Record of burial pages are intended for the comrades of the Post and also for the names of all soldiers V sailors whose graves the Post may decorate from year to year.


Record of presentation page is designed to contain the action of the Post upon receipt of the Volume.



### Hard, Nearing 107, Feels Sad Over Last GAR Encampment

The doughfoot's lot has never been a happy one. Not in Alexander's army . . . not in Caesar's army . . . not in the Union Army in which the soon-to-be 107-year-old

James A. Hard served from Bull Run to Antietam as private.

Seated in a rocking chair in his room at 31 Portsmouth Ter. yesterday, the stoop-framed last state commander of the Grand Army of the Republic in New York State, puffed meditatively on a cigar as he received life in the cigar as he recalled life in the ranks of the Union forces in the war between the states.

"Guard duty... lots of guard duty," Commander Hard said as he shifted in his chair to fap the ash from the stump of his cigar. "Privates always get guard duty That 'n' ditch digging.

### Recalls Guard Duty

"Came near getting ketched one night when I was guarding some prisoners in a house outside Alexandria, Va. I was supposed to be on guard at the door—two hours on and two hours off. But I got

"Fust thing I knew I heard the officer of the day coming and called out 'Halt! Who goes there?"

He answered: 'Grand rounds!'
"Would've been courtmartialed if I'd been ketched.

"Serious! Might not be here now," he concluded with a dry chuckle.

Hard seiz\_d the chance for a five minute "break" and struck up a conversation with the soldier the usual chit-chat compounded of

rumor, fact and gripes.
"After a while the stranger left,"
Hard recalled, "and the lieutenant came over and said to me: 'Hard, do you know who that was you were talking to? That's General Grant!'

"Well, I said to the lieutenant, if he wanted a salute he ought to dress like a general. There was no insignia or nothing on his blouse. How's a man to tell?" The righteous indignation of the exasperated enlisted man seemed to creep into Hard's voice as he pon-dered that long-ago incident.

These and grimmer memories probably will pass through the mind of the indomitable survivor of the once-numerous ranks of the Union Army as he takes the salute from veterans of more recent wars in today's Memorial Day parade.





One by one the posts dis-banded. There was one enemy even the Grand Army could not conquer-the Grim Reaper.

THIS 82D AND LAST encampment of the state GAR will stir memories of other gatherings of the blue-clad veterans. Several state encampments have been held here but most memorable are the two national conclaves.

The first was in August, 1911, a month after the Shriners of the nation had spent a festive and still remembered week in Roches-

ter.

The GAR encampment brought more than 25,000 persons. Jolly, portly President Taft made a speech and reviewed a monster parade in which most of the veterans marched on foot. The sessions were enlighted by the introsions were enlivened by the intro-duction of a resolution urging re-moval of the statue of the Con-federate General Robert E. Lee from the Hall of Fame in Wash-ington on the grounds by west. ington on the grounds he was "a traitor to his country."

To the Union veterans the conflict of the 1860s was not the Civil War but always "The War of the Rebellion," just as below the Mason-Dixon line it was "The War Between the States."

But in later years the Blue and the Gray met in amity on old bat-tlefields of the war. The passage of time had healed the wounds.

The closing sessions of the 1911 encampment were saddened by a train wreck at Manchester, where two coaches, containing many visitors returning home from the convention, plunged off a bridge into the Canandaigua Outlet 45 feet below. Of the 29 persons killed, one was a GAR member and several veterans were among the 74 injured.

During the 1911 encampment, a giant panoramic map of the battle-field of Gettysburg was hung in the Sibley store and many will re-member the old soldiers, pointing with their canes to places on the map and arguing vehemently about the battle strategy.

The national Grand Army re-turned in 1934, during the city's Centennial celebration. The ranks had thinned sadly since 1911. veterans were men in their eighties and nineties but their hearts were young and gay.

Each veteran was assigned a Boy Scout guide. I remember one thirsty old warrior, who wanted to do his own sightseeing, brandishing his cane as he shook off his Boy Scout guide with these words "Go away, con-sarn ye. Where I am goin' you shouldn't go."

Maybe on such a solemn oc-casion I should not inject so light a note. But the Grand Army was made up, not of "plaster saints," but of people,



#### Convention in '49 To Pick Group Name

The five affiliated organizations of the Grand Army of the Republic in New York State last night de-cided to hold a group convention in Syracuse June 9 to 11 next year when a name for the overall or-ganization will be selected.



Sunday, May 23, will be observed as Memorial Sunday this year.

