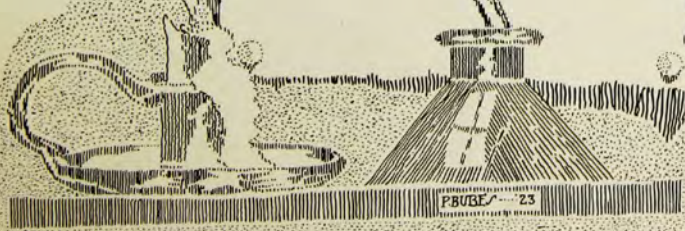

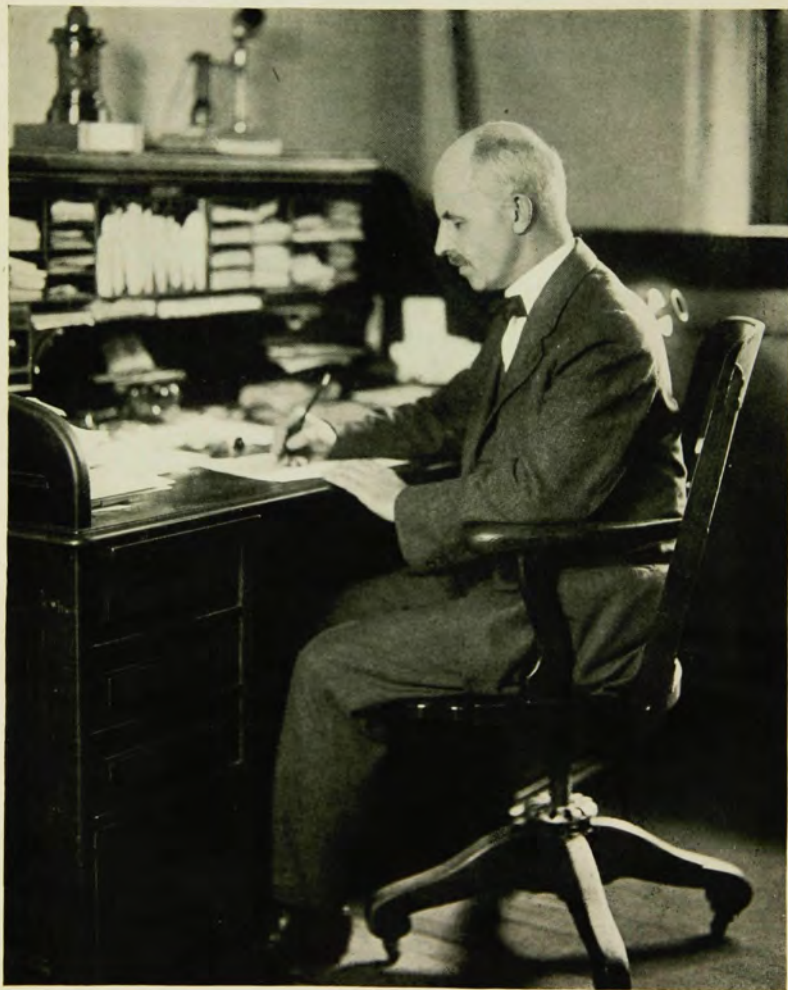

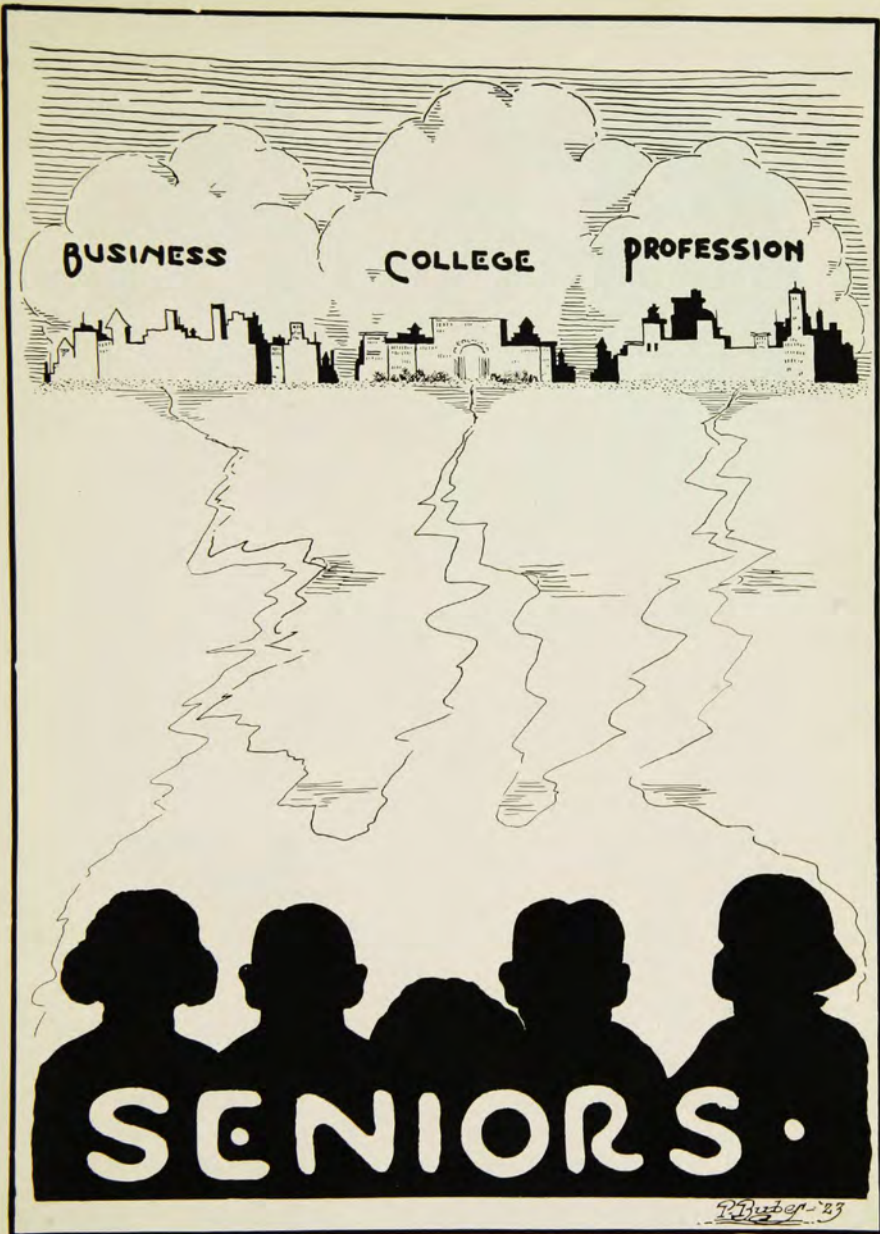

THE ANNEX

The East High School Annex, a remodeled Chiclet Factory on Goodman Street, with Mr. Eddy as its principal is now accommodating about three hundred students. Some of these students are freshmen taking the Academic course, but the majority of them are students in the Technical School.

The Technical School includes a four year course in many crafts and trades including lathe making, printing, carpentry and mechanical drawing. Special courses in Domestic Science, sewing, and millinery are provided for girls attending the High School.

The Annex session is from 8:30 to 2:20 o'clock during which many students of the main building spend some periods there at the various Technical courses. The different things made by the pupils are given to the students for their own use, altho in the printing department much work is done for the school and some of the food in the lunch room is prepared by the cooking classes.

Mr. Terrence Ogden is in charge of the athletics of the Annex boys which are conducted in the High School Gymnasium.

A very successful "social" comprising the whole Annex was recently held under the direction of Mr. Ogden and Miss June Deming.

The Annex is a very important branch of our school and we sincerely hope that some day we may be together under the same roof.

