## Figures Show Retailers Not To Blame For HCL

If anyone still thinks that the retailers of the country ar responsible for high prices-and the sporadic picketing of stores by consumers indicate that many do-they should study the facts
and think again.

Several large food chains have published simplified reports on their operations. These show that, after all the costs of doing business are paid, the profit remaining on each dollar of sales is bine cents goes for sapplies, taxes, wares, rents, and so on down the list.

Now a retailers' association has issued a release on the experi ence of department and specialty stores, including both chains and independents, during the first half of this year. Yet net profits, after estimated taxes, were only 2.9 per cent of net sales, as compared with 3.4 per cent in the 1947 period. The reason is a simple one-expenses have kept on climing, due to factors beyond re tailing's control, and have taken their toll in profits.

The meaning of this to the consumer is certainly clear. If the stores made no profit, and worked on a straight break-even basis, the possible cuts in prices would be microscopic. It is a fact that retailing, taking it as a whole, is working on a smaller profit margin now than in OPA days. It is also a fact-borne out by a Congressional investigation-that retailing has been amaxingly
free of profiteering. So don't blame the storekeeper for a condifree of profiteering. So do

No matter who wins the elections, for one thing be prepared: there'll be the fight of fights over maintenance of rent ceilings when the present control law comes up for renewal Mar. 31 .


No matter what other prices decline, the trend of
city rents is still upward. And city rents will rise whether nominee Truman or nominee Dewey becomes President.
They will rise whether the lobbies for the landlords or for the tenants are victorious in the rent control war ahead.

Since the war's end, the real estate lobbies have been furiously attacking this restraint on their operations and profits. And they on their operations came perilously to victory this past spring; rent ceilings - with modifications were extended for only one year.
Now spokesmen for the Nat1. Assn. of Real Estate Boards and for the Natl. Assn. of Home Builders - both among Washington's most powerful lobbies - are making it unmistakably clear that they expect to smash this last big war control into oblivion in the 81st Congress.
They have publicly announced their hopes. They are circularizing their members and supporters in and out of Washington with
elaborate outlines of their plans. They are lining up votes in Congress; they are lining up sympathizers out of Congress.

of entertainers running all the way from Wallaceites to Menjou's impeccable RepubWalaceites to Menjous' impeccable Repub-
licanism. As far as they're concerned they're geeting out the biggest vote ever cast-from $55,000,000$ to $60,000,000$.

But the AFL leadership is investing its money, energy and falent in the hope that it can stop Gov. Dewey just this side of the goal line.
If they can't stop Dewey, the labor mae-

But it hasn't been "normal" for quite awhile. And it looks ike it will be a long long time before it becomes "normal
The Democrats added an assembly seat, a state senator post, and copped the County Children's Court Judgeship. post, and copped the couspapers between New York and Buffalo, only The Rochester SUN, the New York STAR, the Glens Falls POST-STAR and the Catskill MAIL, gave President Truman a chance. And even with those papers, he was given only the barest edge.
Even the highly popular 40th District Representative Kenneth B. Keating saw his 1946 plurality of 29,531 shrink to neth
4,852 .

In the city where The SUN circulation is concentrated, George Rogers, Democrat piled up a lead of 10,878 over his Republican opponent. Rogers was hampered by illness and was unable to campaign actively. Had he been able to get out around the county, there is little doubt he would join the Democratic majority in Congress.
"The old order changeth" and a heedless local administration was repofted as much concerned with the trend of events. Whether or not such concern will be more than momentary is a matter of conjecture. Observors feel the local GOP will continue on its wilfully egotistical way until tested in the eity election next year, Many leaders feel that by that City it will be much too late. The County of Monroe and the City of Rochester have already shown they want a change in picture much more than they do on the national scene.

If Little Ft. Erie Can Finance War Memorial-Why Can't Big Rochester?
The SUN simply can't get it's editorial eye off that fading Rochester War Memorial Sports Arena.

Particularly when we hear what is happening in the little Canadian city of Fort Erie-a few miles across the border from uffalo
Fort Erie's city fathers faced exactly the same problem as the one posed for the local boys on their war memorial arena-not enough money raised by popular subscription to build it. Rochester's bigwigs threw up their hands when they found a mere $\$ 1,700,000$ in their fund. But the Fort Erie city government decided to do something about it.

Before the end of this year, the Ganadian municipality will have a sports arena, tailored to the needs of the town. Our
Republican "do-nothing" Council ought to see how it was done.

## Here is what happened:

Fort Erie had an arena up to winter of 1938. You will recall how a heavy snow forced the roof to collapse. The advent of war held up plans for rebuilding.

But earlier this year, someone proposed a compaign to raise funds for the purpose, with the idea of making it into a War Memorial.