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#### LINCOLN'S GETTYSBURG ADDRESS

Four score and seven years ago, our Fathers brought forth on this continent a new Nation, conceived in Liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great Civil War; testing whether that Nation, or any Nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting-place for those who here gave their lives that that Nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate—we cannot consecrate—we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather, to be here dedicated to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this Nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, and for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

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## PAST COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF GEN. JOHN A. LOGAN'S GENERAL ORDER

HEADQUARTERS GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

Washington, D. C., May 5, 1868.

GENERAL ORDER, No. 11

The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but Posts and Comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

We are organized, Comrades, as our Regulations tell us, for the purpose, among other things, "Of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foes? Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their deaths the tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the Nation can add to their adornment and security is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time testify to the present or to the coming generation that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic.

If other eyes grow dull and other hands slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain to us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed gather round their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them with the choicest flowers of springtime; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us, a sacred charge upon a Nation's gratitude—the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan.

It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his



#### HISTORY OF COMPANY.

### BRIEF RECORDS AND EVENTS, DATES, ETC., ETC.

THE Com, ny was organized November 19th, 1838, as an independent company, by the Staff Officers of the 54th Rifle Regiment, viz : Gen. Lansing B. Swan, Col. Horace Gay, Col. Ariel Wentworth, Adjutant Jesse W. Hatch and Maj, H. P. Daniels, joining as privates, with members of the old Rifle Guards, the Pioneers and others. They were originally formed as a rifle company, but subsequently adopted the infantry drill, and still later, they became an artillery company purely. The uniform of the company, both fatigue and full dress, was gray cadet cloth with black stripe down the seam of the pantaloons, with white crossbelts.

May 7th, 1839, the first turn out of the Company in their new fatigue dress was to attend the concert given by Henry Russell at Concert Hall, Exchange street. A brilliant and fashionable audience were present. The Grays marched in to the tune of the Grays' Quickstep March, composed for the occasion, and dedicated to the company by Mr. R.

1839, the first public afternoon and evening encampment of the Company in fatigue dress was at Terrace Green-now Maple Grove-40 men in line.

June 9, 1839, presentation of a beautiful silk fiag by the ladies of Rochester to the company on Court House Square.

Aug. 12, 13 and 14, 1839, encampment at Camp Lowd, Rochester. The following companies participated: Rochester Union Grays, Williams' Light Infantry and the United States Infantry Company and a band under Captain A. Lowd.

1840, 41 and 42, a number of public concerts were given cach

year by the Grays' Glee Club, which added several hundred dollars to the treasury of the Company.

1840, Rochester Union Grays' Band formed, composed of 17 members, and attached to the company-Captain Jesse W. Adams

1840, the Grays reviewed by the President of the United States, Martin Van Buren, on Brown Square at Rochester.

1840 opened a Register of visitors to the Armory. A large book was filled with the names and residence of friends and many distinguished persons.

June 18, 1840, first full dress parade of the Company ; 50 men in line, with full band.

July 6, 1840, excursion to Ogdensburg via Lake Ontario steamer Oneida, Captain Child; 3 days and 4 nights, stopping for parede at Kingston, Sacketts Harbor, at the U. S. Barrack, Captain Baruum in command, and at Oswego. On leaving for Ogdensburg, Charles Lee Clark presented the Company with a larger boquet, with strawberries and cream from the ladies of Grove Place.

November 19, 1840, entertainment given by General Swan to the Grays at his residence, Center Park. A full company, headed by Captain Adams' band, marched to the house and spent a very enjoyable evening, partaking of a sumptuous spread for the occasion. Here originated the custom of annual suppers by the Company.

January 12, 1841, a report of the Board of Directors on the purchase of uniforms up to that date showed there had been expended for these and fixing the new Armory \$5,093.30, signed by Ariel Wentworth, Chairman of the Committee.

August 20, 1841, presentation by the Company to General Swan of his portrait, painted by G. S. Gilbert for the Company.

November 19, 1841, entertainment to the Grays by Lieutenant Wm. H. Cheney at his residence, Plymouth Avenue.

Augvst 2, 1843, Oswego Guards, as guests of the Grays, received and entertained on Brown Square for two days.

July 17, 18, 19 and 20, 1843, encampment at Utica with several ther companies, Captain E. K. Barnum, U. S. A., in command. September 26, 1843, invitation from Coleman and Stetson, of the Astor House, New York, for the Grays to become their guests

1845, presentation of a very large and valuable tent to the Company by General James S. Wadsworth, of Geneseo.

On reaching Aurora, the coat stopped for two hours by invitation to the Company from the Town Council and the ladies of Aurora. This was one of the most entertaining receptions the Grays ever had. So elaborate and spontaneous, coupled with a hasty ramble over the spacious, beautiful grounds of General E. B. Morgan, and the abundance of flowers and boquets presented by the ladies was perfectly bewildering. very large boquet presented to Color Bearer Judson graced the Armory for weeks.

