The difficulties and delays in rebuilding the canal bridges in Rochester lately caused the Grand Jury to indict Dr. Bissell, the Canal Commissioner in charge of the Western section of the Erie Canal; but the indictment was quashed by the last court.

Dr. Bissell has done, and is doing, all he can, to remedy the difficulties occasioned by the removal of the old bridges for the purpose of enlarging the canal through Rochester ; but the restrictions under which he labors, owing to the law passed last spring for stopping all contractors from prosecuting the public works after the first of April, forbid him from doing as he might wish in this matter.

Until the present law is modified, he cannot contract for the erection of such bridges as are required; but a temporary bridge is now thrown across the canal in Buffalo-street, so as measurably to remedy the great inconveniences to which an obstruction of that great thoroughfare has given rise.

We are told that the contractors were willing last spring to erect a bridge at this point, if the city Corporation would have guaranteed ultimate payment by the State; and certainly, if such were the case, our "conscript fathers" should have been willing to "take the responsibility" to that extent, seeing that the public convenience and the rights of individuals suffered so much by the obstruction of that great highway.

MURDER AND ROBBERY. A gentleman from Lockport hands us the

following intelligence : SENTENCED-At Lockport during the last

session of the court at that place, one Douglass, for the murder of Mr. Cunningham in an affray last fall, in that village, to be hung the 30th of next month. Motion for a new trial has been made, as the Attorney thinks he has got hold of testimony to reduce the crime to man-slaughter.

ROBBED-Near the junction of the Tonawanda creek and Erie canal, a stranger who left Lockport some days before in search of a farm Yesterday (Sabbath) morning he reached Lockport in the stage, with his coat cut off at the breast where he had secured his money-(\$4,000) which was taken from him. He says several men seized and bound him; and then robbed him of the \$4,000.

# BANK EXPLOSIONS.

Wyman, the late President whose miscon duct caused the explosion of the Phenix Bank of Charlestown, Mass., is indicted along with some others who are said to have shared in the Shaw, late President of the Transfort, Bana Me., was tried at Belfast last week, on a charge of embezzling the funds of the institution .-TheJury could not agree-eleven for convicting one for acquitting. He will soon be hauled over the coals again.

The losses which many sustained by the explosion of the Lyons Bank may or should lead to a similar investigation.

THE SLAVE TRADE .- The London Shipping Gazette, speaking of the Treaty recently concluded between Great Britain and the United States, says-

Looking beyond the questions now happily adjusted, of pure relation to the individual interests of the two countries, we hail with heartfelt gladness the common resolution taken by the Governments to work hand in hand in the suppression of the slave-trade. The cordial co-operation of Great Britain and the United States may shortly and effectually wipe away this foulest stain upon the world's intelligence and honesty. The audacious villany of more ignorant, and hence semi-barbarous, people, or the more crafty wickedness of knowing but heartless scoundrels who disgrace more polished com-munities, will alike hesitate before they brave the vengeance of a combined British and American squadron. Union in such a cause cannot but cement the friendship of the two people who embrace it. THE U.S. SENATE .- The Senate now comprises 30 Whigs, if we include Mr. Rives of Virginia, and 20 Locos. There are two vacancies in Tennessee. It is safe to assume that in place of Mr. Preston of S. C., Graham of N. C. and Kerr of Maryland, Democratic Senators will be chosen for six years from the 4th of March next. Indiana is doubtful, but the chance is, that there, also, a Loco will be elected. On the other hand, the Whigs be elected. As we have seen nearly all the great fetes in that city for the last quarter century, we seized the opportunity of a spare day during our excursion eastward, to witness the glories of this last and greatest Jubilee-for the purpose of seeing the work itself with its reservoirs and fountains-beholding the immense and varied displays at the ceremonial -and comparing the scene with those prethe Canal Celebration, and on other occa- | ness."

It was indeed a glorious pageant, unequaled by any thing of the kind ever witnessed

on this continent. The Military and Fire Departments, recruited by companies from various towns and cities-the Societies of all sorts, mechanical and benevolent-the public authorities of various cities, along with those of the City and State of New-Yorktogether with all the parapharnalia of their respective corps, societies, trades and stations-presented a spectacle worth going a thousand miles to behold.

The weather was propitious-multitude poured in from all quarters by railroads and steamboats-and it is computed that nearly two hundred thousand people were present from other places during the day-in addition to the teeming population of the city .-The procession is said to have numbered about fifteen thousand persons-and stretched between six and seven miles-the last society having only passed the City Hall in going up Broadway when the head of the column arrived at the east side of the same edifice-the procession thus stretching thro' Broadway around Union Square, down thro' the Bowery, Grand-street, East Broadway, and Chatham-street! The whole line was thronged with spectators-so crowded in the streets, during most of the whole way, as to leave scarcely room for the passage of the procession-and every window and door, yea even in many cases the very house-tops, were thronged with anxious spectators of the glorious scene.

