Gener-ally, we prefer to use butter or part butter because of the flavor. Most fats except butter are -unsalted. So when using these, in-crease the amount of salt by onehalf. Eggs vary in size and there fore vary in quantity. One should attempt to use eggs that are medium in size as the quantity of eggs makes an appreciable difference in texture of cake. The liquid generally used is milk. A pastry flour or a general purpose flour is most often used unless a cake flour is specified. It is important to use a good standard brand of flour. If a recipe calls for pastry flour, a bread flour may be substituted if you use 2 tablespoons less flour per cup. Last but not least, baking powder of a good national brand is important to successful cake baking.

Recalls Early Scenes

Conesus Lake. Mrs. Kohlmeier, who enjoys excellent health and is unusually active for her years, was born in 1851 on Ames Street, near Campbell, which at that time was as far as Ames Street extended to the north. She has lived in that neighborhood all her life until recently when she moved to Glide Street.

Recalling some of Dutchtown's history, Mrs. Kohlmeier remembers clearly the Civil War period, for it was then that her father, George Leonard died, the victim of a smallpox epidemic. She and her sister, Mrs. Julia Eckl, are the only survivors of 13 children. The Vicinity then was only

sparsely built up, she stated, as she called to memory the early settlers, some of whom are still numbered among this section's residents. Many others, however, have passed away although their names and homesteads are still 'carried on" by descendants.

Mrs. Kohlmeier was a member f SS. Peter and Paul's Church, transferring to Holy Family when it was built. Her husband, Jacob, who was a barber, passed away at the turn of the century. They had seven children, six of whom are living.

We thought this a lot. The latest manufacturers list includes 180 types, an increase of about 35 or 40 over this time last year.

The tubes are grouped under their filament voltages, that is there is a 1½ volt group, a 2 volt group, a 2½ volt group, a five volt group, a 6.3 volt group, and some tubes with 25 volt filaments. Each group contains radio fre quency amplifiers, audio amplifiers, rectifiers, combination 1st detectors and ocillators, combination 2nd detectors and audio fre quency tubes, automatic volume control tubes, etc.

There are almost as many prices as there are tubes. On the manufacturers' lists before me the cheapest tube is 59c and the most expensive \$2.75. (Of course these do not include transmitting tubes.)



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



Ethiopian Warriors in Mock Cavairy Charge

Prenared by National Geographic Society, Washington, D. C. - WNU Bervies. Silvele the fail of Aduwa, im-portant trading center of northern Ethiopia, to the forces of Italy, the towns of Ak-sum, Harar and Diredawa, and the province of Ogaden have taken im-portant places in the news owing to the further movements of Ital-ian and Ethiopian traons.

ian and Ethlopian troops. (Perched high in the mountains, about 7,000 feet above the sea, and only 12 miles almost due west of

only 12 miles almost due west of Aduwa, Aksum today is a small town of only about 5,000 inhabi-tants, but the memory of ancient glories still elings to huge stone monuments that stand there. Aksum was the capital of Ethi-opla, according to ancient records and since time immemorial has been regarded as sacred by the peo-ple. Its sacred character has made the city immune to attack or plunthe city immune to attack or plun-dering by brigands or the armies of rival Edulopian, chieffains fighting This is not the first time that

Italian armies have held Aksum. The Italians conquered the city and

The Italians conquered the city and nearby territory in the war which was ended by their disastrous de-feat at Aduwa in 1896. In Aksum is a church which, ac-cording to legend, contains the orig-inal Ark of the Covenant of the Hebrews. The church has been so closely guarded by the clergy, how-over that no scholars from the

closely guarded by the clergy, how-ever, that no scholars from the Western world have been able to confirm or deny the legend. Tradition says that the Ark was brought to Ethiopia by Menelik I, son of King Solomon and the Queen of Sheba. Menelik, according to the story, was educated at Jeru-salem by Solomon until he reached the age of nineteen; he then went to Ethiopia with the Ark and a to Ethiopia with the Ark and a large delegation of Hebrews.

Ark May Have Been Burned. The original church in which the Ark of the Covenant was supposed to have been lodged was burned to have been lodged was burned when the city was sacked by a Mos-iem invader, Mohammed Gran, about 1535, but a new one was erected soon after by the Portu-guese, who had visited Ethlopia earlier, and had established friend-ly relations there. There is no rec-ord of whether the Ark was de-stroyed in this fire, or carried to some safe place before the invasion and later restored to the new and later restored to the new church.

