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





### POURING CONCRETE ON DEWEY AVE. AT 500-600 FEET DAILY

Pouring of concrete on the west side of Dewey avenue was started yesterday morning by the Rochester Willite Company, contractors, and will proceed at the rate of 500 to 600 feet per day, according to Julius Friederich, president of the company. Within a week he expects that the entire stretch between Knickerbocker avenue and Augustine street will be covered. This must stand for 10 or 12 days before the top surfacing can be applied and the road will be ready for traffic a few hours after the surfacing has been completed.

Relaying of the street car tracks on the west side was completed last week and pouring of concrete between the tracks will be finished this week. When the west side of the street is opened about the middle of August it will provide a wider lane through which traffic will be able to move more rapidly than through the present rather narrow space on the east side.

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

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

# Let's Get Interested

As interesting as it is to look back upon Rochester's growth to its rating as the 21st city in the United States, it is even more absorbing to speculate upon the future trend of our community. And it is certainly of more than ordinary interest to us that our city planning experts are directing attention to our immediate vicinity comparable to that in the downtown area.

The first step in a five-year program of expansion for the northwest section of Rochster is the widening and re-paving of Dewey avenue which is already underway and which is making excellent progress. The next move will be the widening of West Broad street from Brown street to Lyell avenue, looking toward the development of a straight-through route from the northwest end of the city to the downtown area. The widening of Dewey avenue between Lyell and Driving Park avenues which because of the necessity of cutting back property lines will be a rather expensive undertaking, is to follow and the lower end of Dewey avenue, beyond Knickerbocker avenue, is likewise to be widened and re-paved.

An ordinance for the West Broad street widening has already been called for by Conneilman Nelson A. Milne and is reported to be in preparation in the City Engineer's office Councilman Milne promises that he will urge its early adoption

Although the subway has not as yet had opportunity to prove its worth, it is our belief that this mode of transportation will assume added importance as the city boundaries are extended. In this connection from its present terminus at Driving Park avenue, northward to Ridgeway avenue and thence further, perhaps to the Ridge road and beyond.

One of the problems which the Courier has always felt merits the earliest possible attention is the difficult and dangerous curve at Driving Park and Dewey avenues. This, too, is to be straightened out under the program. But practically everyone is agreed that this problem should be given the preference over any of the proposed improvements, and we earnest ly hope that the Councilman will soon introduce an ordinance





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
