THE RECENT ROYAL DRAMA.

This month will be the most eventful of Queen Victoria's whole interesting life; even if she live the allotted life of humanity "three score years and ten." This month has already been the most eventful of the Queen's life. The month of May, 1839, will long be remembered in the annals of British history; and of all those countries of the earth whose interests are connected directly, or indirectly, with those of the British Empire. How little thought the little Victoria when we saw her some six or seven years since, just entering her teens, riding a donkey over those magnificent hills at Malvern, her mother walking on one side of her, and her uncle Leopold on the other, that before she had a score of years—just before her twentieth birthday, so many spirit stirring events should be crowded by her into the space of one short week; that she should hold in her hand and decide with her tongue in one short sentence the destinies of this great nation; that she should be rapidly petted, and entreated, and commanded, and censured, and praised, and abused, and sought for and soothed by the most potent men and women of the most potent empire on the globe, within the short space of forty eight consecutive hours. The whole affair, connected with the recent ministerial and parliamentary events, has been a complete Drama, in which the Queen has been bona fide the principal actor; although many have chosen to consider her a puppet, moving only as the wires are pulled by others. All the incidents connected with this matter are of a most dramatic character; and as none of our contemporaries have been at the pains to throw them into a connected and interesting form, we have been favored from authentic and even official sources with most of the minutiae and details connected with the recent events around the atmosphere of royalty, which we here subjoin in the correct order of their occurrence.

Towards the end of April, various events had occurred to render the Queen's situation peculiarly critical. She had suffered considerable mental anxiety from the injustice done to Lady Flora Hastings, and had taken unusual pains to make amends for her hasty and injudicious censure. On the afternoon of the 20th April, Lady Flora Hastings, being invited to Buckingham Palace, the Queen met her at the head of the grand staircase and greeted her thus: "Dear Lady Flora, I am delighted to see you; I am determined to enjoy myself to-night, and I sent for you to partake of a round of pleasure with me. I have been reading 'Chevaly' and I more than half like the spirit and action; and should wholly like the matter, were I not partial to Sir Edward Bulwer; I cannot think him so bad as Lady B. has depicted him. I am tired of reading we will walk the long gallery, dine and go to the opera." "I am pleased to find your majesty has had pleasure in anticipation," said Lady Flora. "I have pains in anticipation, dear Lady Flora, and why should I not have pleasure. My Lord Melbourne left me but now, and he tells me of trouble upon trouble; the rebels in Canada, and slaves in Jamaica—horrible—and quarrelling in Maine, and of the malice of the Tories and the spiteful things they talk and write about me; and of the Irish question, and the Indian question, and the Maine question, and the Jamaica question, and the Chartists, and the Corn Laws, till I almost wish there were no laws and nothing in question, and I was a poor little girl again, riding over the hills of Herefordshire without an anxious thought. But I don't care! To-night I will go to the opera. You will also go?" "With pleasure, your majesty," said Lady Flora. "That a dear sweet creature, I never ought to expect you to oblige me again; but I know you have forgiven me. This is a beautiful turquoise (taking a ring from her finger,) the dear Duchess of Northumberland sent it; I do so love her and yet she is my enemy!" "Your enemy, your majesty," exclaimed Lady Flora, with surprise. "Yes, she is my enemy; she is a Tory, and they are all my enemies. Lord Melbourne is certain that they wish me dead; but I'll live fifty years if it's only to spite them; ay, and marry some one who is not a Tory too; for Lady Normanby assures me that Tory husbands are great tyrants, and very false and unfaithful. I'll never marry a Tory, I'm determined." "Perhaps your majesty will never marry at all, like Queen Elizabeth," said Lady Flora, archly. "Perhaps not," replied the Queen. "It is possible, but not probable," and she burst into a hearty laugh, in which Lady Flora joined, as did Lady Normanby, who that moment entered the gallery, to announce that the Royal dinner was ready.

To the opera the Queen went that night, and rode out the next morning, the 1st of May, with Miss Murray, Miss Quentia, Lady Flora, Lady Creveling and Lord Alfred Paget. The queen wore that morning a rich Victoria blue riding dress, with a cap of the same color, adjusted like a turban; the elaps of her habit being of pure gold; she rode faster than usual this day, and was evidently under some little excitement relative to the grand drawing room to be held next day. (Tuesday, May 2,) at St. James' palace, and other matters. After returning from her ride, Lord Melbourne and Lord Normanby waited on her, and presented the message relative to Canada, which she read and approved of. Both noble lords remained to dine with the Queen, and did not leave the palace till at night. The queen set up till past midnight, arranging the routine of

her affairs connected with the drawing room, with the Baroness Lubow. Her majesty slept soundly and rose about seven the next morning. She walked out for an hour in the gardens—read till nine o'clock, and then breakfasted. After writing a note to her mother, the Queen put on a dress of white net, over rich white satin, elegantly trimmed with silver blond and white roses; the body and sleeves splendidly ornamented with diamonds and blond; train of sky blue, erape over blue satin, trimmed with silver lace, with roses to correspond. Head dress feathers, diamonds and lappets. Lady Normanby, Lady Clive, Miss Lister and Miss Anson, entered their carriages and drove to St. James' palace.

THE PRESIDENCY.

The late special election for an assessor in the 5th ward shows the state of parties in the city of Rochester. The Republicans are thoroughly disgusted with the insistent dictation of the office holders in this city, and will not consent to follow such leaders as the neutral and federal Postmaster, the milk and water Collector, and the scheming editor of the *Western Farmer*. In relying upon such men to lead the democratic phalanx of Monroe county, Mr. Van Buren leans upon a broken reed. The federal beneficiaries of the federal government, could not muster troops enough in the 5th ward, to get a ticket. The true democrats of the ward go for SCOTT, and the blind followers of the office holders voted the whig ticket. The Whig and Van Buren parties are both managed by a set of mercenary and unprincipled vagabonds. Too lazy to work—ashamed to beg—and prevented by the fears of penitentiary, from stealing: they make politics a trade, and fatten upon the spoils of the national, state or city treasury. The honest people will not consent much longer to be duped by these mercenary charlatans. We call upon the friends of the old fashioned Jeffersonian democracy throughout the state, who are now identified with either of the present rotten and corrupt parties to "come out and be separate." Gen. SCOTT is not the leader of a faction, but is an honest, fearless, incorruptible servant of the American people. He does not rely upon packed conventions or caucus machinery for support, but upon the spontaneous efforts of a free people. Let the friends of Scott throughout the state organize immediately, and prepare for a Scott electoral ticket in 1840. We can assure them the Republicans of Rochester are determined to vote a Scott electoral ticket and no other, whatever may be the prospect of success. We will have an electoral ticket in the field in 1840, and if defeated then, will carry the state in 1844.

THE RECENT ROYAL DRAMA.

