





**B. C. FORBES PRAISES** INDEPENDENT DEALERS

Setting forth in a rank and clear nalysis the part played by the Independent Merchant in the pres-ent economic depression, B. C. Forbes, economist and writer, lauds the independent merchants for their loyalty to their neighbors in times of greatest need. In his column, appearing in the Syracuse Journal of March 23rd, Mr. Forbes says in part:

"In this community there are humble heroes who are doing much -prhaps more than all others put together-to prevent the outbreak of critical social trouble.

"Who are they? "They are retail merchants. Not chain store managers, not 'cash and carry' merchants, but so-called 'independents,' local citizens who have hearts, sympathetic neighbors who extend credit to many families who would not be regarded as acceptable risks by any banker.

"It is time someone paid a tribute to such unsung heroes, such large-hearted citizens, who put neighborliness ahead of cold business considerations, who are motivated more by humane considerations than by cold credit rules.

"In the small community where I live there are merchants who are 'carrying' families utterly unable to pay. These merchants were born and raised locally. They don't give credit because they figure that it is good business to give credit. They give credit because they know that John Smith and Bill Jones have lost their jobs and

cannot pay. "They have known John Smith and Bill Jones from school days. They know that John Smith and Bill Jones are at heart honest fellows, who pay when they have the money, but they know that John Smith and Bill Jones have been out of work for months. They know, too, that Mrs. John Smith and Mrs. Bill Jones used to buy quite a lot of things from chain stores when they were in a position to pay cash. "Now that there is no cash, the chain stores refuse to sell them a

dollar's worth. How are John Smith and Bill Jones to feed their families. No business of the clerk in charge of the chain store. His orders from headquarters are, no credit.

"Suppose every small retailer, every 'independent,' were to act exactly as the chain store managers act, and refuse to supply a single vegetable or a loaf of bread or a pound of meat, what would John Smith and Bill Jones do?

## Important

Shoes should not be too flexible nor too thin soled. If we could walk only on soft, springy earth, no arch troubles. But walking on we must cushion our feet against preferable to a light sole. Shoes should be long enough for the toes to lie straight and slightly separated. They should be roomy over the toes and fit snugly around

the heel and over the instep. A shoe that fits your neighbor will not fit you at all. Learn to select shoes that fit. Thousands of people ruin their feet by wearing shoes bought because they are cheap. They try to make themselves believe that the shoes will break in and eventually become comfortable, but the result is usually far from satisfactory. A good shoe seldom has to be 'broken in.' It is made so that it fits comfort

## Don't Hurry

Take plenty of time when buying shoes. Try on both shoes of a pair. Stand with your weight entirely on one foot then on the other. Shoes may seem to be comfortable when you stand with your weight distributed upon both feet; but when you throw all the weight upon one foot, the shoe may feel quite different and you may find it not at all comfortable. 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# Around the Dicinity

About the most exciting and at the same time most costly storm that has ever descended in this section of the country, the tornado of July 1, is still the first topic of the day hereabouts. Among the freakish and hardly believable things that happened was the incident of the Lois street housewife who inflicted a serious wound in the shin of her leg with a fork. She was eating her lunch, got up to take the fork away from her young child and the tornado descended as she stood with the fork in her hand. The force with which the house was struck apparently doubled her up in such a fashion that the fork was driven into her leg. In another instance a Warner street home, apparently only lightly affected, was found to have a badly wrenched roof. The framework of the roof was twisted several inches out of line and the wallpaper was pulled away from the walls.

The traffic jam brought about by the presence of trees and branches in the roadways on the day of the storm was succeeded in following days by another traffic jam caused by motoring sightsee-ers desirous of getting a glimpse of the damage they had read about in the papers. Nearly every street in The Vicinity was jammed with cars and despite the best efforts of the police, traffic was at a standstill for long periods.

Although they say picnics are not drawing the crowds these days, outings are coming on just as thick and fast as ever. Very few of the annual affairs are being discontinued, which seems quite appropriate for 1933 is another year, and one hopes with some confidence that it will bring a quite different picture.

In normal times people did not object to paying a little more for brighter lights, but now they feel that ordinary lighting is entirely sufficient and city officials will do well to consider their demands.

The flood of oratory which came popping out of millions of loud-speakers and kept us just as informed as if we had ringside seats is over and now the jockeying for public favor begins. The campaign for control of the federal government has started, but you "ain't heard nothin' yet." With the abundance of issues now on the horizon, this campaign will sparkle with action when the big guns begin to boom shortly.



Lyell avenue property owners were called together Friday eve-ning in a mass meeting to hear tentative proposals by the City Council for the lighting of the street under the agreement now in negotiation with the Rochester Gas and Electric Corp. Two proposals were advanced, one to maintain the 400-watt lamps which Lyell avenue has had since 1927 and the other to cut the size of the lamps to 250 watts.

The meeting was called by the ciation on request of the Council, but the attendance was disappointingly small and as a consequence no decision was made. Councilman Edward L. Miller, delegated by the Council to adjusting street-lighting differences with property owners in all sections of the city, explained the two proposals with the assistance of other city officials who attended the meeting. To get the sentiment of all property owners, a petition-form was drawn up explaining both proposals and circulated throughout Lyell avenue Saturday for signatures favoring one or the other. The 250-watt p posal had a majority.

