I would like to comment on statements made by Mrs. Grace Schaap of Sherman St. which appeared in the Jan. 9th issue of The Vicinity

Post and Tenth Ward Courier.

Banks Lower Rate On Life Insurance

A general reduction in premium rates on new savings bank life insurance policies has been announced by Community Savings, Monroe County Savings, and Rochester Savings Banks.

The new lower rates, effective Jan. 1, 1964, mean a reduction of 12% on a \$10,000 Straight Life Policy at age 35 according to Alfred T. Hall, upstate vice president for Savings Bank Life Insurance Managers Forum.

The rate cut is the result of the recent adoption of a new mortality table and a change in the interest rate on reserves, he explained.

The bill permitting New York State savings banks to issue and underwrite insurance was passed, after a heated legislative battle, in 1938, during the term of then Governor Herbert H. Lehman, who called the bill "one of the important enactments of my administration."





hours. When a severe winter storm brings highway travel to a halt, the individual family's frustration is multiplied many thousandfold.

The inconvenience of being snow-bound is bad enough, but the hazards of driving on icy or snow-covered roads are even worse. States, counties and municipalities are meeting the public demand by extending and improving their winter maintenance programs.

The fight against the elements is well worth the cost. In Ohio, for example, researchers calculated that every dollar spent for snow and ice removal in that State-using snow-plows, chemicals and abrasives - returned more than \$2 in benefits to highway users in the form of lower operating costs, time savings and the reduction of accidents. There are also extensive indirect benefits to retailers and other businessmen when good winter maintenance makes "business as usual" possible.

Despite all that is being done by States, counties and municipalities to improve the effectiveness of winter maintenance operations, extra caution is still recommended when cold weath-

Icing conditions can be most of us feel handicapped tricky. For example, water when the family car is out of freezes faster on bridge decks commission even for a few because these surfaces are exposed to the air from beneath as well as from above. This means that a bridge may be icy at times when the road at either end is merely wet.

To do your part in avoiding accidents and inconvenience in driving on ice or snow, I suggest that you follow these "ten commandments."

1. Remove ice and snow from windshield and windows before you start, and keep them clear.

2. Start easy. Apply power gradually to avoid spinning the wheels and digging in.

3. Stop easy. Let the engine slow you down. Anticipate stops and avoid quick braking that causes skidding.

4. Drive slowly and avoid braking on curves.

5. Keep plenty of distance between you and the car ahead. 6. Keep your gas tank at least

7. Invest in snow tires and put them on before the first snow.

8. Avoid chance of carbon monoxide poisoning by checking exhause pipe and muffler for leaks.

9. If you must use alcohol, use it only in the radiator.

10. If your car has dual transmission, drive in D2.





Do you have "Tired Blood"? If you think you do, go first to your physician. Don't fall for the "tired blood" sales pitch you may hear in reference to some

non-prescription iron compounds. The "Tired Blood" sales pitch has been termed outright quackery by competent medical authorities. The non-prescription compounds supposed to cure "tired blood" usually do have two or three ingredients including iron but it is generally true that the dosage is too small to be effective in cases of true iron deficiency anemia.

The iron content of a given mixture might even be harmful. It could raise a patient's blood count sufficiently to confuse the diagnosis if you do consult your physician later.

A 56 year old salesman, who had begun to feel rundown, took a "tired blood" compound for eight months, hoping for a correction of his condition. Finally, when no improvement came, he consulted his physician. An exploratory operation revealed that the man suffered from a cancer in the small intestine which could have been removed eight months earlier but was too far advanced by the time he sought his physician's advice for his "tired blood" symptoms. The patient died in the hospital.

The average person is in no position to diagnose the presence of anemia, much less determine whether it is an iron-deficiency, pernicious anemia or other form of anemia or some completely unrelated medical problem or



ITEM 3-The 115,000-volt electrical transmission line connecting Rochester with the Genesee Valley will be completed. This will interconnect with the transmission line of New York State Electric and Gas.





Hearing Problem esse Of Children

All too often a child who is labeled "bad" when he appears inattentive or "just doesn't seem to mind" isn't being bad at all. He just didn't hear when mother or teacher told him to do some-

Impaired hearing is often difficult to detect. A child doesn't know when he's hard of hearing. Therefore, the early discovery and prevention of hearing impairments in children depends largely upon the alertness of those around

Observant parents, should and often do, discover the more severe hearing handicaps in infants and pre-school children. They can notice the child's response or lack of response to sound.

Certain communicable diseases, excessive adenoid tissue and diseased tonsils, impacted wax, foreign bodies in the ear, neglected running ears, chronic nasal discharge, or severe blows over the ear may affect hearing.

Possible indications of hearing problems are: failure to respond sound, inattention, unusual listening posture, excessive day dreaming, undesirable behavior problems, pecularities of speech or voice, poor school work, unusual tension or nervousness.

Many problems of hearing impairments in early adult life could be prevented if the defect is discovered and treated in childhood.

A stand like this equipped with built-in fluorescent lamps to substitute for sunlight makes sprouting and growing seeds possible in any part of the house. Note sturdy growth here.

