Beware Of "Furnace Inspectors" Warns Better Business Bureau

With the arrival of cold weather the Better Business Bureau reports an increase in the number of complaints about "furnace inspectors".

Robert C. Hildreth, Bureau manager, said that salesmen or servicemen gain access to a homeowner's heating plant by offering to do seasonal inspections for a nominal price. Once in the home they usually tell the homeowner about an alleged serious defect in their furnace and proceed to sell brand new

equipment, Hildreth states. The BBB warns people that it is at this point that they should call their fuel supplier or regular serviceman for their opinion of the heating plant's condition. The BBB says the fuel supplier's services for this inspection are free.

Hildreth said the Bureau has recorded many instances already this fall where subsequent inspections revealed that the furnace wasn't in the dangerous condition claimed by the "inspector" and

the homeowner was saved from spending several hundred dollars unnecessarily.

The Better Business Bureau emphasized that the vast majority of heating contractors in the Rochester area are reputable and do not resort to such fraudulent practices and that only 3 or 4 companies are guilty of the 'furnace inspector' scheme. Hildreth said the number of companies operating this way has decreased in the last two years because the public has been informed of the scheme through widespread publicity in local newspapers and on the radio and television stations.

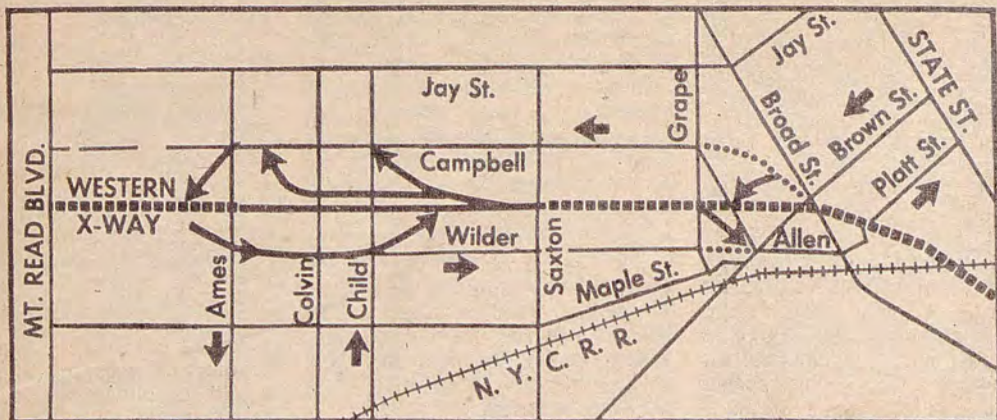

One Way Streets Proposed For Dutchtown Expressway Area



A map of the "Dutchtown" area recently released by the state engineers indicates that the State is planning to create a number of one-way streets paralleling the new Western Expressway extension, construction on which is expected to start this year.

Above is a copy of the map showing Child, Wilder, Ames and Child as one-way streets, State Highway Design Engineer John Ten Hagen explained it this way:

The city will make Wilder St. one way east and Campbell St. one way west. Both streets have been designated as "frontage roads" to feed and take traffic off the ramps at Ames and Child Streets.

According to the plan Ten Hagen said had been worked out by city and state transportation officials, Wilder will carry east-bound traffic from the expressway after it comes off the Ames Street ramp. Campbell would take westbound motorists exiting from the expressway at Child St.

To increase traffic volume on north-south streets connecting with expressway ramps, Child St. would be one-way north and Ames St. one way south at least a few blocks from the expressway.

Campbell would be extended to link with Brown, and Wilder would link with Allen St. Expressway section shown by solid line is to be depressed below grade level; the rest will be at or above grade. Arrows also show expressway entrance and exit ramps.

City traffic engineer Eugene L. Simm declined to elaborate on the one way street plan.

He said one way traffic may not be necessary, but acknowledged

that it makes an "awful lot of sense from the design point of view".

Simm and his staff are studying traffic patterns that will be created by opening of the Western Expressway in the early 1970's as well as what temporary adjustments should be made while the highway is under construction.

Simm said his plans will not be complete until next spring. He will then submit them to the city council.

The Western Expressway's one way frontage road system will extend as far east as State St.

Brown St. would be one way west to where it meets Allen and Campbell St. Eastbound cars on Wilder St. would continue going one way over Allen and Platt Sts. to State St. To accomplish the later, Wilder St. will be extended to connect with Allen St. Ten Hagen said.

The next link of the Western Expressway will be completely depressed from Ames to Saxton St. The Mt. Read Blvd. - Ames St. and Saxton - Broad Sts. sections will be elevated except for where they are gradually graded down to meet the depressed sections.

The contract plans for the \$21 million segment between Mt. Read Blvd. and Broad St. are now being prepared. When they are finished in the late spring, bids can be taken.

Spalling of concrete floors in garages is quite common in the Rochester area because of the widespread use of de-icing salts. This spalling is marked by chipping and flaking of the concrete surface.
To reduce or prevent this action, a mixture of light fuel oil and dry cleaners naphtha may be applied. Mix equal portions of both. A gallon of the mixture should be sufficient for the average two-car garage. Linseed oil may be used instead of the fuel oil.
It is best to apply the mixture with a paint brush. Two thin coats applied several days apart are recommended. A thin coat will dry considerably faster than a heavy coat, particularly in cooler weather.

Red Cross Gives Advice

The rules to follow to avoid becoming an ice drowning statistic this winter were listed today by the American Red Cross, as the annual freeze set in on the nation's ponds, lakes, and streams.

Thin ice can be particularly hazardous to small children who are too young to recognize its dangers, Al Justus, director of the local Red Cross Chapter's Safety Services, said.

"Every year we hear and read of tragedies in which children, attracted to a glazed over body of water, walk or play on it, fall through, and drown," he said. Parents should be especially alert to such dangers if they live near any body of water.

"Skaters and ice boaters should not go on ice too soon. The first ice of the season is deceptive because normally it is not uniform in thickness."

Justus listed some ice safety rules which every skater should follow:

Skate in supervised areas, preferably a shallow pond or lake in which the water is not more than waist deep.

Skate with a companion in case of accident, but avoid congregating on the ice in large groups.

