The home of the Holy Family at Nazareth should be the model for every home in America.



Just as there are do's and don'ts about the care of silk, cotton, linen and wool, there are things you should know about the handing and care of every single rayon fabric.

First Step-Cleanability

First of all, it is important to know whether a given rayon should be washed, hand-washed or dry cleaned. In general, smooth-weave rayons, such as taffeta, may be either washale or hand-washable, while novelty fabrics, crepes and high style fabrics, in rayon as in silk, should usually by sent to the dry cleaner.

Spun rayon combined with other fibers should receive the same care as the natural fibers with which it is used. That is, a rayon and wool mixture should in most cases be dry cleaned, and a rayon and cotton mixture can usually be washed.

However, for best results, it is wise to know definitely; when you purchase rayon fabrics or garments, which method of care is recommended by the manufacturer. The use of labels and tags on every kind of rayon merchandise is increasing, in order to help women know what they are buying.

ROUDLY we salute the forty-seven former members of the Genesee organization who have gone to take their places in the armed forces of the United States. Forty-seventhat's but an infinitesimal part of our mighty army of nearly 6,000,000 soldiers, sailors, marines, and coastguardsmen. But each of them is a mother's son—somebody's pal, sweetheart, or brother. Each left a place in his home, by his fireside, and at the Genesee plant, that isn't easy to fill.

MONTHS before Pearl Harbor it became evident that an acute shortage of industrial alcohol might prove to be one of the bottlenecks of America's war production There just weren't enough industrial alcohol plants in the country to produce the amounts that were needed for lend lease and for our own defense program.

Five months before Pearl Harbor we at Genesee decided that we might be able to contribute to the defense effort by going into the production of industrial alcohol, which is somewhat akin to our company's regular business. Remem ber, in those days we were talking and thinking about "defense" and how America could be kept out of war.


So in July, 1941, with the "blessing" of O.P.M., we started. Almost before you could say C.H.OH we found we were in the industrial alcohol business—a business, may I add abusiness.may I add, about which we soon found we knew very little. But we learned.

With no contract for the sale of the product, and with very little realization of the production problems involvedwork. A plant had practically to be rebuilt. Materials and equipment were hard to get. With O.P.M. prodding us for speed and more speed, thousands of dollars were poured into reconditioning and remodeling. It took a lot of courage, for we were entering a brand new field.

Then came December 7, 1941, and Pearl Harbor. Our months of preparation had not been in vain. The alcohol we were able to produce was now *desperately* needed. In another six weeks we were in full production—becoming the first concern in our line of business to go "all out for war and victory."

"Got A Minute . . . To Listen To A Guy From Home?"

Rochester's my home. I was born down in the Tenth Ward. I went to John Marshall. I used to belong to a Scout troop at my church . . . and I learned to swim at the Maplewood "Y."

When my kid sister was siek with infantile paralysis – they took wonderful care of her at St. Mary's, and down at the Convalescent Hospital. When she came home there was a Visiting Nurse at the house nearly every day. That's why she can walk just as good as ever now...

I'm hoping to get back to Rochester all in one piece. And I don't want Rochester to get crippled and smashed up in this war either.

I want it to be the same kind of a friendly and helpful town that I remember. The kind of a town I'm fighting for. The Nazis and Japs would be glad to see you folks forget your neighbors. They'd be glad to kill the things that are *inside* us Americans. The good things. The things that make you care for the blind and the crippled and the sick. That make you help us fellows with your USO. That make you send food and clothes and medicine to China, Russia, England, Greece,

If you let the Japs and Nazis kill those things . . . then I'm just wasting my time out here, that's all.

I've got a fighting job to do. And so have you. And it's going to take the best I've got, and the best that you've got, to beat the thing we're fighting now. Let's get together on our fighting jobs . . , me out here, and you back home!



The new ceil-ing prices placed on a wide va-riety of commodities — 240 in Rochester and Monroe County, to be exact—are an attempt to hold the line against further in-creases, and in some cases mean a lowered cost. The housewife has a new responsibility, for the enforcement of these ceilings is squarely up to her. Hers not only to reason why, hers to do and to keep doing. What to do? Eternal vigilance may be the price of peace; it's no less a fac-tor in the control of price. So, Mrs. Housewife must clip the lists of price ceilings from the hewspapers, watching these as they change from time to time, and to compare them with the prices charged by her grocer. Violations should be reported to the Ration Board at No. 12 School. And before the lady of the house grumbles at one more food problem she should stop and consider how much more serious would be the problem of runaway prices. By this time the intelligent housekeeper should have ac-quired some skill in budgeting points, so that she doesn't feed her family steak and chops all one week only to find herself without butter the next. She considers her supply of points before gathering up canned goines, she doesn't keep a long line of customers waiting while she rearranges all her pur-chases. And she remembers that if point values and ceiling prices are a headache for her, they are a headache multiplied many times for the grocer and butch-erion on her part are a prime requisite these days.