The ceremonial was remarkable particula-ly for the good order which prevailed throughout-scarcely a breach of the peace, or a serious accident, or a drunken man, having marred the interest of the occasion.

The work, whose consummation was thus celebrated, is indeed a proud monument of enlightened enterprize-prosecuted with becoming confidence through all the perplexities of embarrassing times-and showing what may be done for the public good where the public faith is properly preserved, as happily that faith has been preserved always towards its creditors by the City of New-York.

# A Chapter of all Sorts.

ALBANY.

Albany, like Rochester, seems to go ahead steadily in the march of improvement, notwithstanding the difficulties of the times. Those who have been familiar with the course of that city for some years, cannot fail to be struck with the evidences of prosperity furnished by the many comfortable dwellings going up or lately crected in various parts of Albany and its suburbs. The Argus alludes thus to the signs of the times :- "There were on Tuesday at our wharves, one hundred and seven sail of sloops and schooners, besides the usual number of steam, tow and canal boats. Much activity prevailed along the wharves, and there is a sented at the "Landing of Lafayette," at gratifying indication of the revival of busi.

Albany and Rochester were less affected by speculations and their consequent revulsions than most places of similar size throughout the land.

RETURNS OF ELECTIONS.

The New York Commercial Advertiser say 'the Whigs will be in a minority in both houses of the Pennsylvania Legislature." The Journal of Commerce says the Democrats "have carried the Senate by a majority of 5 or 7, and the Assembly by a majority of about 30. Last year the Whigs had a majority of 1 in the Senate, (counting Farrely as a Whig, and Smith as a Democrat) and 30 in the Assembly.

Respecting the Georgia election, the Y Commercial Advertiser quotes the following from the Augusta Sentinel of Oct. 10-

"The returns received since our last are much more favorable to the Whig cause. In the counties heard from, the Whigs have gained 25 members of the Legislature, and lost 22, ma-king a clear gain of 3. The returns for our gressional ticket are also more favorable. but not sufficiently so to justify a hope of the success of the Whig ticket."

The Albany Argus, in reference to the close ness of the vote in N.Jersey, says-"But for 25 or 30 votes in Morris connty, both houses would have been tied, and the Whigs obliged to make terms with their opponents, on the question of Governor, &c. As it is, the democrats gain two members of the house and lose one councillor-and the Whigs have a small majority in each branch."

From Ohio, the accounts are meagre=unu sually tardy-and the Rochester Democrat while admitting that there is a falling off from the Whig majorities, since 1840, of from six to eight thousand in nineteen counties, says that Corwin is a head : and " if he doesn't fall behind in the 54 counties to be heard from, why -he will be elected !" But the prospect for him is rather blue.

M. the flags of the vessels in the harbor were unfurled and floated upon the breeze. At 12 a national salute was fired from Fort Norris, and the "starspangled banner" un-fu lod. At 3 o'clock a select party of gen-tlemen sat down to an excellent dinner, at the residence of Dr. Day, the colonial phy-

# INDIAN MOVEMENTS.

From the St. Louis New Era, Sept. 30

Treaty with the Sacs and Foxes.—We learn from the Burlington Advertiser, that Governor Chambers, of Iowa, has received instructions to treat with the Sacs and Foxes for their title to the land which they now oc-cupy in Iowa. It is understood that the Indians are now willing to sell their lands, pro-vided they can be allowed to move south and west of the Missouri river, whither a portion of the tribe removed some years ince. Gov. Chambers is the sole commissioner.

The annuities due the Indians were paid at the agency about ten days ago. A census of the tribe was taken, and it was found that there were about 2500 souls, being an increase of about 200 since the enumeration last year. This increase had been made by a party of the Missouri Sacs, who had come to the agency a few days previous, and mingled with the tribe, for the purpose of receivsng a share

of the money. Keokuk and his band had induced the Mis souri Sacs to play this game, and had laid a plan by which he and his men were to attack plan by which he and his men were to allow the party, after they had received the money, and take it from them—thereby securing a greater share of the annuity than would otherwise fall to their lot. It was represented to the Missouri Indians that the Sacs of the Mississippi were rich, and were willing to divide with the Missouri Sacs, who were very poor, as an act o churity and good will Another census was taken-the number was found to be about 2200 souls-and the sum of \$41,000 was distributed by payment to the heads of families.

About 1500 whites were present; some for the purpose of securing the payment of debts due to them-others to trade and traffic-and others from curiosity? but the most numerous class went with the expectation of a treaty being held, and to see the country, in order to secure a good claim, should a treaty be formed.

The dragoons who were present had some difficulty in preserving order, and it is alleged, that they "treated some of the most respectable citizens with insolence, merely because their curiosity, or perhaps their interest, may have led them to visit the Indian country!"


