HOLIDAYS.

There are eight public holidays:—New Years Day, 1st of January; Washington's Birthday, 22d February; Memorial Day, 30th May; Independence Day, 4th of July; Labor Day, 1st September; Tuesday following the first Monday in November or day of State election; any day appointed by the Governor of the State or President of the United States, as a day of public fast or thanksgiving; Christmas Day, 25th of December; also every Saturday, from 12 o'clock noon until 12 o'clock midnight.

When a public holiday falls upon Sunday, the following Monday becomes a public holiday. Notes falling due on Saturday, Sunday, or any public holiday, are payable on the business day next succeeding.

Accepted drafts should be treated as "paper made and dated" at time of acceptance.

The 30th of April, 1889, 100th anniversary of the inauguration of Washington, has been made a legal holiday, and notes falling due on that day must be paid on the 29th of April.

Arbor Day, the first Saturday after May 1st, is not a public holiday.

SOME REASONS WHY NAMES ARE NOT FOUND IN THE DIRECTORY.

Many persons fail to find names on account of not knowing where to look for them. A slight variation in spelling will place names almost exactly alike, far apart. For instance—such names as Brown, Browne, Braun, though pronounced the same, and really the same name, are found in different places in the Directory. So, also, of Conner, Connor, Connors, O'Connor, and many others, each has its own place.

The pronunciation of foreign names usually varies from the pronunciation of such names in English. For instance—if an Irishman pronounces his name Agan, it is probably spelled Eagan or Egan. So, Mar, spelled Meagher or Mahr; Fay, spelled Fahy, etc. In names of nearly all European languages, the sounds of the vowels are usually as follows:—a is ah, e is a, i is e, o is o, u is oo.

In German names, ei and ai are pronounced like I, ie like e, au like ow, eu like oi; j is pronounced like y, w nearly like v, dt and th like t, etc. Thus, a name which is pronounced Yack, may be spelled Jack; Young, Jonge; Roiter, Reuter; Keefer, Kiefer; Line, Lein; and they must be looked for as spelled, not as pronounced.

The letters a, o, u, in a German name, are equivalent to ae, oe, ue, and the name *should be looked for* as if the e appeared.

Owing to the difficulty which foreigners find in getting their names properly pronounced by the Americans with whom they come in contact, they frequently make very decided changes in them; taking sometimes an English name which sounds similar to theirs—as Gilbert for Gebhardt, Rice for Reis, Cole for Kohl, etc.; sometimes translating their names, as Blanc changed to White, Stein to Stone, etc.

Sometimes, members of the same family spell their names in two or three different ways; as Ballantyne, Ballantine, Ballintine; sometimes men bear two or three names, being known by one in their family, another in the shop, and perhaps still another among their associates.

To find a name, you *must know how to spell it*.

SAMPLES OF MERCHANDISE. — The rate is the same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 2 cents. Limit of weight 8¾ oz., except to Great Britain, France, Belgium, Ireland, Switzerland, and Argentine Republic, to which countries the limit of weight is 12 oz.

For Square Measure the square of long measure is used. For measuring land—in the place of acre—the centar which is one square meter, equivalent to 1,550 square inches; the ar which is 100 square meters, equivalent to 119.6 square yards; the hecтар which is 10,000 square meters, equivalent to 2,471.4 acres, are used.

For Cubic Measure the cube of long measure is used; ster is used as a measure of wood in place of cord. The mill, cent, dime, dollar, and eagle of U. S. money exactly illustrate the decimal system of the metric measures,—the mill, cent, dime, corresponding with the milli, centi, deci of the metric system.

Abbreviations.—For meter, liter, and gram, the small initial letter is used, viz: m. l. g.; each division deci, centi, milli, also is abbreviated by using the small initial letters d. c. m.; but each multiple, deka, hekto, kilo, myria, is abbreviated by using the capital initial letter D. H. K. M.

Equivalents.—1 inch equals .0254 meter, or about 2 1-2 centimeters; 1 foot equals .3048 meter, or about 30 centimeters; 1 yard equals .9144 meter, or ab. 10-11 of a meter; 1 mile 1609 meters, or ab. 1.6 kilometers.

1 U. S. liquid quart equals .946 liter, or a little less than 1 liter; 1 U. S. dry quart equals 1.101 liters; 1 U. S. gallon equals 3.785 liters, or about 3.8 liters; 1 U. S. bushel equals 35.24 liters, or about 4-11 of a hektoliter.

1 avoirdupois ounce equals .02835 kilogram, or a little less than 30 grams; 1 Troy and apothecaries ounce equals .06110 kilogram, or a little more than 30 grams; 1 avoirdupois pound equals .45359 kilogram, or about 5-11 of a kilogram; 1 long ton—2240 pounds—equals 1016.05 kilograms, or about 1 metric ton.

Basis of the system.—1. The unit of length, the meter, is the ten millionth part of a quadrant of the meridian of Paris, being 39.37 inches, nearly. 2. The unit of surface, the ar, is the square of ten meters, or a hundred square meters. 3. The unit of capacity, the liter, is a cube whose edge is a tenth of a meter. 4. The unit of weight, the gram, is the weight of a cube of rain-water, whose edge is an hundredth of a meter. From these four primary units all others are derived according to the decimal scale.

