Year End Review

Goodbye To 1966

JANUARY

Neighborhood associations were in the limelight as the year opened. The Maplewood group were investigating vandalism; a second group the Edgerton Neighborhood Association was organizing and still a third Northwest area group (the 15th Ward) met in the Charles Settlement House in Jay St. to hear pledges from numerous public officials to press for sex offender legislation. The Maplewood Association successfully opposed a used car parking lot before the zoning Board; and late in the month held a public meeting addressed by a panel of city officials including City Manager Seymour Scher, Supervisor Robert P. Neilon was again installed as assistant Republican leader of the Board of Supervisors and Supervisor George C. Stockmeister was re-named as minority assistant leader.

Mrs. Elaine Scott was installed as president of Tenth Ward Republican Women. New Otis St. sewers were promised. Gerald P. Hahn, Jr. took office as president and Northwest Kiwanis noted the 25th anniversary of its founding. No. 41 and No. 34 PTA had a couple of sessions on "Sex Education". Christian Unity Week was observed at a joint service held in Holy Rosary Church with a Methodist and Episcopal minister, as well as a Catholic priest taking part. 2 New Bank Buildings Open Jan. 9 On Lyell Ave.; Third Coming Soon

The resurgence of Lyell Ave. as one of Rochester's leading trade arteries will be accented this month with the opening of three brand new, modern bank buildings. Two of the new banks, replacing existing offices of Marine Midland Trust Company and Central Trust Company, will be opened formally Monday. Lincoln-Rochester comes to the Lyell Ave. area for the first time later in the month with a branch in the new Lyell Shopping Center at 424 Lyell Ave.

The Central Trust's Lyell-Mt. Read branch is moving out of the Lyell-Mt. Read Shopping Center into a new building of its own across the street.

The long established Lyell-Saratoga office of Marine Midland is being closed in favor of the new Lyell-Plymouth office, two blocks down the street. It is described as a full service bank with adequate parking area, auto teller and eight teller positions.

Opening features will include personal appearances by Rochester American hockey players who will autograph pictures of themselves for opening day visitors; also a well-known barbershop quartet, the Pastimers who will perform on the evening of opening day (Monday) as well as on Friday, Jan. 13 between 7 and 9 p.m.

Central Trust opened its shopping center office in 1953. A scant four years later, the response of area people to the bank's services forced Central to enlarge the branch.

Under the recent stewardship of manager Jim Farrell, Central Trust soon found itself in cramped quarters.

Thus the new building, scheduled to open next Monday, directly across the street from the shopping center.

The new bank, with its distinctive Cape Cod weathered shingle exterior, was designed by area architect Myron Starks.

The new location features two drive-up tellers, an increased number of inside teller stations, and ample parking for many cars.

Additional banking facilities include a safe deposit vault, 24 hour banking, night depositories, and private cubicles for safe deposit box inspection.

Manager Farrell and assistant manager Mike Powell point out that the drive-up tellers draw cars off Lyell Ave., around the back of the building, and out through traffic free Belknap St., thus relieving congested Lyell Ave.

During Central Trust's opening celebration, free souvenirs will be given to all who stop in.

To Address Women**

Rosary and Benediction in the church will start the Sacred Heart Cathedral Rosary Guild meeting on Monday, Jan. 9 at 7:45 p.m. Regular business is held in the rectory hall after the church services.

Guest speaker will be Mrs. Harper Sibley, who has had a lifelong, active interest in both the ecumenical movement and in civil rights.

In 1928 she was at an early ecumenical movement gathering among Protestants in Jerusalem, and was at the Oxford Conference at Oxford, England in 1937.

Because of her deep interest in ecumenism, Mrs. Sibley stayed in Rome for as much of the Second Vatican Council as possible, seven weeks during one of the sessions. In 1963 she had a personal interview with Cardinal Bea. Her presence was neither official nor required, only her desire for friendship among churches has led her to such active participation.

Members of the Rosary Guild are encouraged to bring non-Catholic friends to the meeting.

IT CAN HAPPEN TO YOU
As a teacher I have always tried avoiding the use of statistics because they can become boring. Now, however, I believe the presentation of some hard data may be more effective in bringing to light--particularly to our young people--the importance of safe driving.

LET'S LOOK AT THE RECORD
In 1965, the total accidents in New York were up 13%, personal injuries were up 9.5% and property damage up 16.5%.

ACCIDENTS VARY BY MONTHS IN 1965
In 1965, as usual, more accidents occurred in December and January and fewest accidents occurred in February. To some extent the accidents in January and December may be results of more driving over the holidays, but I personally believe that part of the problem is drinking and general preoccupation with other interests.

DEATHS AND INJURIES VARY BY LOCATION
Injury and death seem to be more serious in rural areas. For example, fractures, lacerations, and other serious injuries have accounted for about 18% of all injuries which took place in rural areas. In the cities of New York

State, only 6 1/2% of the injuries fell into this category.

This may reflect higher speeds upon impact. Frequently, a deserted, open road can give a false sense of security. Rural areas have a high population death rate: 3.5% per 10,000 while in the cities the rate is less than 1% per a 10,000 population.

MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT INVOLVEMENT
The motorcycle has become quite a problem. The registration of motorcycles in 1965 represented an 84% rise over 1964. Accidents involving motorcycles increased at an even higher rate of 105%.

ROCHESTER
In Rochester in 1965, there were 25 deaths or injuries per 1,000 population as a result of car accidents.

CAUSES
The causes of accidents are endless - carelessness, drinking, fatigue, mechanical difficulty, poor roads and lighting. The list is endless, but I am personally convinced that the human factor is the most important. Life is very exciting for young people and sometimes it helps for parents to remind them about some dull subjects like safety - IT COULD SAVE THEIR LIVES.

In The Fifties, Get Ready For Sixties

(This is one of a series of articles written for our readers by executives and other staff employees of Community Chest Red Feather agencies and offering counsel in specialized family living, health, child care, and youth service fields. They are presented as a public service, and in appreciation of generous Community Chest support, over many years, by the people of this community.)

About one out of every three of Monroe County's 65-and-over senior citizens - - 21,359 out of 61,833 - - lives in the town and village areas outside of Rochester. But the ratio seems due for an increase; the "threshold" group, aged 60-64, show the proportion changing from one of three to one of two and one-half.

There are changes of course, at age 65. Most of the men, and some of the women, will be retired, released from the discipline of daily jobs, with increased leisure, and reduced incomes. How will this leisure be filled - - by idleness and boredom that rusts muscle and mind, or by activity that maintains mental and physical well being?

For most persons, perhaps, that question can best be answered not at age 65 when retirement begins, but a decade or more before the retirement deadline, when various interests can be tested and explored, and a leisurely choice made of post retirement pursuits.

Some individuals and couples may want to start this survey even in their 40s, it may take time to find out what your aptitudes are, what interests will fit your post-retirement pocketbook, perhaps what activities promise at least a moderate income to supplement social security and pension payments.

There are "co-educational" projects in which both husband and wife can participate, ceramics, for example, furniture refinishing, and gardening and cooking.

Some of these can be surveyed in adult educational classes at

high schools, or in courses available at the YMCA or YWCA. Such courses not only can develop special skills, but show what tools and special equipment are required, give some idea of the cost of materials. If interests justify, these tools can be acquired in large part during the wage-earning years, ready for use when retirement time - - with its restricted income - - arrives.

(It's well to remember also that a person has more mobility in his pre-retirement years, is better able to attend classes that may involve some miles of travel two or more evenings a week.)

Weaving is an activity that is high in popularity at Friendly Home. We think of it as a woman's activity; but weaving is, traditionally, a man's occupation, and there is no reason why husband and wife should not share it.

Gardening is another popular interest at the Home. It has the disadvantage of being seasonal-unless the retiree-to-be has the foresight, and the means, to build a small greenhouse. A vegetable garden, even a small one, requires muscle, but if back-yard space is available, it will provide great satisfaction, plus food better and fresher - and cheaper - than one can buy.

For the retired woman, there are knitting and many varieties of needlework. For the man craftsmanship may be an absorbing interest with a vast variety and range from home carpentry and furniture repairs to expert cabinetmaking, carving, the making of toys and doll furniture vastly appreciated by grandchildren.

Let The Adoption Agency Decide

(This is one of a series of articles written for our readers by executives and other staff employees of Community Chest Red Feather agencies and offering counsel in specialized family living, health, child care, and youth service fields. They are presented as a public service, and in appreciation of generous Community Chest support, over many years, by the people of this community.)

Hundreds of Monroe County couples, we know, want to adopt a child--but never take the necessary steps to start and to complete the adoption process.

Perhaps they've heard that the process is complex and difficult. They aren't quite certain they can qualify as adoptive parents; maybe they think their home isn't quite good enough, their bank account not quite big enough. Why not find out?

A couple with one or more children of its own may want more, for some physical reason can't have more, and believe that natural parenthood is an automatic bar to adoptive parenthood. (That's not true.)

Or a husband and wife may believe that the demand for adoptive children so far exceed the supply that only the exception or the fortunate applicant can hope to find a child. (The fact is that between 400 and 500 children will be placed for adoption this year by Hillside Children's Center and other authorized adoption agencies in Monroe County. Incidentally, the vast majority of babies will be placed in township and village homes outside the City of Rochester.)

Some believe that only couples who can submit a physician's statement certifying complete and permanent infertility will be considered as adoptive parents. That isn't true either.

If you really and sincerely want to adopt a child, apply to an agency and let the agency make the decision, you may be a better prospective adoptive parent than you realize.

Authorized adoption agencies in Monroe County include the County of Monroe Child Welfare Division; and these Red Feather agencies, Maternal and Adoption Service, Catholic Family Center, Jewish Family Center, and of course, Hillside Children's Center.

There is always a need for more good adoptive parents. We, and other adoption agencies, make a careful study of each child available, and each family available; and try to match child and family; that is, we try to place the child in the best home that is available, the best for that particular baby. It isn't a case of first come, first served. One family may happen to find a child rather quickly; another quite as well qualified in general terms may have to wait months.

Some families may be anxious to adopt a child born abroad -- a Korean, or Eurasian child, or one of mixed race. Such children are available through International Social Service; but the family must make application through a local adoption agency.

