#### Bowling





Dramatis Personae Epitheus: the lover, an oysterman Veronica: the other lover

MORTAGUE: a fisherman, father of Verronica

RIVER:

MORISES: the friend of Epitheus

ACT ONE-SCENE ONE

As the curtain rises upon our play, which knows no time, we find ourselves facing a most peculiar setting. Ah, young friend, hast noticed not The fair young maiden on yonder rock? Would that I were a youth like you Then would I the fair one woo. But, dear friend, your youth have you, And handsome of face I'd say.

Go to her now, make haste away.

(Throughout this conversation between Epitheus and Morises, Veronica glances coquettishly towards the two. Morises returns these glances with a smile and nod of the head.)

#### EPITHEUS:

Aye, yet knowest thou not who 'tis? The only daughter of Mortague she is. He holds his daughter well.

Were I to woo her to seek my heaven, Would he cast me down to HELL!

#### MORISES:

Shame! What matter which. She wayes her hand from above If success be yours, then fly my dove-

#### EPITHEUS:

Thou art right.
"Yet shall I leave my skiff at home
Lest other folks should see.
I read it in a story book that for to kiss
his dear.

Leander swam the Hellespont, and I shall swim this here."



(Epitheus dives in front of River, As he dives the sound of splashing is heard. Morises exits right. Epitheus goes through the motions of swimming towards the opposite shore, River speaks.)

RIVER:

Ah, young oysterman, thou art bold

To brave River as did lovers of old.

I will carry you safely on the crest of my wave.

Take heart, sir. Make haste! Be brave!

(River pushes him gently towards the shore. As Epitheus steps to the store, Veronica steps forward to meet him. She speaks.)

VERONICA:

Ah, fair oysterman, kind oysterman

I see that thou at last

Have swum across the river so foreboding and so vast;

Yet do not let the rumors of my father make you roam;

For there is nought to fear today.

My father is not home.

(Veronica and Epitheus sit down, side by side. He takes her hand.)

EPITHEUS:

Just today, I know I've learned

For what my sad heart long has yearned.

Yet always you sit here without

My dear, hast thou no other lover?

VERONICA:

How bitter sound those words upon mine ear.

A lover? Nay. My father sends them all away.

Once when I was younger

Was a suitor by my father slain.

And should he find another

Would be treat him yet the same?

(Epitheus is very frightened and starts nervously. He speaks with a very evident forced beavery.)

Егитивов:

Poor Veronica, hast all my pity.

What shame that we two lonely creatures

Must be separated by thy father's jealousy.

(Veronica looks up at him and speaks coquettishly.) VERONICA:

And is it only your pity that I have?

EPITHEUS:

Nay, thou hast my love.

VERONICA

Ah, the time we have together be too short.

Hark! Even now I hear my father's step.

Quick! Into the river thou must go.

Return I pray. I'll not forget.

(Veronica hurries him towards the river. Epitheus again dives an front of River, and makes motions of swimming to the accompaniment of splashing water. He glances back nervously as he swims. Veronica turns guiltily to face the approach of her father. She continues speaking.)

(Mortague, a stern, blustering man, stamps onto the stage from the left, and says gruffly—)

VERONICA (pery nervously):

Oh! I It was nothing but a pebble, sir. I cast upon the water.

MORTAGUE (suspiciously):

MORTAGUE:

# The Great Marcy

"Tahawus" it was called by the Iroquois. This, in English, means "he splits the sky." Where could one find a better name for this magnificent mass of granite, draped with a living blanket of evergreens? There she stood, towering a thousand feet above us like a mighty guardian of the valley in which we stood. Behind us was the pointed Colden, at our left, the massive peaks of McIntyre; at

our right, the majestic dome of Skylight. But what did these matter when before ox loomed the mighty Marcy, greatest of them all, with the reflection of her beautiful pointed cone shimmering in the riny "Lake Tear" at our feet!

We were a small party of climbers: my father, two of my brothers, a couple of natives of the country, a vacationist from Pirtsburgh, and myself. Our family had

been enjoying the summer in a small mountain town a few miles away. I had always hoped for the chance to climb Marcy, so when my father suggested such a trip, I was naturally overjoyed.

