UNITED STATES POSTAL NOTES.

Postal Notes may be obtained in any office that issues money orders, for any amount, from 1 ct. to \$4.00, inclusive, upon payment of 8 cts. in addition; they are made payable to the bearer in any money-order office in the U. S., named on their face, or in the office where procured, at any time within 8 months from the last day of the month of issue.

POSEAGE RATES.

FOREIGN.

UNIVERSAL POSTAL UNION.

The rates for the countries and places which belong to the Postal Union, a list of which is given below, are as follows:—

Prepayment optional, except for registered articles, but on printed matter and samples, postage must be at least partially prepaid.

LETTERS. — 5 cents per 15 grammes, a weight very slightly over one half ounce.—**POST CARDS.** — 2 cents each.

PRINTED MATTER. — 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz.

COMMERCIAL PAPERS (Insurance Documents, Way Bills, Invoices, Papers of Legal Procedure, Manuscripts of Works, &c.) — The same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 5 cents.

SAMPLES OF MERCHANDISE. — The rate is the same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 2 cents. Limit of weight 8¾ oz., except to Great Britain, France, Belgium, Ireland, Switzerland, Italy, and Argentine Republic, to which countries the limit of weight is 12 oz.

To Canada, comprising *British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island*, the postage for letters, printed matter, merchandise, etc., is the same as in the United States. All matter for Canada must be fully prepaid, except letters, which must be prepaid at least 2 cents.

Parcels to Jamaica, British Honduras, Bahamas, Mexico, Colombia, Salvador, Costa Rica, Hawaiian Islands, Leeward Islands, Barbadoes, and Danish West Indies, not exceeding one pound, 12 cents; each additional pound or fraction, 12 cents.

To Mexico, postage is the same as in the United States.

All mail matter may be registered to the above places.

To Canada (including *Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, etc.*), New Foundland, France and Algeria, Belgium, Switzerland, Italy, Portugal, the Netherlands, Germany, Austria-Hungary, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, the Hawaiian Islands, New South Wales, New Zealand, and Queensland, Victoria, Tasmania, the Leeward Islands, and Japan, the same ratio of fees,—a maximum single order not to exceed \$100.

HOLIDAYS.

There are eight public holidays:—New Years Day, 1st of January; Washington's Birthday, 22d February; Memorial Day, 30th May; Independence Day, 4th of July; Labor Day, 1st Monday in September; Tuesday following the first Monday in November or day of State election; any day appointed by the Governor of the State or President of the United States, as a day of public fast or thanksgiving; Christmas Day, 25th of December; also every Saturday, from 12 o'clock noon until 12 o'clock midnight.

When a public holiday falls upon Sunday, the following Monday becomes a public holiday.

Notes falling due on Saturday, Sunday, or any public holiday, are payable on the business day next succeeding.

Accepted drafts should be treated as "paper made and dated" at time of acceptance.

Arbor Day, the first Saturday after May 1st, is not a public holiday.

SOME REASONS WHY NAMES ARE NOT FOUND IN THE DIRECTORY.

Many persons fail to find names on account of not knowing where to look for them. A slight variation in spelling will place names almost exactly alike, far apart. For instance—such names as Brown, Browne, Braun, though pronounced the same, and really the same name, are found in different places in the Directory. So, also, of Conner, Connor, Connors, O'Connor, and many others, each has its own place.

The pronunciation of foreign names usually varies from the pronunciation of such names in English. For instance—if an Irishman pronounces his name Agan, it is probably spelled Eagan or Egan. So, Mar, spelled Meagher or Maht; Fay, spelled Fahy, etc. In names of nearly all European languages, the sounds of the vowels are usually as follows:—a is ah, e is ä, i is ē, o is o, u is oo.

In German names, el and al are pronounced like f, ie like ē, au like ow, eu like oi; j is pronounced like y, w nearly like v, dt and th like t, etc. Thus, a name which is pronounced Yack, may be spelled Jack; Young, Jonge; Roiter, Reuter; Keefer, Kiefer; Line, Lein; and they must be looked for as spelled, not as pronounced.