Where used.—The system is adopted by the following countries: in exclusive use in France, Germany, Austria, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Norway, Switzerland, Roumania, Brazil; in partial use in Denmark, Greece, Argentine Confederation, Venezuela; legalized, but not in general use, in the United States, Great Britain, Russia, Norway, Sweden, Turkey, Mexico, Chili, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Peru, U. S. of Columbia, Uruguay. In Sweden compulsory law will take effect in 1869.

There are 896 arc electric lights; of this number the Brush Electric Light Co. furnish 668 at a cost to the city of 80 cents per light per night; the Rochester Electric Light Co. furnish 228 at a cost of 28½ cents per light per night.

There are 881 incandescent electric lights furnished to the city by the Edison Electric Illuminating Co. at 4 cents per light per night.

THE CIVIL SERVICE.

By enactment of the legislature, all positions in the public service of Rochester (excepting those filled by public election, the heads of departments, and positions under the city treasurer, or the Board of Education), must be filled from applicants who have successfully passed an examination by a board of civil service examiners.

The boards, consisting of three members, are appointed by the mayor, and not more than two members can be of the same political party.

Whenever a position is to be filled, the examining board will notify the applicants on record, or such number of them as can be conveniently examined, to appear for examination, and appointments must be made by the appointing power from the three soldiers or sailors serving in the late war, who shall have the highest standing in such examination. If an insufficient number of soldiers or sailors pass the examination, others are then eligible. The civil service does not affect removals from office. The civil service is classified as follows:

Schedule B, Part 1. Includes all officers and members of the Police and Fire Departments.

Schedule B, Part 2. Includes subordinate officers, clerks, and assistants not included in Part 1. Laborers and day workmen are not subject to examination.

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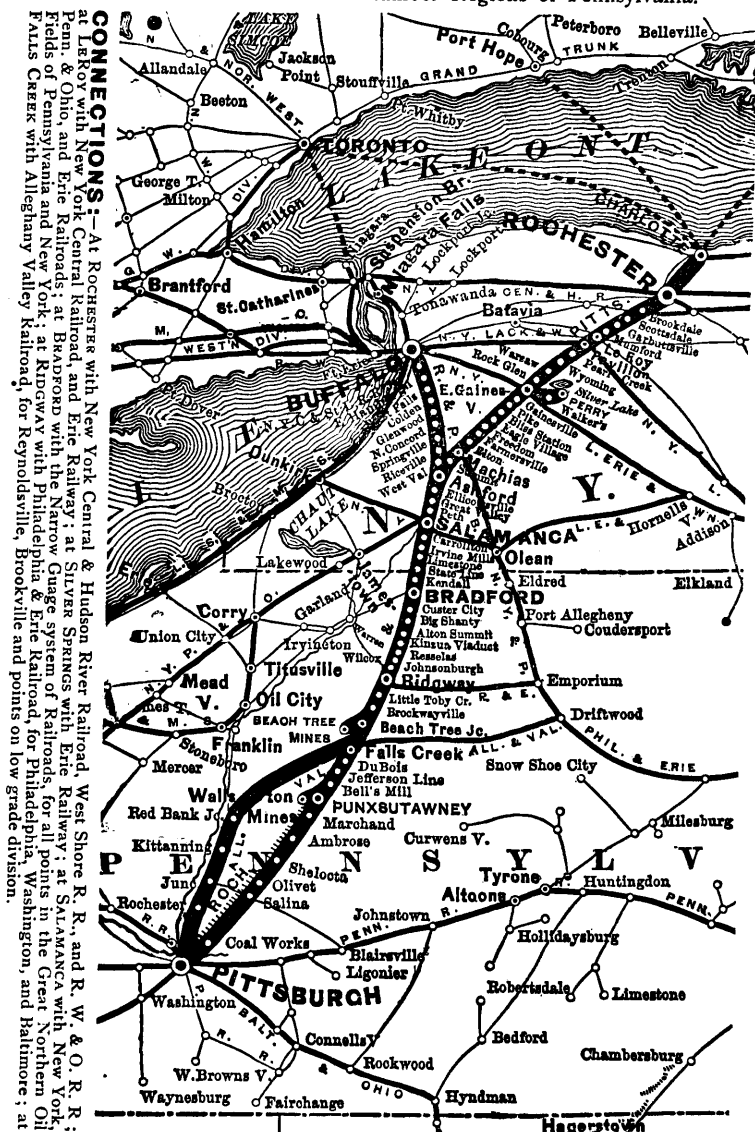

CARRIAGE AND HACK FARES.

HACKNEY COACHES AND CARRIAGES. *Enacted April 17, 1888.*

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows :

SECTION 6. Hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, **waiting for employment**, shall at all times stand, Sundays excepted, on the south side of West Main street, from Irving place to Fitzhugh street, with the horses' heads turned toward the east, and on the west side of Irving place from West Main street to the northeast corner of the Court House; and on the east side of Fitzhugh street from West Main street to the northwest corner of the City Hall, but not so as to obstruct or prevent access to the watering trough, nor to clean or wash any vehicle on said stand, with the horses' heads turned towards the north, or at such other place or places as the Mayor, under the direction of the Common Council, may designate, and not elsewhere, under the penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for each offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or driver thereof, severally and respectively.