The great majority of children placed by our agency are under 5 years old, and most of these are babies only a few weeks old. Agencies generally are reluctant to accept as adoptive parents couples over 40 years old, but there are exceptions. One reason for this rule is that by the time the child is grown and, say, ready for college, the bread-winning parent is on or beyond the edge of retirement. But in some special cases

a child may be placed, with excellent results, with over-40 parents.

Generally speaking, Monroe County children are placed in Monroe County homes. But many New York State counties, especially rural counties, may have children available for adoption but no local adoption agencies. And sometimes such children may be placed here.

You may be a better adoptive parent, your home may be a better adoptive home, than you think. The best place to find out is at an adoption agency.

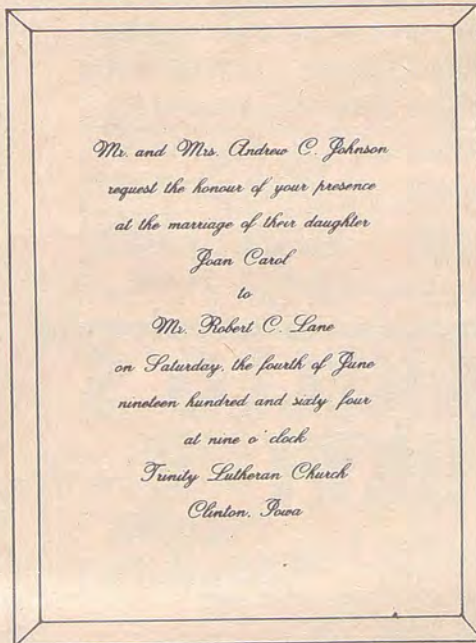

Drain pineapple, reserving 1/2 cup syrup. Spoon one tablespoon melted butter into each of 8 (5-inch) individual foil pans; sprinkle with brown sugar and top with drained pineapple slice. Arrange 3 walnut halves around edge. Place on baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 5 to 8 minutes. Meanwhile, resift flour with sugar, baking powder and salt. Add shortening, 1/2 cup reserved pineapple syrup, milk, lemon peel, vanilla and eggs. Beat on electric mixer 2 minutes. Spoon batter on top of pineapple. Return to oven and bake about 35 minutes until cake tests done. Turn upside down on cake rack; remove pans and allow cakes to cool. Garnish with whipped cream as desired. Makes 8 servings.

ALBANY REPORT

By Senator
James E. Powers

As most of you know, the State Legislature is in session again. At this writing I have not been in the Senate long enough to make a comparison with my life in the Assembly, but I would guess that working with a smaller body would result in many differences.

The heart of any Legislative body is the Committee. That is, proposed legislation must be reviewed by a committee before it reaches the floor of the House. It is the job of the committee to determine what bills are worthy of consideration by the total body. If a bill is reported out of committee favorably, then the complete membership votes on it. Any bill not reported out is termed "killed in committee."

I have been placed on the following committees: Agriculture and Marketing, Banks, Civil Service and Pensions, and Towns and Counties. I was particularly pleased to

be placed on the Towns and Counties Committee. This is a new committee in the Senate and its very existence indicates that the State Legislature recognizes that our growing towns and counties have particular problems that need much attention.

As a result of the Constitutional Convention scheduled to begin on the 4th of April, it is assumed that the Legislature will adjourn earlier than last year, but many problems still face us. In my article next week, I will begin a series on some of the most important problems facing us, and will try to express my own feelings as well as the positions taken by others.

I hope that you will not hesitate to write or phone me whenever you wish to express your views.

"THE PLANTAR WART"

That pesky little thing on the bottom of your foot that resists so-called "corn cures" and other efforts you make to remove it may not be a corn. It may be a wart which, when appearing on the sole of the foot, is known as a plantar wart. The wart is usually flat, surrounded by built up hardened skin, and may contain dark thread-like fibers. Sometimes warts are mistaken for calluses. Plantar warts occur commonly but not always on points of pressure. Other warts are seen in areas where moisture collects as well as under the toenails.

Most warts are probably a viral infection of the skin. The plantar variety can be very painful, even disabling. While they quite frequently affect adolescents, all age groups are susceptible to them. With the plantar wart, the growth is flattened with every step the patient takes. Therefore, unlike warts in other areas of the body, they cannot grow outward but are pushed inward and sideways through the pressure of standing and walking. This compresses nerve endings and causes pain.

Warts can vary in size from a pin head to the size of a large coin.

Warts are transmissible between persons. Plantar warts may also give rise to numerous "satellite" or secondary growths. Treatment varies with the size, abundance and site of the growths. Treatment includes surgery, chemicals, use of electric needle, freezing or other forms of therapy. Podiatrists often use padding to relieve pressure or redistribute weight while treating the problem. There is no sure way of preventing warts from occurring or recurring. Some general rules of foot care should be followed, however:

1. Keep feet clean and dry.
2. Use clogs whenever possible on gym floors, sides of pools or in public showers.
3. Have children's feet checked regularly, at least once a year.
4. Report any unusual marks on the foot to your family podiatrist or physician.

Price Raises Predicted in 67

The cost of food, like the cost of most other things, will continue to edge upward in 1967, reports Mrs. Martha Papp, Extension home economist in Monroe County. But, she says, economists at the U.S. Department of Agriculture do not expect the increase to match the price increase of 1966.

Reduce beef supplies will more than likely mean higher beef prices, particularly after mid-year.

Dairy prices with increases for milk already announced, probably will increase further, and consumers can expect another rise in the price of cereal and baked products.

Fats and oils, too, may cost more; potato prices should remain about the same.

On the bright side for consumers the forecast is for generous supplies of pork, poultry, and eggs. This should mean lower prices for these items. Citrus fruits, too should be less expensive in 1967.

In the market for a man's suit? Buy it now, suggests Mrs. Papp. Prices of some suits are expected to increase next spring by as much as five dollars. By next fall increases may be fairly wide-spread with a maximum increase of 5%.

The price of shoes, too, is expected to advance next spring another 3 to 5 percent. This increase probably won't be in all lines but may be on children's lines and top quality adult dress shoes, Mrs. Papp reports.

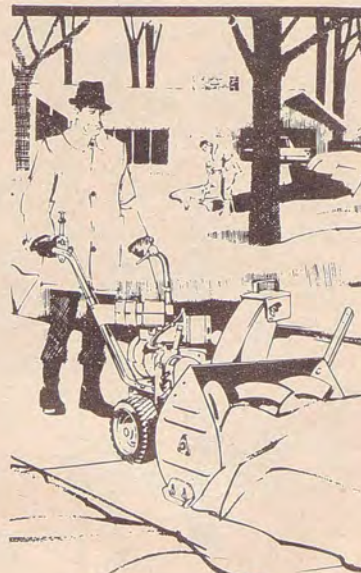
The boost in both shoe and clothing costs is due largely to increase in labor and other production costs.

Department of Agriculture economists anticipate prices on furniture will be up 4 percent from this year, major appliances up 3 percent. Television consoles will also cost more in '67.

Only soft goods home furnishings (draperies, slipcovers, and rugs) so far show no indication of price rises, but they, too, may be affected by the rise in labor costs, USDA economists say.

The State Legislature has now been in session for two weeks, but few bills have been passed as the work of committees are just going into high gear.

**REGENTS MOVE
FOR MORE SCHOOL AID**

The Board of Regents has sought an increase of about \$100 million a year in state aid for schools. At present the state ceiling for all local spending is \$660 a year per pupil. The Regents request would increase this figure to \$726 per pupil. The Regents pointed out that about half the school children in our state are in districts which spend over \$800 a

year on the average pupil and only a quarter of our students attend schools in districts that spend less than \$660 per pupil.

I was particularly pleased to note that the Regents recommended a special aid for summer school and adult education. I have submitted bills in the past to provide this type of aid because of the importance to our community. It seems foolish for the taxpayer to invest in school buildings and not use them to their fullest extent. When we fail to give state aid for summer school and adult evening school programs, we are inducing our school authorities to let the structure remain idle.

It is too early to say what action the Legislature will take. Both Senator Brydes, leader of the Senate and Speaker Travia of the Assembly have been hesitant to take a clear cut position.

I should note here that even if the ceiling was not raised above the present \$660 per pupil, state aid would have to increase by about \$120 million because of increased numbers of students in attendance.

Sometime ago, I illustrated the shortage of nurses throughout the state and in Monroe County and I am pleased that the Regents request for \$12 million to overcome the nurse shortage appears to have the support of both the Governor and Legislature.

To Head Institute For Deaf

Dr. D. Robert Frisina, dean of the Graduate School at Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C., has been selected to head the National Technical Institute for the Deaf to be established at the Rochester Institute of Technology, Arthur L. Stern, chairman of the RIT Board of Trustees announced.

He will hold the title of RIT vice president for the NTID.

NTID will broaden the post-secondary educational opportunities for the deaf and complement the liberal arts program of Gallaudet College, presently the only college for the deaf in the United States.

Students in the NTID program will have opportunities to pursue degree programs in all areas of study presently offered by RIT. These include RIT's well-known programs in photography, printing, fine and applied arts, sciences and business.

It is expected that NTID will also provide the impetus for the development of new programs.

NTID is sponsored by the Federal Government through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Its programs, including room, board, and tuition, are free to deaf students who qualify for admission. The first class is expected to be admitted in September, 1969.

Dr. Frisina, as head of NTID, will be responsible for recruitment and training of staff, design, and coordination of the educational programs, and advisement in the construction of facilities.

A native of Westline, Pa., he has been on the Gallaudet faculty since 1951. He was promoted to professor of audiology and appointed director of Gallaudet's Hearing and Speech Center in 1956.

In November of 1962, he conducted a special educational assignment in Hong Kong for the United Nations Economic and Social Council. He was elevated to

dean of Gallaudet's Graduate School in 1964.

Dr. Frisina holds a bachelor's degree in biology from Westminster College, Fulton, Mo., a master degree in deaf education from Gallaudet College and a doctorate in audiology from Northwestern University.