Remember when a sunny window sill was an absolute "must" for the gardener who wanted to start seeds indoors of his favorite varieties of flowers and vegetables? Now fluorescent lamps, specially designed for aiding plant growth, take the place of sun. This means that the darkest corner of your basement can become

your seed starting area when proper lamps have been in-stalled. The lamps you need have a special phosphor coating which, activated by electricity, gives off light rays high in the

red and blue wave lengths ab-sorbed by plants during growth. Your equipment can be as simple as chains hung from the ceiling to suspend the lamps over a table below. Or it can be as elaborate as a stand with fluorescent fixtures built in, like the one pictured.

Many different types of such 'plant growers" are available. Your favorite garden supply dealer, or, perhaps your favorite

late the amount of light, the length of "daylight" and the dis-tance of the seedlings from the light source.

Seeds sprout rapidly under fluorescent lamps, Because you can keep the seedlings fairly close to the lamps when they are small, they will not become spindly trying to reach towards the light. The distance from the lights can be increased as the seedlings grow.

Lamps designed for growing plants will not burn seedlings with their heat, for they are "cool" lamps.

Even almost perfect growing conditions, so far as light is con-cerned, will not, however, relieve you of watering and otherwise caring for your seedlings. Absolutely nothing can be substituted for personal attention.





The campaign of School Transportation Protesters and No. 40 School District Association which was carried to School Superintendent Herman R. Goldberg and to the City Council Tuesday night will be pressed to a conclusion, states Mrs. Robert Ziegler, 883 Ridgeway Ave., spokesman for the groups. The fight is for "free transportation of school pupils or the same fare for all," she says.

A militant group of school parents met Sunday afternoon at the Terrace Garden meeting hall in Ridgeway Ave. and heard testimonials from a number of No. 40 School parents about the injustice of the transportation Is Unit Topic scheme as set up by the Board of Education in its open enrollment program.

The petition to the City Council was read and met with apparent unanimous approval. Many of those present also promised to send telegrams to Albany to encourage passage of the Assemblyman Russo's bill aimed at keeping the "neighborhood school" concept.

Angelo Monteleone, who is one of the committee for a similar group at No. 30 School, was one of the speakers. The aim of his group, he says, is "we don't want transportation, we want education for our children,"

Monteleon also claimed that the compelling reason in sending the No. 3 School children to No. 30 School was to get State Aid. No. 17 School which also has room available for the No. 3 overflow, is only 11/4 miles and thus would not have made possible application for State Aid, No. 30 School was over 11/2 miles, as he pointed out, and the State is paying most of the bus bill.



Persons interested in maintaining the neighborhood school concept in the city school system are invited to a meeting which will be held next Monday, March 2, at 8 p.m. in the Avery Bowling Hall, Lyell Ave. Northwest area parents are especially urged to attend.

The meeting is being sponsored by the No. 43 School Citizens Group, headed by a five member panel, who have been holding regular meetings to "re-evaluate school transfer plans."

This group maintains that open enrollment as now set up in the city is contrary to the accepted definition of "open to all." The controlled methods of handling open enrollment is discriminatory against those who might wish to participate and are not allowed to, they maintain.

A spokesman for the five panelists stated: "We are continually being stripped of our best reasoning and logic by news media, clergymen, P.T.A. and civic groups and we may be losing faith in the very people whose purpose is to lead us into the righteous path."

Sympathy for Negro

"If some responsible people in the community wish to submit to the demands of Civil Rights groups does this necessarily mean that everyone must support this submission? Please be aware that many who oppose the plan are sincere people who have heartfelt sympathy for the Negro problem. Let us keep an open mind for the misunderstood flock and not make snap decisions as to the sincerity of those who oppose.

"We, of course, are in sympathy with the children in the inner city dwellings who are unfortunate victims of sub-standard dwellings, morals, health habits, etc. However, we do not feel our children or schools should be used to solve

these problems,"





Some of the complaints raised at the meeting were these:

"We are thoroughly in agreement with the bill proposed by Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz requiring funeral directors to furnish a written statement showing the price of the funeral and an itemized list of the services and merchandise to be furnished for such a price and a statement of the cash advances and expenditures to be advanced," says Donald L. McCabe of Warsaw, N.Y., president of the New York State Funeral Directors Association.

The following is a statement of Mr. McCabe:

"The rules of professional conduct of our association require a clear and definite understanding that wherever possible the agreement with clients should be reduced to a written memorandum. Many years ago, our membership adopted funeral arrangement forms setting forth in full detail the costs, services and merchandise involved. Since then, we have been urging the public to expect a detailed memorandum of the arrangements.

establishment keeps a detailed record of all funeral arrangements. There is no reason in the ordinary situation why the funeral director should not furnish a copy as the Attorney General's bill requires. There are exceptions—as when arrangements are made on the telephone and particularly with people located at a distance. In such cases, the arrangements should be confirmed in writing at the earliest opportunity.





