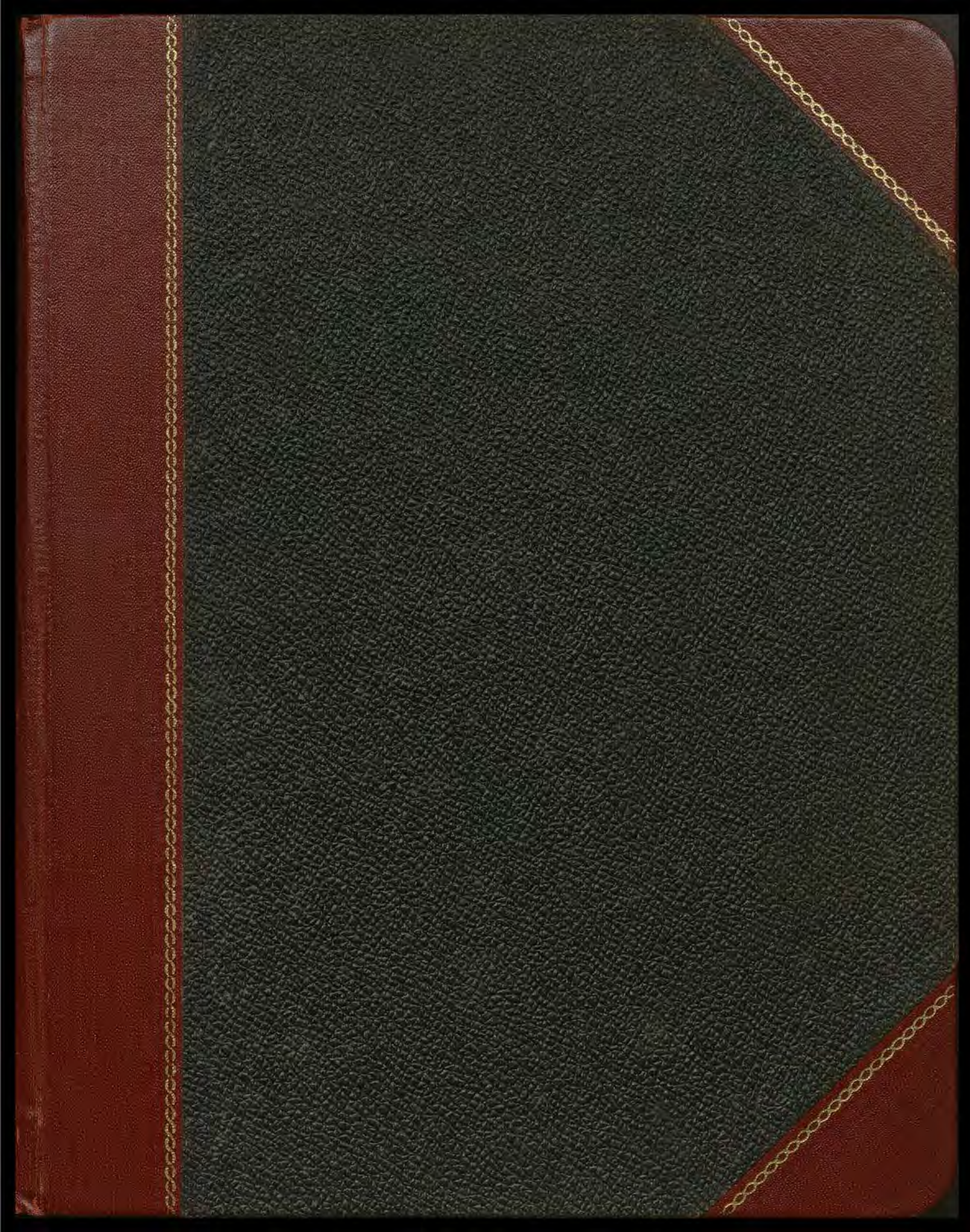


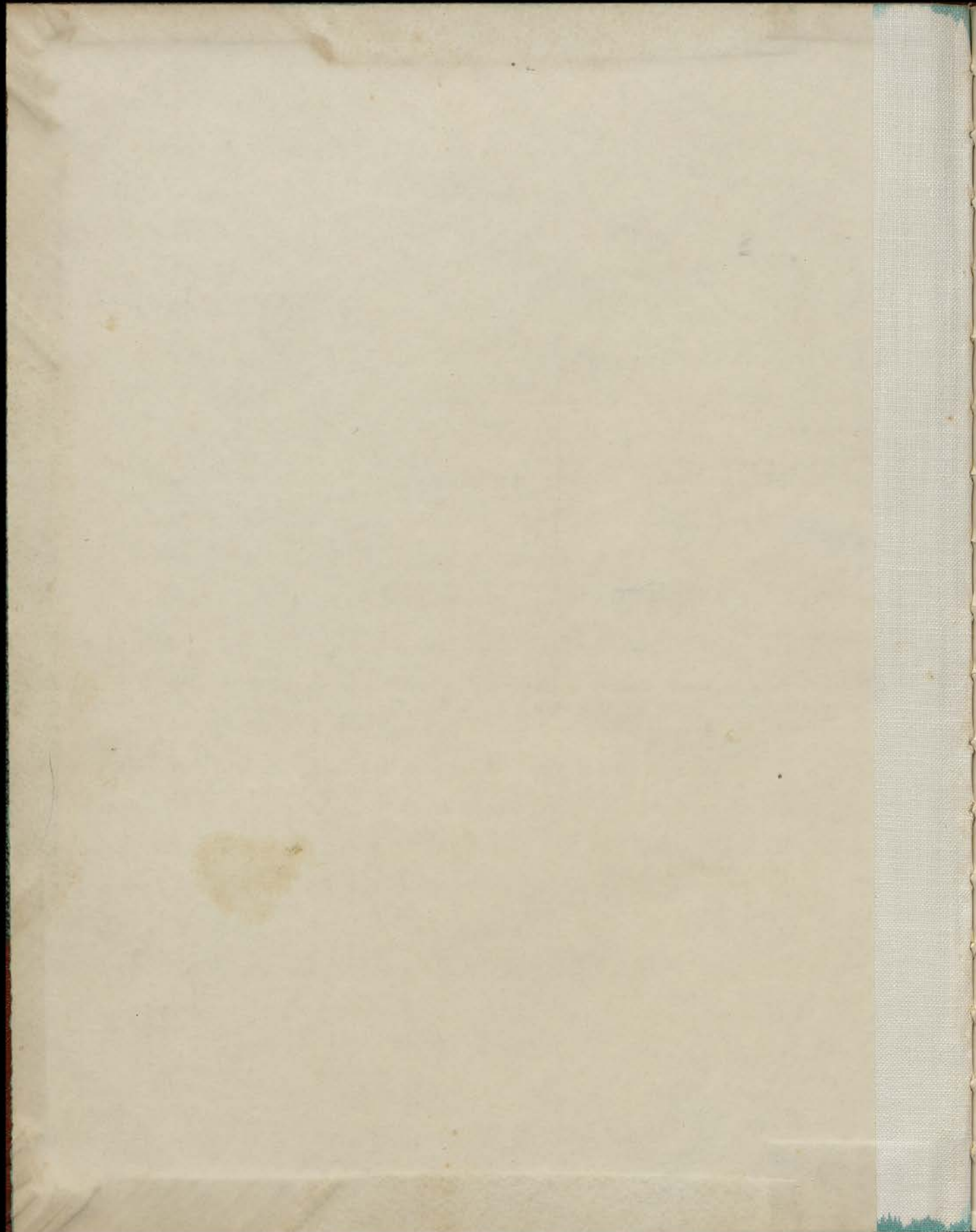

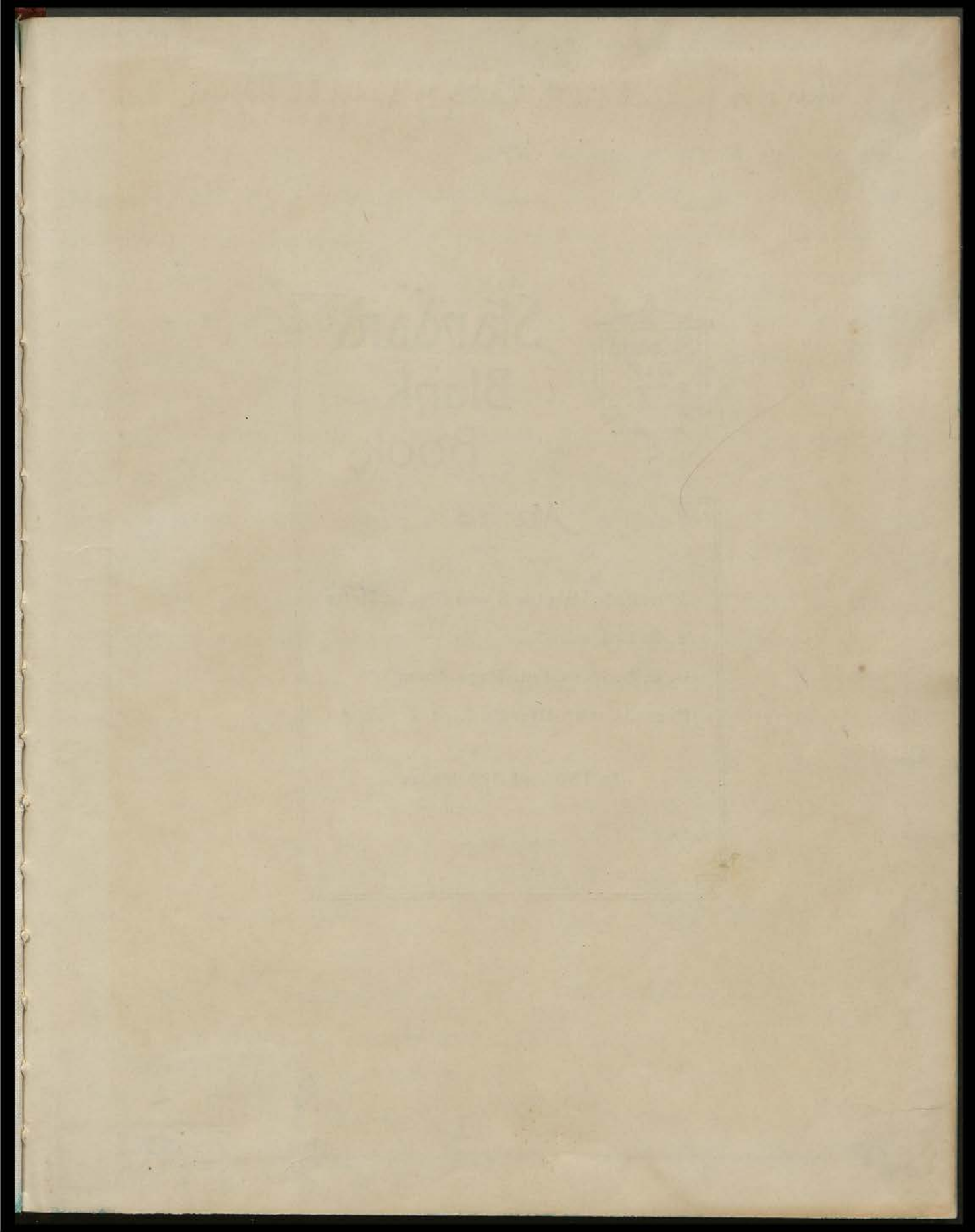

Two members attending were descendants of <sup>two charter members</sup> Romeyn V. and Annis Sibley, Mr. Romeyn S. Dumm and Mrs Annis Dumm Brown, grand children, as Mr. E. H. Miller gave a complete report of the program presented. I will incorporate in the minutes.