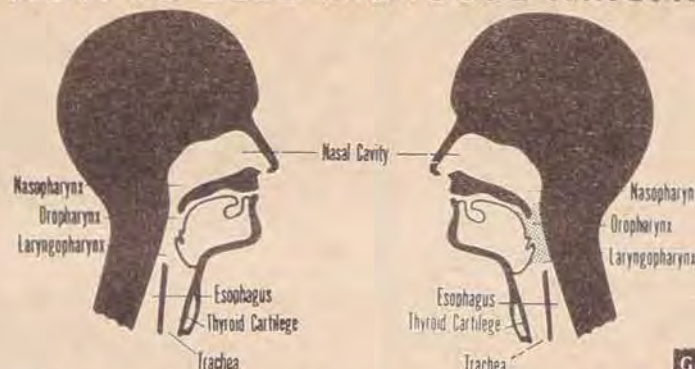
He is a graduate of the Bradford High School in Bradford, Pa., class of 1943 and served in World War II as an Army Air Force pilot.

Dr. Frisina is married and the father of five children.

Announcement of RIT's selection as the site for the institution was made last November after a study was made of the facilities of 28 U. S. colleges and universities which sought the NTID.

At that time, federal officials said RIT was selected because of its position as a leader of technological education in the area.

HOW TO COPE WITH SORE THROAT



The sore throat is the second most common affliction after the common cold --- which it often accompanies. It can be caused by many things year 'round: excessive smoking, chronic fatigue, irritation from dry

air --- and, of course, various diseases --- to name just a few.

Here is a five point program which you can use to treat a minor sore throat. But, the emphasis is on minor. If your sore throat lasts more than 2 days, or if it is accompanied by a high fever or other complications, you must see your physician. A sore throat is often a warning sign for a more serious --- perhaps life endangering --- illness.

1. Many throat specialists suggest you avoid drafts

and inclement weather when suffering from a minor sore throat.

2. Drink plenty of liquids, physicians say, and avoid dry, crunchy foods which may irritate your throat further. If you're a smoker it's best to avoid still another irritant.

3. Stay at home, if possible. Many physicians recommend Chloraseptic, a non-prescription topical anesthetic oral solution which may be sprayed or gargled for prompt relief from the pain and discomfort of minor sore throats.

4. If you must be on the go, Chloraseptic Lozenges offer the same topical anesthetic relief and they can be carried with you.

5. Remember: If your sore throat seems to linger, or if a high fever, muscular aches or pains, feelings of malaise, or other complications occur, the first call you should make is to your physician.

Medicare Questions Answered

Many area residents have been raising questions as to how doctor's bills are paid under the Medicare Program, Joseph Tomaino, District Manager of the Social Security Administration, announced today.

Tomaino explained that after an individual has incurred covered medical expenses of \$50 in a calendar year, the medical insurance plan would pay 80 percent of the reasonable charges for all additional covered services for the rest of the year.

Tomaino added that the law provides two methods of payment, it is up to the doctor and his patient as to which method is used.

1. The doctor may bill the patient and after the patient has paid the bill, the patient will send the receipted bill to the carrier which in the Rochester area is Blue-Shield; or

2. The patient may assign his right to reimbursement to the doctor and the doctor will send the bill to the carrier and be reimbursed directly.

Under either method, after the \$50 deductible has been met, there will be paid 80 percent of what is determined to be the reasonable charge for the services furnished. This payment will be made to the patient if he has sent in the itemized receipted bill together with his Request for Payment form. However, if the doctor accepts the patient's assignment, the payment will be made directly to the doctor. The doctor then may collect from the patient the remaining 20 percent of the reasonable charge and any amount of the \$50 deductible still owing him.

Tomaino also pointed out that an excellent source of information is the green Medicare Handbook which is mailed to all beneficiaries. The handbook is divided into two sections, one covering hospital insurance, the other medical insurance. Pages 16 and 17 explain how one can claim medical insurance benefits. If anyone has misplaced or lost the handbook, the Social Security office will be glad to send another one free of charge. There is also made available at the Social Security office additional copies

of the "Request for Payment" form. Tomaino urges anyone needing help in completing this form to stop in at the office where employees specially trained in the Medicare area are available to advise and assist in these matters.

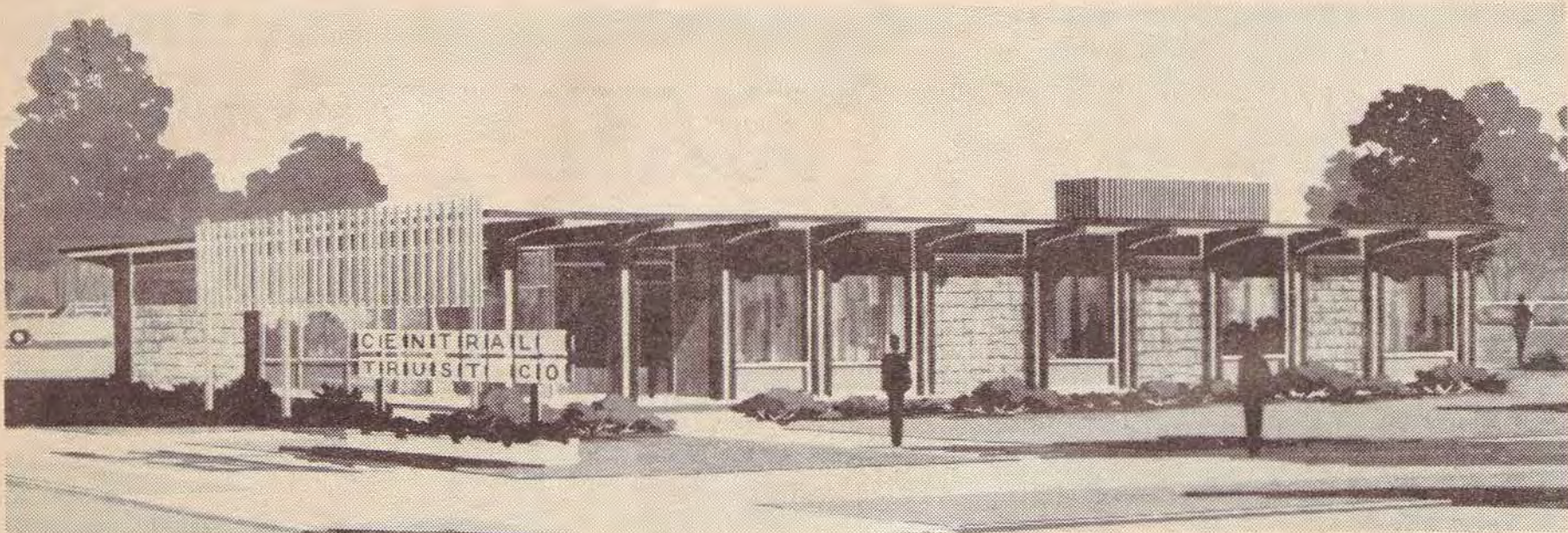
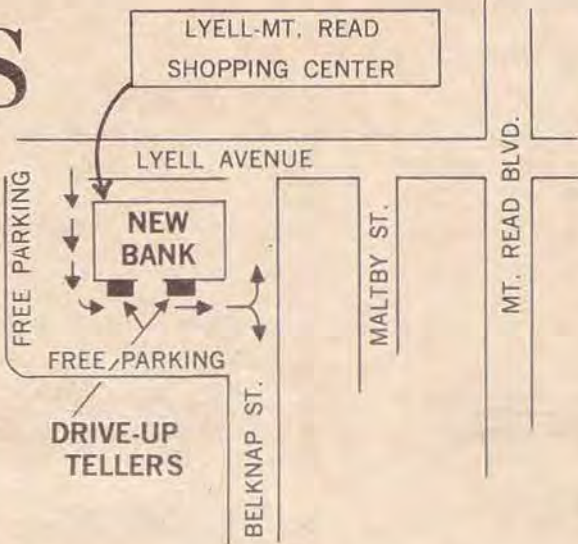

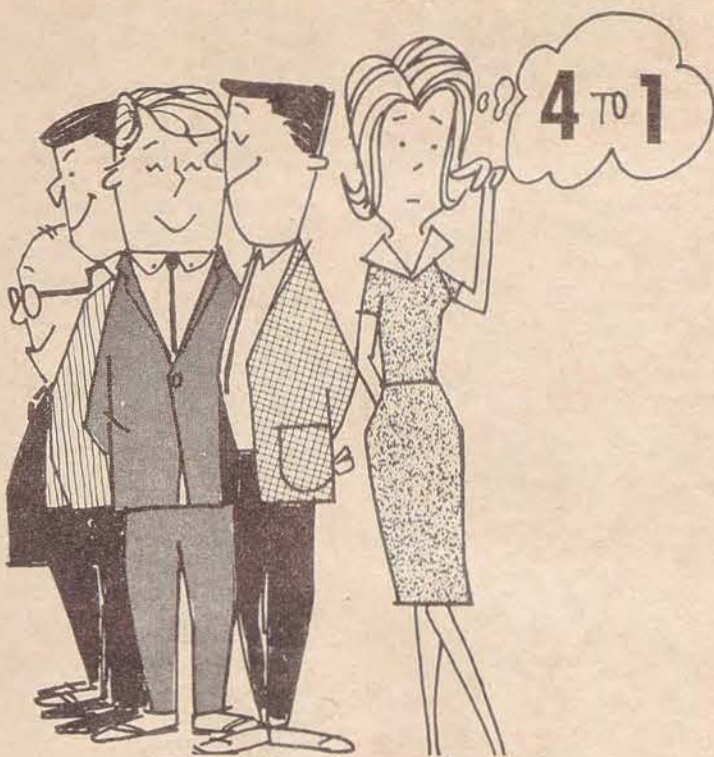

Do you remember the chants of fairy tales?
"Mirror, mirror on the wall" spins a web of magic. The slow intoning of "Fee-fi-fo-fum" brings back memories of giants.
Wondrous fairy tales have always been part of the lore of childhood. Aladdin and his cave, Jack and his beanstalk, handsome princes bewitched into frogs and then transformed by love, brave fishermen given wishes, beautiful princesses cast under spells—all make up a gallery of good stories.