Junior Red Cross Enrollment

The annual Junior and High School Red Cross Enrollment for Service is now being conducted in the public, parochial, and private schools of Rochester and Monroe County, according to Rodney L. Peterson, chairman of the local Red Cross Chapter's Junior and High School Red Cross and principal of Clara Barton School No. 2.

"Education for social responsibility is a vital and integral part of the school curriculum," said Mr. Peterson. "Indeed, it is as important for a child to be able to relate to his fellowman as it is for him to be able to master the three "r's". One of the prime objectives of the Junior and High School Red Cross organization is to provide opportunities in which young people will be able to mature high ideals with respect to becoming socially responsible individ-

Opportunity To Serve

Junior and High School Red Cross membership is maintained through the local Red Cross Chapter. Enrollment means opportunities for youth to serve others locally, nationally, and interna-tionally, and to develop skills, lea-dership ability, and service re-sponsibility. Many of the Junior and High School Red Cross programs are part of the regular school work. Most of these programs and others are carried into the community or carried forward entirely under Chapter supervision.

Last year, about 55 local institutions, hospitals, nursing homes, settlement houses, Association for Retarded Children, Day Care Center for Handicapped Children, Rochester Chapter of the National Hemophilia Foundation, United Cerebral Palsy Association, and homes for the aged, were served by 1,251 student volunteers who gave a total of 28,160 hours of direct volunteer service. Students in home economics, industrial and fine arts classes make articles for children and other patients in these hospitals and institutions. School dramatic and musical groups furnish entertainment.

Members serve the nation as a whole by providing service to area Veterans' Administration hospitals at Bath and Canandaigua. They provide comfort and recreation items and holiday decorations and provide entertainment. In times of disaster they may also assist boys and girls in other parts of the United States as well nesday, March 18 (9 p.m.) as locally with small items, or through contributions to the American Red Cross Children's Fund.

Last year, a \$2,500 contribution from the Junior and High School Red Cross Service Fund was made to aid children in emergency situations. Clothing was provided for the victims of the India-China border dispute and school supplies were provided to assist in the rehabilitation following the typhoon

The chapter has the responsibility of receiving and dispersing all these funds for High School and Junior Red Cross purposes only.







When Blood Needed-Only Blood Will Do

A February 13th news article attracted much local attention here recently. It concerned a 6 monthold infant with a rare, dangerous reaction from a routine smallpox vaccination. Treatment, which must be administered as quickly as possible, involves a blood product known as VIG (vaccine immune globulin).

The 5 ccs of VIG, which saved this baby's life were flown to Rochester from the New York Red Cross Regional Blood Center. The supply is very scarce and great care is taken in its distribution. Since the VIG program began, about two years ago, it





37th District Cited As National Model

The 37th Congressional District (this area) comes closest to the average population base recommended by the Bureau of the Census for apportionment of Congressional Districts, says Rep. Harold C. Ostertag. Based on the 1960 census, the Bureau reported that Congressional Districts should be apportioned on the basis of one district for each 410,481 people. The 37th District had a 1960 population of 410,432, or only 49 below the recommended figure.

The Census Bureau is also the source of many other interesting facts about the district cited by Ostertag in a recent news letter. "For example, two-thirds of the people live in urban areas and onethird in rural areas," he states. Only 28,928 of our people actually live on farms, however.

"One-fourth of our people are of foreign stock; that is, either born abroad or the off-springs of foreign born. The largest number -32,000 -are of Italian descent; next ranking are persons of Canadian, German and British descent, each with a little over 15,000. There are about his same number of Negroes living in our District, also, comprising 3.9 per cent of the popu-

"As to education, the Census figures reveal the median years of schooling of people in our area is 10.8 years. Forty per cent of the people have gone through high school and 6.3 per cent have completed college. The median schooling figure is slightly above the national average; the other two figures are a little below the national average. On income, the Bureau reports the median income of residents of our area is \$6,513 a year. That figure is almost \$1,000 higher than the national average.

New Episcopal Home Planned

Plans for a new and expanded Episcopal Church Home have been submitted to architects for preliminary drawings, according to Ivar N. Hultman, president of the Board of Directors. The plans call for 120 units which will triple the present capacity, with emphasis being placed on a health unit to provide nursing care for 80 occupants. The residential unit will provide accommodations for 40 with both single and connecting rooms for couples.

"It is the express desire of the Board of Directors to provide a facility which will be in accordance with modern trends in meeting the needs of the ever increasing numbers of older people requiring sheltered and nursing care," Mr. Hultman reported, "The present structure, the original unit of which was built in 1868, provides accommodations for 43 residents."

The residence wing will include

living rooms, library, card room, year round porches and bedrooms with private bathroom facilities. Seven suites of two connecting

rooms for couples are also planned, Since the Church Home is the only facility in the diocese which meets the Church's responsibility in it's ministry to the aging every effort is being directed toward familiarizing Episcopalians and others with its present program and future plans. A diocesan wide auxiliary has been organized as well as "The friends of the Church Home" including those who contribute financially to the operation of the Home.

The Church Home is located at 509 Mt. Hope Ave.