The letters ä, ö, ü, in a German name, are equivalent to ae, oe, ue, and the name *should be looked for* as if the e appeared.

Owing to the difficulty which foreigners find in getting their names properly pronounced by the Americans with whom they come in contact, they frequently make very decided changes in them; taking sometimes an English name which sounds similar to theirs—as Gilbert for Gebhardt, Rice for Reis, Cole for Kohl, etc.; sometimes translating their names, as Blanc changed to White, Stein to Stone, etc.

Sometimes, members of the same family spell their names in two or three different ways; as Ballantyne, Ballantine, Ballintine; sometimes men bear two or three names, being known by one in their family, another in the shop, and perhaps still another among their associates.

To find a name, you *must know how to spell it*.

For Square Measure the square of long measure is used. For measuring land—in the place of acre—the centar which is one square meter, equivalent to 1.550 square inches; the ar which is 100 square meters, equivalent to 119.6 square yards; the hektar which is 10,000 square meters, equivalent to 2.47114 acres, are used.

For Cubic Measure the cube of long measure is used; ster is used as a measure of wood in place of cord.

The mill, cent, dime, dollar, and eagle of U. S. money exactly illustrate the decimal system of the metric measures,—the mill, cent, dime, corresponding with the milli, centi, deci of the metric system.

Abbreviations.—For meter, liter, and gram, the small initial letter is used, viz: m. l. g.; each division deci, centi, milli, also is abbreviated by using the small initial letters d. c. m.; but each multiple, deka, hekto, kilo, myria, is abbreviated by using the capital initial letter D. H. K. M.

Equivalents.—1 inch equals .0254 meter, or about 2 1-8 centimeters; 1 foot equals .3048 meter, or about 30 centimeters; 1 yard equals .9144 meter, or ab. 10-11 of a meter; 1 mile 1609 meters, or ab. 1.6 kilometers.

1 U. S. liquid quart equals .946 liter, or a little less than 1 liter; 1 U. S. dry quart equals 1.101 liters; 1 U. S. gallon equals 3.785 liters, or about 3.8 liters; 1 U. S. bushel equals 35.24 liters, or about 4-11 of a hektoliter.

1 avoirdupois ounce equals .02935 kilogram, or a little less than 30 grams; 1 Troy and apothecaries ounce equals .03110 kilogram, or a little more than 30 grams; 1 avoirdupois pound equals .45359 kilogram, or about 5-11 of a kilogram; 1 long ton—2240 pounds—equals 1016.05 kilograms, or about 1 metric ton.

Basis of the system.—1. The unit of length, the meter, is the ten millionth part of a quadrant of the meridian of Paris, being 39.37 inches, nearly. 2. The unit of surface, the ar, is the square of ten meters, or a hundred square meters. 3. The unit of capacity, the liter, is a cube whose edge is a tenth of a meter. 4. The unit of weight, the gram, is the weight of a cube of rain-water, whose edge is an hundredth of a meter. From these four primary units all others are derived according to the decimal scale.

• **Where used.**—The system is adopted by the following countries: in exclusive use in France, Germany, Austria, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Norway, Switzerland, Roumania, Brazil; in partial use in Denmark, Greece, Argentine Confederation, Venezuela; legalized, but not in general use, in the United States, Great Britain, Russia, Norway, Sweden, Turkey, Mexico, Chili, Costa Rica, Equador, Peru, U. S. of Columbia, Uruguay.

THE CIVIL SERVICE.

For State Board of Commissioners, see page 876.

By enactment of the legislature, all positions in the public service of Rochester (excepting those filled by public election, the heads of departments, and positions under the city treasurer, or the Board of Education), must be filled from applicants who have successfully passed an examination by a board of civil service examiners.