The rooms were intensely crowded. The Queen took her station in front of the throne, and the first person presented was Madame la Comtesse Arthur de Potocka, belle sœur de Comte Woronzoff, by the Baroness de Blome, lady of the Danish minister. This lady soon after faint ed, and was carried out. The Queen returned to Buckingham Palace after the drawing room, and dined with Lord Melbourne, Baroness Lezzen and Lord and Lady Normanby. At dinner the Queen asked Lord Melbourne if he expected a large majority in the House of Commons on the Jamaica Bill. "Not very," said the Premier. The Queen was thoughtful, etc. but little, and retired early. On the 3d of May, the Queen rose before five o'clock, and sent for the Baroness Lezzen to consult her about going to Portsmouth to see the "Queen" man of war launched, which the Baroness persuaded her to give up all thoughts of. "I am very an'appy, dear Lezzen," said the Queen. "Why unhappy, your majesty?" "Because I have so many troubles; Lord Melbourne tells me I must publish a proclamation against the Chartists and the riots. I wish there were no riots." "Perhaps your majesty wishes you were not a Queen?" "I do very often, and yet it is wrong; I have the power to do much good, and I will do it. The Grand Duke of Russia is expected to day; I wonder if he is handsome?" "Report asserts he is," said Lady Lezzen. "We shall see to-morrow; I shall hold court to receive him. I wish he was not a Russian." "Why, your majesty?" asked Lady Lezzen. "Because all the Russians are friends of the Tories," said the Queen turning away.

About ten in the morning of this day, (Friday,) Lord Melbourne arrived with a proclamation against the Chartists and presented it to the queen. She signed it, and remarked, "I do this with reluctance, and now I do hope, my Lord Melbourne you do not wish me to do any more business to-day." "In your majesty's name," tenderly asked the old Lord. "No, but I must go to the Academy; Van Amburgh's picture, with the lions, is there, and I must see it. Come Lady Lezzen let us dress." The queen put on a green velvet dress, and with her suite drove to the Academy. Sir Martin Arthur Shee, ushered the royal party through the exhibition rooms. "There is Van Amburgh and the lions," says the queen, "No. 351; I should have known it, had I seen him but once: it is an excellent likeness, Sir Martin." "Very good indeed, your majesty; Mr. Landseer has been as happy with the human figure, as he is with animals," said Sir Martin. "Van Amburgh seems really very happy with his animals," replied the queen smiling, "but I think he might have painted me amongst the spectators." "Your majesty would have been out of place," said Sir Martin. "Not in the least," said the queen, with emphasis; "my place is in the midst of my people." Sir Martin bowed, the ladies looked at each other and smiled.

The Queen staid in an hour in the Academy, and then drove home; a crowd assembled at her arrival and departure and loudly cheered her, with cries of "God bless the Queen," "Long live the Queen." The queen was much affected and leaning her head on Lady Normanby's neck, remarked, "This does not look like a decline of popularity, which the Tory papers speak of, but I wonder if they would not abuse me if I was to do any thing wrong, as much as they now cheer me." "Your majesty can do no wrong," said Lady Normanby. "Oh, but I can," said the queen, "and I am afraid I shall before my next birth day. I wonder why there were no portraits of me in the Academy; I wish there had been. Miss Murray, I like those bracelets you have. Miss Lister, you look fatigued." "So does your majesty," said Miss Lister. "I am," said the queen, "and yet I feel as if I could like to ride to Portsmouth to-day, and see that beautiful ship they call the queen; I wonder what scandal that is about a Spanish lady and Admiral Elphinstone, which I saw in the 'Age'; do you know, Lady Normanby?" "I do not your majesty. I thought Lord Melbourne objected to your reading 'The Age'." "Ah, but I don't mind all his objections. Lady Lezzen brings me that paper every week. When was the Royal Academy established?" "In 1778," said Miss Murray. "How many carriages shall I send for the Grand Duke and his suite to-morrow?" "I would send half a dozen," said Miss Lister, laughing. "So I will," said the queen, "but here we are at home; I shall lie down before dinner; I have done a great days work; I have issued a proclamation; sent a message to both houses; written three letters, seen all the pictures, and invited the Grand Duke to dine to-morrow. I declare its no sinicure to be a queen." "Shakespeare says—'Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown,'" said Miss Murray. "I like Shakespeare, but he was not always right; my head wears the crown, and it lies easy enough." "It may not always, your majesty," said Lord Normanby. "It won't to night, for I shall lie awake, thinking of the Jamaica question. I hope the Tories won't triumph," said the queen, with a sigh, as she stepped out of the carriage.

That evening dined Lord Melbourne with the queen; his lordship was in excellent spirits, and ate heartily of *sautelets d'agneau*; the queen ate sparingly of roast beef; she drank three or four glasses of choice claret. "Who will intro-

duced the queen. "Count Pozzi di Borgo, I presume of course," said Melbourne. "Your appetite is good, my Lord?" "Not better than usual," said the Premier. "Will they divide on the Jamaica question to night, my Lord?" "Not till Tuesday I presume," was the reply. "I am glad of that as it is a respite," said the queen. "I shall have the grand Duke to dine with me to-morrow. Is he handsome my Lord?" "Well enough for a Russian, not enough for a husband," said the Premier. "Of that the ladies are the best judge," said the queen. Lord Melbourne bowed and took his leave. "Come Miss Murray," said the queen, "I have some drawidgs to show you; Lady Normanby, will you join us?" The three retired to the queen's private drawing room, where tea was served, and she retired to rest about 11 o'clock. On Saturday morning she did not rise till near nine, when she dressed with studious care, after taking nothing but a cup of coffee. She held a court in the new palace, and received the Grand Duke. After the presentations were over, she requested the Duke to try some of the horses from her stable and ride round the fields, which request he complied with. In the evening the Duke and the Prince of the Netherlands dined with the queen, to the mutual pleasure of all parties. The queen made great exertions to please her guests and retired later than usual, much fatigued. On reaching her dressing room, as she was disrobing herself she remarked to Miss Murray, "prince Henry is the handsomer of the two—but the Duke is the most sensible; but I could not love either. I shall go to church to-morrow and pray for the safe passage of the Jamaica bill. Good night dear Miss Murray."

"Good night, your majesty," said Miss Murray, closing the door, the queen slipped the bolt, threw off the rest of her clothes, jumped into bed, and was soon fast asleep, notwithstanding her troubles, hopes and fears.

Gov. Seward and family lately took passage in a canal Line boat from Utica to Syracuse. Weed makes a lame attempt in exchanging the matter, calling it "republicanism." To make the least of it, it is a weak hollow device, to ape democracy and catch votes. To see the governor of the Empire State, "born with a silver spoon in his mouth" riding about the country in a "line boat," or scow boat, is too humiliating not to receive, as it justly deserves, the universal contempt of all parties. We have now three living instances of men of high stations, rendering themselves, at least once in their lives, supremely ridiculous before the public. A tear glistened in her bright blue eye, as she gazed at Baroness Lehzen in the drawing room.

"I will not attend church to day," said the Queen, "my thoughts would be wandering too much; I could not pay that attention to the service I ought, and I will not make a mockery of worship; if I cannot set a good example to my people, I will not do the reverse."

"Your majesty is not well this morning," said the Baroness, "you had better ride out."

"No, I will read and write," said the Queen; "I ought to be happy, but really am not."

"Your majesty had better ride out," repeated Lady Lehzen.

"Well I will ride; but in the carriage, not on horseback. You will go with me, and Lister and Lady Normandy, but I must write first."

The Queen and the Baroness seated themselves at the same table, and wrote for half an hour, when Lady Normandy was announced.

The Royal carriage drove round the Bird cage Walk, up Constitution Hill into Hyde Park, up to the Cumberland Gate, and back down the King's private road.