The omnibuses of the different hotels of said city shall be allowed to stand next to the New York Central & Hudson River R. R. depot on the north side of Central avenue.

No hackney coach, cab or carriage, while upon, or at or near said stand, shall stand abreast or along side of any other coach, cab or carriage, under a penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for each offense, to be sued for and recovered from the owner and driver thereof, severally and respectively.

§ 8. The prices or **rates of fare** to be taken or paid to the owner or drivers of hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, shall be as follows, to wit:

1st. For conveying a passenger within the limits herein described as territory No. 1, **FIFTY CENTS**.

2d. For conveying passengers from any point within the territory herein described as No. 2, to any point outside of the limits of territory No. 1; and within the limits herein described as territory No. 2, **SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS**.

3d. For conveying a passenger from any point within the limits of the city to any point outside of the limits of territory No. 2, and within the limits herein described as territory No. 3, **ONE DOLLAR**.

4th. For each additional passenger, **TWENTY-FIVE CENTS**.

5th. **Half fare** shall be allowed for returning to place of starting, provided there is a detention of not longer than fifteen minutes, when over that, full fare.

6th. For conveying a pleasure party to **Mt. Hope** and return, **THREE DOLLARS**—one hour being allowed at the grounds.

7th. For the use of a hackney coach, cab or carriage **by the hour**, to the extent of the capacity of the vehicle, **ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTY CENTS**, and the same proportion for fractional parts of an hour.

8th. For attending a funeral with passengers, including charges for necessary detention and returning with passengers to house, **THREE DOLLARS** at Mt. Hope cemetery, and **FOUR DOLLARS** at the Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

9th. For **children** between eight and twelve years of age, half price only to be charged, and for children under eight years of age, no charge is to be made.

10th. A sum exceeding ten dollars shall not be demanded for the use of any hackney coach, cab or carriage in carrying persons to and from the polls on **election day**.

11th. In case of a dispute or disagreement between the driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, and the hirer or occupant thereof, when demanded, said driver shall drive to the nearest policeman, who shall decide the matter, and no charge shall be made for the extra drive or ride.

Territory No. 1, for which **FIFTY CENTS** is to be charged:

Beginning on Union street at its intersection with University avenue; thence westerly along University avenue to Scio street; thence northerly along Scio street to Tappan street; thence westerly along Tappan street to North avenue; thence along North avenue to Hudson street; thence northerly along Hudson street to Harrison street; thence westerly along Harrison street to Chatham street; thence along Chatham street to Hamburg street; thence westerly along Hamburg street to Joiner street; thence westerly in a direct line to the corner of Clinton and Ward streets; thence westerly along Ward street to St. Paul street; thence northerly along St. Paul street to Gorham street; thence in a direct line to the intersection of the west bank of the Genesee river with Vincent place; thence westerly along Vincent place to Lake avenue; thence westerly along Smith street to Grape street; thence southerly along Grape street to Wilder street; thence southerly along Wilder street to Brown street; thence westerly along Brown street to Maple street; thence easterly along Maple street to Madison street; thence southerly along Madison street and Reynolds street to Bronson avenue; thence easterly along Bronson avenue to Caledonia avenue; thence southerly along Caledonia avenue to Glasgow street; thence easterly along Glasgow street to the Genesee river; thence easterly in a direct line to the corner of Mt. Hope avenue and Alexander street; thence easterly along Alex-

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ander street to Pearl street; thence northerly along Pearl street to Union street; thence northerly along Union street to the place of beginning.

Territory No. 2, for which **SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS** is to be charged:

Beginning at East avenue at its intersection with Meigs street; thence westerly along East avenue to Prince street; thence northerly along Prince street to Main street; thence in a direct line to the corner of Ontario and Union streets; thence westerly along Ontario street to Scio street; thence northerly along Scio street to Lewis street; thence westerly along Lewis street to Finney street; thence northerly along Finney street to Tyler street; thence westerly along Tyler street to North avenue; thence northerly along North avenue and North street to Woodbury street; thence westerly along Woodbury street to Hudson street; thence northerly along Hudson street to Hudson park; thence westerly along Hudson park and Baden street to St. Joseph street; thence northerly along St. Joseph street to Catharine street; thence westerly along Catharine street to Clinton street; thence northerly along Clinton street to Lowell street; thence westerly along Lowell street to St. Paul street; thence in a direct line to the corner of Ambrose and Cliff streets; thence westerly along Ambrose street to Lake avenue, and thence to Jones avenue; thence westerly along Jones avenue to the Erie Canal; thence southerly along the Erie Canal to Lyell avenue; thence westerly along Lyell avenue to Orchard street; thence southerly along Orchard street and continuation of the same to Brown street; thence westerly along Brown street to West avenue; thence southerly along Genesee street to Bronson avenue; thence easterly along Bronson avenue to the west line of the "Greig tract"; thence southerly along the west line of said tract to Champlain street; thence easterly along Champlain street to Jefferson avenue; thence southerly along Jefferson avenue to Bartlett street; thence easterly along Bartlett street to Plymouth avenue; thence northerly along Plymouth avenue to Clarissa street; thence easterly along Clarissa street to Mt. Hope avenue; thence northerly along Mt. Hope avenue to Gregory street; thence easterly along Gregory street and Grand street to Cayuga street; thence easterly along Cayuga street to Nelson street; thence northerly along Nelson street to Monroe avenue; thence easterly along Monroe avenue to Meigs street; thence northerly along Meigs street to the place of beginning.