Two Boards, consisting of three members each, are appointed by the mayor, and not more than two members can be of the same political party.

Whenever a position is to be filled, the examining board will notify the applicants on record, or such number of them as can be conveniently examined, to appear for examination, and appointments must be made by the appointing power from the three on the list of the highest standing. Soldiers or sailors serving in the war of the rebellion, having any standing on the list, and otherwise equally competent, have the preference. The civil service does not affect removals from office. The civil service is classified as follows:

Schedule B, Part 1. Includes all officers and members of the Police and Fire Departments.

Schedule B, Part 2. Includes subordinate officers, clerks, and assistants not included in Part 1. Laborers and day workmen are not subject to examination.

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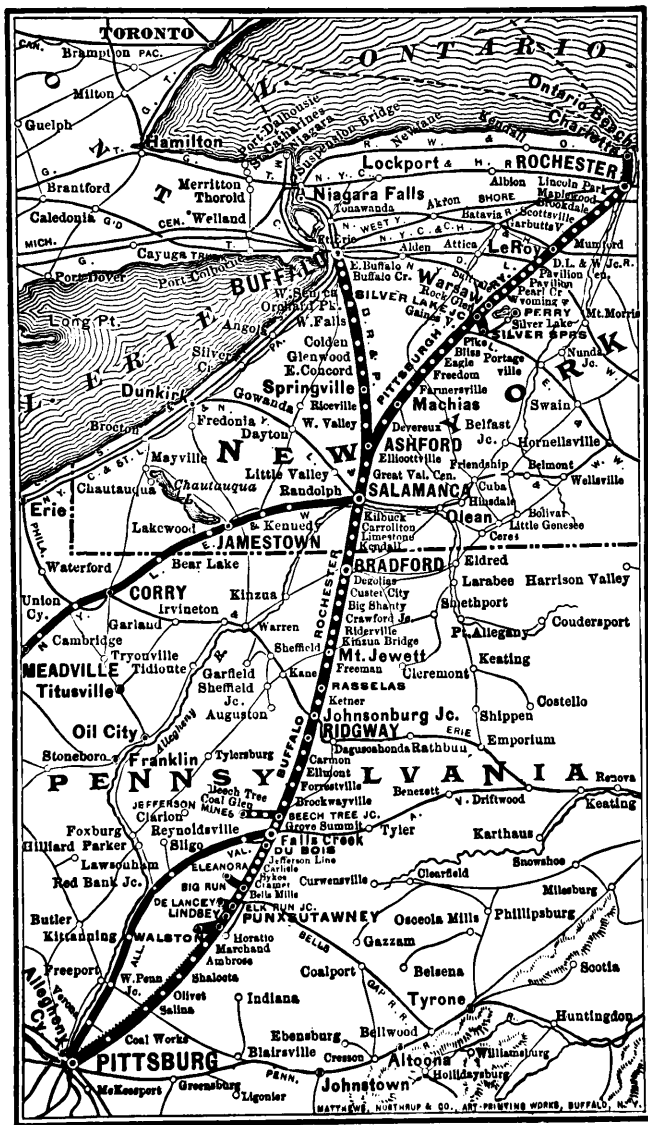

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where the centre of Jay street intersects the centre of the Erie canal; thence south-westerly along the centre of Jay street to a point at or near the centre of Magne street; thence continuing westerly along the centre of Jay street to the boundary line of the city; thence northerly along the west boundary line of the city to a point where a line extended westerly through the centre of Otis street would intersect the said west boundary line of said city; thence easterly on said extended line and along the centre of Otis street to the centre of Sherman street; thence northerly along the centre of Sherman street to a point where a line drawn through the centre of Sherman street would intersect the south boundary line of the State Industrial school extended westerly; thence easterly along the said extended line to the centre of the Erie canal; thence southeasterly along the centre of the Erie canal to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Fifteenth ward.