A new book of fifty famous fairy tales is especially designed for reading aloud. Each tale has been made into a story a few minutes long. Originals varied widely, and some were lengthy. The book, part of a classics and fiction series from Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wis., is handy to pick up when a short story is called for to amuse a child at evening.

Why do fairy tales last? No single explanation accounts for the staying power of these stories. Almost every civilization has had its fiction about royalty and commoners, fairy godmothers, magic lamps, flying trunks and carpets. Usually there is no clear lesson to be learned from a fairy tale. Maybe that's one reason children enjoy hearing them.

A child who has been read to will often make up his own stories, flying on imagination. The plots also serve for plays when the children set up an impromptu theater.

Listening to a fairy tale is often a golden key to a child who can enter a magic kingdom—and at the end of the story be safely back where he started.

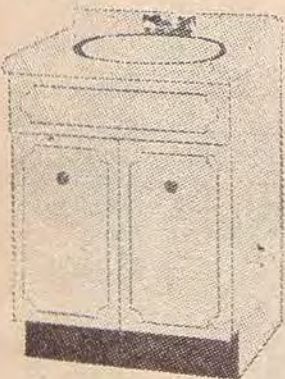

In thousands of urban and suburban homes, where there are teen-agers, there are dilemmas like these: How much freedom should parents permit? How much discipline will teen-agers accept? How much freedom is good for them, or bad for them?

The choice is not easy. Parents now are generally disturbed by the degree of freedom demanded (and taken) by the young. To impose discipline, however, often seems to run the risk of inciting rebellion, tends, in other words, to produce worse behavior than if discipline is not imposed.

The easiest way out is to move towards permissiveness. Indeed, it's hard to argue against the young sometimes. Daughter's best friend has no curfew, a school mate can go to the movies on Wednesday night, this one has a larger allowance, and that one has more use of the family car, etc. Often these arguments are out of context and are used to serve a point. The family without curfew, for instance, may be full of disorder and unhappiness and the daughter wouldn't want THAT part of her friend's experience.

The first point that should be kept in mind here is that young people, of necessity, are often driven by the very process of growing up, to set an inordinately high value on freedom. The second point is that the assertion of this right is often tentative and experimental. Most young people recoil from too much freedom simply because they are not used to use it.

The fact is, however, that they sometimes will take more freedom than they can wisely use in what might be called a gang situation. The gang situation gives a sense of security. Risky behavior is O.K. if you have the support of your friends. There are times when this kind of problem can be better met by a group action rather than by individual family action. Some groups of parents have found it helpful - by street, by school, by church - to get together to agree on some kind of general code for their relationship with their young people. Obviously no code will fit every situation, but the sharing of worries, experience, and ideas is obviously a good thing. If the

young, themselves, can be drawn into discussion then the advantages would be that much greater.

We are talking here of situations falling in what might be called "normal" range, that is, situations where there is a good degree of mutual acceptance and ready affection, in situations in where this is not the case - where the amount of rebellion approaches mutiny, where relationships become fixed in a frozen deadlock, parents should seek individual help for their family situation. They can and should use the resources of the school, church, family physician for guidance; should, if necessary, go to the family agencies or to private psychiatric help. The important point here is to try to get help early.

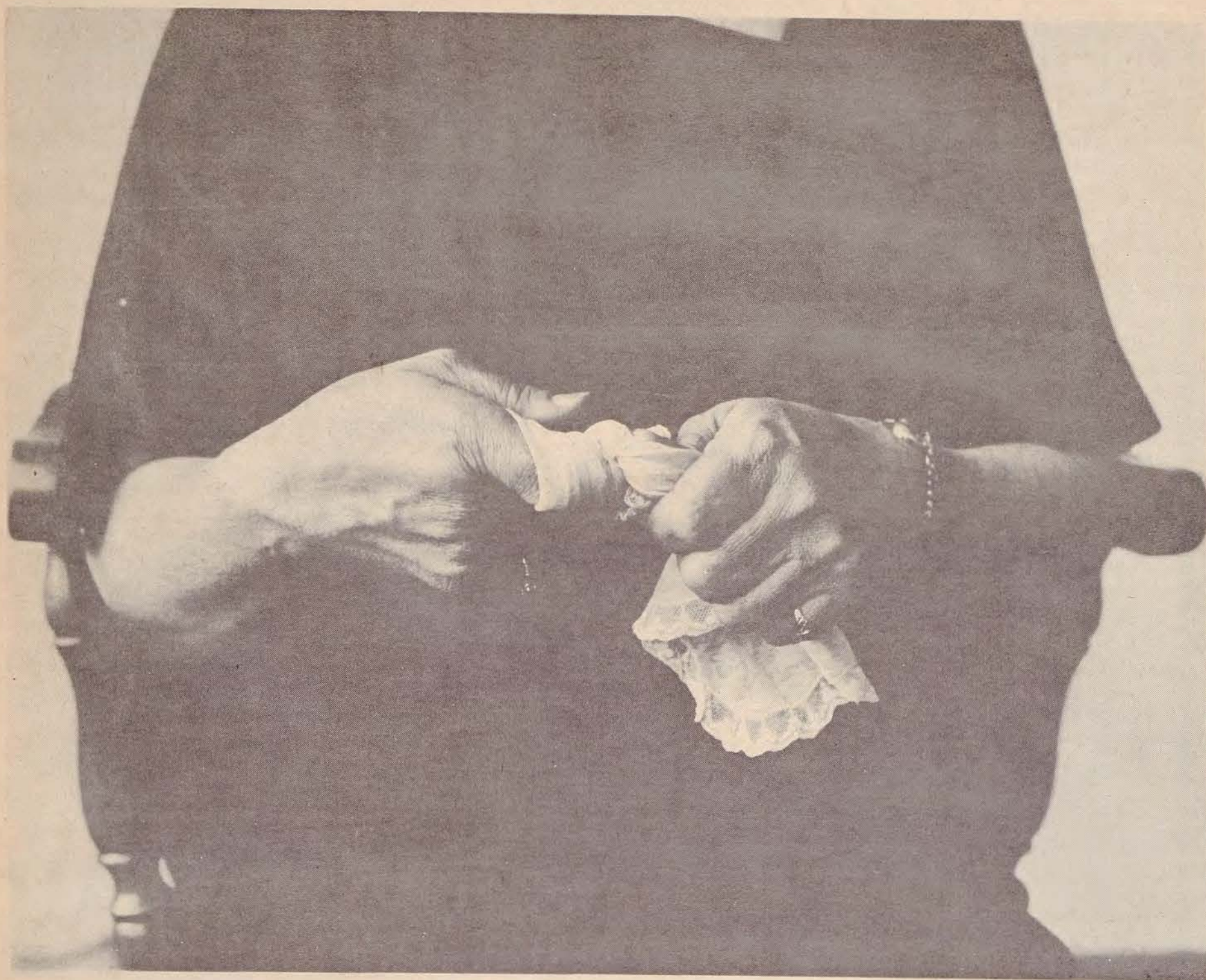

Councilman Henry E. Gillette has expressed himself as in favor of relief for the property owners, but said the city is in no position to finance the separate storm and sanitary sewers to the tune of \$250,000 or more.

Gillette also attacked the move as politically inspired by Councilman Robert Wood; and Gillette claims that only about a dozen homes are involved. 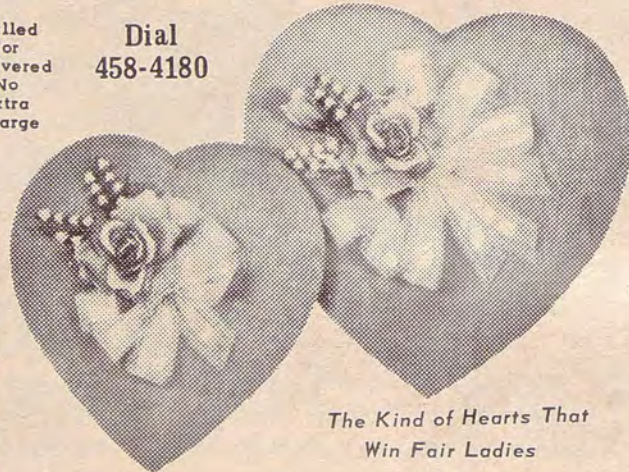

