



Why Parallel Streets?

While there is no clear indication that the City Council is committed to the construction of the so-called parallel streets. there is a strong movement on foot to bring this about. Taxpayers should take more interest, for at least 50 per cent of the cost of this much-discussed project will be added to the already heavy city-wide burden,


There are good reasons to suspect that this proposition is not as sound as certain individuals would make it appear. In fact, it is not even certain what purpose the parallel streets are to serve.

If the purpose is to provide room for expansion to the downtown shopping area, the plan is a gamble and not a smart one either. At any rate, good or bad, city-at-large money has no business being at stake in such a gamble.

If the parallel streets are designed to facilitate traffic movement, they are all out of kilter. Rochester's first needs are direct routes from north to south and east to west. Why keep pouring more cars into the center of the city, just to get them from one side of town to the other?

Furthermore, with half an eye one can see that the traffic maze in the center of town has been almost entirely dissipated by police enforcement of parking regulations.

Let us not be misled into believing that all arguments are in favor of the parallel streets, even though so many powerful forces apparently are behind it. A good sobering influence for all of us is another look at that 1937 county and city tax rate,


"Why are the taxpayers organizing ? The answer is: Self Defense!

Too often we think about cran-berries only when the Thanksgiving or Christmas holidays are near, but their colorfulness and tangy flavor should give them a place on the table more frequently than just on holiday menus-

Besides being gay in color, cranberries are a good source of vitamin C with small mounts of vitamin A, and some traces of

The two ways in which we most frequently prepare the cranberries are either as a sauce or a jelly. In either instance, we want the finished product to be bright looking, full of flavor, and of a consistency, if it is a jelly, to be unmolded, and, if it is a sauce, heavy, but not so stiff that it stands like a jelly. You will find the following two recipes most de-

Cranberry Sauce 2 c. sugar

1 pound cranberries

Boil the sugar and water for 5 minutes. Add the cranberries and boil without stirring until the skins pop. Remove from range when popping stops and allow to cool without disturbing. To store cranberries for future use, pour while hot into sterilized jars and

Cranberry Jelly 2 lbs. (8 c.) cranberries 3 c. water

Cook the cranberries and water until the cranberries are soft. Strain through cheese cloth. Measure the juice and add  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. sugar for each cup of juice. Bring sugar and juice to the boiling

point and boil hard until jelly sheets from spoon or to 220 degree F. if a candy thermometer is used. Pour into sterilized jelly glasses and cover with paraffin. Now, since we have reviewed cranberries in their usual "dress." we'll try them in some other way. A cocktail, you know, if it is a fruit or a fruit juice should be one that is tart. The cranberry, therefore, makes a most desirable berry to use for a cocktail. The juice can be stored away in your pantry to be used when cranberries are out of season. Cranberry Juice Cocktail

4 c. cranberries

4 c. water 2-3 c. granulated sugar

Cook cranberries and water until skins pop open. Strain through cheese cloth. Bring juice to the boiling point, add sugar and boil for 2 minutes. Serve cold. This may be used for the base of a fruit punch. For future use pour hot juice in sterilized jars and seal.

This Thanksgiving instead of serving the jelly or sauce, why not try a sherbet made in your gas or electric refrigerator? It's as pretty as the jelly and since we have so very many hot foods for a large dinner, a really cold food served with the main course is a happy contrast. Re-member, turn your control on the refrigerator to the coldest point before making the sherbet and leave it set at that point until it is completely frozen when you may turn the control back about halfway between the coldest and the warmest point.

Juice of 2 lemons

Cook cranberries with water til the berries stop popping; until the berries stop popping; strain; add sugar and cook until dissolved. Soak gelatin in cold water and dissolve in the juice. Cool and add lemon juice. Pour into the trays of a gas or an electric refrigerator and freeze to a mush. Beat until light and fluffy. Return to tray and freeze 2 to 3 hours.

Then, if you like, there are many cranberry relishes that can be used with any type of meats and add a great deal to improve the left-over turkey, duck or roast beef. Cranberries are good made into pies, as a jelly on toast or spread between the layers of 8 cake, raw. in upside-down cakes, or in salads.

Four cupsful of cranberries equal 1 pound or 1 quart, if you use a recipe calling for either a quart or pound of fruit when you have just a package of cranberries.


As a last reminder, cranberries need larger amounts of sugar than most fruits, but don't add such a great deal that they lose all their snappy tartness, and be-come "sugary sweet."




