Extract from an Address recently delivered before the New-York Horticultural Society by N. H. Carter, Esq:

"Impressed as I am with a firm belief, that ornamental gardening is more compatible with the simplicity of our republican institutions, than are most others of the fine arts—that it has a more salutary influence on the mind and feelings, while at the same time it contributes essentially to the external beauty of a country, I feel a peculiar solicitude, that it should receive a proper direction, and become a more prominent object of attention.

"It is worthy of remark, that we first find man, pure from the hands of his Creator, placed in a garden, as such a retreat was most conducive to health, innocence, and happiness. Even the peculiar presence of the Deity himself hallowed the paradise he had made. His image there appeared and his voice was heard 'in the cool of the day.' And may not his footsteps still be traced in the garden—impressed on the daisy leaf and opening flower?—And is not his voice yet heard in the chorus of the woods, in the fall of the fountain and the whispers of the breeze?

"In every system of religion—Pagan, Jewish, and Mahomedan, and Christian—a paradise or garden is made the abode of the blest. The most prominent objects in the elysium of the poets were bowers forever green, flowery vales, pure streams, an air breathing fragrance, and groves vocal with the melody of birds:

—Locos Intos, et amena vireta.

Fortunatorum nemorum, sedesque beatas.

"With Milton's gorgeous description of Eden my auditors are doubtless familiar. He makes even the Arch fiend himself feel a momentary gleam of joy, in his approach to scenes, 'able to drive all sadness but despair'—a forcible illustration of the influence, which the charms of nature exert over the mind and the heart. Who would not prefer to gilded palaces, and regal couches, such a bower as that in which the Parents of the human race reposed?"

"Thus talking, hand and hand alone they paced On to their blissful bowers: it was a place Chosen by the sovereign Planter, where he framed All things to man's delightful use: the roof Of thickest covert was inwoven shade, Laurel and myrtle, and what higher grew Of firm and fragrant leaf: on either side Acacia, and such odoriferous shrubs, Fenc'd up the verdant wall: each bounteous flower, Iris all hues, roses, and jessamine, Keared high their fragrant heads, between and wrought Mosaic: under foot the violet, Crocus and hyacinth, with rich infly Brooded the ground, more colour'd than with stones Of costliest emblem."

Volcano of Kirauca.—Mr. Stewart, the American Missionary of the Sandwich Islands, visited the volcano of Kirauca, in company with the present Lord Byron, of the frigate Blond, during his stay at these islands.

"There are scenes," says Mr. Stewart, "to which description, and even painting, can do justice, and in conveying any adequate impression of which, they must ever fail. Of such, an elegant traveller rightly says, 'the height, the depth, the length, the breadth, the combined aspect may all be correctly given, but the mind of the reader will remain untouched by the emotions of admiration and sublimity which the eye-witness experiences.' That which here bursts on our sight, was emphatically, of this kind, and to behold it without singular and deep emotion demands a familiarity with the more terrible phenomena of nature, which few have the opportunity of acquiring. Standing at an elevation of 1500 ft. we look into a horrid gulf not less than eight miles in circumference, so directly beneath us, that in appearance we might by a single leap, have plunged into its lowest depth. The hideous immensity itself, independent of the many frightful images embraced in it, almost caused an involuntary closing of the eyes against it. But when to the sight, is added the appalling effect of various unnatural and fearful noises, the muttering, sighing, the groaning and blowing, the every agonized struggling of the mighty action within—as a whole, it is too horrible! and for the first moment, I felt like one of my friends, who, on reaching the brink, recoiled and covered his face, exclaiming, 'call it weakness, or what you please, but I cannot look again.'—London Paper.

Precipitate interment.—In the course of a discussion on this subject, at a late meeting of the Academie Royal de Medicine. Desgenettes mentioned that his relative M. Thourret, who superintended the destruction of the Cemetery of the Innocents observed a number of skeletons in such postures as to indicate that the persons to whom they belonged must have made exertions after they had been buried. A discussion has been raised on the most conclusive signs of death—such as the rigidity pointed out by Nysten—the state of the eye recorded by Louis, putrefaction, &c. In the resuscitation of persons erroneously supposed to be dead, accipulations of the heart was spoken of! M. Segales stated that he had not only resuscitated this organ to contraction in animals recently dead, by such a practice, but that he had exercised it with impunity on living ones.

THE ST. LOUIS (MISSOURI) OBSERVER announces the return on the 27th ult. of Gen. Atkinson, with the detachment of U. S. troops which had ascended the Upper Mississippi to check the hostile spirit of the Winnebago Indians. The detachment had come down in the short space of four days and a half from Prairie du Chien, a distance of 600 miles, in common keel and Mackinaw boats, and passed on to Jefferson barracks, 10 miles below St. Louis.

Before leaving the Upper Mississippi, Gen. Atkinson re-established the important and commanding post of Prairie du Chien, by placing four companies there, which were withdrawn from the post at the falls of St. Anthony.

From our Bogota papers, we learn, that in accordance with the one hundred and ninety-first article of the Columbian Constitution, Congress have decreed that a Grand Convention of Columbia meet at Ocaña on the 2d March, 1828, for the purpose of examining, and, in case of need, reforming the Constitution of the Republic: meantime, it continues, as well as all other laws, in their full force, effect and vigor, until abrogated by the said Grand Convention.

We also learn, that the 5th volume of the Documents relative to the public life of the Liberator of Columbia has just been published at Caracas; it embraces the period from the proclamation of General Sucre, to the Peruvians, of 29th March, 1825, to the reduction of Callao, and elevation of Sucre to the presidency of Bolivia.—N. Y. Cour.

The National Intelligencer says, we understand that the Secretary of the Treasury has been confined to his house for some days, by indisposition, and that he still continues unwell.

Mr. Meriwether, editor of the Lexington (Ky.) Gazette, has been assaulted by Mr. Holeman editor of the "Spirit of 76"—the former friendly to Jackson, and the latter to Adams. It appears that Holeman attacked Meriwether, at night, with a club, knocked him down, and struck him several times when prostrated. [Editors had better stick to their pens, and not permit the spirit of '76 to show itself in so striking a manner.]

James Steel, tried at Winchester, Va. for the Murder of Hugh Kennedy, has been acquitted after lying in jail three years. [This Mr. Steel has had a hard time of it.]

The 145th anniversary of the landing of William Penn, was celebrated on Wednesday, by the Penn Society of Philadelphia. At 12 o'clock, James N. Barker, Esq. delivered an address before the Society, in which he indulged in a retrospective glance at the manners and customs of the settlers that preceded Penn, on the Delaware; and made some instructive and amusing references to localities. We trust that the community will not be kept long in waiting for the publication of this address, which will be read with so much interest by all Philadelphia, and indeed every one at a distance, touched with the least spice of antiquarianism.

The Talisman.—E Bliss of New-York will publish in a few weeks a work with the above title intended as a Christmas and New-Year's present. This work is got up after the plan of the German Literary Almanacks, and in a different style from those hitherto published in this country for the same purpose. The Engravings are said to be done by the first artists in our country; and the literary department having been under the editorial direction of Mr. Bryant, the poet, there is little doubt of its maintaining a good station among the annual *Souvenirs* with which it enters the field of competition.