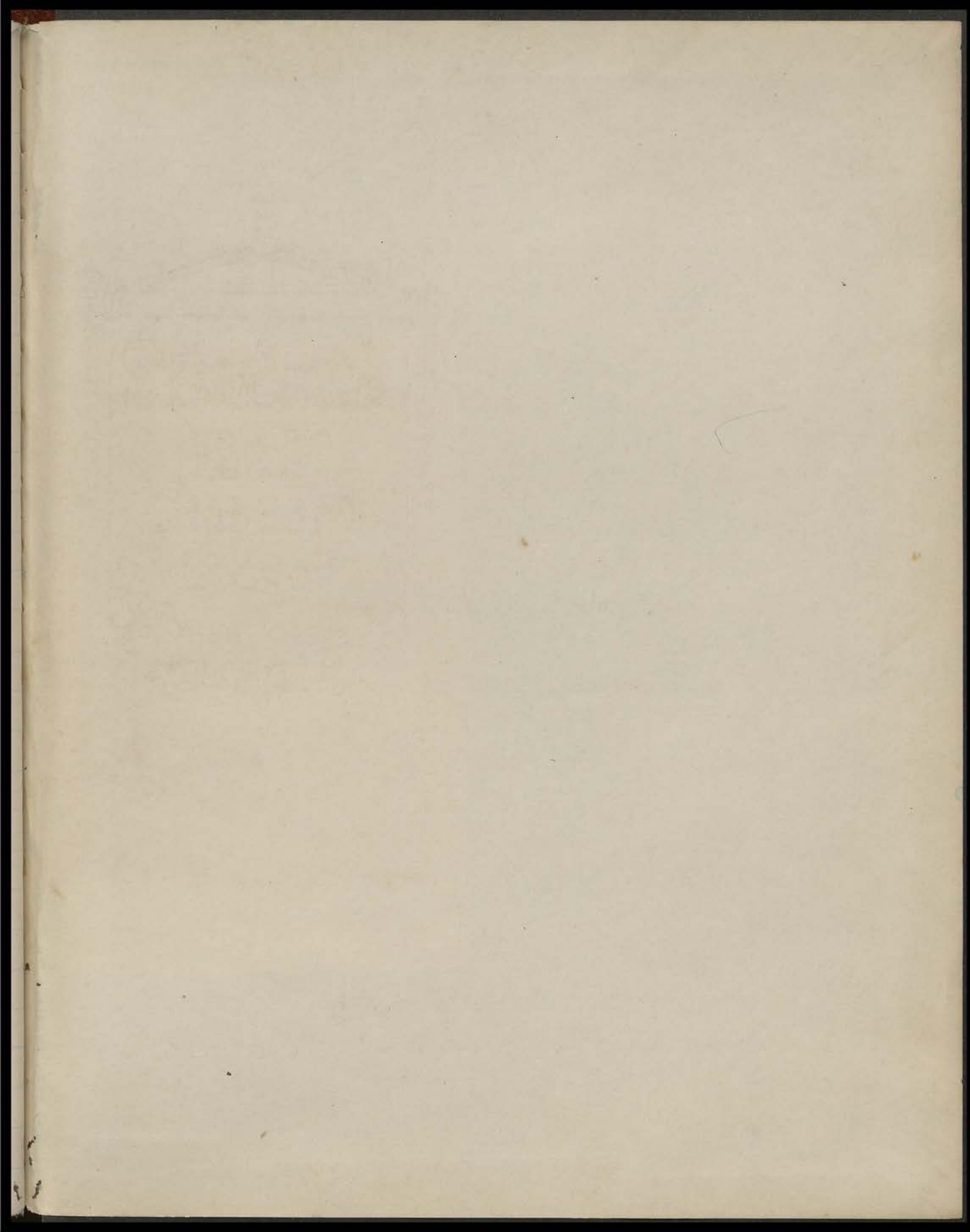
