## LEGAL HOLIDAYS.

There are ten public holidays:—New Year's Day, 1st of January; Lincoln's Birthday, 12th of February; Washington's Birthday, 22nd of February; Memorial Day, 30th of May; Independence Day, 4th of July; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Columbus Day, October 12th; Tuesday following the first Monday in November, or day of State election; any day appointed by the Governor of the State or President of the United States, as a day of public fast, or thanksgiving; Christmas Day, 25th of December; also every Saturday, from 12 o'clock noon until 12 o'clock midnight.

When a public holiday falls upon Sunday, the following Monday becomes a public holiday.

Notes falling due on Saturday, Sunday, or any public holiday, are payable on the business day next succeeding.

Accepted drafts should be treated as "paper made and dated" at the time of acceptance.

## TAXES.

### City Taxes payable May 1—Fees will be added as follows:—

June 1, ½ per cent.; June 16, 1 per cent.; July 1, 1½ per cent.; July 16, 2 per cent.; Aug. 1, 2½ per cent.; Aug. 16, 3 per cent.; Sept. 1, 3½ per cent.; Sept. 16, 4 per cent.; Oct. 1, 4½ per cent.; Oct. 16, 5 per cent.; Nov. 1, 5½ per cent.

After November 15, 5½ per cent., and also interest from that date at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum. A warrant will be issued for taxes and interest, with collector's fees added after November 15th.

### County Taxes payable January 1—Fees will be added as follows:—

Feb. 1, 1 per cent.; Feb. 15, 2 per cent.; March 1, 3 per cent.; March 15, 4 per cent.; April 1, 5 per cent. On April 15, a collector's fee of 5 per cent. in addition to the above, and interest at 12 per cent. per annum.

## WATER RATES.

Rate per annum—Payable annually in advance, on the first day of January.

Metered Water bills—Payable quarterly during the months of April, July, October, January.

During the year of 1914 there were 111 clear days; 81 partly cloudy; 173 cloudy; rain or snow fell on 153 days to the amount of 0.01 inch or more; on 118 to the amount of 0.04 inch or more; snow fell on 64 days; hail on 0; thunder storms occurred on 24, and auroras on 0. The total wind movement was 75,450 miles; total rain-fall, 29.83 inches; average cloudiness 61 per cent.; average relative humidity 70 per cent.; the maximum temperature was freezing or below, 67 days; minimum, freezing or below, 181 days.

Average temperature for 42 years, 47°; average precipitation, 33.69 inches.

## RATES OF POSTAGE.

### DOMESTIC.

**Domestic Postage Rates** apply to all States and Territories of the Union, to Canada, Cuba, Guam, Hawaii, Mexico, Porto Rico, Tutuila, the Philippines, the Panama Canal Zone, the Republic of Panama, to U. S. Postal Agency at Shanghai, China, to U. S. War Vessels stationed abroad, and to officers and men of the United States Navy in the United States Naval Hospital, Yokohama, Japan.

**All Mail Matter** (except regular publications sent to subscribers), must be wholly or in part prepaid.

**Letters, Postal Cards and "Post Cards,"** and all matter on which first class postage is paid, may be forwarded from one post office to another without additional postage, but all other matter must have postage prepaid anew.

**Mail Matter of all Classes may be Registered, except Parcel Post, which may be insured;** fee, in addition to regular postage fully prepaid, 10 cents. Indemnity for loss :—1st class, not to exceed \$100; 3d class, not to exceed \$25.

#### First-Class Matter—Letters and Postal Cards.

<b>Letters.</b> —(To be sent beyond the office where deposited, or for any letter-carrier office or rural delivery). Letters and other matter wholly or in part in writing or type writing, and all matter sealed or closed against inspection, for <i>each ounce or fraction thereof</i> , limit of weight, four pounds .....	.02

#### Third-Class Matter—Miscellaneous Printed Matter.

<b>Books and Catalogues</b> (not exceeding eight ounces in weight), <b>Pamphlets, Circulars</b> , occasional publications, photographs, proof-sheets or corrected proofs, and manuscript copy accompanying the same, and all matter on paper or cardboard, in <i>which the printing forms the principal use</i> , and not exceeding four pounds in weight ( <i>single volumes may be over</i> ), <i>for each two ounces or fraction</i> .....	.01
<b>A Printed Circular</b> may have the date, the name of the addressee and of the sender inserted in writing, and a simple dedication or inscription may be written on the fly-leaf or cover of a book or other article of printed matter.	