All that part of the city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the centre of North avenue would intersect a line drawn through the centre of University avenue; thence northerly along the centre of North avenue to the centre of Bay street; thence easterly along the centre of Bay street to the centre of Hebard street; thence southerly along the centre of Hebard street to the centre of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River railroad company; thence south-easterly along the centre of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River railroad company to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the centre of University avenue; thence northwesterly along the centre of University avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Sixteenth ward.

Ward 17. All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point the centre of the Genesee river where a line drawn through the centre of the Genesee river would intersect a line extended southeasterly through the centre of Evergreen street; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to where the north line of the city crosses the Genesee river; thence following the boundary line of the said city line northerly to the north boundary point of the said city; thence southerly along the east boundary line of said city to a point where said boundary line intersects said north boundary line at Norton street; thence easterly along the north boundary line of said city to a point where the northerly boundary line of the city intersects the east boundary line of the city; thence southerly and southeasterly along the easterly boundary line of the city to the centre of Clifford street; thence westerly along the centre of Clifford street to the centre of Conkey avenue; thence southerly along the centre of Conkey avenue to the centre of Evergreen street; thence westerly along the centre of Evergreen street and continuing southwesterly along said centre line and continuing in a line extending southwesterly through the centre of said Evergreen street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Seventeenth ward.

Ward 18. All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the centre of North avenue would intersect a line drawn through the centre of Clifford street; thence easterly along the centre of Clifford street to the easterly boundary line of the city; thence southerly along the easterly boundary line of the city to the centre of the New York Central and Hudson river railroad company's tracks; thence northwesterly along the centre of said company's tracks to the centre of Hebard street; thence northerly along the centre of Hebard street to the centre of Bay street; thence westerly along the centre of Bay street to the centre of North avenue; thence northerly along the centre of North avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Eighteenth ward.

Ward 19.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point at the centre of Bronson avenue which would intersect a line drawn through the centre of the lands now owned and occupied by the Western New York & Pennsylvania railroad company, being the land formerly used and occupied by the Genesee Valley canal; thence westerly along the centre line of Bronson avenue to the centre of Genesee street; thence northerly along the centre of Genesee street to the centre of West avenue; thence westerly along the centre of West avenue to the centre of Chili avenue; thence southwesterly along the centre of Chili avenue to the westerly boundary line of the city; thence southerly on the westerly city line in its various courses to a point where the said westerly line of the city intersects the southerly line of the city; thence easterly and southerly following the said city line in its various courses until the said line intersects a line drawn through the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the centre of the Genesee river in its various courses to a point where a line drawn through the centre of the said Genesee river would intersect the south line of the Strong tract; thence northwesterly along the south line of the Strong tract at the centre of the tracks of the Western New York and Pennsylvania railroad company; thence northerly along the centre of the tracks of said railroad company to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Nineteenth ward.

DISTRICT 3.—Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Chili avenue and Ames street; thence northerly along the centre line of Ames street to the centre line of Jay street; thence westerly, along the centre line of Jay street to the western boundary line of the city; thence southerly, along the western boundary line of the city to the south line of West avenue; thence westerly, along the south line of West avenue to the east line of Lincoln avenue; thence southerly, along the east line of Lincoln avenue to the north line of Chili avenue; thence northeasterly, along the boundary line of the city at such point and the centre line of Chili avenue to the place of beginning.

CARRIAGE AND HACK FARES.

HACKNEY COACHES AND CARRIAGES. *Enacted July 31, 1890.**The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows:*

SECTION 6. Hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, **waiting for employment**, shall at all times stand, **Sundays excepted**, on the south side of West Main street, from Irving place to Fitzhugh street, with the horses' heads turned toward the east, and on the west side of Irving place from West Main street to the northeast corner of the Court House; and on the east side of Fitzhugh street from West Main street to the northwest corner of the City Hall, but not so as to obstruct or prevent access to the watering trough, nor to clean or wash any vehicle on said stand, with the horses' heads turned towards the north, or at such other place or places as the Mayor, under the direction of the Common Council, may designate, and not elsewhere, except by permission of the owner or lessee of the premises in front of which they may stand, under the penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for each offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or driver thereof, severally and respectively.

