

## EAST HIGH'S SEASON, 1910-11

East High's basketball team of 1910-11 is the first scholastic aggregation in Western New York whose right to championship honors is unquestioned. Balanced by individuals as to present the finest teamwork seen on any of the courts it has played, this aggregation will go down as one of the most remarkable in the history of ball tossing by New York State high school athletes.

The form displayed by the Orientals is the culmination of preparation begun in years before this championship season, for the title holders are but a trifle different in make-up to the quintette of 1909-10, which missed the right to claim the title by one defeat. That East High tossers would overcome all opponents on its schedule was apparent in their early appearances when their superiority to high school fives was so great as to bring comparison with leading college teams.

Individually, in age, weight and experience, the champions almost measure up with collegians, while as a team they have made a record and shown class that would have satisfied more than one college. The most important victory to bring the team into favorable comparison with colleges was gained over the Normal School quintette of Oswego, after the latter had defeated a number of the leading

college representatives. The victory of East High on the Oswego court by a margin of eight points brought praise to the wearers of Purple and White that has been given to few teams, even professionals.

Ranking with the victory at Oswego was one gained at Tonawanda over the Tonawanda High School team by eleven points. It was the first defeat ever administered by a high school team to Tonawanda at Tonawanda. Such teams as Lafayette High of Buffalo and Cook Academy of Montour Falls, which heretofore have been considered as of the best on their home courts did not show capability sufficient to be rated with East High. In the case of Cook, the champion-ship aggressiveness of East High was shown at Montour Falls as in no other game. In the first period of play the Orientals did not strike their stride, but in the second overcame a lead made by Cook, to win out by seven points.

Fortune has dealt kindly with East High even as it does with champions in all branches of athletics. The team suffered no serious injuries; that is, none to affect its individuals and leave the team weakened for any of its games. In material the team has been favored with players both as regulars and substitutes who always went to make up a balanced combination. In passing, guarding, goal shooting and confidence, individually and collectively, the players have displayed ability which seems unlikely to be equaled by another Rochester school team. Certainly no other team will ever show such marked superiority to all scholastic competitors as that of East High of 1910-11, even should the present enviable record be duplicated or surpassed.





#### Captain GEORGE MALONE Right Forward

#### Manager HAROLD DOANE Left Forward



Until this season his playing lacked only the aggressiveness necessary for a champion. To-day he ranks as one of the most aggressive players of the team, and is a running mate who would probably have a record equal to that of Malone were his chance of goal tossing equal under the team's inside playing.






## CLEMENT LANNI—Right Guard IOHN D. MURPHY—Left Guard

In view of the strength of East High's team being to a great extent in its defensive work, the playing of Murphy and Lanni will be treated as one. In the games this season they have held their opposing forwards to less goals than the East High forwards were able to hold the opposing guards in the hardest games. And even when so closely covering their opposing forwards this defensive combination has scored a greater total of goals than either of their individual opponents. Murphy is the lightest member of the squad, of which he has been a member for two years. Lanni is the seasoned warrior of the aggregation, and has been a tosser of the first East High team since his freshman year.






#### FRED BLOOM-Center

In finding a center to measure up to championship form the team was exceptionally fortunate in recruiting Bloom from the second team of 1909-10. Bloom's height, 6 feet, 4 inches, gives him an advantage over practically all scholastic centers. Few have been able to get the tip-off from him, thus giving East High the jump in nearly all of the contests. Bloom stands second as a scorer of field goals.

#### EDWARD DOYLE-Substitute Forward

"Dobber," a recruit from the second team, has not been a regular forward for the simple reason that two older men beat him to the job. He has taken part in several games and on each occasion proved that he is fully competent to substitute for either Malone or Doane and not weaken the team's chances of victory. In passing, Doyle is very clever.





#### DAVIS DORON-Substitute Guard

It was not until the schedule had half run its course that Doron received his chance to show his ability, and then he outplayed in every department an athlete whose reputation had placed him among the fore ranks of the game. Doron excells in intercepting passes. In covering a man he smothers him, even to suffocation. In the games he has played but one goal has been scored against him.

#### JAMES H. FOWLE-Physical Director

All branches of East High athletics have been marked by surprising enthusiasm since "Doc" assumed command, and as his coaching has brought out a high class of performers in track and field events, so has it affected basketball.

Fowle made but one mistake during the season and that was when he wagered a banquet that the boys would not win a certain contest.

WEST HIGH TEAM

#### West High Ranks With the Best

While the East High team has been showing championship form in basketball, her sister school, West High, has attained the highest point of team development ever reached by a quintette of that institution. In every department the combination of 1910-1911 has shown greater ability than any of its predecessors at West High, as is attested by a record of ten victories to five defeats. In only one case has West High been strongly outclassed. That was at Montour Falls at the hands of Cook Academy, which game came as a second contest within twelve hours. The showing of West High then would not have been so poor but for the strain of too much athletics on the same day, which is bound to have its effect on any combination. To lose to Cook, however, is not a disgrace, for that team is one of the fastest in the state.

West High's tossers have shown brilliant passing and guarding in many of its games. This form, however, has been spasmodic at times and sudden aggressiveness by opponents once it disrupted the Occidentals, left them unable to regain their bearings. And, without that confidence which comes through steadiness, the team has been worsted in battles which otherwise would have been won. In comparison to the general run of high school teams, West High ranks in the fore. Of the defeats sustained away from home-and all but one was received on a foreign court—with but one exception the Occidentals lost in contests which were nip and tuck from the first to the last, bringing out the fighting qualities of the losers. In most cases, mere chance gave the opposition the scant margin which decided. With such fast teams as Lafayette High of Buffalo and Starkey Seminary, West High lost away from home and won here in the return games. The lone game with St. John's Military Academy was lost at Manlius, while the only team to really prove clean superiority was Cook Academy, which won in Rochester as well as at Montour Falls.