The subscription campaign raised only $\$ 30,000$.
The cost of reubilding was estimated at $\$ 105,000$.
It didn't remain a problem long in Fort Erie. The Council met and decided to appropriate the remaining $\$ 75,000$ and then operate the arena. Because that city government, unlike Rochester's, realized that the building was necessary and an important service to its people.

Now the new arena is virtually complete and will open its doors to indoor athletic, musical and other events before January 1, 1949.

In order to be certain that it will be operated properly, Fort Erie has already hired Sig Smith, popular sportscaster for Station WGR in Buffalo, as general manager.

A SUN reporter talked to Smith this week and learned that he plans to bring amateur hockey into the sports palace at the start. He will also have the Buffalo Bisons' hockey team there for practice sessions. The big event of the seaton will be one o the important ice shows.

Later, Smith expects to stage fight programs, roller skating, indoor tennis and, perhaps, basketball. The emphasis on ice sports, he explained, is due to the sports tastes of Canadian residents.

But, he pointed out, the seating capacity for ice hockey will be a comfortable 2,200 -undoubtedly many more for fights o other sports that require less floor space for the contestants.

Those details are, of course, interesting to sports lovers.
What is most important about this venture, however, is the fact that a small city like Fort Erie, with nothing like Rochester

Tom Broderick, the Czar of Irondequoit, Rochester and Monroe County, apparently doesn't think a War Memorial Arena for this city is very important. One word from him would have the City Council turning handspringe to find the money necessary to bring us the long-awaited structure.

But then, Tom isn't greatly interested in sports.
After all, you can play all the politics you want to in a new town hall-one like the planned $\$ 500,000$ G. O. P. "headquarters in Broderickville.

It will not have any room for sports. But there will be plenty of back rooms-for smoke, talk and political stratagem.

## Let It Be A Lesson To Mr. Keating

The victory of Keating, a blow to local Demoorats and labor folks, might have been different had Rogers been able to wage a more vigorous campaign. Keating, sensitive to election returns and opinions is quite likely to make an effort to serve his entir constituency with less bias.

## Because The Sun Is Here

When The SUN announced it would become a full-fledged newspaper last April, it was freely predicted in many quarters papers. Competition breeds quality; newspaper competition papers. Competition breeds
brings journalistic enterprise.
That those predictions were based on fact is being proved daily. Never more clearly than last week when The SUN first cold its readers, not only that a member of the Board of Educa-
tion was being demoted, but, of interest to thousands, the reaeons behind the board's action.

If it had not been for The SUN and its adherence to the code that it is a newspaper's duty to report facts, regardless of
whose toes are stepped on, Rochester newspaper readers would etill be wondering why the Board of Education pursued the course it did.

The story of Coach O'Brien's demotion from one of the leading high schools to two grammar schools was not meant to be that, bocause he is a nice fellow, and because of the possible risk to his pension rights, the story would be suppressed. It was agreed that, abiding by the dictate of the superintendent of
schools, the story would not be released at all until Nov. 12, and then only the bare announcement that the coaching posts had been changed would be given.

But The SUN entered into no such suppression of people. It knew that the story was news. It knew that thousands of people
in the city had heard various versions of the story; some knew all of it; most knew some of it. But not until The SUN printed Lhe facts was the mystery cleared up.

Right after the most recent newspaper strike in Rochester, the two dailies editorially said that the newspapers were missed. Rumor and gossip abounded in place of authentic, responsible reporting of the news in the daily press. Therefore, it would seem to behoove newspapers to print all this news when they are pub-
lishing it for no othe rreason than to squelch the "rumors and lishing it for no othe rreason than to
gossip" to which they earlier referred.

As a result of The SUN's actions, the two daily newspapers, of necessity, beat a hasty retreat, and the story belatedly appeared in their columns, substantially as it had earlier appeared in this

The SUN has helped daily newspapers to get more news in other instances, too. Many a story that would not otherwise have seen the light or printers' ink has been published in the daily newspapers, because their editors knew that The SUN was "on
the story," gathering the facts and preparing to publish them. In their efforts to "beat" their newfound competition, they haven't dared take many chances of suppressing stories, only to see them turn up in The SUN.

So, while it is a fact that the news columns of the two daily newspapers are oftentimes tailored in the business office and in
the high level hierarchy of the Gannett press, it is also true thet the high level herarchy of the Gannett press, it is also true that
they have performed their task of informing the people better during the last half of 1948 than since the short lived Rochester Evening News went out of business in 1939.

Perhaps that is why the efforts of this newspaper to reflect public opinion, as well as to mould it, is meeting with the hearty approval of so many people-whatever their political beliefs, courage. They also approve of the salutory effect The SUN has had on its daily newspaper competition.

## Atom Bomb Chief Will Speak Here

Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, atom bomb developer, and Sumner Welles, former under secretary of state, will be among speakers at a day-long forum here Dec. 11 devoted to international affairs and prospects for peace.

