#### ROCHESTER COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE

Is situated on Lancaster-street, between Elm and Court streets. This Institution was first established in 1827, and is now one of the largest and most flourishing in the State. Rev. Chester Dewey, D. D., Principal and Professor, assisted by N. Brittan, A. M.; by Messrs. L. Wetherell, L. A. Burroughs, jun., and C. N. Simmons; and by George Bartholomew, Professor of Penmanship, Book-keeping, and Mezzotinto Painting; and also by Augustus F. Boyle, Professor of the French language. Miss E. C. Clemons, Principal of the Female Department, assisted by Miss R. Eaton. Number of pupils during the last year, 201. Amount appropriated by the Regents of the University, \$327 82.

## ROCHESTER FEMALE ACADEMY

Is situated at No. 70 South Fitzhugh-street. This Institution was incorporated in 1836. Hon. Ashley Sampson, President of the Board of Trustees. Principal, Miss Aramenta D. Doolittle. Miss Julia F. Tracy and Miss S. Burroughs, Assistant Teachers. Miss Marian McGregor, Instructress in Vocal and Instrumental Music. Number of pupils attending during the last year, 100.

# SEWARD FEMALE SEMINARY:

This Institution was first established in 1835, and was incorporated by the legislature in 1839. It is situated at No. 45 Alexander-street. The pleasure-grounds and gardens comprise four acres of land.—The edifice is large and commodious, and can accommodate from seventy-five to one hundred pupils. The next term begins in April next. Jason W. Seward, A. M., President of Board of Trustees.

### ST. PAUL-STREET (FEMALE) SEMINARY

Is situated at the corner of St. Paul and Pleasant streets. Established in 1839. The teachers are—Miss Mary B. Allen, Principal; and Misses Helen M. Mallett, Amelia D. Colton, Harriet Bryan, and Elizabeth Bloss. Prof. B. Hill, instructor on Piano Forte; Prof. George Bartholomew, teacher of Mezzotinto Drawing. Average number of pupils, from 65 to 70; whole number for the year ending July, 1843, 122.

### ATKINSON (FEMALE) SEMINARY

Is situated at No. 4 Canal-street, and is under the superintendence of Mrs. Wm. Atkinson. First established in June, 1841. Misses C. A. Bloss, M. A. Coggswell and Sarah Ingersoll, teachers. Number of pupils now attending, 35. This number is much less than can be accommodated, and less than usually attend the seminary; but during the long vacation the past season, in consequence of sickness in the family of the proprietor, the pupils have become much scattered.

# PUBLIC SCHOOLS-BOARD OF EDUCATION.

In May, 1841, the legislature passed an act, establishing a free school system in Rochester. Under the operation of this plan, every child in the city may re-

ceive an education, free of all expense, directly—the system being supported by general tax. It is under the government of a Board of Education, consisting of ten Commissioners-two from each Ward-elected annually by the people, and a Superintendent appointed by the Board. The whole number of scholars actually attending these Public Schools, is 4,246; employing the services of forty-five teachers. is divided into fifteen districts, in eleven of which, are newly erected school-houses, which will bear comparison with most of the academies in the State. is also a school for colored children, which embraces the whole city. The aggregate cost of the houses already completed, is upwards of \$35,700. Each of the districts is supplied with a library, and a portion of them with a good Common School apparatus. branches taught are the same as those taught in our best English Schools; and all who will, can here receive a thorough, practical education, "without money or without price." The aggregate number of volumes in the district libraries, is 5000. for the present year, consists of the following gentlemen:

# ORPHAN ASYLUMS.

### THE ROCHESTER ORPHAN ASYLUM

Is situated between Greig and Exchange streets, in the South part of the city, on a beautiful tract of ground, which was the munificent donation of Mr. Greig of Canandaigua. The building has been recently completed, and is a substantial and commodious edifice, fifty feet square, and two stories high, with an attic and basement. It is alike an ornament to the city, and a memorial of the liberality of its inhabitants. The Institution was established in 1836, and incorporated in 1838. Fifty-six children now occupy the Orphan's Home. They are under the maternal care of Mrs. Tober, who has most creditably filled this station for six years. The school is taught by Miss Mary Hosmer, and the Sabbath-school, by Mr. E. Peck.

The charter requires that the estate and financial concerns of the Institution, shall be managed by seven Trustees, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Association. The general supervision of the children, and interests of the asylum, are committed to the Ladies, who constitute a Board of Managers. The present year, the Board is composed of the following Ladies:

# ROMAN CATHOLIC ORPHAN ASYLUM.

This beautiful edifice is situated on the corner of Frank-street and Vought-alley. It was opened for the reception of orphan children, on the 5th of July, 1843. The ground on which it stands was purchased by the congregation of St. Patrick's Church, and the

building was erected principally by them, aided by the liberality of several benevolent citizens. It is provided with beds for twenty-four orphans, of whom the Institution now contains twenty. It is managed at present by Miss Kelly, but will soon be placed under the care of the Sisters of Charity-so eminently qualified for the supervision of such institutions.

This home of the parentless is supported by the contributions of the benevolent, together with the avails of an Orphan's Fair, to be held annually on the 17th

of March.