Build fires on the bank, not on the ice.

Remember that ice is especially dangerous during thawing spells and towards the end of winter.

In case of an accident keep simple rescue equipment handy at skating areas--ropes, poles, ladders, or planks.

To rescue someone who has broken through the ice, this is the safest method:

If the victim is near the shore, extend a line or pole. When he has grasped it securely, pull him to safety.

Do not stand up on the ice when executing a rescue.

If the victim cannot be reached from the shore, lie flat on the ice and extend a ladder, plank, or similar device. When he has grasped it, pull him to safety.

If no rescue equipment is at hand, several persons can form a human chain by lying flat on the ice, holding on the ankles or skates of the person in front. They can work their way towards the victim, the foremost man grasps the victim's wrists, and the whole line wriggles back to safety.

"If you are alone and fall through the ice," Justus said, "don't try to climb out. Instead, extend both arms along the surface of the ice and kick vigorously. This will tend to raise the lower part of the body and help propel you onto solid ice. Then, roll to safety."

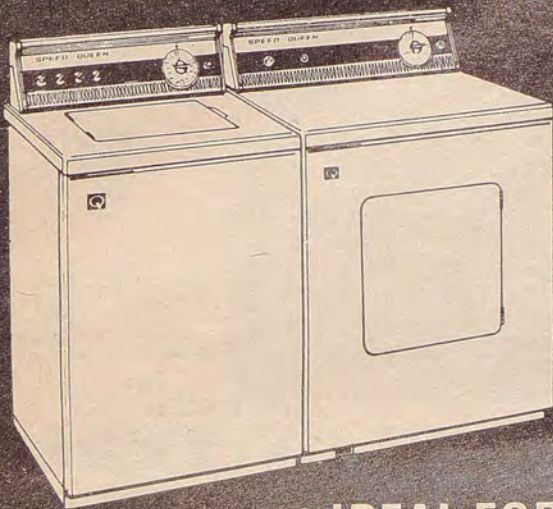

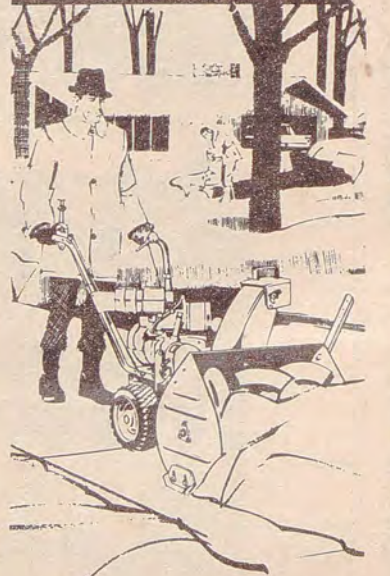

Powers Files Presidential Primary Bill

James E. Powers has filed a presidential preferential primary bill at Albany which would allow the voters of New York an opportunity to express their preference for candidates of their respective party.

"Politics should be the province of the people", says Powers,

"we in America rightfully take pride in our free elections, but the process of nomination has been given less attention; too often we allow party officials too much power in determining nominations.

"The most important political office a man can hold is the presidency of the United States. At present, the people of New York state - the Empire State - cannot participate in a presidential primary. A presidential primary in New York would not only influence our own delegates to the Presidential Convention, but would also give the nation a good indication of the popularity of a candidate in the second most populated state in the union".

The Primary would be held in June and would be advisory only. Effective date would be Jan. 1, 1972 and would not apply to the 1968 elections.

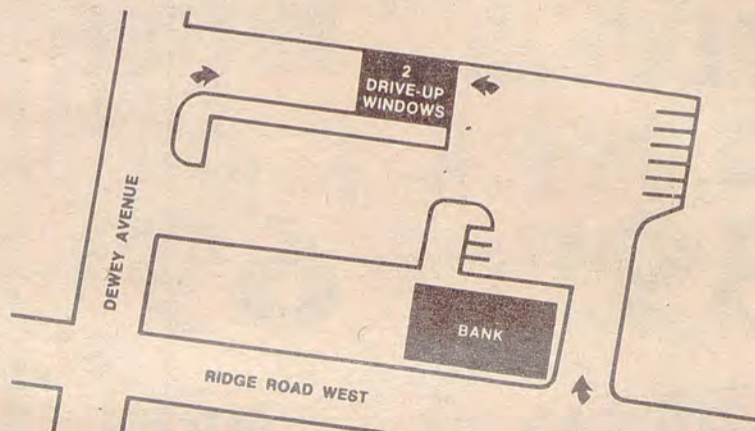

Holy Rosary Pastor Made Bishop; To Serve As Diocesan Auxiliary

In addition to serving as pastor of Holy Rosary Church, the former Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. McCafferty, now to be addressed as Bishop, is assuming duties as one of two auxiliary bishops of Rochester named last week by Pope Paul VI. He will also be one of two vicars general of the Roman Catholic diocese which covers a 12 county area.

Similarly honored was Rt. Rev. Msgr. Dennis W. Hickey who is well known in the Holy Rosary parish where he once served as an assistant. Bishop Hickey is now pastor of St. Theodore's Church in Gates.

As vicars general, the two auxiliaries will be second in command to Bishop Fulton J. Sheen. Their duties will embrace administrative and spiritual, rather than judicial matters.

Bishop McCafferty, 48, has been pastor at Holy Rosary for three years. He has also served for many years as the "bishop's judge" and has been on the Diocesan Tribunal, a branch of the Pastoral Office concerned with marriages and annulments. He is chairman of the Diocesan Ecumenical Commission and only a week ago was elected president of the Diocesan Priests Council.

High praise for both new bishops has come from many prominent Catholics as well as other denominations. Typical of the reaction to Bishop McCafferty's elevation were these two statements run in a local daily:

assistant pastor of Holy Rosary, recalled the rumor that his pastor might succeed the Most Rev. James E. Kearney upon his retirement in the fall of 1966.

"We always thought he would make a good bishop but when it happened, it still was a surprise. We are so happy around here we don't know what to say. He's great. He's a pastor of souls, is interested in people and very kind to work with and work for."

