Probably nothing else holds men back so much as self-imposed limitations.

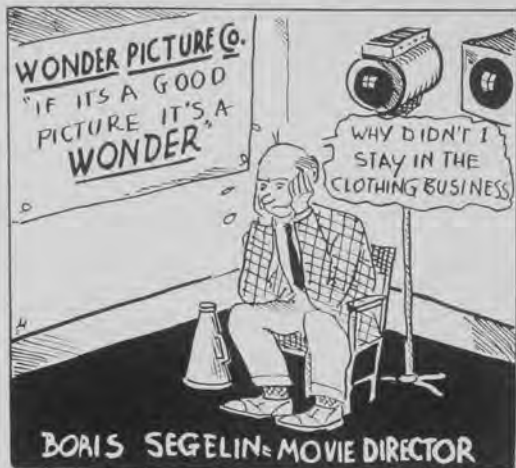

Dante was a great man, admired by the greatest poets, philosophers, and writers of all time. Dante's admirers, however, made one mistake. They made a bust of Dante.

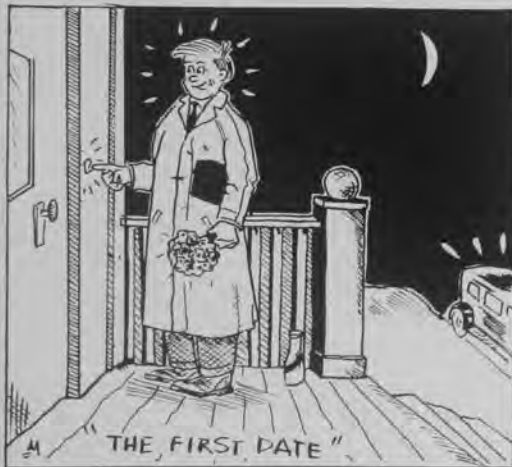

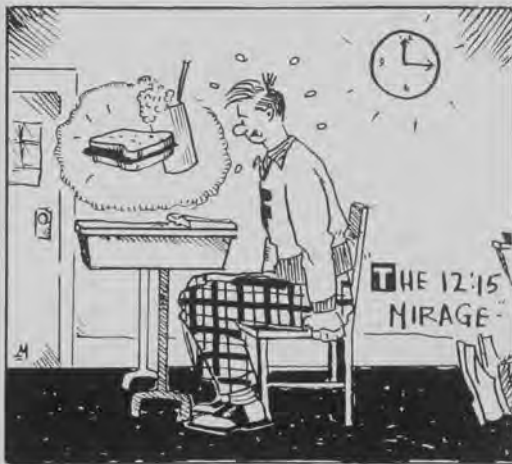
