School 41 Council Seeks Equipment For Playground, Other Improvements

The newly formed No. 41 School Cooperative Community Council has requested installation of play equipment for its primary grades as one of its first steps in improving conditions at the school. It has also criticized lunchroom facilities as "crowded and inadequate" and is advocating smaller class sizes.

Mrs. Joyce Lynch, as an independent parent interested in recreation for the No. 41 area, arranged a meeting with city officials to discuss the play equipment and although no promises were made, she was assured of an answer before the end of the school year. Mrs. Lynch, Mrs. Kay Arnold, No. 41 PTA president and Mrs. Helen Pierce, chairman of the No. 41 Council, met with Rev. Eugene Tennis, city community relations director and representatives of the city recreation department and the planning commission.

The No. 41 Council plan is to "keep more open lines of communication between the school and the community". Addressed to all No. 41 School community citizens, the plan of attack is outlined as follows:

"Obviously, the Council hopes

that progress can be made - but it's really up to you. Not if our neighbors, just west of our State St. offices, can help it.


That's why they call their neighborhood organization WEDGE, after the tool used to raise things. And WEDGE has found out that when it comes to raising and moving people, photography is a pretty useful tool to work with.

Last year, WEDGE came to Kodak with the problem of how to raise people's interest in their neighborhood. They thought the camera seemed like a natural solution, and Kodak turnished WEDGE youths with film, cameras, and some technical assistance (through a special national program we participate in along with other photographic manufacturers). Training was volunteered by Kodak Park's Tim Mathers and Dan Houlihan, and then the kids really went to work.

After three months of shooting, they selected from hundreds of slides the 120 which best told the story of WEDGE in a 28-minute synchronized slide show. Housing and zoning problems. The show is earning not only neighborhood, but city-wide interest in WEDGE as a community organization.


Progress by degrees.

Tips on applying for Social Security retirement benefits:

Are you getting ready to retire? Joseph Tomaino, social security manager in Rochester, has some tips that may help save you time and trouble when you apply for your social security benefits.

A telephone call to the social security office is a good first step. The office can answer your questions and tell you how to apply and when to do it.

When you apply bring your social security card or a record of your social security number, proof of your age, and your last year's income tax withholding statement. (If you are self-employed, bring a copy of last year's income tax return and evidence of payment of the self-employment tax.)

If your wife also is applying for benefits, she should bring evidence of her age and her social security

It's generally a good idea to apply about 3 months before you retire. Don't delay because you don't have any of the required documents or information. The people in the social security office will be glad to help you get the necessary information.

If you are housebound and unable to come to the office, arrange-ments can be made for taking your application by mail or if necessary, someone can come to your home. Just let the social security office know.



The Editor's Viewpoint

The Post-Courier, as a weekly newspaper, is often handicapped in coverage of news by virtue of its early deadline. This is especially true of matters appearing before the City Council affecting this area. City Council meets on Tuesday evenings and by that time a Wednesday newspaper has to be in the postoffice to meet its date line.

This week is a case in point. Both the Emerson St. landfill closing and the Glenwood Apartments project were on the City Council agenda for last night (Tuesday). This probably is of consequence only to the staff of the Post-Courier, but we pride ourselves on being abreast of all civic matters with a local background.

The fact that people living near the Emerson dump serenaded Councilman Andrew Celli on Saturday in front of his home in Seneca Parkway, is not new. But it will have made headlines by this time if it had any influence on the councilman's vote in breaking the 4 to 4 political deadlock on the Western New York Waste System's contract with the city for refuse disposal.

(If Councilman Celli or any of his Democratic colleagues did not see fit to go along with the Republicans, it is our fervent hope that some other compromise be worked out speedily in order to give relief to a long-suffering public.)


City To Discuss Junk Car Plan

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Sewer Flooding Relief Planned For This Area

A master plan under consideration by the Monroe County Pure Waters Agency is a potential source of great relief for flood conditions which plague this area of the city during heavy rainstorms, says County Legistlator John Romano.

The sewer system in this area does not have the needed peak load capacity at present, but the county is about to adopt a plan, involving some \$20 million in its first phase, which Romano says would provide a network of sewers gathering waste water from small feeder sewers plus holding basins which would take the overflow from the present sewage system thus avoiding street flooding and back-up into cellars.