The Rev. Richard N. Hughes, executive director of the Rochester Area Council of Churches, Inc., spoke of Bishop McCafferty's ecumenism:

"During the last two years Bishop McCafferty has given unstintingly of his time and energy to the deepening of the fraternal relationship between the Roman Catholic Diocese of Rochester and the Rochester Area Council of Churches. His warmth and simplicity and sincerity of spirit have won him a place of deep affection and regard among the members of the Ecumenical Relations Department of our council".

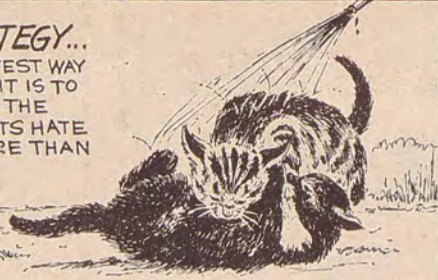

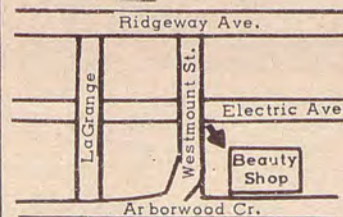

OUR HEALTH

CANCER AND HEREDITY
Recent studies at the University of Nebraska and the University of Michigan strongly indicate that some families have greater proneness for cancer than the national average.



Dr. Amberson

After five years of study, researchers from the schools presented the following picture of the "cancer-prone family" to physicians attending a recent American Medical Association convention.

● At least two out of five close relatives of the family currently have cancer.

● Cancer develops among members of the family earlier in life than the national average.

● Cancer can be found in all living generations of the family.

● Members of the family "often show apathy, fatalism, and resignation toward the cancer problem."

If further research proves the existence of cancer proneness in families, it will help immeasurably to alert doctors to the possibility of cancer so it can be detected early enough to effect a cure. In the long run, the discovery of the cause of cancer proneness may greatly aid researchers in the discovery of the cause of cancer itself.

WHY ARE SOME PEOPLE STILL "YOUNG" AT 70 WHILE OTHERS ARE "OLD" AT 35?

The aging process is not fully understood by medical men, and in all likelihood, some of the thoughts we now hold will change in the future. Obviously, from the moment an infant is

conceived, the aging process begins, and its life span will depend on how rapidly these anatomic changes will take place. There are so many factors affecting longevity, both mental and physical, that it is almost impossible to list them. You may inherit certain types of organs and body structure 'assuring' you a long life — but at the same time stress (and tension) may predispose you to early mental collapse. An imbalanced diet, either too much or too little of certain substances, may hasten the aging process. Chronic diseases in youth affect later life.

But there are so many variables that it is almost meaningless to attempt an answer. A frail body, not wracked by youthful serious illness or abuse may well outlast a strong body plagued by childhood disease or mistreated in adult life.

WHAT DISEASE IS IT THAT HAS THE INITIALS URI?

It is not a single disease but the initials for upper respiratory infections, a wide range of disorders including everything from a minor cold to pneumonia . . . in effect, any infectious disease attacking the upper respiratory tract. Many cases of URI can be self-treated. It is absurd to think that you will see your physician every time you have a cold or minor sore throat. For these uncomplicated illnesses, bed rest, liquids, and aspirin are all that is needed. If throat soreness is present, a relatively new oral solution called Chloraseptic has been found effective for temporary relief of pain of irritated pharyngeal tissue within seconds after spraying or gargling.

When the symptoms are not minor, however, i.e., when fever is present or the symptoms seem to linger on for more than a few days, you should see your physician.

TIPS from the LAB

The colder temperatures of the winter require us to drive our cars for longer periods with the windows closed.

This makes the winter season a critical one in terms of the possible leakage of carbon monoxide fumes from defective mufflers or tailpipes.

Carbon monoxide is an insidious, toxic gas. It is odorless and colorless. If the gas should seep into the passenger compartment when the windows are closed, you could be poisoned and never know it. Many persons have died this way.

It is, therefore, a good idea to have your automobile exhaust system checked to see that it is functioning properly.

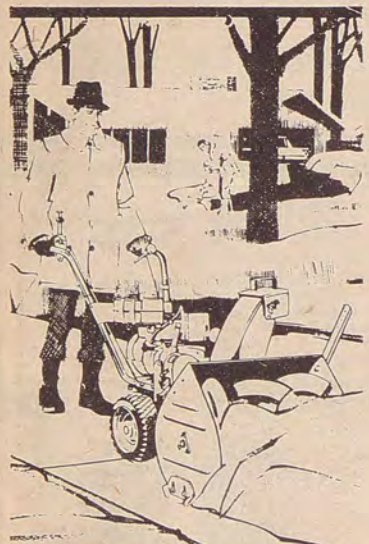
Security Reports Record Earnings

Price Advances Forecast For '68

Keep a close eye on the family pocketbook even though the family salary may be bigger this year, suggests Marcena Ver Ploeg, Extension home economist for Monroe County. The reason is - prices in almost every category of goods and services will be going up too. The price jumps won't be as startling as in the early 1940's or just after the Korean conflict, but just about everything is going to cost a bit more. Since 1958, the typical price increase has been about 1 1/2 per cent a year. But this year prices overall are going to be up approximately 3 per cent over 1966. Much of this increase in retail prices, Mrs. Ver Ploeg says, reflects higher wages. Here are some of the price hikes to expect: Higher prices for clothing because of rising costs of operation. Although retail prices for appliances have been going down in the last few years, increases in appliances, radios and

television sets are now expected. Cars - both new and used - will have higher price tags than 1967. As for food, grocery store prices will increase, especially on items that involve most "processing". Your "tab" for meals away from home will be larger too. Last year "eating out" prices were up nearly 5 per cent over 1966. About the same jump is expected for 1968. Most other prices will be within the overall 3 per cent increase but Medical costs may increase more sharply. So here's the size up: Perhaps more money in the family pocketbook, but you need to remember that each purchase will take a little more out of the family budget than last year. This might be the year to be serious about doing some financial planning that families often "talk about" but seldom sit down and do suggests Mrs. Ver Ploeg.

