PETITION FOR BRANCH LIBRARY ON DEWEY AVE. SENT TO COUNCIL

Developments of the last week indicate that Lake avenue will have some opposition in its endeavor to hold its branch public library. A petition has been circulated calling for the location of the library on Dewey avenue and it was presented to the City Council Monday night with about 300 signatures attached.

Until a short time ago, it was believed that the site of the new branch had been settled. When the approach to the Ridge road bridge is completed some time this year, there will be a triangular plot of ground isolated on two sides by the divided approach to the bridge and facing on Lake avenue. It was here that it was planned to place the library. The trustees of the public library system are said to be in favor of this site. Members of the Lake and Ridge Business Men's Association want the library at or near its present location, although not necessarily in the triangle.

However, the individuals responsible for the circulation of the petition calling for the transfer of the library facilities to Dewey avenues are said to base their petition on the recently formulated city plan for libraries. Under this plan, branch liraries are to be located at least a mile apart and apparently in the center of population of the district which they are to serve. Each branch supposedly is to serve an area included within a half-mile circle.

Councilman Nelson A. Milne favors the Dewey avenue site for this reason also, and it is believed that he will ask the trustees to recommend a Dewey avenue location. Inas much as the Council must approprinte the money for the new library, the trustees may be influenced by Mr. Milne's opinion. The John Marshall High School property is definitely eliminated, according to Mr. Milne, who says that if the branch should be moved from the Lave avenue section it will be located on Dewey

Another statement of the Coun-Elman indicates that the Dewey avenue location would be at least a mile from Driving Park avenue, Mr. Milne states that he has been working for a branch library at Dewey and Driving Park avenues and that that been promised providing it is L. 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

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

Next Wednesday, the eight members of the City Council have promised to make a tour of inspection through John Marshall and Charlotte High Schools to see first hand the conditions which have caused such wide comment during the past week or two. They will be given an opportunity to judge for themselves whether or not the need is as urgent as has been pictured.

The Councilmen are commendably open-minded about the entire situation and members of both City Manager and Regular Republican groups in the Council have stated themselves as favoring appropriation for the new high schools, providing some method of financing is found which will not jeopardize the city's financial standing. If there is any doubt in their minds about the need, the visit next Wednesday should remove it.

Despite the overwhelming sentiment for a new high school in the Tenth Ward shown at the mass meeting held here recently, one is impressed with the fact that there is considerable apathy in the public mind with regard to the problem. Unless Tenth Ward parents have children in attendance at John Mar shall, their attitude is quite apt to be one of indifference and even of opposition to a new school structure. However, if they had children coming home from school, complaining of over crowded classrooms and corridors and during this cold weather of insufficiently heated and poorly ventilated study rooms, their interest would be considerably more acute. Yet if they would take the time to inspect the former factory which houses the high school, there could searcely be need of further testimonial.

We take great pride in our schools; some say we over emphasize. However, even years ago, when the mastery of the elementary grades was an achievement of note, we had warm schoolhouses and seldom were we forced to fill every available Councilman Louis Foulkes agreed inch of space in the classroom with extra chairs.

Radio Tips BY HARRY RUSSELL

Ninety per cent of the present day screen grid receivers are being operated on two to three times the necessary amount of aerial. These sets were designed, built and tested by their makers to be quiet, very selective and extremely sensitive on 20 to 30 feet of aerial and a good ground. As the average buyer has owned a previous set or sets, he has in his home an aerial that was installed for those earlier machinessay 90 to 150 feet in length, including the lead-in.

When his new screen grid receiver is delivered the service or installation man either thru ignorance or indifference, is apt to hook the new set on the old aerial and ground connections. The owner of the screen grid set then finds that his new set is less selective than his old battery or early electric set and much more noisy.

Don't blame the screen grid machine. Use an aerial of not more than 30 feet in length, including the lead-in. Make a clean, tight ground connection and if the set is a good standard make it will live up to its advertised characteristics of selectivity, tone, sensitivity and quiet op-

BUS SERVICE CHANGE PROPOSED BY MILNE 169

Two proposals were advanced by 148 Councilman Nelson A. Milne at the meeting of the Council Monday night affecting transportation facilities in this section. One was to re-route bus service through Augustine and Dove streets and the other to allow transfer privileges to patrons of the Dewey avenue street car line for north-bound buses.

The first proposal has been placed 169 in the hands of Commissioner of Public Safety Donald Dailey, who is expected to order the change in the bus route this week. By sending the buses through Augustine and thus 107 to Driving Park avenue by way of Dove street, the residents of the territory west of Dewey avenue will 127 have considerably less distance to walk for transportation facilities.

The matter of transfers from street cars to buses has been referred to Commissioner of Railways, Charle R. Barnes. In urging the broadening of the transfer facilities, Council man Milne stated that he had two reasons for his proposal; one, to enable those taking the buses to the Stone road section and other localities north of the Tenth Ward to be able to take a Dewey street car any-152 where along the route and thus to take advantage of the sheltered termi nal at the end of the line while awaiting the buses, which run on a 110 half hour schedule; and the other to allow these people the privilege of shopping in the Dewey avenue sec-113

PETITION FOR LIBRARY IN LAKE

Described by City Manager Stephen B. Story as "civil war in the Tenth Ward," the question of a site for the new Lake avenue branch library has assumed major proportions. The latest development was the presentation to the City Council on Monday night of a petition signed by over 1600 persons, asking for location of the library in the triangle at the head of the west approach to the new Ridge road bridge.

The petition was brought before the Council by Charles P. Coster, Lake avenue jeweler, acting as spokesman for the Lake and Ridge Business Men's Association. The actual presentation of the petition aroused considerable interest in the Council, when Mr. Coster was challenged on a point of order by Councilman Nelson A. Milne. Vice Mayor Adler over-ruled the objection, however, and Mr. Coster addressed the

Mr. Coster pointed to the fact that the library apparently now was about to be moved away from the spot where it had run successfully for six years and he claimed that there was absolutely no good reason advanced to show that the site originally planned in connection with the bridge approach should not be used. He stated that the type of building which was proposed, would be an especially suitable structure to be placed at the head of the bridge apbroach. As far as danger to patrons from congested traffic conditions, he said with proper signal system there would be no more danger than at