The Queen was observed to be in most excellent spirits, and was warmly greeted by the people. On her return, she dined with three ladies, Lord Melbourne, Lord Normandy and Earl Uzbridge. The Queen did not remain long at the table, and although she conversed freely with those present, it was observable that the subject of the expected division was not broached. She laughingly observed to Lord Melbourne, "I shall be a grandmother on Tuesday to Lord John Russell's dear infant daughter. I wonder who will baptize me—I mean my ship, the Queen?" "I understand Miss Whitby will," said Melbourne. "You will be here early to-morrow my Lord," said the Queen. Lord Melbourne bowed, and her majesty, with the ladies, returned to talk over the affairs of the concert for the following evening.

ARCTIC LAND EXPEDITION.—Letters have been received, says the Boston Advertiser and Patriot, from Messrs. Pease & Simpson, dated at Fort Confidence, Great Bear Lake, Sept. 16, 1838, giving a narrative of their unsuccessful attempt to explore the residue of the eastern part of coast of the Arctic sea. The season was cold and extremely unfavorable, and they were able to advance with their boat only to a point three miles from the site of Franklin's farthest encampment in 1821. Mr. Simpson, with a part of the crew, advanced on foot 100 miles farther, to lat. 68 43 39, lon. 106 3. They propose to renew the attempt the present season, in hopes of finding a more open sea.

It will be seen by referring to the Advertiser of yesterday, that the "Wetumpka clique," have thought proper to institute a suit against that paper; but we have not the slightest idea that it will be brought to an issue. 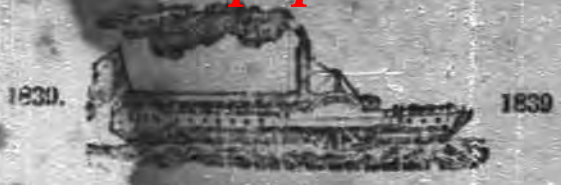

**THE RECENT ROYAL DRAMA.**  
(CONTINUED.)

On Monday May 6th, the incidents of the drama began to thicken. The Queen rose as early as six, and walked the garden till nearly eight o'clock. She changed her dress from a deep blue velvet to a light ermine over rich satin, and sat down to breakfast. Her majesty ate heartily, but left the table suddenly to attend to some despatches that arrived. She gave audience to Lord Melbourne about ten o'clock. The House will divide to-night my lord, I am told; said the Queen. 'I expect it will, said the Premier. 'About what time? Perhaps midnight—perhaps not till some hours afterwards.' I shall wait up to know the result, said the Queen. 'Your majesty's anxiety does us much honor,' replied the Premier. 'What am I to do if you are defeated?' 'Form a new ministry or dissolve Parliament,' said Lord Melbourne. 'I should like to dissolve Parliament,' said the Queen, with eagerness. 'I never have dissolved Parliament; I have opened it, and prorogued it, and have done all but dissolve it, and I hope I shall have to dissolve it.' 'I hope not your majesty, you might get a new Parliament more refractory than the old one.' 'We shall see you will drive with me this even, my lord.' His lordship bowed assent, and left the audience chamber.

She retired to her private reading room (a beautiful apartment at the south-west corner of the palace, fitted up very much like the study of Sir Walter Scott, and containing many curious articles of vertu) and sent for the Baroness Letzen, who found her with a book. 'Who waits for me without?' asked the Queen. 'Lord Byron is the lord in waiting,' replied the Baroness. 'Lord Byron waits on me without, and I wait on lord Byron within,' naively rejoined the Queen, holding up the 'Hours of Idleness,' which she had been reading; let us ride, for I am getting very dull.

Horses were ordered for the Queen, the Baroness, Miss Quentin, Miss Murray, the Earl of Uxbridge, and Surry Marquis of Headfort, and lord Alfred Paget. The Queen wore this morning, buff morocco boots, a green cloth riding habit, open in the centre of the bosom, displaying a rich white face habit shirt, fastened at the throat with a gold and diamond band; a worked lace collar lay over the buff velvet collar of the habit; a small star of brilliants was placed on the left breast a moss rose was in her bosom, a white silk petticoat trimmed with gold lace, and a small black beaver hat with green veil, completed her attire. She had an unusually rosy appearance, and wore her hair plain, put off her forehead, and a very petite curl lay close to each cheek. She also had long gold drops in her ears, and a small gold chain about her neck. All who saw her this morning declared that she never looked more lovely; she rode with great spirit, on her favorite white Arabian, and it required good-horsemens to keep up with her. She rode for nearly two hours round both parks, and was received with vociferous cheerings by the assembled crowds in her route.

On her return, Lord Melbourne, Earl Serry, Earl Uxbridge, Marchioness Normandy, Marchioness Breadalbane and Baroness Letzen, sat down to dinner with her. In the evening her majesty had a private concert, and withdrew to her drawing room about ten o'clock with entire suite of ladies, who were all directed to be in attendance, and who with the Queen, were exceedingly anxious to know the result of the division on the Jamaica bill; and all were more or less interested on this momentous matter. As we shall have to enumerate these ladies in the course of this article, we may as well do so at once, as, as it were, it will be seen, to a certain extent depended the fate of the country for the time being. The following are their names, their connections, and their respective ranks they bear in the Queen's household:

Mistress of the Robes—The Duchess of Sutherland, sister of Lord Morpeth.

Principal Lady of the Bed chamber—The marchioness of Normandy, wife of the Secretary of the Colonies.

Ladies of the Bed chamber—Marchioness of Breadalbane, wife of a whig marquis who received his peerage from the whigs.

Marchioness of Tavistock, wife of the eldest son of the Duke of Bedford, who received his peerage (the Barony of Howlands) from the whigs, and sister-in-law of Lord John Russell.

Countess of Burlington—Sister to Lord Morpeth.

Lady Barham—Wife of an old and consistent whig.

Lady Portman—Wife of a whig peer, who received his peerage from the present ministry.

Lady Lytleton—Widow of a whig peer, and sister of Earl Spencer.

Countess of Charlemont—Wife of an Irish radical peer, who received his English barony from the present ministry.

Mistress in waiting—Lady Gardner, daughter of a peer created by the whigs, and wife of a whig partisan.

Viscountess Fobes—Widow of nobleman who certainly was a Tory, but this lady's influence in Longford is given to the whigs, and she has late married an Irish liberal barrister—Nugent Vaughan.

Lady C. Barrington—Daughter of the whig

Earl Grey and wife of a late member of Parliament.

Lady C. Conley—Daughter of the whig Earl of Yarborough, sister of the whig Lord Worsley, and a wife of a whig baronet.

Lady Harriet Clive—The only conservative in the list, is sister-in-law of the Duchess of Northumberland, to which connection alone it is possible she owes her station in the present court.

Hon. Mrs. George Campbell—Wife of a late whig M. P.

Hon. Mrs. Brand—Daughter of the whig member for East Sussex, and wife of the late candidate for Lewes.

It was a curious scene to see this family party sending and receiving messengers after messenger to the House of Commons, relative to the discussion. The Carlton Club was thronged with eager Tories, about the same time, and the contrast was a curious one. At last midnight came, and on division—the Queen dismissed half her ladies—one o'clock on Tuesday morning came and no division—she then dismissed all but Lady Normanby and Baroness Letzen, and flung herself on a couch in one corner of the room. Two o'clock—a messenger was announced with the result. 'Fly Normanby,' said the Queen in anxiety, 'fly and get it.' She was absent scarce a minute. 'How long she stays,' says the Queen. She enters. The Queen was speechless. 'Your majesty has triumphed,' said Lady Normanby, 'your ministers have a majority.' 'Thank Heaven,' said the Queen, and sank on a sofa; 'by what majority?' 'Only five,' said the Marchioness, 'the skin of their teeth,' said the Queen; 'they will want to resign; gracious heaven! what shall I do Lady Normanby?' she asked; and bursting into tears threw herself into the baroness' arms. They composed her, and after writing a note to her mother, she retired for the night.