Starting early one bright July morning, we had driven twenty miles to a small gravel drive. There we rode for fifteen minutes through a wonderful old forest, coming at length to the small Sanford Lake. Parking our cars, we shouldered our packs and set out across the lake on a rocking suspension foot bridge. We followed a trail for four miles past an old abandoned iron mine and through the very old forest. Here we stopped and ate our dinner by the Hudson River, a small stream at this place. Starting on, we noticed that the trail was ascending. It continued thus for about five miles where it dropped into a swampy valley. Hiking for another mile, we came upon a lean-to or three-sided cabin, many of which are built in the mountains by the state for the use of climbers. This one was near the sparkling Opalescent Brook and we decided to use it for the night on the way back. So dropping our packs, we went on unburdened. The next two miles were very steep, through a beautiful evergreen forest and along the rushing Feldspar Brook. At last the climb ended, and we stepped out of the woods at the foot of the delightful little "Lake Tear of the Clouds" with the peak of Marcy looming ahead. The air was crisp and so clear that we could hear some other climbers talking to each other a mile away at the top.

We rounded the lake and rested at another of the cabins. Then we started for the peak. The climb started so suddenly that it quite surprised us. At one moment we were walking over level ground, and at the next we were climbing at an angle of almost forty degrees. Any one who has done any mountain climbing will appreciate what this means. We were in a forest of shaggy spruces which were greatly stunted by the harsh weather they had

seen, they grew almost horizontally from the ground as the ascent was so steep.

We had to rest every lifty yeards or so, now. At one place where we stopped, I noticed a small side trail. Being inquisitive I decided to explore it, and taking three or four steps came upon a six-foot spruce blocking the path. I pushed it aside and stopped abruptly. There before me was a drop of more than a thousand feet! Another step would have sent me crashing into the rocky canyon of Indian Pass far below!

Getring back to the party. I saw them starting on the upward trail again. After about fifty feet the shaggy spruces gave way to crooked and scrawny pines of two or three feet. These finally disappeared at the timber line, and above this were only a few Arctic bushes clinging to the rocks. The climb now changed to a crawl on hands and knees over the hard granite, and at times we had to cling to the few bushes to keep from sliding down the steep mountain side. The wind was whipping at our clothing in a terrific gale, and one time my cap blew away but caught in a bush nearby.

After crawling steadily for about an hour, we at last reached a stone cabin built into the side of the mountain. Rounding this I plowed ahead and climbed the remaining few feet to the brass marker at the top. Marcy had been conquered! Off to the west the sun was setting behind. Mt. McIntyre, the valley below us was already in partial darkness. Clouds were floating around my feet and bouncing off the mountain side below. The country about was silent; but I was happy. As Wordsworth wrote:

"Had this effulgence disappeared With flying haste, I might have sent, Among the speechless clouds, a look Of blank astonishment; But 'tis endued with power to stay, And sanctify one closing day, That frail Mortality may see..."

"Oh that is rather hard to explain. It just happened that I had always been fond of the theater, such as it was in those days."

"We understand that you learned the English language in five months. Wasn't that quite difficult?"

"No, I shouldn't say that exactly. You see, I went on the stage in Saint Petersburg in 1904, and from there we went to London and then to New York City. New York held so much for me. I had so many new thrills and experiences that I immediately wanted to stay there. The play I was in was Russian, and I realized that its run would be short. Then came my big chance in the form of a contract to play in English. Learn your language I must, and learn it I did!"

"You are best known for your work in Hendrick Ibsen's plays. Will you tell us something of your parts, Madame?" we said, feeling as much at ease now as though we were in our own homes listening to the radio.

"I have played Hedda Gabler in the play you saw today, Nora in The Dolls' House, and Rita Allmers in Little Eyolph. "Are you looking forward to your opening in New York?"

"Yes, but at the same time these onenight stands are quite interesting. I get very little rest, however. Every day the play comes a little closer to perfection; so we think it is worth while. I should like to tell you girls how much Rochester is thought of in the theatrical world. 