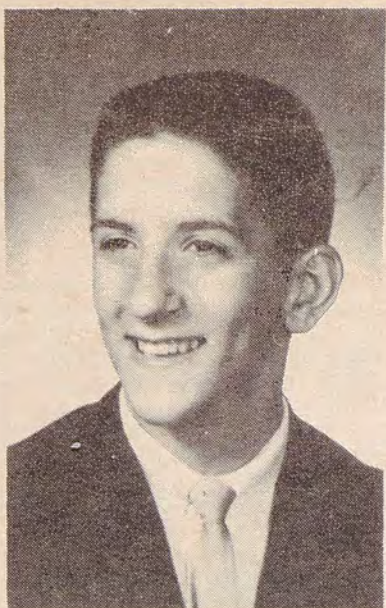

This laboratory recently received an unusual complaint.

A homeowner reported that he had been roller painting a room in his house, and the paint pan became so hot he was forced to drop it, the paint splattering all over the floor.

What caused the pan to become so hot?

Upon investigating, we learned that the homeowner had lined the pan with aluminum foil to keep it clean. We also learned that there are agents in latex paints that will react with aluminum foil, producing an intense heat.

The moral of the story, of course, is never to line roller painting pans with aluminum foil when you are using latex paints.

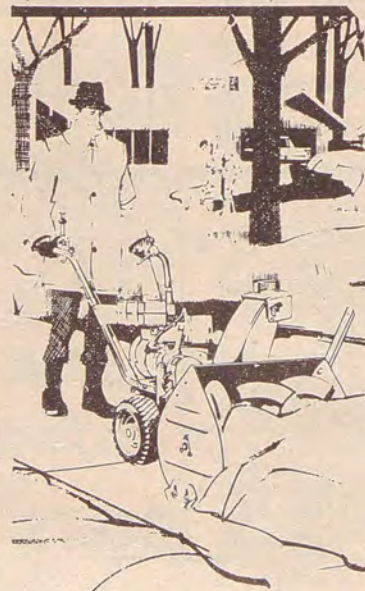

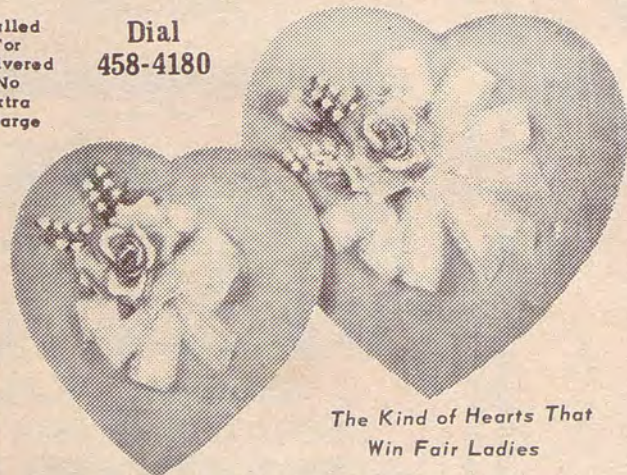

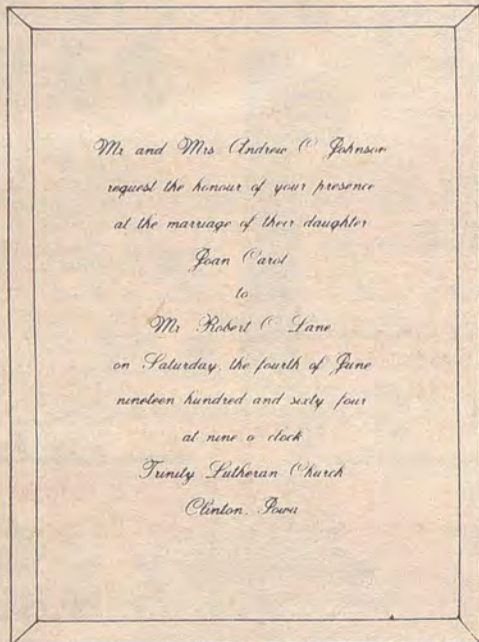

Boy Scouts Gain In Membership

On the eve of its 58th anniversary to be observed Feb. 7 to 13, the Boy Scouts of America announced it attained an all-time high in membership on Dec. 31 with an active membership of 6,058,508 boys and leaders, according to word received by M. Gene Cruse, scout executive of the Otetiana Council. There was a gain of 171,732 boys.

Since its founding 58 years ago, there has been a yearly gain in membership. Since 1910, there have been over 44 million boys and leaders identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

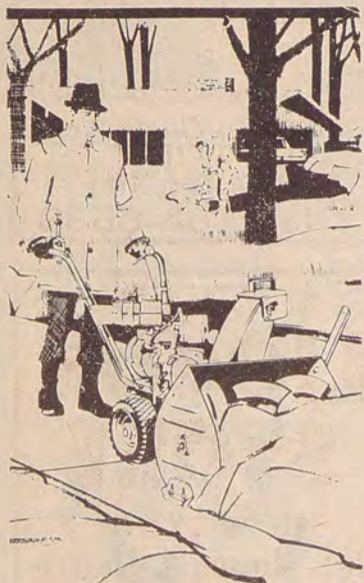

Social Security Changes To Bring More Benefits

The changes in the Social Security Law will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 percent in the social security checks of about 88,000 men, women, and children in the Rochester area.

The Social Security Administration's high speed electronic computers are figuring the increases for all 23,700,000 social security beneficiaries around the country and will finish the task in time to include the increases in the checks delivered early in March.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Residents of the Rochester area can expect the first increased check on Saturday, Mar. 2, one day earlier than the usual 3rd

of the month delivery of social security benefit checks. Under a recent arrangement with the Treasury Department and the Post Office, social security checks are delivered a day early instead of a day late when the 3rd of the month falls on a Sunday or holiday.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 percent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55.

The average benefit payable to a retired worker, about \$86, will be raised to \$98, an increase of \$12 a month. The average couple's benefit, now \$145, will go up to \$165; and the average aged widow's benefit will rise \$11, from the current average of \$75 to \$86.