**THE VIRGINIA ELECTION.**

The Washington Globe claims a Van Buren majority in the Virginia Legislature. It cyphers out such a result by allowing the election of only two conservatives, and by classifying eleven of the Delegates as "impracticable whigs." Now, it is notorious that some ten or twelve of the Delegates were elected as conservatives, but the Globe claims all but two of them as Van Buren men. It is evident Van Buren expects the support of eight or ten of the conservatives elected, as without them he will be in a hopeless minority in the Legislature of Virginia. The question then arises, what grounds have the administration for expecting the support of all the conservatives but two? The answer is plain; Van Buren has abandoned the Independent Treasury! Do the Democrats of New York doubt this? let them look at the facts. The Richmond Enquirer the leading and most influential republican paper in Virginia, is opposed to the Sub-Treasury; without the support of the Enquirer, Van Buren could hope for nothing in Virginia; and the Enquirer did support him during the late elections, with all its power. How did he manage to get the support of the Enquirer? We answer, by an understanding the Sub-Treasury project was to be abandoned. Time will prove this conclusion to be correct. The administration had a clear majority in the Senate, at the late session of Congress. Why did not the senate pass a thorough Sub-Treasury bill, and throw the responsibility of its defeat upon a whig house of representatives? Such a course would have a plain issue of Sub-Treasury or no Sub-Treasury, before the people. But Van Buren dare not trust such an issue to the people of Virginia. We therefore proclaim to the people of New York, that Van Buren, to purchase the votes of the Virginia conservatives has abandoned the only measure that commends him to the democracy of the north. The Van Buren federal papers in this state may make a show of supporting the plan of an Independent Treasury, for the sake of keeping democrats in the traces, but rely upon it, the plan is abandoned. Thus ends the efforts of the patriot Jackson, for putting down 'monopolies' and 'reforming the currency.' Van Buren promised to 'tread in the footsteps' of the old Hero, but he has basely betrayed a confiding people. A Van Buren senate in this state rechartered banks, and permits the issue of small bills. The administration at Washington abandoned the sub-treasury to secure votes

in Virginia. Foreigners and old federalists are appointed to office; Florida is basely abandoned to the Seminoles; the Canadian patriots are left to the tender mercies of infuriated Tories; and yet Van Buren has the consummate impudence to ask the support of the republicans of New York! Alas! the "morning owl" has reach the nest of the eagle; the "laughing hyena" has obtained the station once filled by the noble lion. But there is yet hope for the Republic. The republicans of Rochester have unfurled the banner of the Hero of Chippewa, and under that banner they will contend to the last. The true democracy of the state and nation will join the Scott ranks, and the "Augean stables" will be again cleansed.

We visited the anory of "Walsam's Light Infantry," a few evenings since, for the purpose of witnessing one of their drills, and we feel bound to say that we never saw men go through their evolutions with more precision, not excepting the crack regiments of the British army, whose time was occupied by nothing else.

We defy any place in the union to furnish a finer display of men than our military or fire department. We should join one or the other were it not for our great aversion to cold water, cold steal, and cold lead.

"Oh! I am unhappy," said the Queen, "but I'll make more peers and I'll dissolve the house—should you think I'd better dissolve the house, my Lord?"  
"We will try its temper tonight first," said Lord John.  
"Well, do, only let something be done immediately—a new house or more peers, or something, or I shall go to Windsor. I must have action, action, action. Good day my Lord. I shall see you to the ball tonight," said the Queen, as she left the room leaning on Lady Normanby's arm.  
That eventful day closed this eventful drama. It might be said to have been wound up with a flourish. The house of Lords was crowded at five o'clock to hear all this story explained; but no explanation was heard. The scene was one of curious excitement. Every seat was occupied. The peers eldest sons crowded around the throne and the members of the common throng round the bar—all was still as death. A few petitions were presented; Lord Melbourne whispered to Lord Shaftsbury, and strange to say, he rose and adjourned the house. SCULL YOUR OWN BOAT—When I see a young farmer, mechanic, or professional man, loafing away his time in a bar-room with a cigar in his mouth, I think to myself—you'd better be sculling your boat.

When I see a young man talking loudly about government and gin, (or colonels and cognac, or cop-wives and cadet,) and giving frequent evidence of his knowledge of them by abusing the former and tasting the latter, I cannot help saying, (to myself, of course,) if you have a boat, you'd better scull it.

When see any person prying inquisitively into the affairs of others, guess at what they do not know, and put an unfavorable construction on the whole, I say—scull your own boat.

When I see a farmer at night patching up his fence by the side of his cornfield, and see him the next morning drive his cattle from the same field, thinks I to myself—his boat won't stay sculled.

When I see a woman going about lecturing on slavery, with holes in the heels of her stockings, I cannot help thinking—Madam, your boat needs sculling—very—much—indeed.

I see a young man mortgaging a part of the whole of his farm, in order to get money to pay a boot in swapping horses, I feel very certain that somebody else will soon be sculling his boat.

And when I see persons making a regular business of tattling, gossiping, tale bearing, and mischief-making and of back-biting, scandalizing, defaming and slandering their neighbors, on every occasion and in every possible manner—to all such persons, collectively and generally, and to each and every one of them, individually and particularly, I say, "scull your own boat."

SHIP BUILDINGS IN NEW YORK.—On Saturday last we visited the different ship yards in the upper part of the city. In all there are five large vessels on the stocks rapidly progressing. The keel of another is to be laid immediately, and the tonnage of the six will range, each, from three hundred to one thousand tons.

Brown & Bell are building one ship,	1000 tons.
Berghs do do	1000 do
Picket & Thomas do do	600 do
Smith, Damon & Co. do do	500 do
Berghs do do	300 do

Here are three thousand and four hundred tons to be added to our already extensive mercantile marine in the course of six months, and perhaps five thousand. Two of these ships are to be regular packets between this port and England, and the keel to be laid is also for a European packet. The others are for transient business altogether to run from this to some southern port, thence to Europe, and so on. In looking back, it is astonishing to see the vast number of vessels annually built in this city, and no ship builders in the world can compete with us in point of strength, beauty, and perfect symmetry of model. Baltimore built vessels have heretofore been renowned for speed but the palm now belongs to the New York packets. Witness the speed of the England, Orpheus, Independence, Garck—say, all the packets; nothing can compete with them—nothing can beat them. For beauty, the Rochester lately launched, far exceeds any thing of the kind we ever saw, and the shipwrights up town seem to improve with every vessel. Where they will stop it is impossible for us to tell.

There is one improvement which is very important and deserves particular notice—it is the windlass. In every ship built anterior to the Rochester the old fashioned windlass is used. By them it requires twenty strong men to weigh one anchor, but by the recent improvement adopted by Capt. Woodhouse, eight men can, with perfect ease, weigh two large anchors. A boy can also turn it easily, and a half dozen small lads can with the improvement, do as much as eight men would with the old fashioned windlass. The invention is very simple and in case of sickness among the crew, for in a gale of wind, it will be found of the highest importance.—Herald.

## GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

At the late charter election in the 5th ward of the city of Rochester, there was polled ninety votes for the Scott candidate. There are five wards in the city; allowing there are an equal number in each of the other wards, which is a moderate calculation, there are now 450 Scott men, good and true. There is in the county of Monroe 17 towns, exclusive of the city; say 90 may be found in each town, which will make in the county 1530, and it is less three months since the sun began to illuminate the political horizon in favor of the Hero of Chippewa. If such glorious results are produced in so short a time what may we not expect by 1840, when the question shall be asked, who shall be the next President?

We observe in the West Burying Ground, where the remains of Col. NATHANIEL ROCHESTER, the founder of our city lie entombed, a very ordinary marble slab, is erected to "tell the spot." Col. Rochester, was in his life time, emphatically a good man. He was one of the original purchasers of the ground where the city now stands, an early settler, and a good citizen, respected and esteemed by all. He devoted his best exertions to building up the place. Instead of holding on to his estate, like many other of the proprietors, to the great damage and injury of our citizens, he sold out to purchasers at reasonable prices, which encouraged building, and was no doubt the great first cause of the rapid and permanent growth of the city. We would suggest, therefore, that a suitable monument be erected to his memory as the founder of our goodly city. It may be said that the name of the city of Rochester, is a sufficient and unfading monument to perpetuate his memory. This may be true, so far as the name is concerned. But, the city under all the circumstances, is under infinite obligation to her original founder, for his liberal and magnanimous policy to the first settlers, in the sale of his estate, instead of being like many other of the proprietors, "dog in the manger," holding on to their property, without improvement, for higher prices, to the waste and injury of the city,—and we are persuaded, that all who was personally acquainted with Col. Rochester, would be pleased to have some suitable monument erected to mark the spot where his ashes lie entombed. This is the time to do it—in the age and generation in which he lived and died—and when his virtues are best known and can be best appreciated. We would suggest to the friends of the deceased, and to the Common Council to take the subject in hand.

We are now more fully convinced than ever that Isaac Lyon is nought but a shuttle cock in the hands of others. He has been driven into the course pursued towards the Daily Advertiser and the Sun, by those who have made him "screw his courage to the sticking place." Now that he has instituted a suit against the Advertiser, will he dare to face those whom he has defrauded, the Wetumpkians, that are brought here as witnesses against him? Never. He will quail beneath the glance of honest men. He will shrink from looking on the wreck he has made of some lonely widow whose heart and hopes he has trampled on by defrauding her of her little portion. His blood which courses through his veins, will become heavy and thick by the bare remembrance of "wronged orphans tears." POLICE—JUNE 17.

BEFORE JUDGES WESTWORTH, BARNARD AND TEMPLE.

FOR PRESIDENT  
GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

Our article in relation to the Virginia Election, and the abandonment of the Sub-Treasury by the Administration, in order to secure Conservative votes in Virginia, has called out the old federal and neutral Daily. It cautions the "Whigs" against supposing that the Sub-Treasury plan is abandoned. We have proved conclusively that Van Buren has abandoned the plan of an Independent Treasury, and as the friends of that Democratic and anti-Bank measure, we felt it our duty to apprise the democracy of the fact. The Daily Advertiser says that the Sub-Treasury is "the point on which the fate of the Administration rests." Well, they have given up that "point" and of course their "fate" is sealed. The federal Daily further says—"on the success of this measure, we place all our hopes of the continued ascendancy of Democratic principles." Now, the editor of the Daily knows full well, that the Administration do not intend to push the Sub-Treasury question any further. They intend to use it as a stalking horse, to keep them part together, by making a show of contending for principle, whilst the real contest is for the spoils of office. So far as the Van Buren and Whig parties are concerned, it is a mere contest between the ins and the outs—the office holders and office seekers. The Scott Republicans go for RETRENCHMENT AND REFORM.

SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1.

On Fitzhugh st., adjoining St. Luke's Church is a beautiful two story building, with handsome round columns in front, sufficiently large to accommodate two or three hundred scholars. The amount of taxable property belonging to this District, is according to the Assessment Rolls, upwards of a million and a half of dollars.—Great credit is due Messrs. W. S. Griffith, Dr. Reid, A. G. Smith, and others, Trustees and Managers, for their praiseworthy and laudable efforts in erecting the building, and management of the school. The building is an ornament, and the school a blessing to the city. The doors are thrown open to all, to the children of the rich poor, to high and low, of every class. To those who cannot pay, a remedy is provided. So that all who choose, can enter.

There are a number of Select Schools, in the city, which are managed on the same plan, and on a par with county District Schools. It is with extreme regret, that we are compelled to say, that the Common Schools system, upon the purest plan, as it is now managed does not meet the demands and wants of our city. During the last winter, a project of reform was started, a number of meetings held at the Court House, to consider and report upon the subject. Resolutions were submitted, gravely discussed, and solemnly passed. Reports drew up and submitted—Genius wit and eloquence were elicited, and men who before, had been mute and speechless upon the subject, outmastered. "Demosthenes or Cicero."—"So much for Buckingham." The whole matter ended in smoke and fury. The subject has now lost its interest, and the poor little Children, are doomed to go uneducated and unlettered. We would not speak in disparagement from present Common School System, as adapted to cities, but we must say, that upon this subject there is a criminal negligence manifested by our citizens. Even Prof. Taylor, some few evenings since, sent out by the state, could not command a respectable house.—When a Fantomine show, on ten minute's notice, would at any time, fill the largest house in the city. Such is the fate of our Common School System.

DANCING ON THE GREEN.—The 4th of July is to be celebrated at Northampton, Mass., with a rural tea party under a shady grove, with an address and music, and the merry dances; presided over by eighty lady managers. This primitive and excellent usage resisting the destructive march of steam over the earth's surface, and into the very recesses of society, has existed for 50 years.

Very late on Friday night, I received a note from Dr. Stroble, Physician of the Marine Hospital, addressed to me as chairman of the Board of Health, stating that there were some cases of Yellow Fever brought from Havana, in the ship Burmah. On Saturday morning I visited these cases at the Hospital, with him, and was satisfied he was correct in his opinion. Two of the men were in a low state and soon died; the other is convalescent.

Immediately I had the ship attended to, and the sick remaining, sent to the Hospital on Morris's Island, who are getting better.

I feel confident in asserting that no injury to the health of Charleston will accrue from these cases, and that our city is free from epidemic disease.

THE COLLECTOR OF THE PORT OF  
GENESEE.

