



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

Representative Harold C. Ostertag has appointed John E. Maier of Greece as manager of his campaign for re-election to Congress from the new 37th Congressional District. Maier, 35, is a graduate of Aquinas Institute and Virginia Military Institute.

Congressman Ostertag scored the present Congressional leadership latest election-year date since World War 2.

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The New Family Court

By JUDGE EMMETT J. SCHNEPP

For the first time in 115 years New York State has reorganized its Court System. A constitutional amendment approved in 1961 by the voters authorized this reorganization which was effected by twenty-three (23) Bills approved by the last Legislature. Under this reorganization every court in the state was brought into close working relationship.

Among the changes was the es lablishment of a new Family Court for each county. The joint Legislative Committee on Court reorganzation gave early priority to the new Family Court because of its great importance to the people of our state.

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> Among the major features is the assurance of due process of law for children and families involved in proceedings of the new court. Provision is made for the appointment of law guardians for chil dren in certain cases so that each youngster is properly represented and the Court aided in making proper decisions. Personal liberty is at stake and counsel is an essential factor in fair treatment.

Family Counseling A modern and effective intake procedure is provided and cases which do not require judicial attention are screened and handled by trained personnel on a helpful and friendly basis. A new family conciliation procedure, which will use family counselling and social

work technics, is designed to aid the family in trouble. Civil proceedings for dealing with disorderly conduct and assaults in the family replace previous methods of handling such problems through riminal processes. The treatment of these matters as a civil and not a criminal charge and the use of conciliation procedures may salage what otherwise might be a broken home.

The law of juvenile delinquency has been revised and there is introduced in the new act the concept of a "person in need of supervision". Recognition is thus given that through the powers and auxiliary services of this Court a oungster in need of supervision may be helped before he gets into real trouble.

The act revises the law of support and the law of neglect and generally encompasses within its provisions all matters of importance relating to families.

Each Child Studied

The philosophy of individualzed justice and an objective which is remedial and preventive is evident throughout the law. In connection with matters involving juveniles the basic philosophy of the act, after an adjudication, involves inquiry to determine why each youngster has committed a specific offense and what the physical, mental and social make-up of each child may be. Even if it is the first offense of an erring teenager the public has a right not to have the same offense repeated, and the auxiliary services of the Court are designed to provide help and assistance to this end and to screen out the hoodlum and to save the potential usefulness of our boys and girls.

Traffic Safety Campaign Opened in Local Schools

Green pennants will become the symbol of student traffic safety achievement in a traffic safety campaign which started Monday in city, county, and Catholic schools.

Designed to make every studen of every school conscious of the and mishaps involving one or need for traffic safety, the Green more cars. Pennant Safety Campaign will give recognition to schools with outstanding traffic safety perform-

Slated to run throughout the entire school year, the drive is being sponsored by the Democrat and Chronicle, Times-Union, and the two Rochester General Motors plants; and will be conducted with the cooperation of the city and county public schools, parochial schools, the Rochester Police Department, and the Monroe County Sheriff's office.

Penalty For Accidents Large pennants embossed with the image of a school patrol boy are to be given each school to sig nify accident-free periods. Each school can fly its flag only so long as there are no traffic accidents caused by its students. Should such an accident take place, the school involved must withhold its green pennant from the flagpole until another 30-day period has elapsed without an accident.

The initial pennants will be hoisted on the flagpoles within the next two week periods. Schools who have not had a chargeable traffic accident since the opening of school will receive their pennants during this period.

The Rochester Police Department in the city and the Sheriff's office in the county, in cooperation with some of the participating town police departments, will determine the chargeability of all accidents and the school safety of-ficers in the city and in the county will notify the school principal when a chargeable accident occurs. Immediately after being notified

of a student-caused accident, the principal involved will have the pennant withheld from the school flagstaff for 30-days.

The Green Pennant campaign will be in effect 24 hours a day, seven days a week until the summer vacation begins. All schools having a perfect accident-free school year (September through June) will be awarded a "Perfect Safety Record" banner at the conclusion of the campaign. Car Must Be Involved




YMCA Purchases Site In Bergen For New Day Camp Program