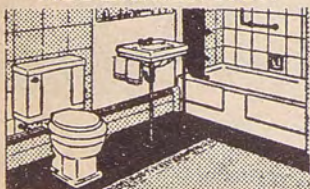

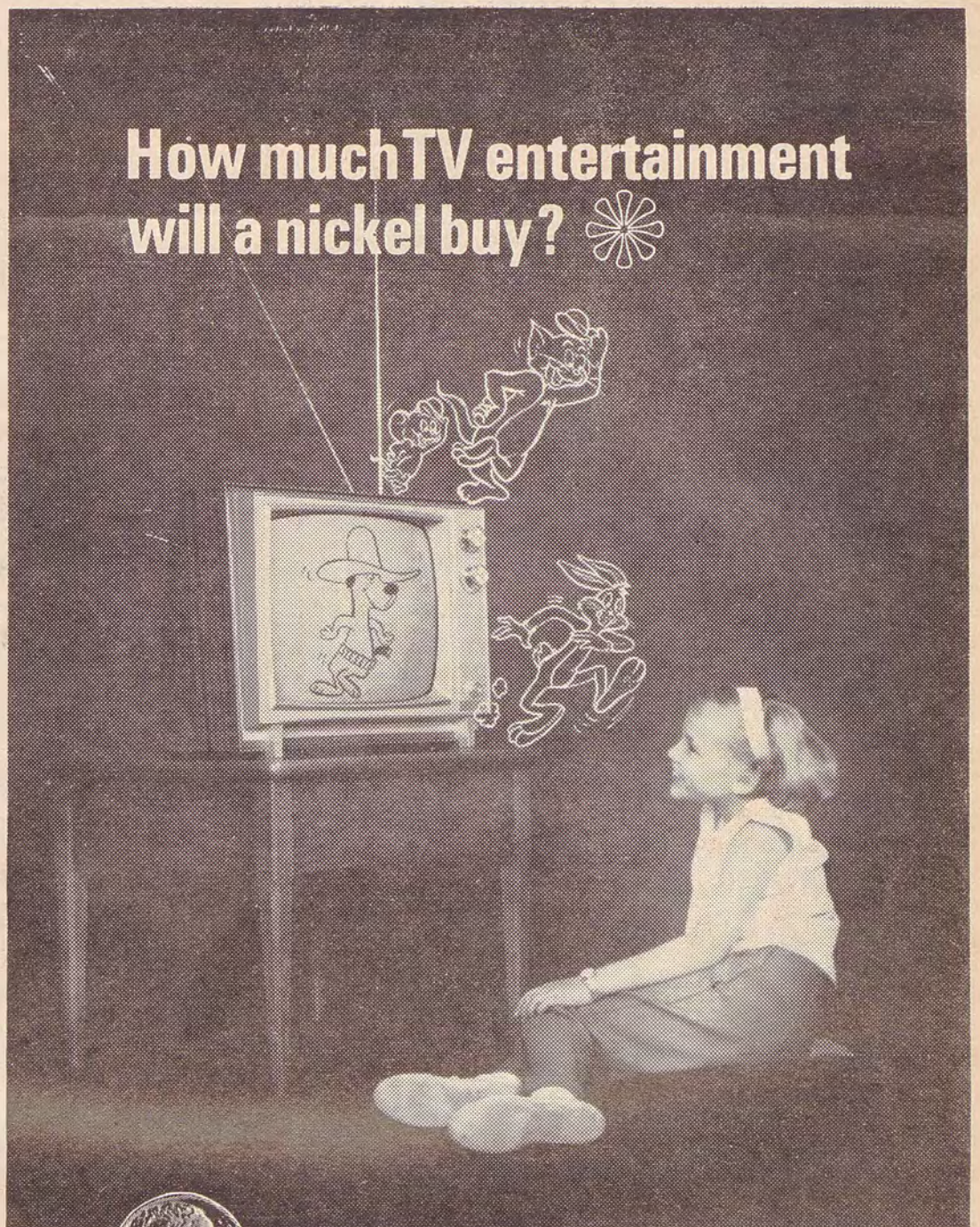

Why Rush The Lottery?
Most of you are aware that the amendment to the Constitution that would permit the Legislature to initiate a lottery, passed at the last election. To have or not to have a lottery was a policy question that the people of the state determined. My constituents, however, roundly defeated the proposal. I have always taken pride in my efforts to determine the feelings or views of my constituents and to be their active voice in Albany. With this principle in mind, I will oppose and vote "No" on any program to initiate a lottery.

But more important than my individual thoughts on the subject, I find it inexcusable that apparently without public hearing or discussion a lottery program will be put into effect at this session. Let us review the amendment which passed last November. In substance, all it stated is that the Legislature could legally, or if you will, constitutionally adopt a lottery. In fact, no proponent of the lottery ever suggested that if the amendment passed, we should rush through some program to have it go into effect immediately. Because the leadership has not yet agreed on how a lottery should be run, no bill is in print and my knowledge is based solely on newspaper accounts and conversation in the halls of the Capitol. One thing is certain, many great decisions have not yet been resolved and the public, as of this writing, has not had an opportunity to express themselves on them.

What questions are there to be asked:

1. WHERE WILL THE TICKETS BE SOLD? I believe the public ought to have an opportunity to contact their legislator to express their opinion on whether tickets should be sold in banks, a symbol of thrift and prudence up to this date.

2. WHAT AGE LIMITS WILL BE ESTABLISHED? Even before the passage of the lottery amendment, I stated that I would never support a bill which would permit the sale of tickets to people under 21, and yet, we don't know now if the proposed program may well allow the legal age to be 18 for ticket purchases.

3. ON WHAT WOULD THE LOT-

TERY BE BASED? Suggestions in this area have ranged from horse races to drawing from a fishbowl.

4. WHO WILL ADMINISTER OR BE IN CHARGE OF THE LOTTERY? The Governor has talked in terms of the State Department of Taxation and Finance, while Speaker Travia seems to prefer a bi-partisan committee. I am sure other suggestions would be worthy of consideration.

5. HOW MANY LOTTERIES WILL TAKE PLACE IN A YEAR? One, two, four, or what have you.

6. WHAT WILL BE THE PRICE OF THE TICKET? \$1, \$2, \$3, or what have you.

In other words, I believe it is always bad policy to make major departures from past procedures in haste and substantially without the knowledge of the citizens of our state. We have seen the evils of rapid passage of bills and programs in the past, it is absurd to continue this practice.

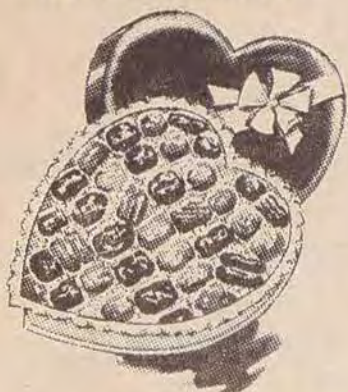

New Services Set For Birth Control

Planned Parenthood will offer birth control services, starting Feb. 7, in three separate sessions in the Baden Street area. The present clinic on Thursday morning each week will be expanded to Thursday afternoons from 1 to 3.

A new unique service will be started on Tuesday nights when bus service will be offered from the Baden St. clubhouse to the 38 Windsor St. center of Planned Parenthood. Patients will be picked up at 6 p.m., starting Tuesday night, Feb. 7, and continuing each Tuesday from then on. Return bus trip will be at 9 p.m., back to the Baden St. clubhouse. Bus service is free and it is hoped that this new service will provide working mothers with birth control information and service at a time when they can come in.

Planned Parenthood, a non-profit agency, operates 13 weekly clinics in the city, six at Windsor St.; and out-reach clinics at General Hospital, Genesee Hospital,

Montgomery Center, Christ Presbyterian Church and ABC Neighborhood Service Center, in addition to the Baden St. location. Planned Parenthood makes no charge for Welfare or Medicaid patients and others on a sliding scale according to income. No one is turned away for financial reasons.

Ten doctors and seven nurses are on the regular medical staff of the agency. A medical advisory staff of prominent area physicians insure the most advanced medically approved methods, including rhythm. No one who comes for information or help is required to accept a method and there is a method which is compatible with any religious belief or personal choice.

The Planned Parenthood League maintains a speakers list, including doctors, clergy, nurses and social workers who are available for group meetings.

The league is a non-profit agency supported by private funds from the community and is the only organization in the area devoted to family planning, education and service.

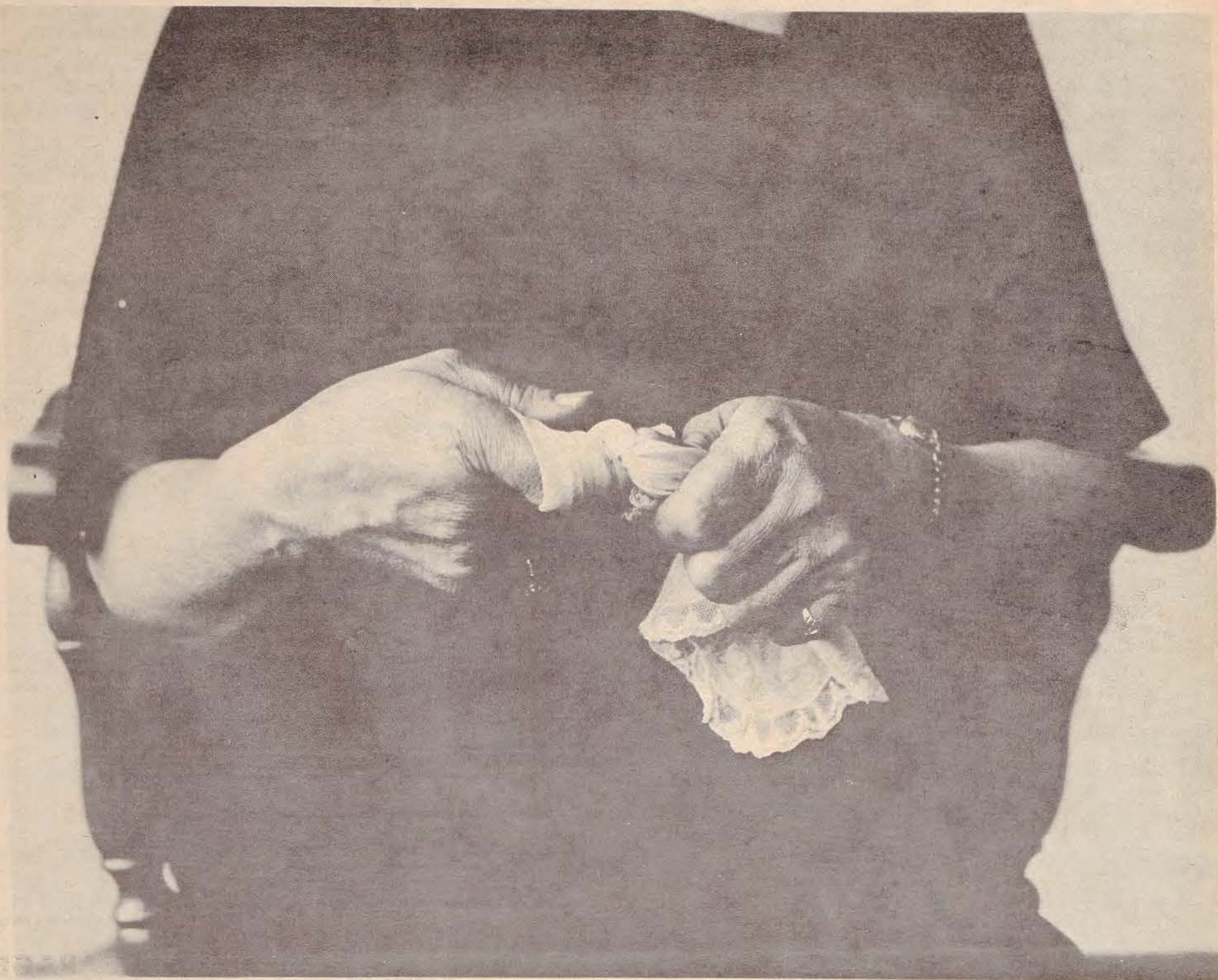

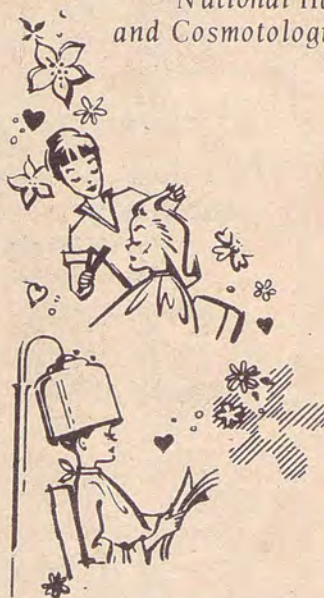

WEST POINT, Jan. 31, 1967

It was indeed an honor and moving experience to be one of the four State Senators to represent the New York State Legislature at the funeral ceremony for the late astronaut Lieutenant Colonel Edward H. White II at West Point.