The last increase in social security benefits amounted to 7 percent, and was effective January 1965.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving an increased check early in March will be someone under 65, many of them the children of working fathers who have died.

The value of social security survivors insurance is often overlooked. Social security is more than just a retirement system. But is also income protection for the family in case of the breadwinner's death or disability.

With the increased benefit payments provided under the new amendments to the law, the face value of social security survivors insurance protection is increased to about \$940 billion. This is just about equivalent to the value of all the private life insurance now in force.

Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security benefit rolls will go up from the currently payable maximum of \$309.20 a month to \$322.40. In the future, the maximum payable monthly to any one family can be as high as \$434.40.

Business As Usual At Lake & Ridge

Fire early Monday morning destroyed one business block at Lake and Ridge, but most of the stores at the corner suffered little damage and are doing business as usual.

The building destroyed, owned by Dr. Jack Oster, housed a tailor shop, Lee's Restaurant, the Oster dental offices and three apartments. Smoke and water damage was extensive, but most other stores on the Lake Ave. side were saved and expected to be open shortly. Grinnan's Market, immediately adjoining the Oster building, had only smoke damage, but was closed by order of the State Department of Agriculture pending a thorough check of all stock in the store. Frank Grinnan, the market owner, hopes that it will be a matter of only a few days.

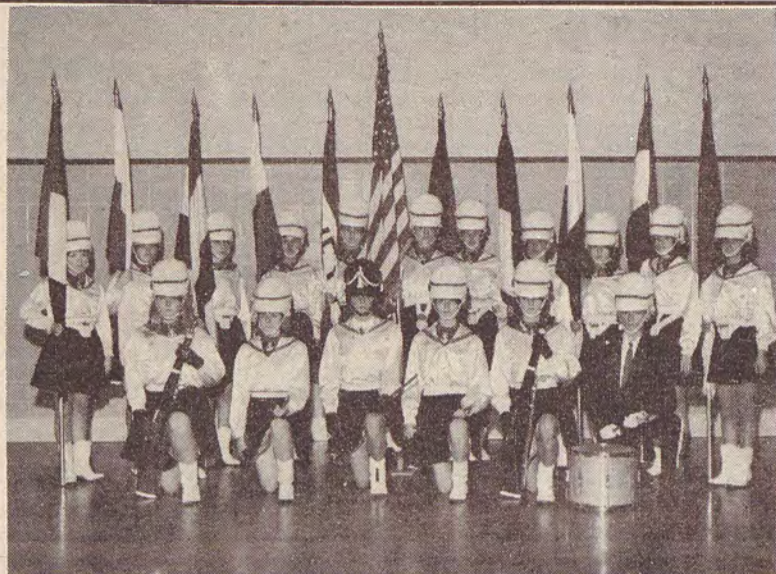
Parisian Liquor Store and Coster's Jewelry had some water damage, but expect to have little or no interruption in business. Stores around the corner on Pulman Ave. were apparently unharmed and stayed open, including the barber shop, the Wig Center, Johnson's Bakery and Pulman Ave. Hardware. (These are in the old Wagg's Corners building owned by Grace Wagg).

Much of the dentists' equipment fell from the second floor into the basement in the ruined building, but many of the Oster dental records were saved. Occupants of the apartments all escaped safely, but their belongings were a total loss.

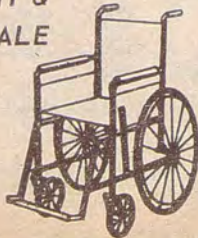

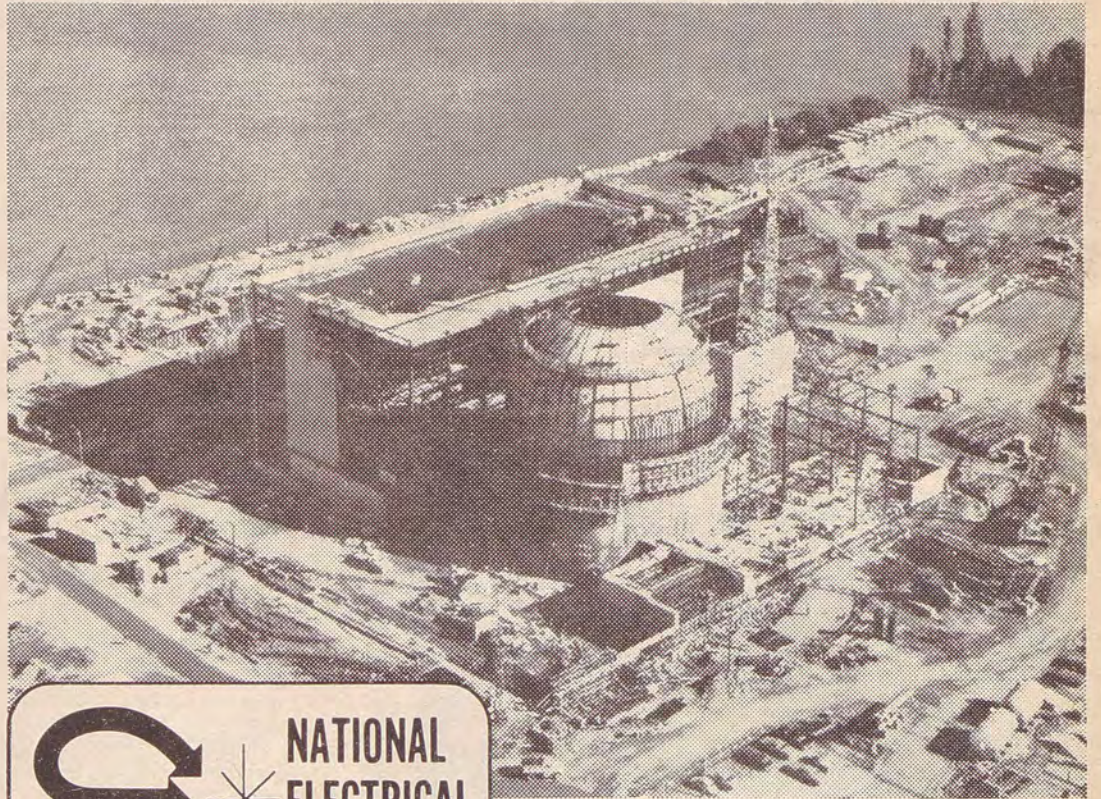

Railroad Agrees To Fill Potholes

May stated that Tomasovich promised to carry out temporary patching jobs on some of the worst areas, including Ridge Road West near Bonesteel Street, Dewey Avenue near Bennington Drive and Scio Street near Syracuse Street. Permanent repairs will be made, May added, during warmer weather this spring.