Territory No. 3, for which **ONE DOLLAR** is to be charged:

All the territory outside of the boundaries mentioned and described in territory No. 2, and between that and the city limits.

§ 9. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, in the city of Rochester, shall ask, demand, or receive any **larger sum** than he or they may be entitled to receive as aforesaid, under the penalty of **TEN DOLLARS** for every such offense, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or owners, or the driver of any such coaches, cabs or carriages, severally and respectively. And no such owner or driver shall demand or receive from any such person or passenger, any **extra compensation**, or any sum whatever, for carrying and transporting with such person or passenger, in or upon such hackney coach, cab or carriage, any ordinary baggage or luggage belonging to any such person or passenger to or from any of the points or distances above named.

§ 10. The number of the license of every hackney coach, cab or carriage shall be painted in legible characters on the outside thereof, or on the lamps, and a printed copy of the map describing the territory, and of the different rates of fare to be charged, together with section eight of this ordinance, shall be framed and hung up in some conspicuous place in the inside of such coach, cab or carriage, under a penalty of **TEN DOLLARS** for each offense, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or driver of such hackney coach, cab or carriage severally and respectively.

Every driver of a hackney coach, cab or carriage, licensed as hereinbefore provided, shall, on each and every occasion, when his carriage shall be hired, deliver to the hirer thereof a **card** with the name of the owner, the driver and the number of the hack thereon, under a penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for each offense, to be sued for and recovered in the manner herein provided.

Each driver of a hackney coach, cab or carriage, licensed as hereinbefore provided, shall wear in some conspicuous place on his hat or cap, painted or printed in a plain, legible manner, the word "**Hackman**," the letters to be not less than one half-inch in length, and the number of his hack, cab or carriage in figures on each side, not less than one inch, under a penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for each offense, to be sued for and recovered in the manner herein provided.

§ 12. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, while on any of the stands heretofore designated, or waiting for employment at any place other than the house or the stable of the owner thereof, between the hours of sunrise and ten o'clock in the evening, shall **refuse and neglect to convey any person** or persons to any place or places within the limits of the city, upon being applied to for that purpose, and upon being tendered the fare for the same, under a penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for every such refusal or neglect, to be sued for and recovered of the owner or driver of any such hackney coach, cab or carriage severally and respectively.

PENAL ORDINANCE RELATING TO NUISANCES.

An Ordinance relating to nuisances, public peace and good order; riots, disturbances and disorderly assemblages; vagrants, mendicants, street beggars, and persons soliciting alms or subscriptions; hawking and peddling; horse racing, and immoderate driving or riding; privies and other offensive or unwholesome houses or places, and the removal, cleansing and abatement of the same; bathing in public waters and the preservation of public health and the cleanliness of the city. Enacted October 26, 1886.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do Ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. No person shall make, aid, countenance or assist in making any **riot, noise, disturbance**, false alarm of fire, or improper diversion in any of the streets, lanes, alleys or other public places, or on any public or private premises, or elsewhere in the city of Rochester, to the annoyance or disturbance of any of the citizens or travelers or others, under a penalty of and be fined not less than two dollars nor more than five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 2. No person shall sound any **gong** in the street, or in any alley, upon any sidewalk, or upon any piazza, balcony, steps or platform adjoining any sidewalk or street in the city of Rochester, under a penalty of and be fined ten dollars for each offense.

SECTION 3. No tenant or occupant of any dwelling in the city of Rochester shall permit any **gong** to be sounded upon any street, alley or sidewalk, or upon any piazza, balcony, stoop, step or platform adjoining any street or sidewalk in said city, under a penalty of and be fined ten dollars for each offense.

SECTION 4. No person shall carry and use upon any wagon while passing along or being upon any street, lane or alley in the city of Rochester any **gong** similar to that used on trucks and engines of the fire department of the city of Rochester, under a penalty of and be fined five dollars for each offense, except that the provisions of this section are hereby declared not to apply to any wagon, truck or cart used as a part of the police patrol system, or the fire department, nor to any wagon used by any officer of the police or fire department of said city while engaged in the discharge of their duty as such officers.

SECTION 5. No person shall **scatter or distribute any cards**, dodgers, advertisements, or any **printed matter** whatever, other than periodical publications, in or upon any of the public streets, lanes or alleys within the city of Rochester, or sidewalks of said city, to the annoyance of any person, under a penalty of and be fined five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 6. * * * * *

SECTION 7. No person shall **drive or ride**, or cause or suffer to be ridden or driven, any **horse**, mare, gelding or other animal, in, upon, or through any public street, lane or alley of the city of Rochester, (except East avenue and Lake avenue between the hours of three and six p. m., from the 15th day of December to the 15th day of March) at a speed exceeding six miles per hour, under a penalty of and be fined ten dollars for each offense.

