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



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

LAKE LIBRARY MAY **BE TRANSFERRED TO TEMPORARY QUARTERS**

With no definite proposal in sight for the location of the new library which is to replace the Lake Avenue Branch Library officials are making a survey of all available buildings for temporary headquarters. Unless some decision is arrived at shortly, the present lihrary will be forced to make temporary arrangements and as far as the general public knows the situation remains as it has been for the past two months.

Although no definite date has been set, it is stated that the lihrary building will be torn down some time this summer. The Chain Store

We recently received a pamphlet from the Ohio Wholesale Grocers' Association which states the case against the chainstore system of business about as concisely as we have seen to date. From a thorough study of the entire chain system it is concluded that "they are detrimental to the best interests of the American public because they destroy individual opportunity in business without effecting substantial economy in the field of merchandising; because they tend to confuse the consumer as to the value of merchandise and as to price-saving and because they tend toward monopoly and its attendant evils."

The pamphlet further continues: "Chain stores do not contribute freely and in proportion to their ability to general community enterprise and eivic welfare projects, such as charities.

"Chain store profits are not retained or re-invested in the community, as a result of which the capital available in the community is reduced.

'Chain stores tend to standardize community life, thus robbing it of its personal character and individuality.

'Chain stores are detrimental to local banks; their bank balances are usually low, due to the fact that they almost immediately transfer their money to the central offices.

Chain stores are detrimental to manufacturers and wholesalers in that they demand unjust price considerations and cut down the market for advertised brands.

'Chain stores do not bear their full share of the local tax load, due to the fact that they carry low stocks of goods and local managers do not often own their own homes.


'Chain stores disorganize the distribution of merchandise. which necessitates readjustments in the field of marketing and raises the costs of merchandising.'

(Editor's Note: This is another in the series concerning merchants

of the Lake and Ridge section.) The biography of James Vonglis could be easily transformed into novel form without need of imaginative details or hardly the touch of a short story writer to dramatize. He is the owner of the candy shop which bears his name at 1521 Lake avenue.

A Roumanian by birth, Mr. Vonglis came to America as a sailor on the S. S. Verdi. He had spent two years on merchant boats, part of the time having been spent on the ill-fated Vestris, which sank recently in the neighborhood of the West Indics. He received his discharge papers in New York City on July 4, 1911 and boarded a train at Hoboken bound for Rochester with less than two dollars in his pocket, after paying his railroad fare.

Assisted by relatives, Mr. Vonglis worked at various occupations until finally he found himself in the business in which he has achieved success. His first experience in candy making was with the More Candy Company. In 1915 with \$20 borrowed capital and \$10 of his own he opened his first store on Jefferson avenue with his brother. Subsequently he owned five stores, the last of which is the one on Lake avenue. He has disposed of his interests in the others and now devotes his time entirely to the one store.

The Lake avenue shop is completely equipped not only for candy making, but also for the manufacture of ice cream and for practically everything which is sold in the store. "His ice cream equipment turns out at the rate of a gallon a minute.

Among the 10 employees of Mr. Vonglis are three unusually capable candy makers, who have helped to make possible the widely-known quality of Vonglis candy. James Penman, who Mr. Vonglis says is one of the best candy makers in the country, is principally responsible for the various Vonglis sweets. 



PROPOSE TEMPORARY LIBRARY ON DEWEY; NEW LOCATION ON LAKE

There were several new developments in the Lake Avenue Branch Library situation that occurred at the City Council meeting Monday night, indicating that the triangle site for the new library is no longer being considered. A petition for a library at Dewey and Lewiston avenues on the ground now occupied by the Lewiston M. E. Church and a request from the library board for appropriations for purchase of two sites hitherto not mentioned constituted the new developments.

According to City Librarian William F. Yust, the library board is now interested in building the new library on the southwest corner of Lake avenue and Flower City park, which is privately owned property. Heekel They feel that by so doing, they will overcome the principal objection to Metzinger the triangle site inasmuch as it is on Davidson the west side of Lake avenue and Gerber away from the congested district.

However, the time which would be required to purchase the property and erect a building would make it necessary to provide temporary quarters, since the bridge approaches will soon be under construction, Mr. Yust stated; and the board asked for an appropriation to buy the two-story frame house on the southwest corner of Selve terrace and Dewey avenue where the library might continue service during the building period. Mount This house is said to be available for \$18,000 and it is estimated that an additional amount of \$7,000 would McGrath put it into condition for temporary use as a library.

Councilman Nelson A. Milne is in favor of the Dewey and Selve site, since he has been working for some time on a library in the neighborhood of Driving Park and Dewey avenues. He is quite confident that the \$25,000 will be appropriated for this purpose. However, he stated that at the present time he would not commit himself on the Flower City park and Lake avenue site, although he did not say that he was opposed to it. The petition for the Dewey and Lewiston corner was presented by T. Carl Nixon and it was stated that 2,000 petitioners had signed it. A hearing will be granted on this petition within the next two weeks, ac- Bullen cording to Mr. Milne.