#### Fourth-Class Matter—Parcel Post.

<b>Fourth-Class Matter</b> includes merchandise, farm and factory products, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants, books (including catalogues), miscellaneous printed matter weighing more than four pounds and all other mailable matter not now embraced in the First, Second or Third Class, not exceeding fifty pounds in weight, in first and second zones or twenty pounds in all other zones, nor greater in size than seventy-two inches in length and girth combined, nor in form or kind likely to injure the person of any postal employee or damage the mail equipment or other mail matter, and not of a character perishable within a period reasonably required for transportation and delivery.	
<b>Rate for Parcels</b> weighing four ounces or less, except books, seeds, plants, etc., regardless of distance, <i>for each ounce or fraction</i> .....	.01
<b>Parcels weighing eight ounces or less</b> , containing books, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants, regardless of distance, <i>for each two ounces or fraction</i> .....	.01
<b>Parcels weighing more than eight ounces</b> , containing books, seeds, plants, etc., parcels of printed matter weighing more than four pounds, and all other parcels of fourth-class matter weighing more than four ounces, are mailable at pound rates varying in amount according to the distance to be conveyed, the minimum being five cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound, and one cent for each additional two pounds or fraction of two pounds, and the maximum twelve cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound, and twelve cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.	

**Alaska, Hawaiian Islands, Canada, Cuba, Mexico, etc.**—The eighth zone rate of 12 cents for each pound or fraction thereof on all parcels weighing more than 4 ounces (except books, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants weighing 8 ounces or less) applies (1) between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands; (2) between the United States and its postal agency at Shanghai, China; (3) between any two points in Alaska and between any point in Alaska and any other point in the United States; (4) between the United States and the Canal Zone; (5) between the United States and the Philippine Islands; (6) between the United States and its naval vessels stationed in foreign waters; and (7) to matter not exceeding 4 pounds 6 ounces in weight, except books and other printed matter (to which the rate of 1 cent for each 2 ounces applies) mailed to Canada, Mexico, Cuba and the Republic of Panama. (Parcels weighing up to 11 pounds may be sent to Mexico and the Republic of Panama as foreign parcel post mail under the parcel post conventions with those countries.)

**Parcels must be prepared for mailing in such manner that the contents can be easily examined and all parcels must bear the name and address of the sender, preceded by the word "from."**

**Limit of Weight of fourth-class matter** is 50 pounds for parcels mailed for delivery within the first and second zones, and 20 pounds for all other zones.

**Limit of Size.**—Parcel post matter may not exceed 72 inches in length and girth combined.

**Place of Mailing.**—Parcels weighing more than four ounces must be mailed at a post office, branch post office, named, numbered, or lettered station, or delivered to a rural or other carrier duly authorized to receive such matter. Parcels weighing four ounces or less may be deposited in letter or package boxes.

**Insurance Fee** on parcels, actual value not exceeding \$25..... .05  
Actual value not exceeding \$50..... .10

**Return Receipts** for insured parcels may be obtained by indorsing the parcels "return receipt desired."

**C. O. D. Collections**, not exceeding \$100, made for fee of 10 cents in addition to postage, which also insures package. This is done only at Money Order Offices.

**Postage on All Matter of This Class** must be prepaid.

**Postage Stamps.**—Ordinary stamps are valid for postage and for insurance and collect on delivery fees on fourth-class mail.

#### FOREIGN.

**Prepayment Optional**, except for registered articles; but on printed matter, commercial papers and samples, postage must be at least partially prepaid.

**Letters.**—5 cents for the first ounce, and 3 cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof. To Bahama Islands, Great Britain, Ireland, Newfoundland and to Germany (when sent by steamers direct to Germany) the rate is 2 cents per ounce or fraction. No limit of weight. For rates to Canada, Cuba, Mexico and Republic of Panama, see below.

**Postal Cards.**—2 cents each. **Reply Postal Cards.**—4 cents. **Post Cards.**—2 cents.

**Printed Matter.**—1 cent for each two ounces or fraction. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 8oz.

**Commercial Papers.**—(Insurance Documents, Way Bills, etc.). The same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 5 cents. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz.

