EXTRA! EXTRA! CLASS PROPHECY!

JANE SULLIVAN MISSING
FROM HOTEL; KIDNAPING
SUSPECTED BY POLICE

New York, June 21, 1944—Special dispatch to Skehan Newspapers.

Police today were combing the state for some trace of the missing Jane Sullivan, television star, who is thought the victim of a kidnaping ring. Police Commissioner Howland today declared, "We are doing everything in our power to locate Miss Sullivan."

Jane Sullivan, who is under contract to the Schreiner-Roger television chain, was reported missing this morning. Ralph Johnston, bellboy, received no answer when he rapped at Miss Sullivan's door at nine this morning to deliver her breakfast. He summoned Robert Brice, doorman, and Paul Froeschle, house detective, and they decided to force their way in. The entire suite bore signs of a struggle, and Patrolmen Leonard Shavlan and George Donovan were called in.

Lack of fingerprints, and the apparent ease with which the abductors slipped out of the hotel without arousing suspicion indicated that they were experienced and well acquainted with the hotel routine. Secrecy surrounded the movements of the police today, but it is known that many of the hotel's guests and employees were being held for questioning.

POLICE QUIZ MANY
PROMINENT PERSONS
IN SULLIVAN KIDNAP

New York, June 22—Many of New York's most prominent citizens were being quizzed today by police in the startling kidnap case of Jane Sullivan, television star. Peggy Mason, prima donna of the Metropolitan Opera Company, was among those examined. Police suspected, it was charged, that jealousy may have been the motive of Sullivan's abduction. Mary Van Allen, head of the New York City libraries, who occupied the rooms adjoining Miss Sullivan's suite, was also questioned at some length. She gave as her alibi for not hearing the struggle in the next room the story that she was busy deciphering a newly discovered Chaucer manuscript. It is not yet known whether her story was accepted as true by police.

Others known to be held by police are Clark Schaeffer, leader of a troupe of midgets; James Brown, Socialist mayor of Rochester, N. Y.; John Utz, professor of domestic science at Alabama University; Joseph De Vitt, successor to Koussevitsky as director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra; Thomas Stapleton, powerful Bronx politician; Alice Greene, artist; Joan Guggenheimer, writer of many recent Tin Pan Alley song hits; and Carol Eddy, noted stock manipulator and wolf of Wall Street. All were guests in the hotel at the time of Miss Sullivan's disappearance, and are under suspicion.

SULLIVAN KIDNAP NOTE
DEMANDS MILLION RANSOM
POLICE COMB UNDERWORLD

New York, June 23—A note demanding a million dollars ransom for the release of Jane Sullivan, television star, was received today and threw police into a furor of activity. A drag net of detectives, plain clothes men, and special deputies was reported combing every underworld hangout in an effort to locate the abductors. Among those whom police were especially seeking were "Nate" Jones, alleged leader of a kidnap ring; Tom (the Dip) Griffith, beer baron; and "Stew" Phelps, lone wolf who has considerable influence with underworld characters.

The note, mailed to the Schreiner-Roger television chain, read "Have million dollars in small bills not numbered consecutively ready for Sullivan's ransom. You will hear from me again. X." Police continued to question hundreds of suspects today. It was learned that Jane Sullivan had been last seen at a dinner dance at her hotel the 21st. All who were present at the dance have been held for further quizzing by police. Among them were Esther Williams, noted poetess and dramatist; Dr. Fred Shaper, brain specialist at the Mayo clinic; Richard Burrell, columnist on the New York Daily News; Virginia Potter, prominent woman banker; Daniel Cohen, first violinist of the New Symphony Orchestra; and Justin Price, judge in Rochester Police Court.

Late today Commissioner Howland declared. "When we catch the Sullivan kidnapers we are going to make an example of them. We intend to get them and we are going to, if we have to go to the moon and back. My men have their orders. You will see results inside of twenty-four hours!"

SULLIVAN KIDNAPING A HOAX;
FOUND SAFE IN ROCHESTER HOTEL;
MANAGER ADMITS PUBLICITY GAG

Rochester, June 24—Jane Sullivan's kidnaping was only a publicity stunt, it was revealed here today. New York police, hurrying to Rochester on a tip from William Rosenberg, Broadway night hawk, found Miss Sullivan safe in a hotel. Evangelos Livados, her publicity agent, admitted the stunt was only to get her name in the papers to advertise her new television contract.

Police, who have been frantic during the last few days, were furious when the gag became known to them. Their anger was increased when they learned that a law suit charging them with causing innocent persons embarrassment, was being started by Seth Shaver, Broadway play producer, through his attorney Irwin Lippe, of the firm Carson, Dettman, Nash, & Lippe. Others who have threatened to bring suit are Helen Engert, aviatrix; Neil Regan, manager of the New York Yankees; and Jean Applebaum, narrator of children's bedtime stories on the Schreiner-Roger television chain, all of whom were jailed by police as suspicious characters.

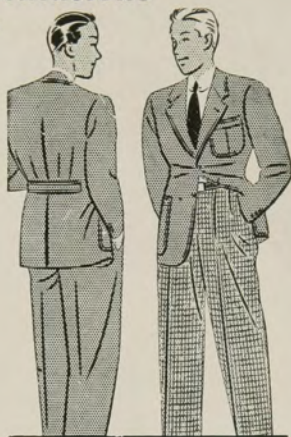