The Councilman said he was also contacting the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad to request repair work at its crossings on Ridge Road and Dewey Avenue, respectively. He added that Commissioner of Public Works Alfred S. Ancello told him the City would cooperate with the railroads in patching sections of streets near the railroad crossings on Ridge Rd. and Scio St. which are under the city's jurisdiction.

"Prompt action by the railroads and elimination of these hazardous conditions which have plagued motorists for months on Ridge Rd. W. and Dewey Ave. will make the railroads much more welcome visitors in Rochester," May concluded.



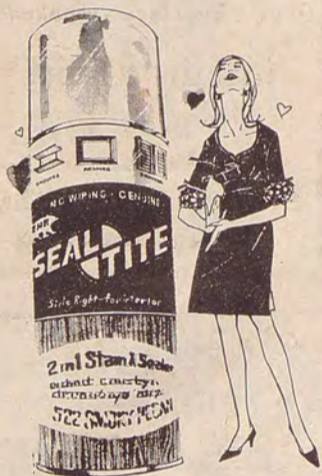

Kodak Accelerates Pollution Fight

A groundbreaking ceremony last Friday here on the west bank of the Genesee River signalled the start of a dramatic new step forward in the war on water pollution. A large turnout of city, county and state officials, Congressman Barber Conable, Jr., and other invited guests witnessed a dynamite blast that marked the start of construction on a \$6.5 million additional water treatment plant to further purify industrial waste water flowing from Kodak Park Works into the Genesee.

The site is directly opposite Kodak in the Hanford Landing Road area. It will be named "King's Landing Purification Plant" after the pioneer settlers who arrived at that same spot in March 1797 to lay out an ill-fated village under the leadership of Gideon King.

At the luncheon following the ground breaking, Dr. Louis K. Eilers, president of Kodak, said that his company was pleased to do its part in helping the State to achieve its "B" classification for the river.

"I think it is significant that we have representation to day from virtually all levels of government" stated Dr. Eilers. "This is fitting because the problem of bringing water pollution under effective control is a concern for local, state and federal government just as it is for business of all sizes".

Norman F. Beach, Kodak vice president and general manager of Kodak Park, announced that completion is scheduled by 1970. It will add to the purification facilities that have been operated by Kodak in the same general area since 1957, he said, but will have a much greater capacity (36 million gallons a day) and do a much more thorough job. Kodak presently discharges about 22 million gallons daily and does not expect to reach the 36 million figure until 1990.

Prominent in engineering details of the water treatment plant is a man well known in this section of town. He is William M. Steinfeldt, former supervisor of the 23rd

Wagg's Corners NOT Damaged By The Fires

A mistaken report in a daily newspaper that "Wagg's Corners" was seriously damaged in last week's fire at 1523 Lake Ave. has caused "a real head-ache", as one merchant put it, for the stores at Lake Ave. and Ridge Rd. (This week's fire, likewise has no connection with the "Wagg's Corners" stores.)

Last week's fire was confined to one building and the worst that other stores in the immediate area suffered was smoke in the stores and water in the basements. The building owned by Dr. Jack Oster and containing a restaurant, a tailor shop, dental offices and three apartments, was badly burned and may have to be razed.

However, none of the buildings comprising what was once known as "Wagg's Corners", were damaged by the fire and all stores but one have operated without interruption. Grinnan's Market, closed for a few hours pending routine inspection by the State Department of Agriculture, was quickly cleared and was doing business as usual the next day. Pullman Avenue Hardware, Johnson's Bakery, the Wig Center of Rochester and the Lake-Ridge Barber Shop had no effect whatever from the fire.

On Lake Ave., next to the burned out building, Coster's Jewelry and the Parisian Liquor Store were undamaged and have been doing business as usual without interruption.

Dr. Oster and his father, Dr. Charles Oster, have made arrangements for a temporary office to be opened soon at another Lake Ave. address. In the meantime, the Osters are using other dentists' offices which have been so generously put at their disposal for emergency work. They have a temporary headquarters in a vacant store at Lake and Ridge where their office staff is functioning. The telephone company has given them their same number.

Fire Destroys Five Businesses

Fire which wiped out five stores and the apartments above them at Lake and Ridgeway Ave. early Monday morning is under investigation by the Arson Squad, but up to yesterday there was no evidence to prove that it was other than coincidence that the fire had started on the same day of the week and at about the same hour as last week's fire a block away.

This week's fire completely destroyed Max the Florist, Parkview Realty, Jerry's TV, a small grocery store and a barber shop. It also damaged a chemical supply store in an adjoining building, but left a monument store intact.

Neighborhood Council To Cover 32 Blocks

Establishment of the Charles House Area Neighborhood Council has been announced. Its purpose is to provide a forum for "collective action beneficial to the neighborhood associations: ACTION, DRIVE, FRIEND, and UNITE which cover a 32 block area bounded by Lyell Ave. on the north, Maple St. on the south, Broad St. on the east and Child St. on the west. 6. To foster more effective co-operation between area organizations and the city government.
7. To increase the social - cultural activities among our association memberships.
8. To encourage our neighbors so as to effectively pursue those programs adopted.