**Samples of Merchandise.**—The rate is the same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 2 cents. Limit of weight, 12 ounces.

**To Canada**, the postage and limit of weight for letters and printed matter, is the same as in the United States. On seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions, and all Parcel Post matter, limit of weight 4 lbs. 6 oz., the rate for each pound or fraction thereof is 12 cents. All matter must be fully prepaid, except letters, which must be prepaid at least 2 cents; and nothing may be sealed except a letter in its usual and ordinary form.

**To Cuba and Republic of Panama**, mail matter of all classes is subject to domestic rates and conditions, except that no prepayment of postage is required on Letters and Postal Cards, and that on other articles only part prepayment is necessary. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz., except second-class matter and single volumes of printed books.

**To Mexico**, first, second and third class postage and limit of weight is the same as in the United States. Merchandise may be sent at domestic rates and under domestic conditions, but should be sent by Parcel Post, and must not be sealed. Commercial papers and samples of merchandise are subject to Postal Union rates.

**Parcel Post.**—Merchandise not exceeding one pound, 12 cents; each additional pound or fraction 12 cents. Limit of weight, 11 pounds, except to some offices in Mexico, where limit of weight is 4 lbs. 6 oz. Packages must be accompanied by a Customs Declaration, blanks for which will be furnished at Post Office. Packages may be registered except to Barbados, Curacao, Great Britain and Ireland, Greece, Guadeloupe, Martinique, The Netherlands, Uruguay, France and Dutch Guiana.

**International Money Orders.**—The rates to certain countries and colonies are the same as Domestic; to others 10 cents for \$10.00 and 10 cents for each additional \$10.00 up to \$100.00. Limit of a single order, \$100.00. In all cases a part of any sum requires the rate of full sum. Lists of countries to which each system of rate applies may be obtained at post office.

The original Water Works began in July, 1873, and completed in February, 1876. They embrace two distinct systems of water distribution from two separate sources. The first or principal one is the gravity system from Hemlock Lake as source, which now includes two conduits and 393 miles of distributing pipe; the second is the Holly System, which derives its supply from the Genesee River and serves essentially in affording a more efficient fire protection in the central and manufacturing districts of the city, the extent of distributing pipe connected therewith being about 25 miles. Total length of distributing pipes, in city, of both systems, about 418 miles.

The original conduit consists of 9.627 miles of 36-inch, and 2.92 miles of 24-inch wrought-iron riveted pipe, and 15.70 miles of 24-inch cast-iron pipe; total length of old conduit is 28.247 miles.

The new conduit consists of 2.253 miles of brick conduit 6 feet in diameter, and 25.94 miles of 36-inch riveted steel pipe, with 1.47 miles of 36-inch cast-iron pipe; total length of new conduit, 29.662 miles; total length of conduits and distributing pipes January 1, 1915, 576.090 miles.

The branch libraries contain chiefly popular books for home use, but also works for use in the library only, such as dictionaries, cyclopedias, and other frequently needed reference books and current periodicals.

Each branch has a department for children, which is supplied with books carefully selected for their merit and suitability. In these departments special attention is given to directing children's reading and training them in the use of the library through individual instruction and by means of the story hour and reading and debating clubs.

The deposit stations vary in size from 31 to 647 volumes and in their hours of opening according to the needs of the group served. Those in the fire houses form a special group and contain 25 volumes each.

The library has charge of the 454 grade libraries in the public schools, 15,673 volumes. These libraries consist of about 35 volumes each of general children's literature. Under the care and direction of the teachers they are circulated among the children in the schools for home use.

The City appropriation for library purposes in 1915 is \$50,000.

By enactment of the legislature, all positions in the public service of Rochester (excepting those filled by public election, the heads of departments and confidential subordinates), must be filled from applicants who have successfully passed an examination by a Board of civil service examiners, or from registered list of laborers.

A Board consisting of three members is appointed by the mayor, who also appoints the secretary and chief examiner.

Whenever a position is to be filled, the examining Board will notify the applicants on record, to appear for examination, and appointments must be made by the appointing power from the list prepared by the commission.

Soldiers or sailors who served in the war of the rebellion, having any standing on the list, have the preference. Soldiers and sailors of Spanish-American war have no preference in appointment.