The Pure Waters Agency, created in 1957, was given the task of drafting a master plan for pollution abatement and the local sewer relief would be one of its byproducts.

The county has been divided into four regional systems. The so-called Northwest Quadrant would affect the old Tenth Ward, particularly Dewey and Lake Avenues and adjoining streets.

It is expected that federal funding to the extent of \$12 million will be possible and state money is also being sought, with the balance to be assumed by the county.

Celli Candidate Stop Bi For Judgeship ? At Eme

Northwest District Councilman Andrew G, Celli is a possible candidate for City Court Judge this fall. His name is one of five submitted by the Democrats to the Bar Association which is now polling its membership to determine qualified judicial candidates.

Celli is serving his first term on the City Council, and if elected a judge would have to resign his council seat. His successor would be picked by the council, but would have to be a Democrat.

Stop Bull-dozing At Emerson Dump

As of Monday, the city dump in Emerson St, had reverted to its old status. The dump trucks were depositing their collections in big mounds and there was no bulldozing and no covering going on. The reason: The contractor who

had been doing the bull-dozing at \$80,000 per month was disqualified.

In the meantime the districtattorney's office was probing possible involvement of crime syndicates and suspected arson.

The property owners met last week with officials of the constrution firm which will be building the apartments as well as County Legislator John Romano and Councilman Andrew G. Celli, and all agreed that the new plan met with their approval.

A total of 124 one-story units is now proposed, all for senior citizens. Each will have a bedroom, living room and kitchenette.

The controversial 40 low-cost housing units to which the neighborhood objected are no longer a part of the plan, according to Mario Pirrelli who is the attorney for Stannco Developers (successor to Joyce Construction Co.).Stannco has title to the parcel of land on which the apartments are to be built.

The project backs up to the old subway bed, but is to be at some distance from it. (The expectation is that the subway will be widened some day and used as an expressway from the Northwest area of Rochester to the center of town.)

The apartment grounds will be well shrubbed, it is promised, and as many as possible of existing trees on the land will be kept for natural beauty as well as serving as a sound screen when and if the expressway goes through.


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Historic Newspapers Collection Heart-Help Diet Is Prescribed

Summertime, when the livin' is easy, should be the best time to begin new eating habits that may reduce the risk of heart attack, suggests your Genesee Valley Heart Association. Here are other suggestions from the association:

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The abundance of fresh fruits and vegetables and the tendency to eat more salads in place of heavier foods, make it easier to begin such a diet now for the whole family. If the homemaker can extend it to a year-around habit it can help adult hearts and provide protection for children in later years.

The typical American diet, high in saturated fat and cholesterol, contributes to hardening of the arteries, an important factor in heart attack and stroke. Factors implicated in artery disease must be present over long periods of time before this condition becomes evident. There often are no symptoms. Then, suddenly, a heart at-tack may occur. So, the earlier a heart-helping diet is adopted the better.

To help reduce the risk of heart attack, your Genesee Valley Heart Association recommends a diet that uses less saturated fats and more polyunsaturated fats; more meals of fish and poultry and less beef, pork and ham; margarine instead of butter and skimmed milk in place of whole milk.

Other diet tips include serving lean cuts of meat, trimming off the fat, and limiting egg yolks to three a week. When cooking, use vegetable oils instead of butter and lard.

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You don't have to say "no" to outdoor barbecues and picnics when you begin your new diet, says your Genesee Valley Heart Association.

Some suggestions for outdoor eating include grilled chicken basted with a polyunsaturated oil, and hamburgers made from lean ground beef. At corn roasts, substitute margarine for butter. Avoid or use sparingly such items as spare ribs, frankfurters and sausage which are high in fats.

When dessert time rolls around, think in terms of sherbet or ices instead of ice cream, This is the season for fresh watermelon and cantaloupe. Though diet is an important

element in raising the risk of heart attack, it is only of the factors identified by scientists. The others are cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, overweight, lack of regular exercise and diabetes.

The association has printed materials that can guide you in taking preventive measures against these risk factors, Among diet publications is a booklet on recipes that can serve the homemaker the year around, Call 232-2820 or write to the Genesee Valley Heart Association, 217A Alexander St., Rochester, N.Y. 14607 for more information.