Since 1927 (exclusive of the last few months when only half of the lights have been turned on), Lyell avenue has been lighted with 400watt lamps. ### **CIVIC DEFENSE URGES** TAX ON CHAIN STORES

The following article is reprinted from the current issue of the Rochester Civic Defense League publication together with the coupon which interested readers of The Courier are urged to clip out and send to Councilman Nelson A.

A four-fold plan of licensing various business enterprises in the city will be presented to the city administration during the next week by the Rochester Civic Defense League and immediate favorable action will be sought.

The main feature of the program consists of a chain store license modeled after the chain store tax now levied in St. Louis. This plan provides that every merchandising establishment shall be licensed upon a graduated scale, beginning with a small license fee for a single establishment and increasingly large fees according to the number of retail units operated by a single concern. In St. Louis the Kroger Grocery and Baking Co., the second largest grocery chain in the country, is compelled to pay an average tax of \$250 per stor The second part of the Civic De-

fense League's program calls for increased license fees for all peddlers and hucksters, other than farmers selling their own produce. The tax situation in this city has become alarming during the past few years and a great factor in the decrease in revenue from real estate is the large number of vacant stores. If the city is to get the maximum revenue from store properties it must do something to protect the store owner. House to house peddlers have increased as Ave. tremendous rate during the past Ave. RADIO SERVICE—Fast efficient house peddlers have increased at a hood, the fact remains that established retail establishments have been seriously affected. Operating upon little or no investment, and at very little cost, they usually try to undersell the merchant who must pay rent or taxes, clerks, and meet the usual items of overhead expense that go with maintaining a store. The city is rapidly coming to a point where, for the sake of its revenues, if for no other reait must choose between the stable, responsible store operator or the transient and unreliable peddler

In this vicinity its selling is done from its own trucks. Thus they do not help to pay the usual store property tax but they do use the city streets. Local taxpayers maintain these at great expense and it is felt that a tax on such delivery trucks would assist the lo-

In addition to being a positive menace to the safety of our citizens, these trucks have substantially increased the cost of maintaining our city pavements. This tax program has the backng of most of the merchants and business men of the city and favorable action by the City Council is confidently expected.





### Signal Radio & Electric Service Notes

Editor's Note. This column is written especially for The Vicinity Post by Signal Radio Service, lo-cated at Lyell avenue and Orchard street.

A washing machine motor has two electrical windings, commonly called a starting and running wind-ing. The starting winding is wound with very small wire while the running winding consists of heavier wire. The starting coil is only in actual use a few seconds or from the minute the switch is closed to start the motor until the motor comes up to speed at which point an enclosed switch in the mo-tor cuts out the starting winding and leaves the motor to operate on the running winding. If by chance the motor is stalled, due to either washing machine trouble or perhaps bearings on the motor being bad through the lack of lubrication, the starting winding is being left on continuously and soon burns up.

is being left on continuously and soon burns up. Never allow a motor to stall over five seconds without shutting off the electricity to same, as it only takes about 60 seconds to burn out the starting winding, due to the small size wire with which it is wound. Investigate the trouble and have same repaired and thus save a double repair bill by not having a motor burn-out.

The practice of placing pennies or silver coins in the fuse box of your lighting system in place of a burned-out fuse is about as sensible as wiring your house with bare wire or for better comparison about as sensible as the fireman that tied down the safety valve of his boiler so the escaping steam wouldn't bother his sleep. The wire in your house will carry a certain number of amperes of current without overheating. To prevent this wire from carrying more amperes than it should, the Underwriters require us to use a fuse of sufficient size so that same will blow or rupture if the amperes in this wire reach a point higher than that which the wire will safely carry.

In othe wife Yeach the wire will safely carry. Introducing a coin in place of the required fuse leaves you without any protection for the wire. The wire becomes hot, the rubber coat-ing of this wire begins to burn and transmits the heat to the woodwork throughout the house soon setting fire to the house. > Speakers declared that both national and local chain stores have been monopolizing grocery, meat and dry goods business in all sec-tions of the country. It was disclosed that lack of organization had worked hardship on unionized workint ment chir is, Thits and veg etfbles and other lines and it was Harged that chain stores have atempted to disorganize local unions by refusing to employ union men unless they severed their connection with the unions and surrendered their working cards. It was also charged that the

chain stores refused to comply with demands of the unions for the observation of the eight-hour day and refused to pay overtime to workers or observe certain holidays demanded by the unions. In the resolutions presented it

was stated: "It is our thought that the present economic depression is due in part to consolidations, amalgamations and the creation of some mammoth organizations of chain store companies now operating in the country, and the laboring classes of the United States derive no benefit whatsoever from such mammoth combinations, therefore be it resolved, that the American Federation of Labor direct its organizers to foster the organization of managers, clerical help, ware-house help and truck operators, motor truck drivers and other types of labor in the employ of such na-tional, regional and local chain stores, and that the American Fed-

ally in the problem with a view to improving the future of the employees of these chain organizations." Numerous suggestions were made as to the best methods of bringing the chain store companies into line with the plans of the American Federation of Labor in organizing their workers. Among these suggestions it is understood were several that co-operative stores be opened and operated by the American Federation of Labor for the benefit of union members if it should develop that the chain store managements refused to consider any sort of propopsals from the unions to have their men organized. Boycotting of the chain stores was suggested also as a means of bring-ing the managements into line.






