TO START RAZING **BUILDINGS AUGUST 1**

By order of the Department of Public Works, all buildings on Lake avenue, which have been acquired for the opening of the Ridge Road bridge approach, will be raized, beginning about August 1. The bridge itself will be completed sometime during the month of December, according to engineers' estimates and it is desired to have all the approaches ready before cold weather sets in.

Included in the buildings which are shortly to be removed is the Lake Avenue Branch Library. Within the next week alterations will be underway, states City Librarian William F. Yust on the temporary quarters in the H. A. Johnston block opposite the present site. The branch will be closed about August 1 and probably will not be available to the public in its temporary quarters until about two weeks later.

The Schairer fruit and vegetable store will move to 1473 Lake avenue and the Economy Tailor Shop will transfer next door to its present location on Owen street to make way for the library. This practically completes the extensive changes which have been made at the corners since the buildings on the east side of the street were purchased by the city.

Such a fine and delicate piece of mechanism as a radio is entitled to the utmost in protection from destructive agencies and causes such as lightning and short circuits. Lightning strokes may be combatted by the installation of a lightning arrester on all aerial systems that are either wholly or partly outside the building. This inexpensive device will not only save your receiver from being destroyed by lightning but will prevent any lightning strokes damaging your home to any great extent by being conducted into your home by the aerial lead-in. Also (and this is most important) all insurance companies are very strict in their ruling that any aerial system exposed, either wholly or in part, on the outside of a building, must be protected by lightning arrester equipment.

And now we approach the subject of short circuits. These are destructive to electrical devices and dangerous in that they cause fires unless the current flow is immediately stopped by action of a fuse.





Radio Tips By Harry Russell

No radio performs at its best unless it is attached to a good aerial. Many receivers operate wonderfully well on very poor aerials but Long Island and New York City. they would improve their distance, clarity, selectivity, etc., if given the benefit of a good aerial installation. A good radio "plays" or reproduces only what it receives from its aerial. If the aerial is too short or badly located the programs received are weak, given to fading, and possibly contain much "artificial static" or interference. Too long an aerial makes for poor selectivity and "pick up noise."

The condition of the aerial joints, lead-in position, ground location, and joints-all are important items. to your radio, strong, clear, and as conferences. free from artificial noise as possi-

KODAK PARK EXPLOSION FOLLOWED BY RUMORS: ACCIDENT RATE IS LOW

At about 11 o'clock Friday morning, the lower Tenth Ward was startled by a heavy explosion, followed shortly by prolonged blowing of the Kodak Park fire whistles. Within an hour, meager details of Kodaks calamity had spread into the home of many park workers and is to be lessened as between the choice of the aesthetic and the frantic wives and relatives (and perhaps some who were just curions) created a tie-up on the 30 trunk phone lines of the Lake avenue Plane.

The explosion claimed four lives directly and one, it is said, indirectly through suicide. Another worker is still in serious condition and a score or more received minor injuries. Rumors have followed in the wake of the explosion and about as fast as one subsides another is in circulation. Most of them apparently are of an unofficial nature and quite without foundation in fact, although they probably will continue to be told, one to another, for some time to come.

At least two Tenth Warders claim to have escaped death or injury by a quirk of fate. One of these is said to have been working on the doomed machine no more than five minutes before the explosion. He was relieved to go to he rest room and the man who resigned his position. Another Harry Nesbit of Albion. Majestic engineers have adapted to American principles another new discovery, this one coming out of England. They call it "twin power detection," and consists primarily of the use of two detectors with consequent greater volume without "choking" and "distortion." The third improvement is referred to as the "modulated" circuit. It is a new circuit, developed by Majestic engineers in collaboration with the Hazeltine Laboratories which is said to have brought about a greater depth of tone.