Twenty-six civic and community organizations are supporting the City Club, the Foreign Policy Association, and the United Nations Association,
sponsors of the event. It will open with a luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce and conclude with an evening session at the Eastman Theater.
Oppenheimer is the 44 -year old builder of the atomic bomb and a staunch advocate of international control of atomic energy. Long regarded as one of the world's outstanding theoretical physicists, he sprang to public notice after the Hiroshima bombing when it was its inception in 1943, the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, at which the bomb was de veloped. Now head of the Ins titute for Advanced Study Princeton, N. J., he recently returned from

A career diplomat for more than 18 years, Mr. Welles en tered the Department of State in 1915, became its leading authority on Inter-American affairs, and served six years as under secretary of state. He accompanied President Roosemet at sea with Prime Minister Churchill to draft the Atlantic Charter. And it's only when you get your grip on the figures - imagine eating, clothing and sheltering yourself on less than $\$ 25$ a month that you recog done at once.

One of President Truman's first requests to the new Congress in January will involve expansion of our Social Security system and an increase
bere state.

This was among his last proposals to the 80th Congress. This was a pledge in the Democratic platform and a major issue in Truman's campaign. This was on Candidate Dewey's agenda too.

It will be proposed, then. And the prediction in Washington is the changes will get through Congress with relative ease. Well, as one of the millions who has and who has had confidence in the system's worth, I say the overhaul can't come too soon.

It seemed a mighty advance back in 1935 when our Congress approved the Social Security Act.

Since then, rising prices have hacked at the value of our dollar - slashed into the purchasing power of savings, pensions, insurance. And unless $w$ ecollapse into a catastrophic depression, we'll never see the dollar at 1935 's values again.

And singe the mid-30's, the inequities and limitations within the Social Security
system have become glaringly apparent system have become glaringly apparent.

Either our Social Security system really is a first line defense against want, really is a base for other insurance, savings and investments - or it shouldn't exist at all.
What was adequate in 1935 is not adequate in 1948. Not to a shocking, painful extent.

Their purpose is to prevent the creation of a situation like that which exists in recorded music. It has long been the contention of the musicians union that the use of recorded music has reduced the earnings of music lans and has resulted in unemployment for many of them The Screen Actors Guild feels the same way. They contend that unless the use of films is regulated by collective bargaining contracts, the thousands of movies made for teievision will depress actors wages, and reduce their employment.
And in that stand by the actors guild lies trouble for the small city television stations. Obviously, station owners in a city the size of Rochester cannot hope to present a great many "live television shows, outside the field of sports, news and other special events. Their big hope has been the widespread use of movies produced exclusively for use in television. Now comes the action of the Screen Actors Guild, bring ing up the old, old question, argued so long by James Pel rillo of the musicians union, as to whether a labor organiza tion should have control of its product after that product has been put on film or on re-

The Bureau has worked out come new systems for investigating returns that should cluse a number of holes in our prisent tax-enforcement machinery.
From now on, the "T-Men" will go over more of our tax returns than ever before.
Under the new system, even apparently accurate returns will be scrutinized. The aim is to uncover not only deliberate fraud but also ways of unintentional tax evasion.
The Treasury will ask the next Congress for sufficient funds to finance the new drive on tax chiselers.
And there is every indication it will get the appropriations it asks for this purpose.
Beginning Jan. 1st, the Bureau will divide responsibilities more evenly between the cen-

The ideal room for indoor flower gardening should be light and eiry, free from gas fumes; it should have a uniform temperature of 65 degs. and be sufficiently sunny. Here a few bulbs that can your home:

HYACINTHS: AM types adapt themselves to house culture. Bulbs should be planted in well-dampened peat moss, and stored away in a dark clothes closet. Keep well watered. In 2 or 3 months bring out into a lighted, sunny window and they will flower for you without much trouble.
AMARYLLIS: Flowers easHy in the home. Few plants handle as easily either in the flowering the plant needs a soil of fibrous loam, leafmold, and sand, with liquid manuring during the blooming season. Gambling is not okayed from the top down. It begins at the bottom and surges up like a gusher. Occasionally it may be "rough and tumble," which means that all player have an opportunity to deal and the house takes a cut every time the deal changes hands.
Joe subscribes to a number of "form" and tip sheets, the Daily Racing Form and the New York Telegraph. Customers are thus kidded into consensus and form playing.
Joe has a few telephones installed and if his standing is high enough, he gets "wire service" which gives off with a hoofbeat-by-hoofbeat account of every race, opening and closing odds, etc.

