Artistically Revealing the Spirit

Richmond Futch, Jr. started painting early in life. After being recognized by a RCSD teacher for his untapped talent, Richmond was entered into a special art program for one year of private study at the Rochester Museum of Art. He continued to attend evening art classes at East High, later he joined the "All of Us" art program.

Richmond was also one of the founding members of the Figure Study Guild led by Master artist Steven Carpenter, where he continued to enhance his craft by studying the techniques of the Old Master Artist. However, the majority of his training was self-taught.

Richmond became known in the Christian world as a Worship Painter. He and his wife Shawn were members of Shepherd's Heart Christian Fellowship in Rochester and, as an ordained minister, Richmond flowed in the prophetic through his work.

In 2006 Richmond was inspired to start A.R.T.S Artistically Revealing the Spirit. A.R.T.S is a ministry that promotes the recovery of the imagination and creativity. Even though A.R.T.S is a Christian based ministry it maintains the ability to bridge the church and the community at large to serve as a catalyst in the process of social and emotional healing.

In 2016 Richmond launched Revelation Rochester Art Center which was housed at the Pillar where he offered free art workshops to Rochester's most vulnerable population. He taught art classes at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality and House of Mercy encouraging homeless people in discovering their creativity.

Richmond conducted seminars on the effectiveness of healing through the arts. He was featured in several articles in the Democrat and Chronicle, Metropolitan, Breakthrough and About Time magazines. His work is known throughout the USA. Richmond's work can be seen around Rochester hanging in the French Quarter Restaurant 534 West Ridge Road, Café Aviv 321 East Ave and in a conference room at Strong Memorial Hospital. One piece he created after a free Bike Raffle at the Arnett Block Party is hanging in the Arnett Library.

Richmond's community projects include working with Artist in Residence projects at Arnett Library, the Campbell and Adam Street Recreation Centers. He worked with Legacy of "64 Ripple Art Window of Humanity", serving as the chairperson for the United Global Artist Gallery and Symposium. A favorite involvement was with St. Joseph's House of Hospitality and The House of Mercy where he offered art workshops as a form of healing and hope to homeless individuals. Richmond also served on the advisory board at St Joseph's House.

As an artist Richmond believed in using his talent in more ways than one, along with being a fine artist Richmond took on the challenge of being a theatrical artist as a member of the Neutral Zone Players Arts and Entertainment Community Organization.

A gifted servant of God, Richmond used his gift of art to worship. Watercolor, acrylic, pencil, collage and mixed media were his instruments of praise.

At the Arnett Branch Library, we are so grateful for Richmond's generosity and heart in sharing his talent with us. We are already missing you, Richmond!!

ochester loves its murals. Art adorns walls all over the city, from the sprawling, eccentric images created by WALL\THERAPY's annual roster of visiting and local artists to Shawn Dunwoody's inspirational community projects in the Fruit Belt and JOSANA neighborhoods. There's something seemingly simple about putting paint on a wall, and yet it has the power to transform a place — not just the way it looks, but how we feel about it. And a new, literary-focused mural installation that has sprung up in the 19th Ward, is the latest community-oriented work by artist and homeless advocate Richmond Futch Jr.

As you head down Arnett Boulevard, vibrant colors pop from the surface of the tall, narrow panels that form the facade of the Arnett Branch Library. Images of book spines depicting illustrations of influential works of literature for children and adults alike, as well as biographies on local historical titans Frederick Douglass and Susan B. Anthony, wrap around each of the corners at the front of the building. Cultural touchstones abound, including such titles as Ezra Jack Keats's "The Snowy Day," Roald Dahl's "James and the Giant Peach," C. S. Lewis's "The Chronicles of Narnia," Arthur Conan Doyle's "The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes," and Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet."

Richmond has become known in the Christian world as a Worship Painter. As an Ordained minister Richmond flows in the prophetic through his work. He has studied hearing the "Voice of God" under the leadership of Bob & Kathy Campbell of Harvest Fellowship in Geneseo, NY.

In 2006 the Holy Spirit birthed A.R.T.S (Artistically Revealing The Spirit) through Richmond. A.R.T.S is a ministry that promotes the recovery of the imagination and creativity. This ministry allows you to practice and learn that art is a basic form of prophecy that God is restoring to His kingdom. Even though A.R.T.S is a Christian based ministry it maintains the ability to bridge the church and the community at large to serve as a catalyst in the process of social and emotional healing. In 2012 the concept of Revelation Rochester came about, and in 2016 *Revelation Rochester* was launched. Arts Center, which is housed at the Pillar, is where he offers free art workshops to our most vulnerable population. 



A message on behalf of the Arnett Library Community

Good afternoon. I am Susan Morehouse. It was my privilege to have known Richmond for many years for his community involvement. I knew that Richmond's faith was the purpose and power behind his life and his community endeavors. It was obvious to all that Richmond had a vibrant faith and genuine relationship with our Lord Jesus Christ.

In our community on the SW side of Rochester, Richmond is well known as the artist who transformed the Arnett Library. Over the course of several years he painted three indoor murals and numerous book spine murals on the outside of the library. Along with help from Ebony Singleton and Chloe Smith, Richmond painted book spines for familiar books like "A Snowy



Day", "Make Way for Ducklings", "Sherlock Holmes", and "Frederick Douglass' Autobiography" and many more favorites-even some local authors' books were represented. These murals took an ordinary library and made it a work of art and a unique and welcoming space. In addition, Richmond participated in the Arnett Block Party, setting up two easels so kids could paint with a real artist! He helped with School 29 visiting the library at Christmas time. He also was a key person in the Reconnect Rochester Complete Streets Makeover of the Arnett and Warwick intersection. This commitment involved months of planning. The sunflower and bubbles design was his inspiration.

In recent months he painted a large mural at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality and was on their board. This ministry to the homeless was close to Richmond's heart. At St. Joe's, House of Mercy, and Bethel Express he gave free art lessons, encouraging people to discover their own creativity. Revelation Rochester was his inspiration and endeavored to help people find their God given creativity.

Richmond felt that we are all Image Bearers. Our Lord is our divine Creator and made us in His image. Because of that, when we touch in on our own God given creativity we can experience peace, healing and a deep reconciliation with our Creator God.

When I heard of Richmond's illness and passing, I was sad to lose a brother in the Lord that I deeply respected. I was reminded of the Parable of the Talents. Richmond did not bury his talent in the ground. He wisely invested it in our community and city. I am personally so grateful for Richmond's life. He was a gift to us all!