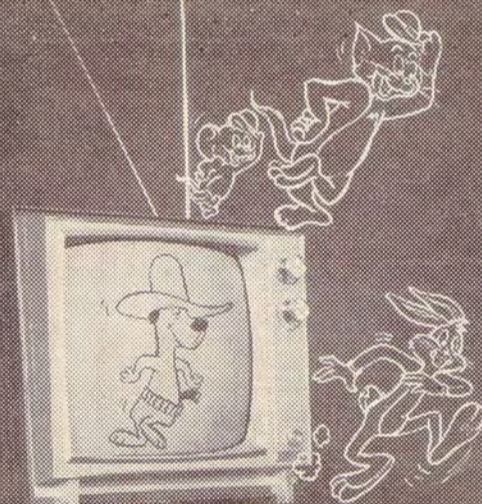

Cpl. Frank Capuano Dies In Vietnam

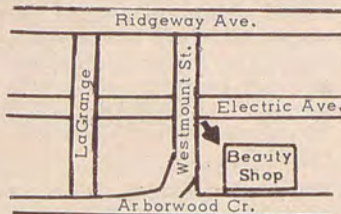

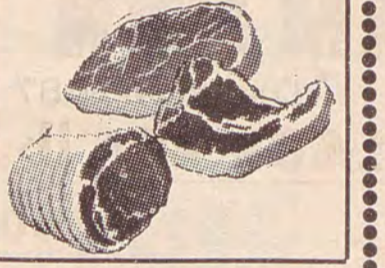

Social Security Notes

"If you are receiving a monthly social security benefit, the amount you receive will be increased by at least 13% beginning with the check due early in March," reported Joseph Tomaino, District Manager of the Social Security office located at 107 Clinton Ave., N.

"You do not have to do anything to get this increase," Mr. Tomaino stressed.

The minimum monthly benefit for a worker who retired at age 65 will be increased from \$44 to \$55 and maximum from \$135.90 to \$153.60.

The maximum payment to a family now on the rolls, \$368 a month, will be increased to \$395.60. He added that for many working

people, the 1967 amendments will increase future cash benefits even more. This will result from the increase in the amount of earnings that can be counted toward benefits in a year from \$6600 to \$7800, beginning in 1968. The resulting ultimate maximum benefit will be \$218, based on average monthly earnings of \$650.

These higher maximum retirement payments will be payable to workers who are now young and who consequently will be paying contributions on this higher amount of earnings over a considerable period of time before they retire. But even those in their middle years will benefit, he noted. For example, a man age 50 in 1968 who earns \$7800 a year until he is 65 will get a benefit of \$188.80 at age 65 -- 21.8% higher than he could get under the old law.

"The special payments made to people age 72 and older, who did not work long enough to qualify for regular benefits, are also increased under the amendments," Tomaino said. Single persons now receiving \$35 will receive \$40 per month and a couple now receiving \$52.50 will receive \$60 a month effective with the checks received early in March.

Mr. Tomaino again pointed out that these increases are automatic and people do not have to go to their social security district office to take any action.

Library Adds New Collection

"The Performing Arts" is the subject of a rotating collection of books from the Monroe County Library System now at Dewey Branch Library. According to the librarian Miss Burnett, the books will remain in the library for three months before going on to another library in the county system.

Books cover a wide variety of subjects from ballet and opera to theatre and jazz. Included are such titles as "History of the Circus in America", by Chindahl; "The Book of the Dance", by De Mille; "Esquire's World of Jazz"; "The Life and Death of Tin Pan Alley", by Ewen; "Theatre U.S.A. 1668-1957", by Hewitt; "Fiddler on the Roof", by Stein, and "The Wonderful Era of the Great Dance Bands".

TIPS from the LAB

By Dr. Herbert R. Ulrich, Director Monroe County Health Department Laboratories

A number of housewives have complained that bleaches have attacked shirts, sheets and other linens to the point where the materials can be easily pulled apart.

It was discovered that these housewives were all using bleaches to their washing machines after they had put clothing into the machines. When this is done, the bleaches localize and concentrated amounts of it may attack the clothing fibers.

Bleach should be added to the washing machine water before any clothing is placed into it. This way the bleach will become sufficiently diluted so that there will be no danger of fiber attack.

Your Assemblyman Reports

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Some time shortly -- probably next week -- the Chinese puzzle of Medicaid will reach the floor of the Assembly for solution. As you know, in the face of reductions in federal aid for the program, Republicans in both houses of the Legislature have been pressing for cutbacks at the state level for some time. In addition the Governor has proposed reductions in the program. Democrats in the Legislature, on the other hand, have been unenthusiastic about making any new economies in the medical assistance program. Any hope for reduction in the tax program before the Legislature is certainly related to the passage of these cutbacks.

Much has been written and said about the cutbacks which we have recommended, but, to summarize them briefly, they would be realized through lowering the income eligibility figure, limiting benefits to people between the ages of 21 and 65 except in cases of catastrophic illness and changing the rules relating to how much in personal savings a recipient may have.

Between the cuts proposed by Governor Rockefeller and the plan which the Republican lawmakers are advancing, we can trim an estimated 370 million dollars from the cost of Medicaid. That's a significant savings. And these cuts can be made without seriously damaging the effectiveness of our medical assistance program for those who really need it.

No one wants Medicaid to turn into a political issue. But the battle lines have been drawn. The time has come, it seems to me, for responsibility. We must meet our obligation to our citizens who need help with their doctor bills, of course. You and I could need such help at any time. But we must keep the costs of giving this help in line. SAFETY Patrols To Be Honored

WASHINGTON - March 5, Rep. Barber B. Conable, Jr. today introduced a resolution in Congress providing that a National School Safety Patrol Week be proclaimed for the second week in May. The Congressman said special safety patrol activities including a national parade in Washington, are customarily held during that period.

In offering his resolution, Congressman Conable pointed out that more than 900,000 pupils in 40,000 schools annually serve as patrol members in 15,000 communities in all fifty states. He noted that two of his own children have served as school patrol members.

"Auto traffic deaths exceeded 53,000 last year", Congressman Conable said. "Since the school patrol program was instituted in 1922, the traffic death rate of school children has dropped nearly 50 per cent, while the death rate in all other age groups has doubled. The school patrol program has achieved commendable results and I think the designation of the special week would be an appropriate recognition of the efforts of the millions of students who participate and of the organizations which direct and support the program."