The omnibuses of the different hotels of said city shall be allowed to stand next to the New York Central & Hudson River R. R. depot on the north side of Central avenue.

No hackney coach, cab or carriage, while upon, or at or near said stand, shall stand abreast or along side of any other coach, cab or carriage, under a penalty of **FIVE DOLLARS** for each offense, to be sued for and recovered from the owner and driver thereof, severally and respectively.

§ 8. The prices or **rates of fare** to be taken or paid to the owner or drivers of hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, shall be as follows, to wit:

1st. For conveying a passenger within the limits herein described as territory No. 1, **FIFTY CENTS**.

2d. For conveying passengers from any point within the territory herein described as No. 2, to any point outside of the limits of territory No. 1; and within the limits herein described as territory No. 2, **SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS**.

3d. For conveying a passenger from any point within the limits of the city to any point outside of the limits of territory No. 2, and within the limits herein described as territory No. 3, **ONE DOLLAR**.

4th. For each additional passenger, **TWENTY-FIVE CENTS**.

5th. **Half fare** shall be allowed for returning to place of starting, provided there is a detention of not longer than fifteen minutes, when over that, full fare.

6th. For conveying a pleasure party to **Mt. Hope** and return, **THREE DOLLARS**—one hour being allowed at the grounds.

7th. For the use of a hackney coach, cab or carriage **by the hour**, to the extent of the capacity of the vehicle, **ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTY CENTS**, and the same proportion for fractional parts of an hour.

8th. For attending a funeral with passengers, including charges for necessary detention and returning with passengers to house, to any cemetery within the city of Rochester, or the Holy Sepulchre cemetery, the sum of **FOUR DOLLARS**.

9th. For **children** between eight and twelve years of age, half price only to be charged, and for children under eight years of age, no charge is to be made.

10th. A sum exceeding ten dollars shall not be demanded for the use of any hackney coach, cab or carriage in carrying persons to and from the polls on **election day**.

11th. In case of a dispute or disagreement between the driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, and the hirer or occupant thereof, when demanded, said driver shall drive to the nearest policeman, who shall decide the matter, and no charge shall be made for the extra drive or ride.

Territory No. 1, for which **FIFTY CENTS** is to be charged:

Beginning on Union street at its intersection with University avenue; thence westerly along University avenue to Scio street; thence northerly along Scio street to Tappan street; thence westerly along Tappan street to North avenue; thence along North avenue to Hudson street; thence northerly along Hudson street to Harrison street; thence westerly along Harrison street to Chatham street; thence along Chatham street to Hamburg street; thence westerly along Hamburg street to Joiner street; thence westerly in a direct line to the corner of Clinton and Ward streets; thence westerly along Ward street to St. Paul street; thence northerly along St. Paul street to Gorham street; thence in a direct line to the intersection of the west bank of the Genesee river with Vincent place; thence westerly along Vincent place to Lake avenue; thence westerly along Smith street to Grape street; thence southerly along Grape street to Wilder street; thence southerly along Wilder street to Brown street; thence westerly along Brown street to Maple street; thence easterly along Maple street to Madison street; thence southerly along Madison street and Reynolds street to Bronson

avenue; thence easterly along Bronson avenue to Caledonia avenue; thence southerly along Caledonia avenue to Glasgow street; thence easterly along Glasgow street to the Genesee river; thence easterly in a direct line to the corner of Mt. Hope avenue and Alexander street; thence easterly along Alexander street to Pearl street; thence northerly along Pearl street to Union street; thence northerly along Union street to the place of beginning.