SECTION 8. No person or persons shall **ride or drive**, or cause to be ridden or driven, any **horse**, mare, gelding, or other animal, upon or over any of the **bridges** within the city of Rochester, excepting the bridge over the Genesee river on Main street, or over the crosswalk of any street, lane or alley in said city, faster than a walk, excepting the fire department in case of an alarm of fire, under a penalty of and be fined five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 9. Every **owner** of every inhabited lot within the city of Rochester, and the occupant of every such lot, when the owner thereof is a non-resident, shall **provide** and keep upon such lot a convenient **privy**, with a vault at least four feet deep, or a suitable **water-closet**, under a penalty of and be fined five dollars for every twenty-four hours any violation of this ordinance shall be continued.

SECTION 10. No tub, box or other **receptacle**, nor the contents thereof, shall be **removed** from any **privy** within the city of Rochester, except between the hours of eleven at night and three in the morning, from the first day of May to the first day of October in any year except by some odorless process, under a penalty of and be fined twenty-five dollars for each offense; nor shall any person, under a like penalty, empty or deposit the contents of any such tub or receptacle out of any **privy** into any place within the limits of the said city, or in, upon, or into any public street, alley, lane, canal or public square, or into the river, except at the places designated therefor by the Mayor or Board of Health, under a penalty of and be fined fifty dollars for each offense.

SECTION 11. It shall be the duty of such person as may be specially authorized for that purpose by the **Board of Health** of the city of Rochester to enter into and upon, and **examine** any lot, yard, building, cellar, alley, basin, slip, **drain**, **vault**, **privy**, or any other place within the limits of the said city of Rochester; and if the same shall be found to be foul, incumbered with rubbish, damp, sunken or ill-constructed, or to contain any filth or other offensive substance or nuisance, to **direct the removal** of all such nuisance, filth or other offensive substance, or the cleansing or repairing of

any drain, vault or privy, upon any such lot of ground or premises by the owner or agent of the owner, lessor, lessee or occupant of the same, within twenty-four hours after directions from the person authorized as aforesaid. And any person who shall refuse or neglect to comply with such directions, after such notice as aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of and be fined twenty-five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 12. No person shall **deposit**, or cause to be deposited, any dead animal, fish or putrid meat, entrails, shells of oysters or clams, decayed fruit or vegetables, or the skin of any fruit or vegetables or any other **filthy or offensive substance**, in or upon any public street, lane, park or alley, or other public place, or on the surface of the ground in any lot, or in any canal, or any basin attached thereto, or in the Genesee river, except as herein provided, or in any mill-race, or canal, or on any bank thereof, in the city of Rochester, or suffer any stagnant or filthy water, or any putrid or unwholesome meats, decayed fruits or vegetables, or other filthy or offensive substance, to remain on his or her lot, or in his or her house, or other building or cellar, or in or upon any boat in any canal, or in the Genesee river within the limits of said city, under a penalty of and be fined not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense, and the expense and charge which the said corporation shall or may incur in removing or abating such nuisance.

The Police Justice or any Alderman, the Executive Board or any member thereof, the Superintendent of Streets, or any person authorized by them, or either of them, or any policeman, may, at any time, enter into or upon any house, cellar, boat, lot or other place, and remove or abate such nuisance in such manner as shall be judged best. And every person obstructing or hindering such removal or abatement shall forfeit and pay a penalty and be fined twenty-five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 13. No person shall throw or place upon the sidewalk of any public street, lane, park, alley or other public place in the city of Rochester any **banana, orange, lemon, apple, or any other fruit, skin or peel**, under a penalty of and be fined two dollars for each offense.

SECTION 14. No person shall fly a **kite** within the city of Rochester, under a penalty of and be fined two dollars for each offense.

SECTION 15. No person shall cast or throw any **hide or skin**, tanned or not tanned, out of any door or window of any building above the first story, fronting on any public street, lane or alley of the city of Rochester, or cause any such untanned hide to be suspended from or laid upon any post, or elsewhere, in any public street, lane or alley of such city, under a penalty of and be fined two dollars for each offense.

SECTION 16. No person shall **cut, injure, deface**, mar or tarnish any public or private **building**, electric or other wire, bridge, street sign, lamp, lamp-post, or any property belonging to the corporation or any private person; nor any well, pump, **fence, tree**, awning, useful or ornamental improvement, within the limits of or public work in the city of Rochester, nor break any window or window-glass in any private or public building or place of worship in said city, nor aid or abet, or assist therein, under a penalty of and be fined ten dollars for each offense.