James Smith, Collector of the Port of Genesee, and tail of the Rochester federal re-gency, of which Cock Robin O'Reilly is the head, is an inhabitant of the town of Mendon, a town that has been uniformly opposed to the Republican party, and where the *whig* majority has steadily increased, although opposed by the *consensus* talents and *jury energy* of collector Smith. As a moral and respectable citizen, we are happy to say that the character of Mr. Smith, stands fair, which causes us the more to regret that he should have suffered himself to be made the tool of selfish and unprincipled individuals, in sowing discord and distraction in the bosom of the "Great Republican family." During the "dark days" of anti-masonry, when the Republicans of Monroe County came into the field year after year with a county ticket, when there was not the least prospect of success, it was thought best to select such men for candidates as would not call out the particular opposition of the Anti-masons, but would enable us to bend our undivided energies upon the State and Electoral tickets. There are always attached to any party, a set of men, who by their inefficiency, and by the pains they take to be popular with their political opponents, are considered "good men to run as candidates." They are a party, what "chips are to porridge;" if they do no good, they do no harm. Such a man was James Smith, and for such reasons he became a kind of standing candidate of the Republicans for all sorts of electoral offices. He was run alternately for Senator, for Congressman, and for Assemblyman, and as often beaten by majorities ranging from 900 to 1800. The Republicans said "what a nice man Mr. Smith is—to be sure he never does any thing for the party but run, yet he is a Republican," and they voted for him. The Anti-masons said "Mr. Smith is a nice man; he is so courteous" and never says or does "any thing to offend us, except he will run," and they voted against him. But in process of time Mr. Smith became tired of the empty honors of running and being beaten, and asked for something more substantial. He was accordingly appointed a Judge of Monroe County Courts—then Canal Collector at Rochester—and then Commissioner of Loans, which latter office he still holds. We have no doubt that when Judge Smith resigned the office of Canal Collector and returned to the care of his mill and farm in Mendon, that he supposed his political services had been fully requited, and that he was disposed to repose upon his laurels. What a pity that he suffered himself to be duped into emerging from his honorable retirement, to gratify the personal feelings of a smiling and "courteous" but vindictive office-holder, who disappointed in his efforts to procure the nomination of Tucker at the city Convention, determined to wreak his vengeance upon those he conceived had thwarted his views! Judge Smith professes to be a democrat; did he ever ask himself candidly, "Do the democratic party of Rochester want me for Collector of their Port?" Did he know at the time he was privately sent for from Mendon, and closed with the Post Master and Public Printer, in the back room of the Post Office, that the names of nearly the entire democratic party of Rochester, were signed to petitions of other persons than himself for the office of Collector? Did he not know that at the largest Convention of city delegates ever held in Rochester, his name was not mentioned as a candidate for that office? Alas! we fear that the reports that the office was worth \$2000 a year (instead of \$900 the actual salary) was the gilded bait that induced the democratic judge to become the willing tool of designing and unprincipled adventurers, and to consent to accept the office in violation of all republican usages, and in defiance of the wishes of nine-tenths of the Republicans of this city. Never was there a greater outrage committed against the expressed wishes of a political party, than the appointment

of Judge Smith as Collector at Rochester. His appointment was unasked for and unexpected by the whole party.

It was procured by the fraudulent and impudent misrepresentations of perhaps two individuals, to the President. Those two persons must bear the odium of dictating to the Republican party the appointment of Collector. At a future time we shall tear off the mask from their hideous visage, and expose their mercenary and profligate political conduct to the indignant gaze of an abused and insulted democracy. We shall expose the vile conspiracy by which Judge Smith is to retire from the office of Collector and L. Tucker to be appointed his successor? In the mean time, we do not envy Judge Smith the task of contemplating the ruins of a party, thrown into confusion and nearly disbanded by a base intrigue in which he has consented to be used. In future years, he will often exclaim, "out damned spot"—"thou canst not say I did it!" but the ghost of the abused and betrayed democratic party of Monroe will tell him, that he was the poor dupe by whom the deed was done.

The appointment of Judge Smith, has opened the eyes of the Republicans of the city of Rochester; and it ought to open the eyes of the Republicans of the County and State. The Republican party professes to be more democratic than any other, and in all cases to be guided by the popular will. To consult the wishes of the majority, is the very essence of Democracy.—Mr. Van Buren had before him the names of four or five candidates besides Judge Smith, for the office of Collector. Hundreds of names of the old and unflinching Republicans of this City and county were appended to the petitions of these Candidates. He also had before him the proceedings of a Republican City Convention, showing clearly the popular wish, and not a single vote given for Judge Smith. But we will venture to say that not a dozen names were affixed to any petition for the appointment of Judge Smith—nay, we doubt if there was any petition at all in his behalf, except the letters of the two persons before alluded to! And is this Democracy? Is this consulting the popular will? Is this the democracy of the successor of the Hero of New Orleans? The man who appeals to Republicans for support on the ground of consulting their wishes? Are Luther Tucker and Henry O'Reilly, the democracy of Rochester par excellence? We know the Republicans of Rochester well to believe that they will follow the example of J. Smith, and consent to be the dupes and tools of men who have been party paupers since 1827. Judge Smith having been appointed to office in defiance of the will of the Republican party, is expected by the appointing power to do political duty. That duty is, in conjunction with the Post Master, to officer and lead on the party, against the Whigs. The Militia of this state elect their own officers, and would hesitate to charge an enemy, if led on by officers thrust upon them contrary to their wishes.

The Republicans of Monroe are old soldiers; they know their rights, and "knowing, dare maintain them." It is our opinion that Judge Smith sincerely regrets the false step of suffering himself to be used by the selfish and mercenary creatures, who obtained his appointment solely to gratify their personal malevolence, and ultimately appropriate his office to their own use. Had the Judge consulted his old and long tried political friends, he would never have accepted of an office upon such terms; procured in such an underhanded and anti-Republican manner, and in opposition to the wishes of the entire democracy of the city where his office is located. We look at the Collector "more in sorrow than in anger"—sorrow that so decent a man should prostitute himself to such vile purposes—sorrow that his salary is so much less than he expected—and sorrow that so good a "candidate to run" is forever used up! But "sic transit gloria mundi." The plotters of this rascally intrigue, are viewed in a different light. They pull the wires that move the puppet Collector, and they deserve, as they shall receive, the concentrated and burning rays of the Sun full upon their corrupt and rotten political characters. May the Lord have mercy on them, for we shall have none—Amen!

Nichols the editor of the Buffalonian, has been convicted on a charge of libel. The article with which he was charged, was written and published during his absence from the city, the purport of which, was calling an individual the tool of Hiram Pratt. For this, he is sentenced to four months imprisonment and a fine. We have men among us who have plundered a community of an hundred thousand dollars, who have robbed the widow and the fatherless, who have taken the little earnings of the poor laborer, which have been laid up against the time of need. Are these men punished? No. They are to be seen stalking abroad in the face of day, as if they knew not what dishonesty was. Oh! tell it not in Gethsemane they are to be seen in the midst of virtuous and pure minded Christians at the communion table partaking of the Holy Sacrament. Is the man who has spoken the truth to be incarcerated in a loathsome dungeon, while he who has trampled on all the earthly hopes of the lone widow, and taken the last morsel of bread from the orphan's mouth to escape unpunished? Forbid it God, forbid it Justice.

The news of Nichols being convicted for libel, must be gratifying to *Dei*side, after the trouble he has taken in connection with Hiram Pratt, to wind up the Buffalonian.

A Coroner's inquest was held yesterday, on the body of Albert Baldwin. A postmortem examination by Dr. Webster was made, which proved satisfactorily to the jury, that the disease of the lung, was and might have been hastened by a blow from some person unknown. Verdict accordingly.

FOR PRESIDENT  
GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

The Albany Argus contained the other day a long article, probably from Ex-Attorney General Birdsley, trying to prove that Gov. Seward is doing very wrong in turning out the present office holders, and appointing his political friends in their places. We have a higher respect for the talents and character of the Ex-Attorney General; but we think he could be in better business than abusing the Governor for ridding the state of the most miserable set of pensioners who were ever quartered upon any people. Men who have been in the receipt of thousands of dollars a year for labor, merely mechanical and which any competent clerk would perform for as many hundreds, who have not only grown "gray in the service," but have grown to fat and insolent upon these "spoils," that a "common Democrat could hardly speak to them without being insulted in return. We hope the Governor will make a "clean sweep," and we will do the same for him, when we elect Gen. Scott.

