

Fireplaces Homey

Fireplaces rank high in the list of features most people in-tend to have when they can have a "home of their own". But the fear that the installation will prove a useless expense because of smoking or other evidence of poor construction prevents many people from including them in their homes.

poor construction prevents many people from including them in their homes.

Actually, assurance, that the fire place will operate correctly depends on a very few simple rules. Each fireplace opening should have a separate flue (adlitional flues for a second fireplace are easily installed at the time of building). The width of the flue should be at least one-tenth the size of the fireplace opening, the flue opening above the roof should be at least two fee higher than the highest roof ridge and there should be a damper and smoke chamber provided for each opening. Fireplace openings should be at least 3 feet wide, and an additional 6 inches chould be included when possible.

New types of circulating fire-places which can be build into the usual opening should be investigated for they are scientifically designed to provide the most efficient operation without smoking.

In many cases the fireplaces can be provided at only a slight additional cost. Placement of the chimney determines whether the same structure can be used for heating plant and living room fireplace two separate flues will take care of the ordinary needs. By including a third flue a second fireplace can be build in a bedroom above the living room or in an adjoining room. Often one of these two fireplaces can be arranged in a corner a particularly satisfactory arrangement for bedrooms where large wall areas are desirable for furniture placement.

areas are desirable for furniture placement.
In any room a fireplace that is flush with the wall is generally the most satisfactory since a fireplace that extends out into the room results in alcoves that are difficult to furnish and decorate at each side.
Firaplace fittings should be carefully selected to harmonize with the architecture and interior decorating scheme but it schould be remembered in selecting them that they are first of all fire "tools" and as such should be selected with an eye to usefulness. Easily cleaned surfaces combined with material and workmanship that will "stand the gaff" of frequent, heavy fires should be the first consideration in choosing these accesories.

Guard Cat From Cold

Cold wintry days lie ahead and asve their dangers to the cat as well as the human—particularly to the cat that has the privilege of spending most of its time in the house by the roaring fireplace or near the kitchen stove. Just because it has a fur cost does not mean that it may safely go from a room of 80 degrees F, into a snowbank for a frolic without paying the penalty of a cold.

Instead of trusting to luck that your pet will come out of the "sniffles" all right help him by using some of the treatments which have been found successful. Remember, your cat doesn't keep up on those things.
CHECK CAT'S COLD

CHECK CAT'S COLD

If your cat's eyes turn watery and he seems a bit languid, the chances are he has a cold. Generally, the nose is hot and dry and the nostrils have mucus in them. Give him at once a quarter of a five-grain aspirin tablet, and give this dose three times a day for two days.

Brush the fur on his forehead with oil of eucalyptus, so that he will inhale the vapor, and if his breathing is bad make him in-hale steam from boiling water in which you have put enough of the oil to scent it strongly.

KEEP CAT FROM DRAFTS Drop a little argyrol in each noatril twice a day, and if the throat is inflammed swab it with argyrol, using a swab made by winding absorbent cotton firm-ity around the end of an orange

dick.

Cats with colds should be en-couraged to eat plenty of simple food; raw beef finely cut up, lean cooked lamb, chicken, mut-ton, and boiled codfish; and non-starchy vegetables. If there is diarrhea, however, vegetables must be barred.

If the inavild's throat is sore and solid food is hard to swal-low, pamper him with beef juice, warm milk with egg beaten in it, home-made chicken jelly, lamb broth and similar dainties.

Colds are extremely contag-ous, and the cat suffering with me must be isolated from any ther cats in the family.

Sometimes in spite of all one's forts a cold will turn into neumonia or something equally grous. So if a cough deevlops, the breathing grows difficult, the fever rises, send at once or the veterinarian.

Cleaning Silver

One of the petty and annoying chores of the housewife is cleaning silveware. Of course, this would not be a problem if the silver were used daily or frequently and then washed carefully but in so many homes the prized pleces are dragged out for "company" only.

Tarnish is caused by certain gases in the atmosphere, and, in the case of tableware, by food elements coming in contact with the metal. It is a help to keep the silver in cloth rolls or boxes, but even then occasional pollahing is necessary.

Use a good brand of pollsh.

Use a good brand of polish, for one which has too much abrasive in it will take off the silver along with the tarnish. Never rub it crosswise or with a circular motion. A good bath in warm suds, a rinse in hot water, and after drying, a final polish with a piece of soft finnel or a chamols, and you have the brilliant glisten which is so desirable.

Aggregate weekly payrolls in September were about \$6,300,000 less than in the preceding month, due principally to the decrease in factory payrolls, re-duced to some extent by shut-downs for Labor Day.