August 19 and 20, 1845, expedition to Geneseo, together with Williams' Light Infantry, German Grenadiers and City Cadets, in four canal boats, to escort the remains of Lieutenant Boyd and comrades to Mount Hope. Reception of cortige on arrival at Rochester by Gov. Wm. H. Seward and the Common Council.

1846, presentation of a silver headed cane to Mason A. Fisher by Squad D, noisy corner.

August 4, 5 and 6, 1847, excursion of the Grays to Niagara

October 20, 1847, Mason A. Fisher died. So strong was the feeling of friendship by the Company for him, that they declared no hearse should carry his body to the grave. The coffin was placed on a bier and by squads in full uniform and full band they bore him on their shoulders nearly two miles to Mount Hope, and

afterwards erected a granite monument to his memory.

M. cars for Brighton and then marched to the Grove and were receive. by the Principal and 65 young ladies robed in white and blue. The day was perfect, the lunch abundant, roses and sunflowers perfumed the air, blue birds and larks sang songs of joy, black eyes and blue eyes sparkled from the young ladies like repeating rifles, but the Captain vowed he would never take the Company into such an engagement again. Memory lingers over this scene of parting at this distant day with a suddened feelings of broken hearts and amid summer pleasures. Tear drops from the young soldiers and pupils moistened the green sward on leaving. At the word, "Frward March!" the Band struck up the tune of "The Girls We Left Behind."

The following members have been captains of the company, and in the order named, up to the time of the formation of the Vereran Corps: Lansing B. Swan, John G. Gray, Chas. G. Lee, Nathaniel Thompson, Wm. M. Lewis.

Great care was always exercised in the selection of persons for membership. Three black balls cast against any one preventel becoming a member.

Of the 192 members, with 17 of the band who had signed the roll of the Company, 16 were known to have died up to the time of the formation of the Veteran Corps in 1855.

Many pleasant excursions and encampments have been made by the Company to Geneva, Mount Morris, Canandaigus, Avon. Syracuse and other places, the dates of which are not recolle owing to the loss of two books, of the Secretary's minutes and the Armory scrap book, which mysteriously disappeared. This is greatly regretted by every Veteran and deprives them of many

very interesting events of the Company.

Note.—As a reminder of old time by words and apt sayings, the following is added: "Captain Swan's store circles, Little Beach, Corporal Brown, Stucco Hyatt, Coaporal Moody's trial, Squad drills, our mess table talks, Armory scenes, Steuben Guards drill, weekly drills, New Year's calls in a body, Berthrong's sad fate, marriage fetes, bob-tail sorrel mares, two fingers, two thumbs, Battle of Todd Waddle." etc.

#### THE VETERANS ORGANIZED.

The formation of the Veteran Corps follows in order of dates after the Grays, and although the Veterans are in the sear and yellow leaf of life and do not muster as full ranks as in earlies: days, still, when seated around the annual mess table, the fun an i story brings out pleasant remembrances of earlier training days.

Foolish as the publication of this may seem to outsiders, we know, as members of the Company, how much these meetings and associations have elevated the man, gratified the soldier, and put life, fun and joy into many camp scenes that will live in the memory of the Grays and the Veterans so long as life lasts.

November 21, 1855, a call was issued signed by L. B. Swan,

John G. Grav, O. Robinson, Geo. W. Fisher, Chas. R. Baboit, R. K. Loth,idge and many others who heartily join in the call, exnbers of the Rochester Union Grays inviting the members to meet at the Armory of the 54th Regiment, December 3, 1855, for purpose of forming a Veteran Corps. At that meeting fiftypersous answered to their names at roll call, Major Heman nis in the chair.

On motion of Colonel Chas. R. Babbitt, the following resolution was offered and adopted; viz:

Resolved-That we organize a Veteran Corps of the R. U. Grays, to be composed of those persons who joined at its ganization November, 1838, and include all those who have been members up to January, 1854, who shall meet annually to keep up a record of the living and the dead, as time shall from year to year take from the number on one list, and add to those of the other.

At 7: 30 o'clock supper was announced, when 92 persons, Veterans and guests, sat down to a sumptuous entertainment with General Swan at the head of the table. The bill of fare ordered by the commissaries, Colonel Babbitt and Lieutenant Wilson, was elaborate and all that could be desired. The camp fires of long ago were all ablaze, the room was bright with banners and bunting, speech and wit poured forth from all parts of the table, not forgetting "Old Boots," "Brass Ends," "Corporal Moody," nor "69 ahead." Thus was the campaign opened by the Veterans in

remembrance of old times, old friends and old training days. The reporters for the evening were Geo. G. Cooper of the Daily Union, F. S. Rew of the Democrat, C. P. Dewey of the American, W. H. Orr of the Daily Tribune, and A. Oakly of the Daily Advertiser.