GEN. SCOTT AND THE NEXT PRESIDENCY.—The party hacks of Wall street are discussing the question of the next Presidency with great ardor and warmth. No man has any chance against Van Buren, or possesses the popular power to put him down but Gen. Scott, and if we were to put on the same ticket with him, John C. Calhoun, the present incumbent would be "distanced south and west, and therefore defeated."

But this rational course we do not expect from the rabid intriguers who manage the concerns of the whig party, and go for Clay to the devil. Mr. Van Buren has, therefore, the "vantage-ground" at the ensuing election—but for the succession, if we can put any faith in the general popular movements, springing up like the buds of May, among the people, we have every reason to believe that they will elect in 1844, for our term, and against all opposition—

TO THE MECHANIC'S AND WORKING MEN OF ROCHESTER.

We would call your attention to the intelligence in some of the Daily papers of this city, under the head of "New York Market June 15." By this you will see that "sales of Western Canal Flour" were made at "\$6.25 to \$6.50." At the same time the article in this market which is manufactured could not be purchased for less than \$6.50. By what kind of commercial rules, we would like to know, can the makers of the article operate, if they pay from seventy-five cents to a dollar per barrel for transporting flour from Rochester to New-York, and twenty-five cents for cartage, cooperage, and commissioned, and then sell for less price per barrel there than here?

If consumers here are thus to be galled by the manufactures of the article most necessary of all others for the sustenance of man, would it not be better for the man who has to depend on his daily labour for sustenance, to emigrate to New-York or some other place when the general rules of trade are not dogged by monopolies?

From the Philadelphia Ledger.

THE DAILY PENNY PRESS.—Of all the modern improvements for the general diffusion of knowledge, the daily penny papers stand first. Their origin will constitute an era in the annals of society, and, in their progress, they will change that aspect of human affairs.

Prior to the introduction of this improvement into the newspaper world, but here and there a family read the news of the day, and kept pace with the times; and those that did so, were deemed oracles of knowledge by the wondering multitude that listened to the second-hand intelligence which fell from their lips. As the consequence, the knowledge of passing events was very partially and imperfectly disseminated through the community, and the mass of the people were dependent on the few for information in which they were immediately and deeply interested. Here, then was a monopoly, an aristocracy of knowledge; a monopoly and an aristocracy far worse, in bearing and tendency, than a monopoly of privilege or an aristocracy of wealth; for to what impositions cannot ignorance be subjected by intelligence? What but the shackles of ignorance binds whole nations to the footstool of despotism in the old world? But we need not multiply illustrations. Knowledge is confessedly power; ignorance the bane of the social state.

Since the establishment of the daily penny press, knowledge is placed within the reach of all. There is not a family, not an individual, that cannot obtain the news of the day, nay, much more than the news of the day; for every one can take a penny paper, and every penny paper contains, or should contain, much valuable matter besides mere news. The result is, that the great body of the people are becoming readers of papers, and of news papers—are becoming a reading generation, altogether without a parallel.

Viewed in this light, how important is the aspect which the small papers assume. Instead of rating their consequence in direct proportion to their price, as is natural to those ignorant of the principle upon which they are founded, the role

is reversed, and they are deemed as much more important as they are cheaper than the more costly papers, for so much greater is their circulation and consequent influence. And this consideration leads to a conclusion of importance, that those who wield this potent engine, the penny press, should be men of *heads and hearts*. The conductors of penny papers, above all others, should be men of intellectual superiority and moral worth. If mediocrity or inferiority must be concerned with the press, let it be employed at the old one, the limited ten, eight, and six dollar press—at any rather than the penny daily. But for this let the highest order of mind be enlisted. Let genius, let erudition, let philosophy, let every thing that ennobles, adorns and exalts human nature be put in requisition, in swaying the mighty mass of mind that is moved by the penny press.

Mr. LAURIATT made a perilous voyage in a balloon from Chelsea on the 17th. The first move after the ascension was a drive against a tree. Five of the cords by which the car was attached to the aerostat were severed, and Mr. Lauriatt was in imminent danger of being thrown out. The balloon, however, was wafted on at a low elevation, towards Shirley Point, where Mr. L. endeavored to effect a landing, and letting off a portion of the gas, descended to the ground. The balloon was dragged some distance and came in contact with another tree, by which two more cords were severed, and left it retained only by a part of the netting. The Transcript gives the following additional particulars:

There was no assistance at hand, and the balloon, after being disengaged from the tree was dragged in despite of all Mr. L's efforts to stop its progress, into the water, and continued skipping over the surface, sometimes completely immersing the aeronaut in the water, and again elevating him an hundred feet in the air. There were several vessels in the bay which endeavored to assist him, but were unable to reach him. The balloon was driven some eight or ten miles from land, and Mr. L. became faint, discouraged at the momentary anticipation of a watery grave. In this perilous condition he continued until Capt. Paine, of schr. Fame, which was coming up the bay, discovered his danger and launched a boat, which was rowed to his assistance, and happily, the progress of the balloon was intercepted, and the aeronaut rescued just as the balloon rolled from the netting, and soared "free and unconfined" away, and was soon lost to view.

Mr. Lauriatt was kindly received on board the schooner, and carried to Gloucester, where he arrived about 9 o'clock. As he was very anxious to return home immediately, Mr. Mason, of the

Stage House generously conveyed him to Lyon, where he arrived at one o'clock this morning, pretty well satisfied, we hope, that ballooning is not the best mode of making gold leaf.

MORAL REFORM SOCIETY.

The ladies of Rochester belonging to this society, held a meeting last week at the Brick Church, to take into consideration important measures, to restrain licentiousness and criminal indulgence. The rigid enforcement of the laws, and the wholesome restraint of public opinion, which strike at private character, are by far the most salutary checks, that operate upon a depraved heart. These societies indicate a wrong state of feeling and sense of propriety, in a decent and well regulated Christian community. The very agitation of the question, shows a corrupt and licentious mind. If you would be pure and holy, put away evil thoughts. McDowal's Journal published in the city of New York, has been very justly indicted as a nuisance. Obscene prints are also, liable. Why not indict persons who unite together for the express purpose of indulging in *obscene conversation*? These things demoralize commonity, vitiate and corrupt the mind, without producing the object intended. We are disposed to go the whole length, in resisting the moral depravity. We would exclude from all society persons who are known to indulge in such practices. THE PRINTER OF U. S. LAWS.

Lothar Tucker, Printer of the Laws of Congress and of the Lists of letters remaining in the Post Offices of Monroe County, and recipient of the official patronage of a great number of political public officers, is an important member of the central "regency" or *trio*, that assumes to dictate to the Republican party, and to control all the appointments made within the borders of Monroe County. With the private affairs and character of Mr. Tucker, we have nothing to do; but truth and justice compel us to say that in his ordinary concerns he is governed by proper considerations, and that his moral and religious character is beyond reproach. It is with Mr. Tucker in his public capacity and political movements that we have to do, and we must be permitted to express our sincere regret that politicians are too apt to forget those principles of morality and justice, that ought to be equally binding in private and public life. Many a man who is amiable and upright in private life, and who would scorn to be guilty of fraud and falsehood, will perpetrate both as a politician, and justify himself by the odious maxim that "all is fair in politics."