Territory No. 2, for which SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS is to be charged:

Beginning at East avenue at its intersection with Meigs street; thence westerly along East avenue to Prince street; thence northerly along Prince street to Main street; thence in a direct line to the corner of Ontario and Union streets; thence westerly along Ontario street to Scio street; thence northerly along Scio street to Lewis street; thence westerly along Lewis street to Finney street; thence northerly along Finney street to Tyler street; thence westerly along Tyler street to North avenue; thence northerly along North avenue and North street to Woodbury street; thence westerly along Woodbury street to Hudson street; thence northerly along Hudson street to Hudson park; thence westerly along Hudson park and Baden street to St. Joseph street; thence northerly along St. Joseph street to Catharine street; thence westerly along Catharine street to Clinton street; thence northerly along Clinton street to Lowell street; thence westerly along Lowell street to St. Paul street; thence in a direct line to the corner of Ambrose and Cliff streets; thence westerly along Ambrose street to Lake avenue, and thence to Jones avenue; thence westerly along Jones avenue to the Erie Canal; thence southerly along the Erie Canal to Lyell avenue; thence westerly along Lyell avenue to Orchard street; thence southerly along Orchard street and continuation of the same to Brown street; thence westerly along Brown street to West avenue; thence southerly along Genesee street to Bronson avenue; thence easterly along Bronson avenue to the west line of the "Greig tract"; thence southerly along the west line of said tract to Champlain street; thence easterly along Champlain street to Jefferson avenue; thence southerly along Jefferson avenue to Bartlett street; thence easterly along Bartlett street to Plymouth avenue; thence northerly along Plymouth avenue to Clarissa street; thence easterly along Clarissa street to Mt. Hope avenue; thence northerly along Mt. Hope avenue to Gregory street; thence easterly along Gregory street and Grand street to Cayuga street; thence easterly along Cayuga street to Nelson street; thence northerly along Nelson street to Monroe avenue; thence easterly along Monroe avenue to Meigs street; thence northerly along Meigs street to the place of beginning.

Territory No. 3, for which ONE DOLLAR is to be charged:

All the territory outside of the boundaries mentioned and described in territory No. 2, and between that and the city limits.

§ 9. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, in the city of Rochester, shall ask, demand, or receive any **larger sum** than he or they may be entitled to receive as aforesaid, under the penalty of TEN DOLLARS for every such offense, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or owners, or the driver of any such coaches, cabs or carriages, severally and respectively. And no such owner or driver shall demand or receive from any such person or passenger, any **extra compensation**, or any sum whatever, for carrying and transporting with such person or passenger, in or upon such hackney coach, cab or carriage, any ordinary baggage or luggage belonging to any such person or passenger to or from any of the points or distances above named.

§ 10. The number of the license of every hackney coach, cab or carriage, shall be painted in legible characters on the outside of the lamp, which shall be placed on each side of the driver's seat or box, and such numbers shall be in figures not less than two and one-half inches in height, and a card or hand-bill, describing the territory and the different rates of fare to be charged, as provided in and by section eight of this ordinance, shall be, at all times kept in a conspicuous and easily accessible place in the inside of such coach, cab or carriage, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offense or violation thereof, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or driver of such coach, cab or carriage, jointly or severally.

§ 12. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, while on any of the stands heretofore designated, or waiting for employment at any place other than the house or the stable of the owner thereof, between the hours of sunrise and ten o'clock in the evening, shall **refuse and neglect to convey any person** or persons to any place or places within the limits of the city, upon being applied to for that purpose, and upon being tendered the fare for the same, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for every such refusal or neglect, to be sued for and recovered of the owner or driver of any such hackney coach, cab or carriage severally and respectively.

BICYCLE ORDINANCE.

