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Sex Offender Legislation **Suggested By Officials**

A bill which is "tough but fair" providing punishment for sex offenders was suggested at a parents' committee meeting held last Wednesday at the Charles Settlement House in Jay St. The proposal, made by Councilman Stephen May and to be submitted to the State Legislature, was one of a number of suggestions advanced at the meeting.

Assemblyman Charles F. Stockmeister says he will submit a bill requiring persons convicted of certain lewd crimes to register with the police when they change their address or car. Failure to register would be a misdemeanor. Supervisor Scibilia stated he will seek a resolution from the Board of Supervisors supporting the bill.

Assemblyman James E. Powers, Councilman Robert Wood and Supervisor John Scibilia also offered suggestions at the meeting which was called after some 2,500 persons in the 11th, 15th and 20th Wards had signed petitions asking for help in coping with the wave of sex offenders.

ASSEMBLYMAN POWERS noted that the laws such as proposed by Stockmeister and May are needed because sex offenders have the greatest record of repeating their crimes.

The parents' committee endorsed the proposed legislation and also recommended future legislation providing more and better phsy-Continued on P. 11

Creative paste-up work can keep children busy for hours. You'll need several coloring books, a large supply of crayons — and anything on the kitchen shelf or in the odds-and-ends drawer that looks handy.

First a child colors a picture of his choice with crayon. He can draw his own picture or trace one if he prefers. Next, he'll paste on various materials to add dimension.

Before you begin, it's a good Idea to spread large squares of oilcloth on the floor or over the play table.

A child may color a picture of a duck, then paste on shredded otton balls to make it downy. If he colors a horse, he can paste on a saddle cut from a scrap of leather or leathery-looking vinyl. A girl might color a picture of a doll, then add a dress cut from real cloth, using any remnants

supplied by the sewing basket. To a farm scene, a little boy could add a fence made of flat popsicle sticks. Scraps of felt are handy for cutting out animal figures and pasting them into a drawing.

"The combination of bright erayon coloring and smooth and rough materials gives his work a brilliance and texture that pleases a child," points out Mary Hilt, an editor with Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin, world's largest pub-lisher of children's activity items. "Also," she reminds, "the finished work is often original enough to be framed and hung in the child's room where the whole family can enjoy it.



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



Johnson turned over a few spadefuls of soil recently in a symbolic acknowledgement of Japan's gift of 3,800 "Sakura" saplings which launched a Five-Year Beauty Plan for the Washington Monument Grounds. 

Continued from P. 1 chiatric care for sex offenders. They also have issued an appeal to all people of this area who favor such legislation to call the Charles Settlement House at FA 8-5453. Jack Quinn of the Charles Settlement House staff says "your help is essential".

COUNCILMAN MAY endorsed a proposed state law which would require convicted sex offenders who move into this state or within the state to register with local law enforcement agencies. But he also urged caution in drafting legislation "in this extremely sensative field", "In spite of our deep abhorrence of the acts of these criminals", said May, "and our fervor for bringing them to book, we must go slow in enacting laws which can so directly - and adversely - effect the life and liberties of some of our fellow citizens.

"Councilman-elect Robert Wood and I have been studying a number of bills which have been introduced in past sessions of the State Legislature on this subject, and statutes which are now on the books in other states, including California, Massachusetts and Michigan, We are also soliciting the opinion of appropriate experts in the fields of law enforcement, psychiatry, medicine and penology.

"What we seek is a bill which will be tough but fair - a bill which will be realistic in terms of gaining sufficient support to pass the Legislature, and practical in terms of its enforceability. We will continue our investigation of this problem and hope to have a sound proposal which will meet all of these criteria in the near future.

"Enactment of such a bill can go a long way toward protecting voung and old alike from sex offenders and increasing safety on our streets."

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

The issue was ready for the presses, but delivery of the paper last Wednesday was ruled out by inability of the mailmen to make their full rounds. 1. Discourage indiscriminate granting of zoning variances.


2. Prevent further deterioration in housing due to improper code enforcement.

3. Promote optimum land use to the end that property rights of residents will be respected to the fullest.



I was very pleased on Monday, Jan. 24 when Speaker Travia of the New York State Assembly announced that electronic voting equipment will be installed in the Assembly by the end of this session or the beginning of the 1967 session, You will recall that I supported and requested this procedural change last year and this year submitted a bill calling for such action.