Mr. T. came to Rochester in 1826, and established the Daily Advertiser. At that time an active canvass was going on for the Presidency. The election of John Quincy Adams in 1824 by a corrupt coalition with Henry Clay, and the subsequent appointment of Clay as Secretary of State, had roused the dormant energies of Democracy. They were determined to throw off the federal yoke, and prostrate the coalition that had violated the public will by the corrupt election of Adams in the House of Representatives. For this purpose they declared "war from the threshold" against the Adams federal administration, and rallied around Andrew Jackson, the Hero of New Orleans.

For more than a year after the Rochester Daily Advertiser was established it sailed under the flag of neutrality; its proprietor was blind to the triumph of federalism in the election of Adams; blind to the principles of Republicanism then almost hopelessly struggling for existence against the overshadowing patronage of the general government; and blind to the talents, patriotism and public services of the gallant Jackson! The friends of Jackson and Democracy in Rochester at that time were few indeed—they were struggling to effect an organization—but for a long year they received no encouragement from the democratic proprietors of the neutral Daily. That print however did keep for several weeks to fan the flame of the Morgan excitement during the winter of 1826-27, and was for a time considered an anti-masonic paper. The antimasons however, started a paper of their own called the Balance; and all prospect of exclusive anti-masonic patronage having vanished, the Daily resumed its neutral course. But the eyes of the proprietor were miraculously opened, and the beauties of Democracy and the superlative merits of Old Hickory burst upon his astonished vision.

Joshiah Sheldon, (an ancient democrat) and a few associates, were the oculists that applied the peculiar eye salve so admirably adapted to remove the blindness of neutrality. The "Monroe Republican" an old "bucktail" paper was offered for sale, and Mr. T. was urged to become the purchaser. He did so, and united that paper with the Daily Advertiser. The eye salve consisted of certain monies raised at Albany upon a note signed by Mr. Sheldon and several other gentlemen of this city, and endorsed by his now Excellency Mr. Van Buren.

For a time after this wonderful cure was effected, things went on well—but there were occasional symptoms of the return of the old disorder, which however were removed by a prompt application of small quantities of the eye salve.

Soon after the election of Gen. Jackson in 1828, the proprietor of the Daily Adv. was appointed Public Printer, and for sometime afterwards the principles of democracy grew brighter and bright-

er, and the merits of Gen. Jackson became more and more evident. At one time however during Gen. Jackson's administration, Mr. T. was so violently attacked with his ancient and inveterate complaint, that probably from want of timely application of the infallible salve, the Daily actually relapsed into an avowed and decided neutral paper, although the Republican printed weekly on the same press was made to send forth democracy in small doses. It was finally arranged that the party should defray the expenses of an editor for the papers, and the Daily resumed its democratic character.

We will now give an estimate, which we believe to be nearly accurate, of the "component parts" of the famous salve which opens the eyes of the politically blind, and preserves the sight in tolerable condition for a series of years:

Printing the U. S. Laws, lists of letters, and advertisements for government, jobs and contracts—per annum,	\$450 00
Advertisements of political public officers, Masters in Chancery, Clerk in Chancery, Surrogate, &c. &c.	600 00
Party printing, such as handbills, votes extras, pamphlets, &c. &c.	250 00
	\$1,300 00

These receipts are entirely independent of the ordinary patronage received by a political paper from its party friends and patrons. This patronage of the Daily and Republican commenced in 1828, and has been continued to the present time, say 10 years, which make the aggregate sum received in this way, \$13,000!

Is it wonderful that such a fortunate man should consider himself the very incarnation of democracy? Is it surprising that he should think himself the pet of the Republican party? the most disinterested friend of the dear people? and privileged to regulate and control all appointments to office? By no means. The only wonder is, that such a disinterested favorite of the democracy should confine his dictation to Monroe County, instead of exercising a supervision over all "Western New York."

The latter duty however has been assumed by an individual more "disinterested" than Mr. T., and of course possessing stranger claims to the "dictatorship" of Western New York.

Having thus delineated the political course of the Public Printer for a series of years, and glanced at the motives that may with justice be presumed to have governed him, we now come to the last "scene of the drama," the crowning act of political life. The showers of favor and patronage bestowed upon him for ten years by the Republican party, ought certainly to place him under some obligation to do all in his power to promote union and harmony in the ranks, and to exert himself to carry out the views and wishes of a confiding party. It has been hinted, that that the very liberal patronage bestowed upon him, should have been enough to satisfy the cravings of his avarice, if not of his ambition. When the office of collector of the Port of Genesee became vacant, it was not supposed that he would seek to clutch it, more especially as the Post Office had already been bestowed upon his co-worker in the cause of neutrality and anti-masonry. Moreover, Mr. T. did positively declare that in case a City Convention was called to nominate a candidate, his name should not go before it, and he would not accept a nomination from the Convention. But his name was used at the Convention, and used in such a manner as to produce discord and division, prevent a nomination and break up the Convention.

That such was the design of Mr. T. unless his nomination could be effected, there can be no reasonable doubt. And what was the cause of this recipient of democratic patronage, after the adjournment of the Convention? Did he leave the question to be decided by the President upon the petitions laid before him, signed by the thousands of Republicans of Monroe, and the other counties in the District? No. He operated secretly and in the dark, to thwart the wishes of the democracy; intrigued for the appointment of Judge Smith, a man whose name had been scarcely thought of; and aided by the Judge and the Post Master actually procured the appointment of the present incumbent. There is, there can be, but one sentiment amongst the Republicans of

Rochester in relation to their high handed outrage upon their political rights. It is virtually an assertion by this contemptible and mercenary jingo of the neutral Daily, that among the capable and long tried Republicans of this city, no one but Lothar Tucker was worthy of an appointment, and that a Collector must be imported from the town of Mendon. It is significant of the opinion entertained by Tucker himself of the views entertained by the Democracy, of his connection with the villainous intrigue by which Judge Smith was appointed, that he found it necessary soon after to sell out his press and retire from a station he had disgraced, by using it to brave public opinion, and control an appointment in a manner that could be expected only from unblushing federalist or a tyrannical and dictatorial Tory. That is a part of this infamous game for Tucker to succeed Judge Smith after the next election, we do not doubt. If he is successful, it will be but another experiment of how far the popular feeling may be outraged with impunity, by an administration professing to be Democratic.

For the present, Mr. Tucker has retired from political life. He has become an agriculturist, an avocation admirably adapted to enoble the mind, and to give time for serious reflection. Let us hope, that whilst following the plough, and contemplating the wild scenery and picturesque beauties that abound in the vicinity of his romantic retreat upon the banks of the Genesee, he may learn that the principles of religion and morality should be practised in political as well as private life. If consciousness of treachery toward political friends and visions of a betrayed, deceived and abused party should sometimes embitter his moments, let him remember that penitence will bring peace, and that the Democracy though just are always generous.

Notwithstanding the disagreeable weather, thousands assembled yesterday afternoon, to witness the presentation of the most splendid banner we ever saw, to the UNION GRAYS, by the Ladies of Rochester.

Wrigley—and if we don't make him "wriggle" to some purpose before we get through with him, there's no snakes. We have a rod in pickle for this chap, and some others of the same kidney—so beware!