Naturally, the type of tree to select depends upon the georaphical territory in which you live. In this territory, four groups of evergreens commoniy used for Christmas trees are the pines, spruces, firs and bemlocks. of these, the hembock is least desirable because of its tendency to shed needles quickly.
Pines are increasing in popularity and have the advantage of bolding their netdles well. Some may object to the Pine's tendency to be too open, and coraggly. The Scotch Pine is cause it is more compact
The spruces have long been tavorite Christmas trees because of their compact, bushy growth and conical shape. The Norway Spruce, with its long, dark, lustrous green needles has the disadvañtage of losing its toliage quickly-especially if the tree is jarred or brushed against. The White Spruce (or at spruce due to an alleged unpleasant odor given off by it when brought indoors) ceems to lose its needles less quickily. Fir is the ideal Christ-
The mas tree, resembling the Spruce except that the needles are not sharp pointed. The Fir has been revered for the greatest number of years and its superior holding quality of the needles make it the most popular tree today. The Douglas fir, while mot a true fir, is a native of Rocky Mountains. Unquestionably, it is the ideal tree of the it does not lose its needles even under adverse indoor conditions.

Christmas trees are a yuletide fire hazard, so it pays to to proor your lrees accor ing Un process developed by the Agriculture. Use either calcium chloride or ammonium sulfate. The amount'to use should equal about $1 / 4$ of the weight of the tree. Dissolve the chemical in wated at the rate of $11 / 4$ pints per pound of chemical. Place room of moderate temperature -55 to 65 degs. $F$. Incidentally, the bottom of the tree should be freshly sawed, preferably an angle or in a V shape.

But the Youngs can't afford candle-bedecked birthday cakes this year. And that bothers the youngsters - all excep Baby Barbara. You see, she' blind.
About that job:
Young was fired by the Brighton School system June 25, 1947. His job was to drive a shool bus, food and provisions from one building to anpothar, set out traffic safety sigros, and do other maintenance work as ordered by his bosk. During the summer he helped paint interiors of the buildings.
Last April, Young took a civil service examination for the post to which he had been appointed. He stood at the top of the list.
Suddenly, on Nov. 10, Young was bounced.
Why?
"Incompetent," said his boss, Joseph Slack, superintendent of Buildings of the Brighton High School.
"Prejudice against the veterans' preference in Civil Service," says Young.
Both employer and employee have eeveral affidavits from fellow workers to prove their point.
Slack has lined up Janitors Charles H. Steffens, Alvin DeHollander, Russell W. Jock, and Arthur E. Crossley to allege that Young was "not as fast a worker as they are.
Disputing this olaim are Janitors William Snyder, Bart Kiernan and Warren Ghyzel all of whom say they have worked with Young and found him to be a "good worker who has performed his work as conscientiously as any other employee of the school

If all the Christmas editorials written this week in the good old U.S.A. were laid end -to-

All he had were man's most powerful With those, he battered down the most formidable walls erected by man's worst enemies in the past 1948 years.
Yet we hear little these days but the cry of

weapons of destruction.

A truce or armistice between men of bad faith can be enforced by guns. But not Peace. That must come from within man. It is a sad commentary upon man's intelli-
getice that those to whom we have entrusted
the monumental task of writing a peace at the close of the most horrible war in history,
should still be thinking in terms of peace through strength.
Wars settle nothing. They simply create new problems, harder to solve than the ones about
which men went to war, in the first place.
Only this past weekend, the Dutch govern ment became impatient with the true methods shells against the peoples of the Indonesian Republic. It was a plain defiance of the
United Nations pact, to which the Dutch are United Nations pact, to which the Dutch are signatories.
Temporarily, the Dutch will win. But they should realize that they and other apostles of
imperialism no longer can rule the restless native peoples of the Far East.
Premier Jawaharlai Nehru of Indian phrased it well, when he said, as he heard of the Dutch action:
"The tide of independence is running too
strongly in Asia, to be halted by the feeble strongly in Asia, to be
weapons of imperialism
That is, of course, one way of putting it. Boiled down, it points to the same conclusion reached by that prophet for whom Christ-
mas is celebrated.

Man has it in his heart to live in peace with his neighbor. The hope that rises again in every Yuletide season is that men will some-
time lay down their guns and look for a solutimon to the problem of peace, in the rich treasure chest of human dignity.

CHRISTMAS BEGONIA: Here is the most showy of a!! Begonias and it's also the most difficult to grow. Keep in a sunny window; it likes a lot Because of the difficulty of gnowing in the home, it's perhaps best to discard this plant efter flowering.
JERUSALEM-CHERRY: This plant likes the same temperature as Cyclamen - 50 dgs found helpful to spray the leaves.with a little water daily, Keep out of drafts, open doors and other exposed places. OrDon't keep plant for next year as it becomes ungainly and eldom flowers well.
CHRISTMAS PEPPER: This is an annual and should be discarded after flowering. It can be grown from seed planted during June or July and the