930,000 More Workers

Miss Perkins said that employment and payrolls in September, as compared with the corresponing month last year, show a gain of more than 930,000 workers in motorbus operation and maintenance, dyeing and cleaning establishments and year-round hotels. These increases were offset by declines in employment in crude petroleum producing, private building construction, quarrying and non-metallic mining, laundries and brokerage and insurance.

"Retail trade averaged about \$2,300,000 more per week in September than in August from 1932-36 inclusive. This year the gain was \$2, 100,000. In coal mining, payrolls, like employment, advanced from August to September, but by somewhat leas than the average gain in recent years. "Employment in manufacturing industries decreased 2 per cent over the month interval, indicating a decline of approximately 19,000 factory wage earners."

"While the September index of employment (102.1) is slightly lower than the levels recorded in May and August of this year, it exceeds the levels of all other months since November, 1929, except April, 1937, and shows an increase of 5.9 per cent over the September, 1936 level. The government would have a very difficult time convincing her that it is necessary to stay where we can be hit.

One or two, a dozen or a few hundred wondering mothers, will not worry the government, but if the women of our country would awaken to the power that its is nutted forces and large numbers the government might find it easier to take its protection from private foreign industry than to explain to stubborn mothers who would give their all to our country if it were attached, but who do not feel that patriotism requires deliberately bringing a war upon ourselves.



Auxiliary Active In Legion Work

The American Legion Auxiliary in Monroe County boasts a membership of 1210, divided among 30 active units. The primary objective of each individual unit is the rehabilitation of the disabled man and the care of his family. Then, too, there is a special committee, called the Child Welfare, which

called the Child Welfare, which takes care of children alone. These are the auxiliary's private charges and every effort is made to see that they have the necessary food and clothing when disaster overtakes the family. Last year 36 children received approximately 80 weeks of health camp care, and it is estimated that that number will be nearly doubled next summer. In order to give the member, who is inclined toward community betterment and civic projects, her outlet thru this organization, there is the Community Service committee which is doing fine work; for women who enjoy atudy clubs, and book reviews, there is the Fidac club, which is primarily a peace group dedicated to peace endeavors between the ailled nations of the World War.

The Junior Activities committee, spreads a plan of operation over the entire twelve month period in which the juniors are instructed in the major objectives of the parent organization.

They meet bi-monthly in a body and separately on their own designated dates. They work on scrap books for hospitals, childrens wards, etc., and at present are undertaking an extensive Fidac program.

Outstanding among the endeavors of this county, is the Americanism Committee work, which gives the individual member an opportunity for community work, study work, patrictic endeavor and better clitizenship. This committee brought back to Montree County the state award for work of the past year.



Christmas is a fitting time for us to try forgetting our troubles—read or imaginary, and a little introspection usually will show that many of them are imaginary. Ill health, death of a loved one and lack of material necessities are afflictions not easily put out of the mind, especially on the eve of what should be our most Joyous holiday, and our sympathy goes to all who are carrying such burdens.

A petition from the trustees of the village of Rochester relative to an appropriation for "flagging the sidewalks in front of the Court House yard" was rejected as "inexpedient."

Steps were taken to punish tardy Supervisors when the Board began its fall session in 1824. It was voted that "all members of this Board that are absent at roll call shall pay 12% cents and for every half hour after that time 12% cents. That James Seymour be empowered to collect the fines. That Henry Fellows be an assistant to Mr. Seymour."

Short winter days and long sessions of the Board forced the Supervisors to provide artificial light, so, on February 23, 1825, they authorized the Sheriff to procure a lamp and oil for the Court House.

In 1825, the Supervisors authorized the erection of a County Poor House and that measure was the cause of considerable controversy the following year, as is indicated by this passage from the record:

Public Hearing

"Also to investigate and report if proceedings on the part of the Superintendents of the Poor House in contracting for the building have been conducted with fairness.

Nourishing Diet Builds Flesh On Underweights

Dr. Barton, well known health authority, writes a column for The Rochester Sun, every week BY DR, JAMES BARTON

When the overweight examines the reduing diet outlined by his physician he finds that the fat-forming food — starches and fats — must be greatly reduced; the protein foods — weat, fish, white of eggs — may be caten in the usual quantities; and the green vegetables — cabbage, lettuce, celery, cauiflower — are to be greatly increased to give "volume" or sie to the meals only, as these foods are not rich in food value.

However, when the underweight examines his weight increasing diet he finds that his instructions are to eat more of "all" kinds of foods—proteins, fats, starches, minerals and vitamins.

To build up new fatty tissues, the diet must supply calories food of heat units in excess of the individual's needs. To build up other tissues of the body which have been depleted or lost by prolonged undermourfshiment, large amounts of proteins, minerals and vitamins will also be required.

Hence, a fattening and up-

Hence, a fattening and upbuilding diet should be a high calorie diet which also must have sufficent amounts of "all" the nutritive and needed elements, but with extra calories provided by fatty foods, starches and sugars.