We left the Capitol by state car at 8 a.m. and arrived at the Old Chapel at West Point two hours later. As the complement of men has increased at West Point, a new chapel was built and so, the smaller Old Chapel, located adjacent to the cemetery, is only used for special occasions. By the time we took our seats at 10:15, a huge throng was present, and of course, most could not be seated, but remained outside. There was absolute silence within the Chapel - - even the whispering that is frequently heard prior to the initiation of the ceremony was absent. It was as if each person present felt a deep personal loss, the kind of personal loss one normally associates only with a relative or close friend.

At 10:45 Vice-President Humphrey and the President's wife, Mrs. Johnson, were seated. At a few minutes to 11:00 Col. White's wife and family, including a 13 year old son and a 10 year old daughter,

were ushered to their pew.

The ceremony was short and the pastor of Col. White's church alluded to the excellent character and civic consciousness of Col. White.

From a personal standpoint the most impressive and moving feature was the singing by the Cadet Choir. Col. White loved the Point. And when all assembled stood at attention while the Cadet Choir sang the West Point Alma Mater, an emotion was present which I find difficult to describe. It was the same type of emotion I am sure many of you experienced at the funeral ceremony of the late President Kennedy when the band played "Hail to the Chief". At the conclusion of the ceremony within the Chapel the processional of the cadets, band and dignitaries marched to the grave site. The echo of the three gun volley was followed by Taps.

Col. White was not the first nor will he be the last to die in the service of our country, but the sincere sorrow of all present and in fact, the sorrow felt by all Americans proves that we are still a society which values the individual life.

Northwest Renewal Next In City's Future Plans

This area apparently will be the prime target of the city's next big move in the urban renewal program. Some 900 to 1,000 acres have been ear-marked for rehabilitation or rebuilding, the largest project yet to be undertaken by the city. The first neighborhood conservation phase of the project hopefully will be initiated within a year.

Councilman Henry E. Gillette, who has been pressing for action for some time, states that more definite proposals will be outlined in a few weeks.

Richard H. Pine, director of the Bureau of Redevelopment, said the City Council will be asked next month to approve application for federal funds for planning the project.

The area is bounded by the Genesee River on the east, Main St. and West Ave. on the south, and Driving Park Ave. on the north. Although the western boundary is not definite it is expected to be near Ames and Santee Sts., Pine said.

Some clearance is proposed by planners, but most of the area will be treated by rehabilitation—mainly code enforcement and public improvement.

Pine said there was no estimate of the total cost of the project. Planning will begin after federal approval of planning funds.

The first phase would be rehabilitation of the northern and western parts of the area, generally stable neighborhoods threatened by blight spreading from the sections closer to downtown.

The southern position may require some clearance, Pine said, as it contains the worst housing and obsolete commercial structures.

In the rehabilitations phase, property owners would be eligible for federal low-interest loans to improve their properties.

Proposals for development of the riverfront and Western Expressway corridor include apartment sites overlooking the river, development of a park at the Upper Falls, creation of a shopping complex on Jay St. and single family housing complexes in the same area.



Governor's Budget

On February 1, 1967 Governor Rockefeller submitted his budget to the Legislature. This budget cannot be read quickly inasmuch as it is over 1000 pages long and calls for an expenditure of almost four billion seven hundred million dollars.

At the same time, if each school district raises their expenditures and it is on these expenditures that their plea for greater state aid is made, then you can readily see that the decisions made within a school district have a great effect on the state budget.

Aid To Public Schools

In this article I would like to explain the proposed expenditures to aid public schools. The proposed budget allocates one billion five hundred and one million dollars for this purpose. This budget does not increase the present aid formula of up to \$660 per pupil, but the larger student population of seventy thousand, along with the full year's formula, will result in an increased expenditure of \$117 million.

State University

With the student population of State University exceeding 140 million people, an increase in appropriation of \$54.7 million has been called for bringing the total to \$257.6 million for State University operations. Moreover, the Governor appropriated \$4 million for faculty salary increases. It should be noted that some costs of State University are not part of this budget, but are budgeted in an independent authority.

Many groups have asked for an increase above the \$660 level. For example, the State Board of Regents has recommended that the ceiling for operating expenditures aid be raised to \$726, an increase of 10% over the present. The plea of the Regents is well taken inasmuch as 60% of the students in New York State now attend school districts that have an operating cost of \$726 per student or higher.

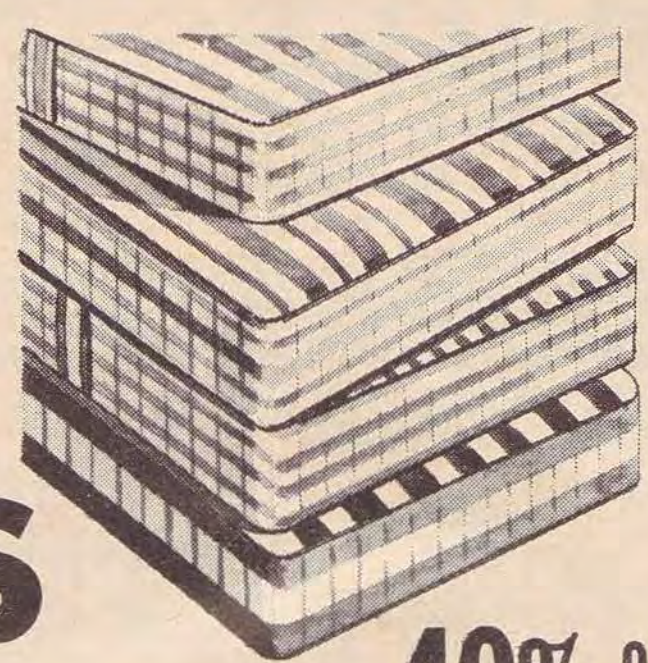

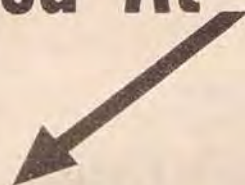

Auto Inspection Complaints Aired

Complaints regarding the state car inspection program have been forwarded by Senator James E. Powers to Vincent L. Tofany, Commissioner of Motor Vehicles. They are largely concerned with the ethics of some of the inspection stations, according to Powers.

Powers has suggested that each station be required to post a notice that the motorist is not required to use the services of the particular inspection garage and has a perfect right to have any and all repairs necessary done at a garage of his own choice.

The inference of some inspectors that the car will not be permitted to be on the streets until that garage has made the necessary repairs is not true, states Powers.

He also asks three specific questions: Are the inspectors actually checking all required items; are they making additional charges for operations already covered by the \$1.50 fee; and are they charging excessive rates for some repairs which they have declared necessary?

Powers Introduces Legislation Creating Ombudsman

On Tuesday, February 21, 1967 I submitted two bills to institute the office of Ombudsman. One bill applies to Monroe County outside of the City of Rochester, and the other bill applies to the City of Rochester itself. Both bills are of a permissive nature. That is, the County Legislature and the City Council would, at their discretion, appoint the Office of Ombudsman.

The concept of the ombudsman is neither new or untried, it was first set up in Sweden in 1809 and has spread to other Scandinavian countries and New Zealand, as well as England. In fact, last year Nassau County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson appointed an official with ombudsman duties to protect the public against "inefficiency, maladministration, arrogance and abuse on the part of Government."

The bills stipulate that "the ombudsman shall hold office for a term of six years and that the ombudsman shall be a person of distinguished accomplishments in the field of legal scholarship administrative law.

Too often an aggrieved individual, whether he is treated rudely when applying for a driver's license or believes that a governmental unit has behaved in an unconstitutional or illegal manner, does not know where to turn. Rightly or wrongly, he sees little value in complaining to the same agency which has behaved badly. Although the vast number of public employees are dedicated and courteous, all men who have held public office have received complaints from a variety of people in reference to inefficient, rude, or high-handed public servants or officials.

As government grows more complex and further from the citizen, complaints of this nature increase, and though, I am sure all of my colleagues in public office investigate to make sure the people receive the public service which is due them, this could be more effectively and efficiently handled by an ombudsman. Moreover, an ombudsman's investigation would be largely free from the charge that his acts were politically motivated, as is often the case, when a public official intervenes.

Seven New Signal Lights; Six Modernizations Due

A major overhaul of the traffic signal system, proposed in a bill introduced last night by Councilman Henry E. Gillette will have its greatest impact in the Northwest area. It provides for new signals at 13 intersections, seven of them in Gillette's councilmanic district, as well as numerous replacements, and will cost an estimated \$230,000.

The Northwest District Democrat said new installations and replacements for outmoded signals are based on a priority study by the Bureau of Traffic Engineering. All the work is scheduled for completion this year.

"We are continuing a program initiated when this Administration came into office in 1962", Gillette said. "We will have spent more than \$1,100,000 on traffic signal improvements since that time, involving scores of new signals and replacements. This compares, for example, with the spending of some \$60,000 for such improvements, long needed though they were, by the prior Administration in 1960-61 and 1961-62."

Most of the new setups are in the area of schools in the interest of greater safety for the children. New locations for signal lights will be at LaGrange and Ridgeway (near No. 40 School) which has an average daily vehicle count of 15,000; on Lake Ave., in front of Nazareth Academy, where the traffic count averages 25,000; at Dewey and Alameda, opposite Aquinas, with a traffic count of 15,000; at Bloss St. and Daus Alley, near Jefferson High, with a traffic count of 12,600 and at Otis and Sherman Sts., with a traffic count of 6,000.