A large turnout of the Company with full dress marched to Mr. F.'s residence, No. 11 Troup street, at 8 o'clock in the evening, and were there served with a fine entertainment and supper, together with a series of amusing surprises until 12 o'clock, when the Company left, marched to the Four Corners and broke ranks.

Space will only permit of a brief word here to speak of the deep-fe ling of attachment and respect each member entertained for him, as Captain, soldier, and friend to every member.

only by the Grays, but by the whole community.

November 20, 1879, Corporal Jas. H. Kelley produced at this supper a fine roast pig, Berkshire breed, \*bred on his farm for the occasion, placed on a large platter, and presented it to Secretary Fisher. It was received with rounds of applause from the whole Company except the Secretary, who asked what in thunder he should do with it.

Of the 192 members of the Company and Band who gned the original roll, 75 have died; about 70 of the est are accounted for here and elsewhere; 47 are unaccounted for, not knowing where they reside nor whether ad or alive. Of the first election of 14 Company offisers of the Grays, June, 1839, 12 have died, P.B.Loomis end G. W. Fisher only living. Of the first election of 24 ompany officers of the Veterans, December, 1855, 13 ave died. Of the 59 who sat down at the second anand supper of the Veterans in 1856, 19 have died.

Since our last annual supper two of our members have ed, Wm. H. Cheney and James A. Braley. Thus only but surely will all the names of the Veterans now iving be transferred to the list of the departed.





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The F. E. Pierce Post, No. 455, formed in 1902, and named after Franklin E. Pierce, who was a Lieutenant-Colonel in the 108th New York State Volunteer Infantry.

Seven months after the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, there had already been enough posts formed to warrant a National Encampment. This was called at Indianapolis, November 20, 1866. General S. A. Hurlburt of Belvidere, Illinois, was elected National Commander and Dr. Stephenson, the founder, Adjutant General.

The second encampment was held a little over a year later, at Philadelphia, January 15, 1868. General John A. Logan was elected National Commander, which position he held for three successive terms. His most notable contribution to the G. A. R. was the institution of Memorial Day, announced through his now famous General Order No. 11, of May 5, 1868. This "order" commanded the comrades of the G. A. R. to "garland the passionless mounds .... with the choicest flowers of springtime," to "raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor," and to keep up the observance "from year to year, while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades." This order has been faithfully observed to the present day, the entire nation as a whole giving the day over to the veterans of all wars who have gone marching on.

The original method of decorating the graves was to strew cut flowers on them. This method was used in Rochester up until the time the Chairmanship of the Flower Committee was assumed by Captain Henry Lomb.

Henry Lomb, who served as a captain in the "Old 13th" and who was a member of the George H. Thomas Post, No. 4, was one of Rochester's industrial leaders and philanthrophists. Believing that something more permanent than quickly fading flowers should be used in such a sacred purpose, he had the children of the public and parochial schools grow flowers and plant them on the graves themselves. This gave the children a direct grow flowers and plant them on the graves themselves. This gave the children a direct contact with the men who had fought to preserve their country, teaching them invaluable lessons in patriotism.

Captain Henry Lomb also perceived the necessity of keeping permanent records of the military service and burial place of all veterans, in order to facilitate the marking of graves and to serve as a source of information for future historians. He developed a system that became one of the finest and most complete in the country. His methods of decorating graves and of keeping records have since been adopted by other cities and are now country-wide in use.

The first two conventions having been a success, the G. A. R. National Encampment became an annual event. The eyes of the nation focussed upon it. Cities vied for the privilege of entertaining the boys in blue, for it meant prestige to them and a source of inspiration for its citizens. In 1911 Rochester was fortunate in having the Forty-fifth National Encampment. Some 150,000 guests were entertained in grand style with the President of the Nation, Honorable William Howard Taft, and the Governor of the State, Honorable John A. Dix, paying their tribute.

This year, 1934, Rochester is fortunate in having the Sixty-eighth National Encampment. Competition for it was as keen as it was in the old days, but Rochester won. Its past record as an ideal convention city and its liberality as a host, together with its physical beauty, were sufficient to persuade the grand old men to once again visit Rochester. Rochester will attempt, not only to live up to its past record, but to surpass it in every detail.

Since the inception of the Grand Army of the Republic in 1866, its curve of membership has risen and fallen. From a total of 31,016 in 1878, it grew to its peak of 409,489 in 1890. Since that time death has insistently taken its toll, until, today, its membership stands at only 9,500.