SECTION 17. No person shall **carry on**, within the city of Rochester, any business or **manufactory** of such a character, or in such a manner, as shall produce or cause such **dense smoke**, or such loud and disturbing **noises** as to be a nuisance; nor shall any person, in the process of any **manufactory** or business, or in any manner cause to be set afloat in the air, or scattered, or deposited upon any house or lands, or public street, lane or alley, within said city, any cinders, or soot, **dirt, dust, sawdust, shavings** or other objectionable dirt, dust or matter, so as to be a nuisance; and no person shall **carry on** any manufactory or business in said city of such a character or in such a manner as shall cause or produce disturbing **noises** in any of the public streets, lanes or alleys in or of the city; and every person who shall violate or offend against any of the provisions of this section, shall forfeit and pay the penalty of and be fined fifty dollars for each offense, and the further penalty of and be fined fifty dollars for each and every day that such offense shall be continued after notice from any city officer to discontinue the same, or fined not less than ten dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, or both.

SECTION 18. Any person who shall **swim or bathe** in any canal, basin, mill-race or river within the limits of the city of Rochester, shall be subject to a penalty of, and be fined five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 19. Every execution issued upon a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance, or any provision thereof, except as is hereinbefore otherwise specially provided, shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant, if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary; and any person violating any provision of this ordinance and failing to **pay the penalty** and fine imposed therefor, shall be imprisoned in said penitentiary for a term not exceeding one hundred days.

SECTION 20. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

WARD BOUNDARIES AND ELECTION DISTRICTS.

Ward 1.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of Allen street; thence easterly along the centre of Allen street to the centre of State street; thence southerly along the centre of State street to the centre of Mumford street; thence easterly along the centre of Mumford street to the centre of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Ward 2.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of Mumford street; thence running westerly along the centre of Mumford street to the centre of State street; thence northerly along the centre of State street to the centre of Allen street; thence westerly along the centre of Allen street to the centre of the Erie canal; thence northerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of Jay street; thence easterly along the centre of Jay street and the centre line thereof continued easterly to the centre of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Ward 3.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of the Genesee Valley canal; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee Valley canal to the south line of the Strong tract; thence along the south line of the Strong tract to the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Atkinson street, west of a line drawn through the centre of Plymouth avenue from Atkinson street to Troup street, and north of a line drawn through the centre of Troup street from Plymouth avenue to Exchange street.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Atkinson street, east of a line drawn through the centre of Plymouth avenue from Atkinson street to Troup street, and south of a line drawn through the centre of Troup street from Plymouth avenue to Exchange street.

Ward 4.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of East Main street; thence running easterly along the centre of East Main street to the centre of East avenue; thence along the centre of East avenue to the centre of William street; thence southerly along the centre of William street to the centre of Howell street; thence westerly along the centre of Howell street, and the centre line thereof continued westerly, to the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Ward 5.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East Main street and of the Genesee river; thence running northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the north boundary* of the city; thence easterly and southerly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of Clinton street; thence southerly along the centre of Clinton street to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Gorham street.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Gorham street.

Ward 6.—Beginning at a point in the centre of North street and of the New York Central Railroad track; running thence westerly along the centre of said railroad track to a point in a line with the centre of Nassau street; thence westerly along the centre of Nassau street and in a direct line continued to the centre of Clinton street; thence southerly along the centre of Clinton street to the centre of East Main street; thence easterly along the centre of East Main street to the centre of North street; thence northerly along the centre of North street to the place of beginning.

Ward 7.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East avenue and of William street; thence running southerly along the centre of William street to the centre of Howell street; thence westerly along the centre of Howell street, and the centre line of Howell street continued westerly, to the centre of the Erie canal; thence easterly along the centre of the Erie canal to the east boundary line* of the city; thence northerly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of East avenue; thence westerly along the centre of East avenue to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying west of a line drawn through the centre of Alexander street from Erie canal to Pearl street, southwest of a line drawn through the centre of Pearl street from Alexander street to South Union and west of a line drawn through the centre of South Union street.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying east of a line drawn through the centre of Alexander street from the Erie canal to Pearl street, northeast of a line drawn through the centre of Pearl street from Alexander street to South Union street and east of a line drawn through the centre of South Union street.

Ward 8.—Beginning at a point in the centre of Brown street and of the Erie canal; thence running southerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of the Genesee Valley canal;

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thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee Valley canal to the south line of the Strong tract; thence easterly along the south line of the Strong tract to the centre of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the south boundary line* of the city; thence westerly and northerly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of West avenue; thence easterly along the centre of West avenue to the centre of Brown street; thence easterly along the centre of Brown street to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward which is bounded as follows: Beginning at a point in the centre of Troup street at the intersection of the Genesee Valley Canal Railroad; thence westerly along the centre of Troup street to the centre of Prospect street; thence southerly along the centre of Prospect street to the intersection of the centre line of Clifton street; thence westerly along the centre of Clifton street to the centre of Genesee street; thence southerly along the centre of Genesee street to the intersection of the centre line of Moran street; thence westerly along the centre line of Moran street and said line continued to the west line of the Eighth Ward.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all of the territory included within the boundaries of the Eighth Ward, and situated and lying south of the above described line and north of a line beginning at a point at the intersection of the centre line of Frost avenue with the west line of the Eighth Ward and extending easterly along the centre of Frost avenue to the centre of Plymouth avenue; thence northerly along Plymouth avenue to the Genesee Valley Canal Railroad.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 3, comprises all of the territory situated and lying south of the last described line and included within the boundaries of Ward Eight.