The benefits of electronic voting are three-fold; Firstly, under the present two hundred year old voice voting method, many inaccuracies occur. Not only will there be little or no error in the report on a legislator's vote, but it will also serve as an attendance register. Unfortunately, some assemby-men on both sides of theaisle have poor attendance records and now such absence will be clearly noted so that you, the voter, can readily note if your representative is on the job.

Secondly, time will be saved. Long roll-call votes often demand 20 to 25 minutes of the Assembly's time. It is no short task to call the names of 165 men and duly record their vote. However, under electronic voting, after debate has ended, it will take less than 2 minutes for the full membership to vote and be recorded, allowing more time for debate and sound legislative development.

Thirdly, this legislative reform in no way is partisan or benefits particularly the democratic or republican party. It has been supported by every major non-partisan group whose only goal was that of sound legislative practice and reform.

The column which follows was intended for publication in the Feb. 2nd issue, was cunceled due to the weather emergency.

Certainly one of the prime concerns in New York State over the last few years, if not the last decade, is that of water pollution. The importance of this area has been discussed with such great frequency and at length that I do not wish to spend time on the need for clean waters. Some of the causes of dirty or polluted water which not only has worked against those of us with conservation interest, but has threatened the supply of the water we need for actual body consumption, are the poor methods used by both home and industry in elimination of our waste matter.

However, we cannot criticize industry and the home owner unless we first classify our waterways correctly. By classifying I mean A, B, C and D, which in turn means designed for drinking; designed for swimming; designed for lesser purposes; etc. I submitted a formal request to the State Water Commisssion last week in Albany for a reclassification or regrading of Black Creek. This is because of the condition of Black Creek not only for those of us who live in the vicinity but for our friends from the City and other areas who want a clean, well-stocked, recreational center to visit on the weekends and holidays. I have received great support in this area from the Chamber of Commerce and in particular Joseph Schirano and his group from Churchville who aided in gathering petitions for this purpose. I will report on the decision of the commission when I am in receipt of their reply. In this same area, I submitted a bill, which I believe has a good chance of passing, which will allow the Water Commission to hold hearings and make the necessary investigation for the purposes of upgrading a waterway without charging the applicants for the cost of the hearing. Unfortunately, under present law a town, village or group of individual citizens who persuade the commisssion to hold a hearing for the purpose of re-

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



POLICE CHIEF LOMBARD: We can be proud of our children except for a fraction of a per cent. Dropouts and jobless are principle concern. Citizens must help police even to the extent of "turnover arrests" and appear in court to help prosecute. Has 16 non-uniformed officers working on youth problems. Sends letters to parents of delinquents. Willing to put special police here equipped with walkie-talkies. Hopes to eliminate delay in police response to calls by new shifts which go into effect later this month.

YOUTH BOARD ASSISTANT HO-WARD: Willing to send in four workers into the area. Knows of no organized gangs in the old Tenth. Has great faith in the majority of teen agers.

CITY COUNCILMAN WOOD: Advocates foot patrolmen on the beat, more vigorous attitude and an end to coddling by judges, more Saturday night activities for kids financed by the city and businessmen. Suggests formation of a citywide federation of neighborhood associations.

COUNCILMAN GILLETTE: Says area has improved in his 55 years as a resident and he sees it as a very stable, good place to live. Failure of parents to correct children is the problem. Doesn't believe vandalism is excessive, but if he finds it is so will see to it something is done about it.

REV. JEANDHEUR: Would encourage kids to think of vandalism as "stupid" and urged them to turn informer, to tell teachers and school counselors who the trouble makers are. Sees it as his duty to press charges against offenders and then, as a minister, to go visit them in jail.

Always Perfect

A mistaken belief that a child's eyes are perfect because he has 20-20 vision is probably one of the greatest reasons his school work falls below expectation, according to the Rochester Optometric Association.

During the annual observance of "Save Your Vision Week", Marvin A. Shulman, O.D., president of the association, notes that many children with 20-20 vision maybe seriously handicapped in school as well as in their enjoyment of other every day activities by visual handicaps other than the ability to see clearly. "Vision is a collection of sever-

al skills, such as the ability to focus, to distinguish colors, coordinate head and eye movements, to name a few, and if a child is sufficiently deficient in one of these skills, he may be hampered in his intellectual, social and emotional growth."

Many school and behavior difficulties could be prevented if a child's vision is professionally examined before he enters the classroom and is checked annually thereafter, Dr. Shulman advised.





This is the easiest way to become discouraged and figure what's the use. The City Officials don't care, the men we helped elect to office do not care. They live elsewhere, where such things are not even permitted to start and are prohibited. Why should we care?"

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


