Minister of Scottsville, and a member of the Literary Society. A copy has since been presented to the Society by the Author.

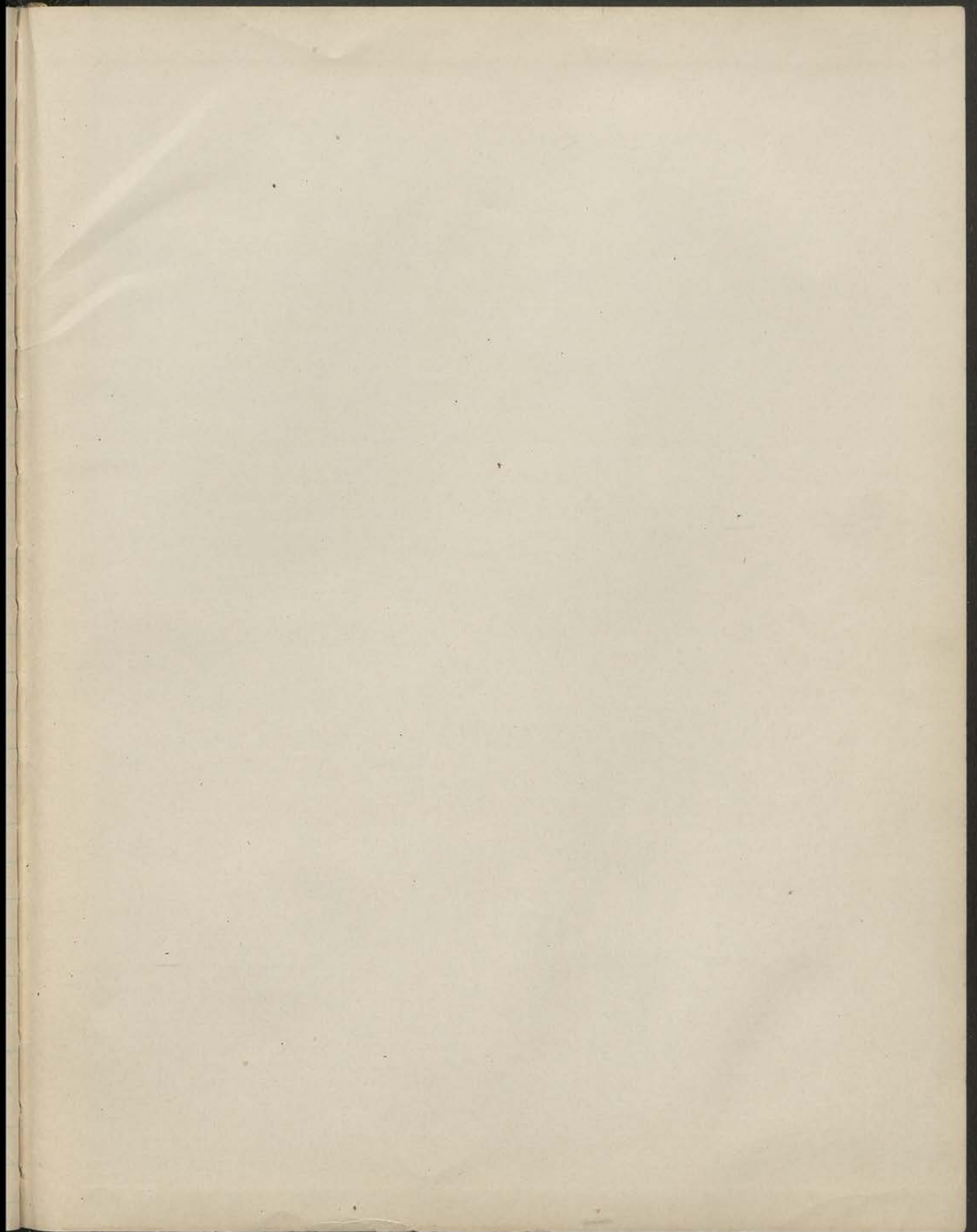

During the season 1923-1924 there were fifteen meetings of the Literary Society.