Ward 9.—Beginning at a point in the centre of Jay street and of the Erie canal, and running thence easterly along the centre of Jay street, and Jay street continued, to the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the north boundary* of the city; thence westerly and southerly along the boundary* of the city to the centre of the Erie canal; thence southeasterly along the centre of the Erie canal to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all of that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Lorimer street.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all of that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Lorimer street.

Ward 10.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East Main and of North streets; thence running easterly along the centre of East Main street and East avenue to the east boundary line* of the city; thence northerly and westerly along the east and north boundary line of the city to a point in a line with the centre line of Scio street continued northerly; thence southerly through the centre of Scio street to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the place of beginning.

Ward 11.—Beginning at a point in the centre of Brown street and of the Erie canal and running thence along the centre of the Erie canal northwesterly to the west boundary* of the city; thence southerly along the west boundary to the centre of West avenue; thence easterly along the centre of West avenue to the centre of Brown street; thence easterly along the centre of Brown street to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Campbell, east of a line drawn through the centre of Grape from Campbell street to Jay street, and south of a line drawn through the centre of Jay street from Grape street to the Erie canal.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Campbell street, west of a line drawn through the centre of Grape street from Campbell street to Jay street, and north of a line drawn through the centre of Jay street from Grape street to the Erie canal.

Ward 12.—Beginning at a point where the centre line of Howell street continued westward intersects with the centre of Genesee river; thence running easterly along the centre line of Howell street continued to the centre of the Erie canal; thence along the centre of the Erie canal to the eastern boundary of the city; thence southerly and westerly along the boundary* of the city to the centre of the Genesee river; thence along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Gregory and Grand streets.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Gregory and Grand streets.

Ward 13.—Beginning at a point in the centre of North street and of the New York Central Railroad track; running thence westerly along the centre of the New York Central Railroad track to a point in a line in the centre of Nassau street; thence westerly along the centre of Nassau street, and in a direct line continued to the centre of Clinton street; thence northerly along the centre of Clinton street to the north boundary* line of the city; thence easterly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of North street; thence southerly along the centre of North street to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying west of a line drawn through the centre of Chatham, from Hamburg street to Kelly street; north of a line drawn

through the centre of Kelly street from Chatham street to Hanover street; west of a line drawn through the centre of Hanover street; north of a line drawn through the centre of Herman street from Hanover street to Thomas street; west of a line drawn through the centre of Thomas street.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying east of a line drawn through the centre of Chatham, from Hamburg street to Kelly street; south of a line drawn through the centre of Kelly street from Chatham street to Hanover street; east of a line drawn through the centre of Hanover street; south of a line drawn through the centre of Herman street from Hanover street to Thomas street; east of a line drawn through the centre of Thomas street.

Ward 14.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East Main and of North streets; thence running northerly along the centre of North street to the boundary line*; thence easterly and southerly along the boundary line of the city to a point which would be intersected by continuing the central line of Scio street northerly; thence southerly through the centre of Scio street to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the place of beginning.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the Fourteenth ward as at present constituted, lying south of the following described boundary line: Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of North avenue with the centre line of Kirk street; thence easterly along the centre line of Kirk street to its intersection with the centre line of Scio street.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that portion of the Fourteenth ward as at present constituted, lying north of the above described boundary line.

Ward 15.—All that part of the city lying west of the centre of the Genesee river and not included in either of the above described fourteen wards. (*See City Boundaries, below.*)

Ward 16.—All that part of the city lying east of the centre of the Genesee river and not included in either of the above described fifteen wards. (*See City Boundaries, below.*)

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying west of a line drawn through the centre of North avenue.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying east of a line drawn through the centre of North avenue and north of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. track.

ELECTION DISTRICT No. 3, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. track.

CITY BOUNDARIES.

Established by an Act to Amend the Charter of the City of Rochester and to Extend its Boundaries. Passed February 15, 1880. Extract:

SECTION 2. The boundaries of the said city shall be as follows: Beginning at a point in the present town of Irondequoit, at a point in the middle of the ridge road, eight chains and seventy-five links distant from the top of the east bank of the Genesee river; thence south fifteen minutes east, to the south line of the highway known as Norton street; thence easterly along the south line of the highway, running through the north-easterly corner of lot number forty-eight in said town; thence south-easterly along the westerly line of said highway to the south line of lot number fifty in said town, where the same intersects the west line of the highway commonly called the Schanck or Culver road; thence southerly along the west line of said highway and in said line produced to the north line of lot number forty-five in the town of Brighton; thence westerly along the north line of lot number forty-five, and in said line produced to the east line of lot number sixty-one; thence southerly along the east line of said lot to the intersection thereof with the south line of the Pinnacle road; thence westerly along the south line of said road to the highway known as South avenue; thence southerly along the east line of said avenue to the south line of lot number twenty-three in the town of Brighton; thence westerly on a line in continuation of the south line of said lot number twenty-three produced to the west bank of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the west bank of said river to the south line of the town of Gates; thence westerly along the south line of the town of Gates to a point on the south line of lot forty-six in said town, which would intersect the east line of lots seventy-five, seventy-six and one hundred and sixty-eight in said town of Gates, if produced southerly to the south line of the said town; thence northerly on the east line of lots seventy-five, seventy-six and one hundred and sixty-eight, produced to the south line of lot twenty-two in said town; thence westerly on the south line of lot twenty-two to the east line of the highway; thence northerly on the east line of said highway to the north line of lot twenty-two; thence easterly on the north line of lot twenty-two to a point intersected by the east line of lot number one hundred and sixty-eight produced southerly; thence northerly on east line of lot number one hundred and sixty-eight produced south to the last line of lot one hundred and sixty-eight and along the east lines of lots one hundred and sixty-eight, seventy-six, seventy-five, seventy-four and seventy-three, in the town of Gates, continued on the east line of lots seventy-two, seventy-one and seventy in the town of Greece, to a point twenty rods north of the centre of the highway of the town of Greece, known as the Big Ridge road; thence easterly in a line parallel with the centre of said road and twenty rods distant northerly therefrom, and on said line produced to the top of the east high bank of the Genesee river; thence, southerly on the top of said bank to a point due west from the place of beginning; thence easterly to the place of beginning.