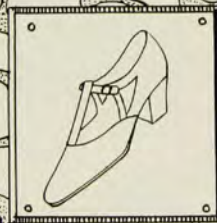
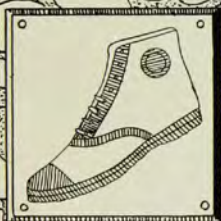

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The School Year

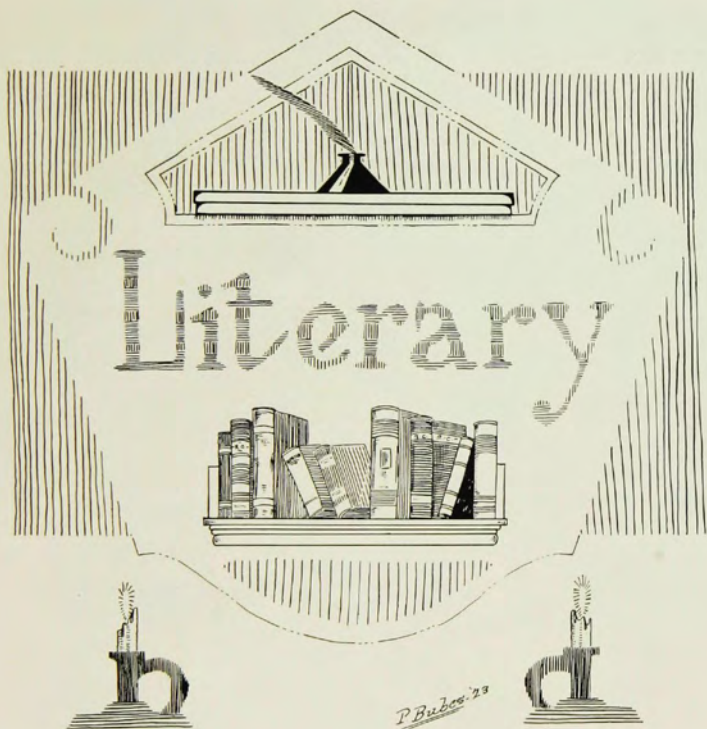
WHEN the doors of East High School were opened in the fall of 1922, it was to welcome 2208 pupils and 140 teachers in a building originally planned for 1008 pupils and 45 teachers. This growth, which is out of all proportion to the growth of the city itself, has been most marked in the last few years; and not even the afternoon session for the first year pupils, and the addition of the Chiclet factory on Goodman Street have relieved very materially the overcrowding. The pupils, however, have shown a commendable adaptation to the various inconveniences which the crowded condition of the school has brought about, acquiescing readily to the abolition of the seventh period study hall.

Perhaps the most noticeable change of the summer was that which had taken place in the library. Yawning empty shelves greeted us here, for hundreds of the books had been transferred to the new social science laboratory in room 128. This room is now the special domain of the history, now known as the social science department, the new name representing more adequately the work which that department is doing. The empty shelves of the old library are being rapidly filled with the hundreds of new books which the library fund is buying. This fund of approximately fifteen hundred dollars was raised by the pupils under the direction of the English Department. For weeks candy, baked goods, apple and chestnut sales followed each other in rapid succession as the different classes worked to raise their quotas; and class auctions—where everything from Palm Olive Soap and hair nets to sweet grass baskets and carpet beaters sold at high prices—helped to swell the fund. The larger part of the money, however, came in the form of direct contributions from the pupils themselves.

This term has seen also the installation of the new school bank. It is an imposing wire structure situated on the main floor opposite the assembly hall. Here pupils can bank on Tuesday at any hour of the day. Thrift has flourished since its arrival, both the number of depositors and the total amount deposited having increased considerably.

Perhaps there is an advantage in numbers after all; and it will take something more serious than crowded corridors, over-filled class rooms, and waiting lines in the lunch room to dampen the jubilant spirit and quell the ardor of East High School.