Native tradition says that Aksum dates back many thousands of years. The earliest authoritative years. The earliest authoritative mention of it is in a manuscript written in 67 A. D., in which it is described as the capital of the Ak-sumite kingdom, which was the successor of the ancient land of Punt and the forerunner of Ethio-pla. Punt is mentioned in Egyp-tian records as a place with which tian records as a place with which the Egyptians traded for gold, ly-ory, ostrich feathers, and other valnable morchandise, Aksum is thought to have been

much larger in ancient times than now, for there are traces of stone foundations of large buildings over wide area near the present town some of them probably temples and

pulaces. The city of Harar, about 180 miles from the Red sea and 35 miles south of the railroad from

Addis Ababa to Djiboufl, was originally settled by Arabs who migrat-ed from Yemen on the eastern shore of the Red sea.

Harar a Walled City.

A survivor of the Middle ages Europe would feel at home in Ha-rar, for it has long been the cus-tom to close the five gates in its high stone wall at nightfall. None may leave or enter the city until may leave or enter the city until the following morning, just as was the former practice in European walled cities. The wall, about three miles in circumference, is guarded by 24 towers. Recent re-ports from Harar say that the gov-ernor of the city has torn breaches in the walls to make it possible for the lababitants to flee without con-gestion at the narrow gates in case of raids by Italian bombing planes. of raids by Italian bombing planes.

The streets of Harar are little The streets of third are infi-more than narrow alleys, some of them only three or four feet wide, steep and Mynerad and evaluated with refuse. They wind between one and two-story buildings built of undressed stone and mud, with thatched roofs. Along the streets are many small shops, some a few steps below the street level, in which work blacksmiths, silver-smiths, swordmakers, and other artisans

About 40,000 people, according to the most recent estimate, normally live in and around Harar and the city contains the palace of the goverror and several foreign consu-lates which are of more substantial construction than the huts of the common folk. There are both Christian (Ethlopian) churches and Moslem mosques, and two hospitals within the walls.

within the walls. Harar and its province stand on a plateau, between 4,000 and 5,000 feet above the sea, which has a pleasing climate and is extremely fertile. Harar province is famous for its coffee, much of which is ex-ported, a portion of the crop com-ing to the United States where it is preferred by many discriminations ing to the United States where it is preferred by many discriminating coffee drinkers. Coffee grows wild in some parts of Harar province, for Ethlopia was the original home of coffee.

Arabs Founded Harar.

The history of Harar goes back to the Seventh century A. D. when the immigrant Arabs from Yemen the immigrant Arabs from temen arrived and founded the city, ac-cording to tradition. The state which was then organized was known as Adel or Zaila. Of this, state Harar was the capital in the Fifteenth century, During that

No while man visited flarm, so far as is known, until 1854 when an Englishman, Sir Richard Bur-ton, spent ten days there disguised as an Arab. In 1875 the region was occupied by an Egyptian army and held for the years until troubles in the Sudan forced the withdrawat of the garcison. The province then was under British Influence until 1887 when it was conquered by Monelik II who later became emperor of Ethiopia and who con-quored the Italians at Aduwa in 5. During the period from 1891 1896, Harar province was an 1896. Italian protectorate.

Diredawa, 35 miles to the north Harar, can be reached in one day's journey on mule back or in four hours by automobile over the rough ferrain. This city, in many ways the most progressive in Ethi-opia, is a key-point on the railroad which is Ethlopia's only outlet to

Formerly Diredawa was the terminus of the railroad from Djibouti. It is about 180 miles from the coast and stands on the fringe of the Ethiopian plateau about \$,000 feet above sea level.

Ogaden Province. Ogaden Province. Ogaden province is in Ethiopia's southeastern corner, jutting out into an angle formed by British Somaliland on the north and Italian Somaliland on the south and east, On the southwest it extends to the Webbe (river) Shibeli, one of Ethiopia's two queer streams which flow hundreds of miles toward the sea only to disappear into the earth

a few miles from their goal. This strange river tumbles down from Ethiopia's high central mounfrom Ethlopia's high central mon-tains, almost reaches the sea near Mogadiscio on the Indian ocean, then changes its mind and runs 170 miles along the coast only 12 to 15 miles inland, finally losing itself in the Italian Somaliland plains a few miles from the equator. An-other of Ethlopia's disancemine site other of Eithlopia's disappearing riv-ers, the Awash, flows out of the mountains near Addis Ababa northeastward, but loss itself about 60 or 70 miles inland from Dibboui. the chief port of French Sonal-land on the Guif of Aden. From the Italian Somaliland ber-

der north through Ogaden to Dire-dawa and the Addis Ababa-Djibouto rallroad, the Italians must Difficuto rallroad, the Halians must travel 350-miles, half again as far as General Sherman's famous march from Atlanta to the sea. On the Italians' right as they move north is the vast dry plateau

of the Haud country, which stretches along the frontier between Ethiopia and British Somaliland. Its undulating surface is broken up by shallow stream courses, but in the dry season the Haud plateau is victually waterless.