Other new installations will be at Dewey and McCall where the traffic flow is estimated at 19,500 daily and at Saxton and Maple Sts. which has become increasingly busy since the opening of the western expressway extension.

GOVERNOR PROPOSES MAJOR POLICY CHANGES

The Governor's proposal for legislation to modernize transportation is much more than a coordination of facilities, and I am afraid most people do not recognize this fact.

By and large, I have the impression that the people believe that the Governor's proposed \$2 1/2 billion bond issue is simply the building in a few years (4 or 5) what would normally be done over a 10 year period. Let's analyze the situation. In the next two weeks the legislature will vote on 12 bills which will allow communities to do that which they are now prohibited from doing. Should these 12 bills pass, it means that if the people this November approve the \$2 1/2 billion bond issue, this money can be used in ways which are not permitted now.

I attended two meetings with the Governor and my colleagues in a discussion about his proposals. I am very much disturbed that the legislature is again going to embark on the passage of major bills without the necessary time for research and discussion by the legislators. In fact, as of March 9 printed copies of the bills were still not available. It is unjustifiable that minor proposals facing the legislature are available for months before consideration and major legislation, such as Medicaid and changes in our philosophy

about mass transportation which have grave fiscal and social ramifications, are handled like a "close-out" sale of a corner haberdashery.

What will these bills do? Since my knowledge is based on discussions with the Governor and his staff and as of this date (March 9) I still do not have the luxury of having the bills before me to study, I can only give an overall view.

1. This legislation would permit communities to develop bus, subway, and other forms of mass transportation with the state picking up three-quarters of the bill.
2. Would permit New York City to subsidize its subways to retain the 20¢ fare. In fact the transit authority (subway) would have the power to issue \$100 million in promissory notes to cover the deficit in daily operating expenses. These bills would also permit capital investments in railroads, expanded airports and, of course, the bond issue would permit highway development.

When I have an opportunity to see the bills, I will then give a more detailed account. The major thrust of my criticism now is the procedure that is being used; namely, major changes in philosophy and administration with financial ramifications in the Billions will be decided by legislators who will have the proposals in their hands for about two weeks.

GI Johnson Gets VC Gun As Vietnam Souvenir

A clipping from a Vietnam service newspaper which came to Clyde Johnson of Clay Ave. by a roundabout route, casts his son, Specialist Four Robert Johnson, in a prominent role in a skirmish with the Viet Cong. (The father got the clipping from a buddy of Robert's and has had no word from his son about the episode).

The story in the Army paper says that a 29-man reconnaissance platoon, called the Recon Panthers and of which Johnson is a member, came under sniper fire as it crossed a large clearing in the jungle. The sniper retreated without inflicting any casualties and the Panthers advanced while firing. Two hundred yards further they found a tunnel system 250 yards long that had been dug two weeks earlier and had fresh foot prints.

Beyond the trench system was an oxcart trail which led to a small hamlet. Johnson was left with another man to secure the trail while the rest of the platoon proceeded to search the hamlet. As he watched, a VC in civilian clothes carrying a rifle, came around a corner in the trail 60 meters away, says the article.

Johnson fired his M-79 grenade launcher as the VC crossed the road to enter the jungle. Although knocked down by the blast and covered with blood, the wounded VC quickly regained his feet and escaped around the turn in the trail. Johnson retrieved the rifle, of Chinese manufacture. (His notation on the clipping he sent to his buddy indicates that this is a prized possession and will be brought home as a souvenir of the war.)

Also taken in the raid by the platoon were two Honda motorcycles, belonging to the Viet Cong and ridden out from one of the larger villages by the VC to do "part-time" sniping at the Allied

troops. Civilian and military clothing, cached by the VC, was also among the haul.

"Judging by the clothes found, these VC were rich and important" the commanding officer of the platoon said. "I'd hate to be in their shoes when they report to their superiors on foot."

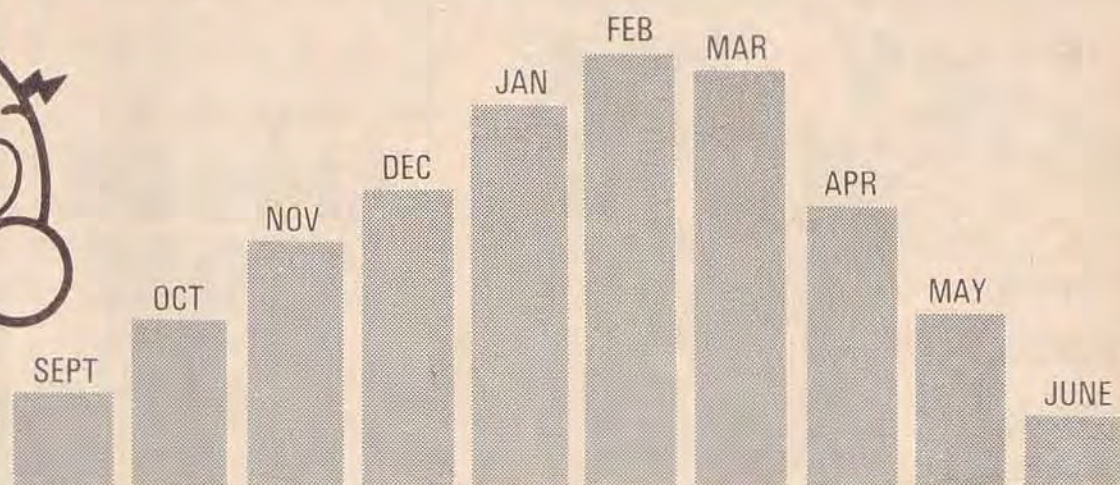

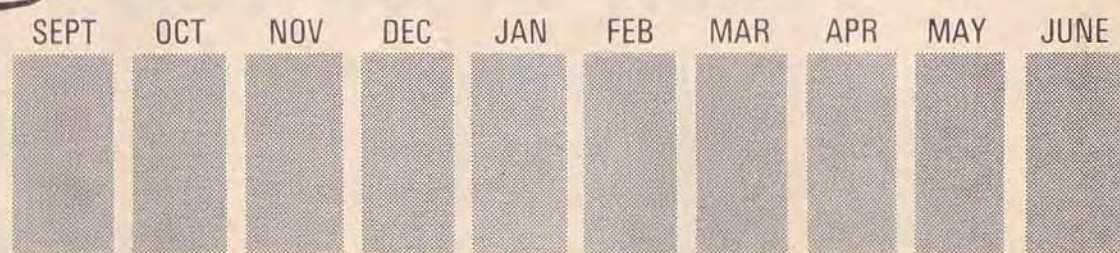

City Proposes New Park Here

The auto junkyard in Lake Ave., long a subject of controversy, will be turned over into a public park if Mayor Frank Lamb has his way. He introduced an ordinance Tuesday in the City Council which authorizes purchase of six acres of land for a proposed "Lower Falls Park".

The new park will run down to the river's edge from Hastings St. to Driving Park Ave., alongside Maplewood YMCA. It would be transformed into an area for picnicking and for a better view of the river "our most valuable asset", said Lamb, who is chairman of the city's recreation committee.

To finance the park, the city has applied for 50% federal aid for land purchase and 75% of the balance from the state, leaving about 1/8 for the city to pay. The city also seeks 50% of the development cost from the federal government.

The city is also seeking to get land in the Avenue D area for enlargement of recreation facilities there.

Someone Lives When Someone Gives

The First, Ninth and Tenth Wards Bloodmobile will be visiting in this area on Tuesday, April 4th from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Flower City Pk. Perhaps your blood donation today won't save a life tomorrow or the next day, but someday it will.

Much publicity is given to cases where blood transfusions have dramatically saved a person's life in a matter of minutes, but few people stop to give thought to the important use of blood for research purposes. To open doors to new uses for blood products and to increase the effectiveness of present blood services, the American Red Cross Blood program is carrying on research in three broad areas.

For three years the Red Cross has been screening blood samples to create a "Rare Blood Donor File". This laboratory may in the future save hundreds of lives for people with rare blood needs.

"Long Time Preservation" of blood by freezing is another effort of the Red Cross Blood research program. Its objective is to establish a method of preservation by which the blood will be entirely safe for human use.

Another goal of the Red Cross Blood research program is the discovery and refinement of additional blood components, this is called "Blood Fractionation". In many medical instances, a blood fraction is more effective than the administration of whole blood.

Voluntary Busing Wins A Round

The grass roots movement against involuntary busing in the city schools resulted in a hard won, but possibly temporary victory, at last week's meeting of the Board of Education which could well turn out to be a milestone in the history of Civil Rights. Northwest area parents can rightfully claim a major role.

The vote of the Board was a close one, three to two. And Mrs. Frances Cooke, whose word was decisive at two o'clock in the morning, admitted that she had been influenced by the self-evident surge of popular opinion against involuntary busing as expressed at the meeting. She thus supported Dr. Louis Cerulli and Glenn Wiltsey as against Robert Bickal and Faust Rossi.

Numerous people from our area were in the audience and several of them were among the 60 or more who spoke. All are aware that they have won a major skirmish, but with militant opposition that threatens to carry the fight to Albany and to State School Commissioner Allen, they plan to continue to organize and to fight for their rights.

As one of the women prominent in a local branch of the city-wide Neighborhood School Council put it: The aim is to keep the neighborhood school concept alive. Busing of children from No. 3 School into schools of this area such as Nos. 34, 40 and 41 is now an accepted fact of life, provided parents of these children do not object. But forced busing of boys and girls from Northwest area schools to other sections of the city is a principle on which we will not surrender.

Unfortunately the effort of local legislators to curb the powers of Commissioner Allen have apparently been thwarted by political maneuvering at Albany and as a consequence a test of some kind, possibly in the courts, is indicated. Organization on the local level is the only answer.

Wegmans Buy Dewey Driving Park Property, Will Demolish Landmark

Sale of the Schulz Building and adjoining property on the southwest corner of Dewey and Driving Park Aves. is the first step in eventual removal of this old Tenth Ward landmark from the local scene.

