

City Taxes payable May 1-Fees will be added as follows:-

June 1, 1/2 per cent.; June 16, 1 per cent.; July 1, 11/2 per cent.; July 16, 2 per cent.; Aug. 1, 21/2 per cent.; Aug. 16, 3 per cent.; Sept. 1, 31/2 per cent.; Sept. 16, 4 per cent.; Oct. 1, 41/2 per cent.; Oct. 16, 5 per cent.; Nov. 1, 51/2 per cent.

After November 15, 51/2 per cent., and also interest from that date at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum. A warrant will be issued for taxes and interest, with collector's fees added after November 15th.

County Taxes payable January 1-Fees will be added as follows:-

- Parcels Post.—Merchandise not exceeding one pound, 12 cents; each additional pound or fraction, 12 cents. Limit of weight, 11 pounds, except to some offices, where limit of weight is 4 lbs. 6 cz.
- International Money Orders. For sums not exceeding \$10, ten cents.—for each additional \$10 or fraction, ten cents. To Bahamas, Bermuda, British Gulana, British Honduras, Canada, Cuba, Newfoundland, Antiqua, Barbadoes, Dominica, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevie, St. Kitch, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, and Virgin Islands (West Indies) the rates are the same as in the United States. To Belgium, Bolivia, Costa Rica, Egypt, Liberia, Luxemburg, Mexico, Peru, Netherlands, Denmark, Switzerland, New Zealand, Orange River Colony, Sweden, Norway, Japan, Trinidad, Austria, Hungary, Chile, and Transvasi, for sums not exceeding \$10, sight cents—over \$10, one-half the International fees. The limit of a single order is \$100.