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BICYCLE ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE USE OF SIDEWALKS, FOOTPATHS, ETC., BY CYCLES AND OTHER VEHICLES.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. No person, or persons, shall draw, ride or propel any wheel-barrow, hand cart, sleigh, carriage or other vehicle, except baby carriages, or lead, ride or drive any horse, beast of burden, cattle, swine or fowl over or upon any sidewalk in the City of Rochester, or belonging thereto, except in passing into or from any lot where pavement shall be constructed for that purpose; and no person or persons shall ride any cycle over, upon, in or through any sidewalk or footpath, intended for the use of pedestrians, in, through or upon any street, alley, park, bridge, highway or other public place in said city, or belonging thereto, unless the rider thereof shall have in his possession a written permit therefor, or unless such cycle shall have been duly registered and numbered, and shall have such number affixed thereto, in a conspicuous place, as hereinafter provided under a penalty of five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 2. Any person may ride a cycle, registered and numbered, as hereinafter provided, upon any sidewalk of this city, except that between the hours of six A. M. and eleven o'clock P. M. no person shall ride a cycle upon the sidewalks of the streets described as follows: Main street from East avenue to the Erie canal; State street, south of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad; Exchange street, north of Erie canal; St. Paul street, south of New York Central & Hudson River Railroad, to Court street; Front and Clinton streets, between the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad and East Main street; Mumford street, Market street and Exchange place; Central avenue, from Clinton street to State street, or upon the footpaths of any and all bridges, under a penalty of five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 3. Any person who, while riding a cycle upon any sidewalk or footpath in said city, shall collide with, or run against, any person walking or standing upon such sidewalk or footpath, shall be liable to a fine of not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk is hereby directed to provide a book in which shall be recorded the name and residence of the owner of every cycle, a brief description of such cycle, the name of the manufacturer, the shop number, and any other details necessary and proper to identify such wheel, and to carry into effect the provisions of this ordinance; and said City Clerk shall assign a serial number to every such cycle in the order in which the same shall be recorded; such serial number shall be displayed upon a metal plate, of suitable size and shape, not less than one-thirty-second of an inch in thickness. The numerals composing such numbers shall be of the uniform height of not less than one-half inch, a running breadth of not less than three-eighths of an inch, and a heavy face, of a style known to printers as "Gothic" with three-sixteenths of an inch face; such numbers shall be attached to such cycle by the City Clerk, or under his direction, upon the front side of the left handle bar, near the head, in such manner as such clerk may consider best, and shall be furnished to each person at the time of registering such cycle.

SECTION 5. In case the owner of any cycle, registered and numbered as aforesaid, shall sell, or otherwise lose possession and ownership thereof, he shall, forthwith, report the facts to the City Clerk, and the same shall be duly recorded in the cycle register provided for herein.

SECTION 6. In any suit or action for the recovery of any damages, or penalties for the violation of any ordinance, caused by the use of such cycle, the records in the office of said City Clerk, or Superintendent of Police, herein provided for, shall be presumptive evidence of the ownership of such cycle.

SECTION 7. The said Superintendent of Police is hereby authorized and directed to furnish to any person, upon payment of the fee therefor as herein provided, a written permit to use a cycle for a specified time upon the sidewalks and footpaths of said city, subject to the provisions of Section 2 herein, without such cycle being registered and numbered, as herein provided. Such permit shall describe such wheel, and state the names of the owner and applicant, and manufacturer's number of wheel; and said Superintendent of Police shall keep a record of all such permits in a book to be kept for that purpose.

SECTION 8. For the purpose of this ordinance, the term "cycle" shall be construed to mean any unicycle, bicycle or tricycle whose wheel or wheels, or either of them, shall exceed twenty-four inches in diameter.

SECTION 9. The fee for recording each cycle shall be ten (10) cents; for furnishing and attaching such numbers, twenty-five (25) cents; for recording transfers, ten (10) cents; for a permit, ten cents for each day covered by such permit; and the same shall be paid to the City Clerk or Superintendent of Police, as the case may be, by the person applying therefor, and be deposited by said Clerk or Superintendent of Police, with the Treasurer of said city, to the credit of the contingent fund.

SECTION 10. All ordinances and parts of ordinances, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall take effect on the fifteenth day of October, 1891.