The corner location, including four stores, two second floor apartments and Dewey Station, the branch of the U. S. postoffice, is now the property of Wegman's food stores. Purchase price was \$93,500. The sale was made, effective March 15 by John Garnham, real estate agent, in affiliation with the Byron B. Webber agency.

Wegman plans are to raze part of the building, as soon as present tenants have vacated, probably this summer, to provide more parking and to improve the "sight line" of the present Wegman store which is now largely not visible from

Dewey Ave. The sandwich shop, directly on the corner, has a lease that has about two more years to run and may be left standing temporarily. The future of the postoffice will be decided when its lease runs

Gillette's Decision Stands; Will Not Run For Council

Councilman Henry E. Gillette's decision against seeking re-election for another term in the City Council is "irrevocable and final", he told the Courier this week. He will run for judicial office, however, if the party decides to nominate him, he says.

Gillette has represented the Northwest area on the Council since 1959. He was re-elected in 1963 and his term runs out this year. He will be closing out a chapter in his political life that has been colorful and stormy, and on several occasions has been at odds with his fellow Democrats over what has been best for the city. He served as mayor during his first term of office as councilman. Previously he had been a city court judge. Political speculation now links him with either County Judge or Supreme Court Judge nomination.

"I intend to continue my interest in community and political matters" states Gillette, "with particular emphasis on the Northwest district's affairs and problems. I hope to broaden my participation in local matters with freedom to abstain if I so desire. I hope to devote more time to my law practice, but will accept a judicial nomination if my party asks me."

The Democrat's choice of a successor to run in the new Northwest district which now runs on both sides of the river, including the Third and Seventh Wards, will be announced at a later date. Lapolois Ashford, former assistant to the public safety commissioner, is among those suggested for the post, as is Andrew Celli, leader of the Ninth and Tenth Wards. Ashford is believed to be reluctant to run and Celli is not an active candidate either. Republicans have as yet mentioned no candidates.

Putting the Council race into the limelight at this time has brought realization to many political leaders and to the voters as well, that the Ninth and Tenth

Wards are to be split again, as far as Council representation is concerned. The northern parts of the two wards will be in the so-called North district, along with the 23rd Ward and wards on the other side of the river which are now in the Northeast district. Urban Kress will be the Democratic nominee there, with a Republican choice yet to be made.

Since the success of the 15 point plan, as outlined by Dr. Cerulli, will depend largely on voluntary reverse open enrollment, we must now encourage those parents who have not been opposed to compulsory busing to help implement point #6 of the approved plan.

Again we wish to thank all those who obtained signatures on the petitions. After the remainder of the petitions were turned in, the actual count was over 3,200. Our petitioners deserve a lot of credit for their efforts.

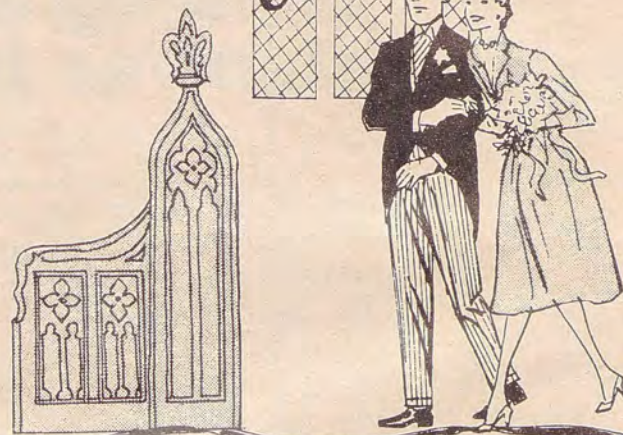



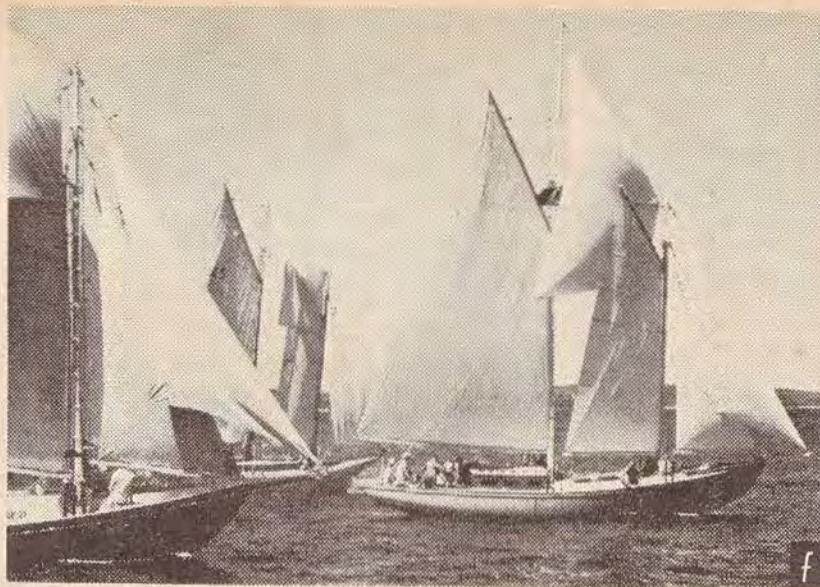

Building of Schooner to Attract Boat Buffs



MONTREAL, CANADA (CFN)—Not until Expo 67 opens here April 28—and not one day sooner—will construction begin on one of the major outdoor attractions of this largest world's fair in history.

The attraction will be the on-site construction of a 47-foot, two-masted schooner by a skilled team of boatwrights at the Atlantic Provinces Pavilion, a joint venture of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

Designed by the renowned boat builder David Stevens, the gaff-rigged vessel will boast a 7,500-pound lead and oak keel, mahogany planking, teak cabin, bronze and copper fittings. It will typify the fishing, trading and passenger vessels that, for more than 200 years, contributed substantially to this nation's economy, particularly in the Atlantic region.

From the day Expo opens until the schooner is launched late in the summer, there will be exciting activity in the boat pit. Visitors will see timbers erected, oak frames steamed and bent to shape and rigging installed.

Nearly all of the materials used will be obtained from the Atlantic Provinces—paint from Newfoundland, refrigerator and galley unit from New Brunswick, batteries and sails from Nova Scotia.

The vessel will be christened the "ATLANTICA," a name containing three A's which denotes, according to superstitious seafarers, a safe future for the schooner.

To further emphasize the proud seagoing heritage of the four provinces, the pavilion will operate the only restaurant at Expo 67 that will serve seafood exclusively. Half a ton of seafood a day will be used to prepare some 90 different dishes for which the Atlantic region is famous. Presiding over the restaurant will be Sam and Lyn Andrews, former owners of Montreal's elegant Chez Pauze.

In addition to delicacies fit for an admiral of the ocean deeps, diners will enjoy a breathtaking, panoramic view of Montreal Harbor and City from the restaurant's second floor position under the huge cantilever roof.

Further echoing the romance of the ever-changing sea will be a sculptured wall made entirely of whale bone. The giant skulls, ribs and vertebrae of the great behemoths of the deep were gathered last summer along the shores of Trinity Bay, Nfld. They will complement other marine exhibits.

A wealth of things to eat and see stamps the pavilion a must for any Expo visitor but the building of the schooner remains the biggest drawing card.

In the words of Rear Admiral Hugh F. Pullen, manager of the Atlantic Provinces venture, "Each time a visitor returns to view the vessel he will see something new. He will be able to follow the craft from keel-laying to launching."

A large mast will tower above the pavilion, directing visitors to Expo 67's most arresting outdoors attraction.

EDITORIAL

We Add Our Protest

The hitherto tacit approval of off-street parking-at an angle- was suddenly withdrawn by our police department as an "Easter present" to the small business men of Dewey Ave. At least one roving prowler car, with two policemen aboard, must have set a new record for tickets issued- mostly of the \$5 variety. Even on Palm Sunday morning, they were at it, giving out tickets to church-goers.

And the letter-of-the-law enforcement is being continued right on, this week too, even on Monday when traffic is at a minimum and the neighborhood stores have few, if any customers.

In an old neighborhood like ours, the people have no place to park when they go to the store except at the curb. Angular parking, which makes room for quite a few more cars, has been allowed for years. Black-topping has been permitted by the city to make room for cars in front of the stores. Now suddenly, a new policy, and a whirlwind drive to back it up.

The small merchants, quite frankly, can't afford the luxury of large parking lots like the chains and the shopping centers. If the police decide to continue their over-zealous ticketing, there will be a lot more little fellows going out of business; and too many have already quit.

"The city is trying to put us out of business", said one man. A strong statement, but the present city administration will have to face up to it, since it is their commissioner of public safety who apparently has issued the clamp-down order.

This newspaper takes the position that except at peak-load times, to expedite traffic movement, enforcement of strict parking regulations is cruel and unnecessary.

Red Cross Home Nursing Classes Starting Apr. 3

Registrations for Red Cross Home Nursing Classes will be taken during the week of April 3 at the Chapter House, 276 Clinton Ave. S.

The course is conducted in seven weekly two-hour sessions, according to Mrs. H. C. Arnold, chairman of the Rochester-Monroe County Chapter's Nursing services.

Mrs. Arnold explained that home nursing training is extremely important to today's homemakers and mothers because of shortages of hospital beds, nurses, and other health personnel. "Also, today," she added, "with antibiotics, a growing number of people can be treated in the home". Mrs. Arnold said that a local physician recently stated that the main trend toward home care is in pediatrics and that relatively few sick children are sent to hospitals today as compared with a few years ago.

The Red Cross Home Nursing course teaches intelligent, simple, basic nursing care for every member of the family. The care of the aged and/or chronically ill is stressed. How to maintain good health in the family, particularly

the children and the aged, is emphasized. The primary concern stressed in the course is health - how to maintain it and how to regain it, with the aim that better personal health ultimately reflects a healthier community.

Lessons include recognizing illness, personal services for the bed patient, giving medicines and simple treatments, positioning and body mechanics, and emergency and disaster care.

Women may enroll in a home nursing class by calling the Red Cross at 454-2400.