ADVERTISING ON LAMP POSTS, TELEGRAPH POLES.

An Ordinance to prevent the posting or placing of bills and advertisements upon trees, telephone, telegraph and electric light poles and lamp posts in the city of Rochester. Passed April 3, 1888.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

SECTION 1. No person, association or corporation shall place, or cause, or suffer to be placed, fastened or secured, any bill, notice, advertisement or sign of any kind, upon, against, or fastened to, any tree, telephone, telegraph or electric light or public or private pole or lamp post in, or any fence or public building in or adjacent to, any of the public streets, avenues or places within the city of Rochester, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offense, and a like penalty for each twenty-four hours the same remains without permission first being had and obtained, in writing, from the Common Council of the city.

SECTION 2. The permission specified in section 1 of this ordinance may be revoked at any time without notice by the Common Council, and shall, at no time, permit any sign or advertisement of any kind mentioned in said section that shall project laterally from any such pole or post beyond ten inches on either side thereof, and shall not be lower than seven and one-half feet from the surface of the sidewalk underneath, and shall be conditioned upon the consent of the owner of the premises in front of which the same shall be so placed being had and obtained.

SECTION 3. Every execution issued upon a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance, or any of the provisions thereof, shall command the amount to be made off the property of the defendant, or defendants, if any such can be found, and, if not, then to commit the defendant, or defendants, to the Monroe County Penitentiary for a period of twenty days.

SECTION 4. The passage of this ordinance shall not effect the repeal of any ordinance in force at the time of such passage where any penalty or fine under any provision thereof has been at any time heretofore incurred, by any person, association or corporation, but such ordinance, and the penalty or fine incurred thereunder, shall continue in full force and effect for the purpose of the collection thereof.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

By gift of Mr. Mortimer F. Reynolds, the books of the old Athenæum Library, amounting to about 18,000 volumes, have become the property of this library, and he has in addition given it money and the free use of eight spacious rooms over the Post Office. Large additions have been made to the library, both by purchase and gift. The Reference Department was opened for free consultation in January, 1886, and shortly after the free loan of books from the Juvenile Department was begun. 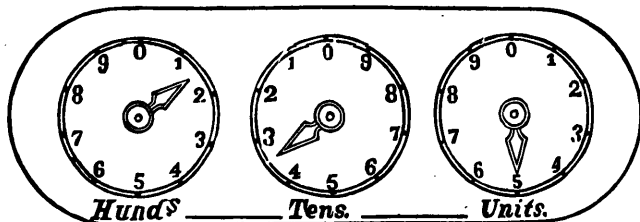

TO CONSUMERS.


The following explanations will enable any person to understand the process of ascertaining the Registry of the Gas Meter, and by making observations every day, or at short intervals, to satisfy himself that the meter registers with uniform accuracy the amount of gas that passes through it. The following diagrams show the "Indexes" seen on the front of every meter.

EXPLANATION OF INDEX.



The figure or division on the different faces of the index indicates as follows, viz: On the Right Hand Face, *Hundreds*, as 100, 200, 300 cubic feet, &c.; on the Middle Face, *Thousands*, as 1,000, 2,000, 3,000 cubic feet, &c.; on the Left Hand Face, *Tens of Thousands*, as 10,000, 20,000, &c., and in this way multiplying by ten for every additional face.

TO TELL THE STATE OF THE METER.—Look at the *left hand* face of the Index, and set down the figure of *least* value next the hand, which on the diagram is 1. Next look at the *middle* face and as before set down the figure of the *least* Value next the hand, which on the diagram is 3. Next upon the *right hand* face, take the same relative figure, which is 5, and you have the figures 1, 3, 5, to which last figure add two ciphers to represent hundreds, and the sum 13,500 is shown to be the present state of the meter. If a previous observation has been taken, subtract the state of the meter at *that* time from the *present* state, and you have the amount consumed in the interval.

 In case of the failure of the gas from any cause, immediate notice of the fact should be left at the Company's office, No 62 Mumford Street. At night ring the carriage bell on Mumford Street.
