

Undoubtedly, the school attempts to make it easy for everyone to follow the vocation he may desire. It does all in its power to lighten the sudden load put upon young people when they have to take care of themselves. Without the help and guidance which the school offers it would be exceedingly difficult for them to adapt themselves to the complex business of life which awaits them.

As your last year of high school draws to a close, the question of what to do after graduation must be answered. Will you do the things that come first to hand, or will you make a plan and try to follow it? Have you made any plans which take into account your interests, your aptitudes, and your special abilities? Determine to make the most of yourself. Probably nothing else holds men back so much as self-imposed limitations.

Idleness following graduation from high school has done much to dim the future and lower the earning capacity of many graduates. Do not let this be the pitfall of your life! If the study habit is stopped after graduation, it seldom will be resumed. Keep up the habit of reading! The more you study the lives of great men, the more you will wish to emulate their examples. Your aims and purposes will be elevated by reading the great thoughts of other men.

You should have an aim in life and a definite goal to reach. If higher learning has to be put off to some future day, never lose sight of your goal. Do other things first if necessary, until you have enough money to continue your education—but never lose sight of your goal. If you have an idea and the will to develop it, you can find an opening in the present economic set-up. Through all hardship, follow the gleam that leads ultimately to the goal.