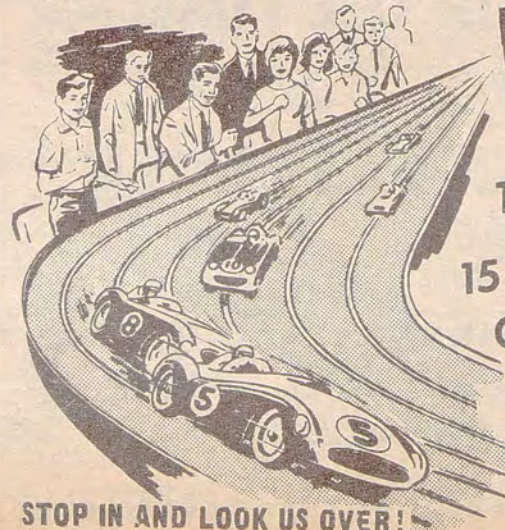

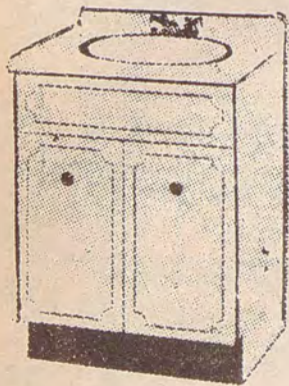

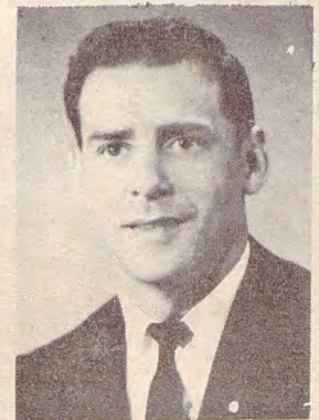

POWERS TO BACK GOVERNOR'S PROGRAM TO REBUILD SLUMS

The Governor's program to initiate a state authority which will induce private capital and initiative in clearing our urban blight is essential. As a member of the Joint Legislative Committee on State Commerce and Industry, I have listened to testimony from representatives of industry, commerce and real estate that the amount of red tape and delay makes private capital investment difficult at best in our urban core centers.

It has been apparent over the past few years that the government at any and all levels cannot solve the problems of our cities alone. This is true not only in terms of urban redevelopment, but our welfare programs as well.

The bills in their final form are not yet in print, but I attended the information hearing with the Governor and had an opportunity not only to hear his presentation, but I found his answers to my specific questions more than satisfactory. Although the program is complex, the basic theory is this:

1. The complex zoning and code restrictions which delay major developments will be eliminated.
2. The Public Urban Development Corporation can initiate an industrial, commercial, or housing complex and later lease to tenants or private sponsors may work jointly from the beginning.
3. A related corporation titled Corporation for Urban Development and Research will be under the auspices of private sponsors only. This corporation will aid the small homeowner in rehabilitating his property. I have testified at various hearings that improvements in our dilapidated housing not only eliminate a health hazard, but the satisfaction an individual obtains by doing his own work with technical assistance is a great inducement to maintain the property following the repairs.
4. The Urban Development Guarantee Fund will make loans possible to "high risk individuals". Banks which are reluctant to make home mortgage loans to individual because of a low down payment or

lack of job security will now be guaranteed their investment.

Moreover, merchants in blighted areas of the city where potential for damage is high will now be able to obtain loans at reasonable interest rates.

Conservatives Fight Council Pay Raise

James E. Powers

POWERS SUPPORTS LAW ENFORCEMENT

Senator James E. Powers yesterday entered Senate debate to support the policeman's right to be protected while making an arrest.

We must all realize that a policeman who believes that a crime has been committed must have the right to arrest a suspect and we cannot tolerate people physically accosting a policeman who is trying to do his duty, simply on the grounds that they are innocent of the alleged crime. Under our concept of law all men are innocent until proven guilty. However, the guilt or innocence is determined in the court room, and not on the streets. A policeman is obliged legally and morally to arrest those people who he believes have committed a crime. No one has the right to attack an officer for doing his duty. Anyone who feels he was falsely arrested has legal redress through our courts.

Other provisions of the bill which passed the Senate and Assembly allow a policeman to shoot to kill a fleeing person if the policeman "reasonably believes" the person has committed a felony and was armed with a firearm or deadly weapon. Moreover, a homeowner or apartment dweller may use deadly physical force against an intruder if he reasonably believes such force necessary to prevent the burglary or intrusion.

The rise in the crime rate and the fact that many of our citizens fear that they cannot walk the streets unmolested is one of the greatest problems facing our state. When the Governor signs this bill we will have taken a step in the right direction. Much more needs to be done. The causes of crime must be erased, education emphasized, drug addiction reduced, rehabilitation centers expanded. But while we attack the root causes, we must have the power to handle lawlessness.

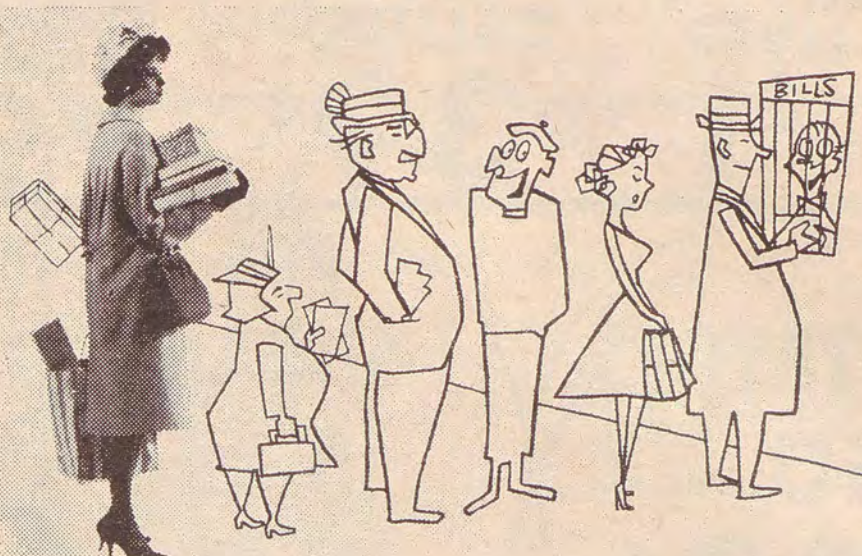
