The original Water Works were begun in July, 1873, and completed in February, 1876. They embrace two distinct systems of water distribution from two separate sources. The first or principal one is the gravity system from Hemlock Lake as source, which now includes two conduits and 865 miles of distributing pipe; the second is the Holly System, which derives its supply from the Genesee River and serves essentially in affording a more efficient fire protection in the central and manufacturing districts of the city, the extent of distributing pipe connected therewith being about 25 miles. Total length of distributing pipes, in city, of both systems, about 390 miles.

The original conduit consists of 9.627 miles of 36-inch, and 2.92 miles of 24-inch wrought-iron riveted pipe, and 15.70 miles of 24-inch cast-iron pipe; total length of old conduit is 28.247 miles.

The new conduit consists of 2.252 miles of brick conduit 6 feet in diameter, and 25.94 miles of 38-inch riveted steel pipe, with 1.47 miles of 36-inch cast-from pipe; total length of new conduit, 29.662 miles; total length of conduits and distributing pipes January 1, 1911, 467.909 miles.

FOREIGN.

- Prepayment Optional, except for registered articles; but on printed matter, commercial papers and samples, postage must be at least partially prepaid.
- Letters. 5 cents for the first ounce, and 3 cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof. To Great Britain, Ireland and Germany (when sent by steamers direct to Germany) the rate is 2 cents per ounce or fraction. No limit of weight. For rates to Canada, Cuba, Mexico and Republic of Panama, see below.
- Reply Postal Cards. 4 cents. Post Cards. 2 cents. Postal Cards. — 2 cents each.
- Printed Matter. 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz.
- Commercial Papers (Insurance Documents, Way Bills, etc.) The same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 5 cents. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz.
- Samples of Merchandise. The rate is the same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 2 cents. Limit of weight 12 ounces. Limit of size, 4 x 8 x 12 inches.
- To Canada, the postage and limit of weight for letters, printed matter, merchandise, etc., is the same as in the United States, except that on seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots and scions, the rate is 1 cent for each ounce or fraction. All matter must be fully prepaid, except letters, which must be prepaid at least 2 cents; and nothing may be sealed except a letter in its usual and ordinary form.
- To Cuba and Republic of Panama, mail matter of all classes is subject to domestic rates and conditions; and nothing may be sealed except a letter in its usual and ordinary form.
- To Mexico, first, second and third class postage and limit of weight is the same as in the United States. Merchandise may be sent at domestic rates and under domestic conditions, but should be sent by Parcels Post, and must not be sealed. Commercial papers and samples of merchandise are subject to Postal Union rates.
- Parcels Post.—Merchandise not exceeding one pound, 12 cents; each additional pound or fraction, 12 cents. Limit of weight, 11 pounds, except to certain offices in Mexico, where limit of weight is 4 lbs. 6 oz.

When payable in Apia, Austria, Beigium, Bolivia, Cape Colony, Costa Rica, Denmark, Egypt, Germany, Great Britain and Ireland, Honduras, Hongkong, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Liberia, Luxemburg, Natal and Zululand, New South Wales, New Zealand, Orange River Colony, Peru, Portugal, Queensland, Rassia, Salvador, South Australia, Switzerland, Tasmania, The Transvaal, Uruguay and Victoria, for sums not exceeding \$9.50, 10 cents; not exceeding \$9.50 to cents; not exceeding \$9.50 cents; not exceeding \$15, 30 cents; not exceeding \$20, 35 cents; not exceeding \$10, 40 cents; not exceeding \$20, 45 cents; from \$40.01 to \$100, the regular international fees.

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
