FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH.*Under Charge of Fire Department Committee.*

Superintendent—B. F. Blackall. Salary \$1,000. Appointed by the Common Council.

The telegraph was constructed at a cost of \$12,000, by GAMEWELL & Co., of New York (*See page 544*), and was accepted by the city, March, 1869. Alarm is given instantly from the Alarm Boxes to the office of the Fire Department, to each of the engine houses, to City Hall, and to the Arcade, the number of taps indicating the box from which the alarm is given. The taps can also be heard at each of the other boxes. Keys to the boxes are in the hands of the police and the nearest responsible resident to each box. Conversation can be carried on between the office of the Fire Department and the engine houses, and between the engine houses one with another.

The Fire Marshal and the Chief Engineer can communicate also from any box to each of the other boxes, to the engine houses, to the office of the Fire Department and to the City Hall.

The bell on the City Hall is struck daily at 1 P. M. by telegraph, from the store of **John T. Fox, jeweler, No. 3 State Street**, who is appointed by the Common Council to furnish the standard city time.

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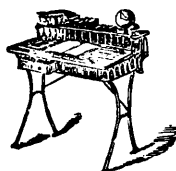

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[Extract from City Ordinance passed June 10, 1868.]

SECTION 8. The prices or rates of fare to be taken or paid to the owners or drivers of hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, shall be as follows, to wit:

1. For conveying a passenger within the limits herein described as Territory No. 1, * * * fifty cents.

2. For conveying a passenger to any point outside the limits of Territory No. 1, and within the limits herein described as Territory No. 2, * * * seventy-five cents.

3. For conveying a passenger from any point within the limits of the city to any point outside the limits of Territory No. 2, and within the limits herein described as Territory No. 3, * * * one dollar.

4. For each additional passenger, twenty-five cents.

5. Half fare shall be allowed for returning to place of starting, provided there is a detention of not longer than fifteen minutes, when over that, full fare.

6. For conveying a pleasure party to Mt. Hope and returning, three dollars—one hour being allowed at the grounds.

7. For the use of hackney coach, cab or carriage by the hour, to the extent of the capacity of the vehicle, one dollar and fifty cents, and same proportion for fractional parts of an hour.

8. For attending a funeral with passengers, including charges for necessary detention and returning with passengers from house, three dollars.

9. For children between eight and twelve years of age, half price only to be charged, and for children under eight years of age, no charge is to be made.

10. A sum exceeding ten dollars shall not be demanded for the use of any hackney coach, cab or carriage in carrying persons to and from the polls on election day.

11. In case of a dispute or disagreement between the driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, and the hirer or occupant thereof, when demanded, said driver shall drive to the nearest policeman, who shall decide the matter and no charges shall be made for the extra drive or ride.

SECTION 9. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage in the city of Rochester, shall ask, demand or receive any larger sum than he or they may be entitled to receive as aforesaid, under the penalty of ten dollars for every such offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or owners, or the driver of any such coaches, cabs or carriages, severally and respectively. And no such owner or driver shall demand or receive from any such person or passenger any extra compensation, of any sum whatever, for carrying and transporting with such person or passenger, in or upon such hackney coach, cab or carriage, any ordinary luggage belonging to any such person or passenger, to or from any of the points of distance above named.

SECTION 12. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, while on the stand heretofore designated, or while waiting for employment at any place other than the house or stable of the owner thereof, between the hours of sunrise and ten o'clock in the evening, shall refuse or neglect to convey any person or persons to any place or places within the limits of the city, upon being applied to for that purpose, and upon being tendered the fare for the same, under a penalty of Five Dollars for every such refusal or neglect, to be sued for and recovered of the owner or driver of any such hackney coach, cab or carriage severally and respectively.

No delivery by carriers on Sunday, but letters can be called for at Post Office from 9½ to 10½ A. M.

RECEIVING BOXES.

Iron boxes for the reception of letters, *pre-paid by stamps, according to law*, have been placed on most of the public buildings, hotels, and at the corners of the principal streets.

Letters are collected from these boxes daily except Sundays, between 6 A. M. and 6:30 P. M.; in the business portions of the city, five times; in the intermediate portions, three times, and in the outer portions, once.

Letters to be *registered* must be taken to the Post Office. Letters collected on holidays at noon.

The streets of Rochester have been declared post routes by the Postmaster General, to the exclusion of all unauthorized letter carriers.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

Letters to any part of the United States, 3 cents for each ½ ounce or part thereof. Drop letters, 2 cents.

Transient newspapers, periodicals, proof sheets, book manuscripts, pamphlets, blanks, and all mailable printed matter (except circulars and books), two cents for each and every 4 ounces. Double these rates are charged for books.

Unsealed circulars (to one address), not exceeding 3 in number, 2 cents, and in the same proportion for a greater number. Unsealed circulars to be delivered in the city, 1 cent.

Seeds, cuttings, roots, etc., 2 cents for each 4 ounces or less quantity; limited to 32 ounces.

All packages of mail matter not charged with letter postage, must be so arranged that the same can be *conveniently* examined by the Postmasters; if not, letter postage will be charged.

No package will be forwarded by mail which weighs over 4 pounds.

All postage matter, for delivery within the United States, must be *prepaid* by stamps, except duly certified letters of soldiers and sailors.

Weekly newspapers (one copy only) sent to actual subscribers within the County where printed and published, *free*.

Letters to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, 6 cents. Prepayment optional; but insufficiently or unpaid letters will be subject to a fine of 6 cents on delivery.

Letters to France, 10 cents for each $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. Prepayment optional.

Letters to other Foreign Countries vary in rate according to the route by which they are sent, and the proper information can be obtained of any Postmaster in the United States.

Direct mails to Hamburg or Bremen will be dispatched from New York on Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week, and closed mails via England and Belgium, on Wednesdays and Saturdays of each week.

New York, Boston, Portland, Detroit and Chicago, are the United States offices of exchange for mails, dispatched to the North German Union.

Valuable letters can be registered for any part of the United States, Canada, Great Britain and Ireland, Holland, the Italian States, or States of the German Austrian Postal Union, on application at the Registry Office, between the hours of 8 A. M. and 5 P. M.