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
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
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
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COUNCILMAN WOOD HEADS GOODELL CAMPAIGN HERE

For several years now our laboratory has been concerned about the hazard of lead poisoning involved in the use of certain types of imported ceramic dishware, mostly from Mexico and the Far East.

We discovered that this dishware contains lead, and that acidic foods and beverages may leach out the lead. To avoid this risk, such dishware should not be used for foods.

More recently we learned of another side to this hazard.

We found that there is lead in ceramic glazings sold for use in arts and crafts. Items made from these glazings should also not be used for foods,

I have alerted the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and have suggested that manufacturers of glazings containing lead be required to place a warning label on their products.

Bilingual Program For City Schools

The City School District's highly successful bilingual education program for Spanish speaking students will be under the direct supervison of an assistant city school superintendent when school opens next month according to City Board of Education Vice-President Emilio Serrano.

Serrano said the program supervisor, Miss Carmen Delgado, will report directly to Dr. George Rentsch, assistant superintendent for instruction.

"This will put our bilingual education program on an equal footing with science, mathematics, and other major school programs", Serrano said.

"The program is at least as important as science and mathematics, because without it many of our Spanish speaking children would never be able to read and would probably drop out of school at an early age," Serrano said,

Serrano said Miss Delgado will also work closely with Miss Helen Gerhardt, Supervising Director of Elementary Education, on elementary school matters, and with Mr. Harvey R. Granite, Supervising Director of Instruction, on secondary problems.

"Adelante", was experimental in the City School District last year. The program was in the district's Special Education Department last year.

"The first year evaluation of the program was excellent," Serrano said, "and for the coming year we've doubled the budget from \$200,000 to \$400,000."

"The Board of Education is always encouraged by - and receptive to enlarging - a program that shows it can help children with their basic learning skills,"

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
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

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Historic Newspapers Collection Pure Waters Agency Announces Northwest Quadrant Plans

The Monroe County Pure Waters Agency is making plans for four different areas. This part of the county is designated as the Northwest Quadrant,

The population of the northwest corner of Monroe County, currently 120,000, is expected to nearly triple by 2020. This rapid growth will strain the already overloaded sewage collection and treatment plants.

As a result, the Pure Waters Master Plan calls for a modern 15 million gallons a day waste treatment plant to replace as quickly as possible eight existing plants, Interceptor sewers will radiate to the east, west and south of the plant to carry sewage to the treatment plant.

To avoid dumping treated water into the Rochester Embayment, it will be discharged through an outfall tunnel extending 4,660 feel out into Lake Ontario, Automatic control and monitoring systems will assure the efficiency of the primary and secondary treatment and the removal of 80 percent of the phosphates present. The initial project, scheduled for completion in 1971, includes construction of the plant, the outfall, and an interceptor running east and west ac-ross the Town of Greece,

Another phase of the project the Western Extension, will extend the interceptor from the plant west to the Town of Hamlin and south to the Village of Brockport, An interceptor south through the Town of Greece is planned, Construction of an interceptor from the plant to the Village of Spencerport will be completed later in the seventies.

Genesee-Irondequoit Bay The Genesee-Irondequoit Bay drainage basin is divided into two separate sections, reflecting the different problems that exist within the district. Both areas, however, will be served by the Durand-Eastman treatment plant, which is being expanded.

The population of the suburban area is growing rapidly and is currently served by more than a dozen small treatment plants. Fourteen plants currently discharge into Irondequoit Creek or

its tributaries or into the bay itself.

According to census studies, the City of Rochester will show virtually no population growth in the coming decades. Its sewers which carry both the sewage and runoff from the streets and lawns, result in an overflow of sewage into Irondequoit Bay and the Genesee River, This causes serious pollution of these bodies of water and affects the swimming at our beaches.

Durand-Eastman Plant The City is undertaking an extensive modernization and expansion of its Durand-Eastman sewage treatment plant. The project will cost \$48.7 million and is scheduled to be completed in 1971. It includes the expansion of the plant's capacity from 90 million gallons to 100 million gallons daily, adding se-condary treatment facilities to remove 90 percent of the suspended solids in the sewage and quipment to remove 80 percent of the phosphates. A 3-1/2 mile outfall, also under construction at the present time, will discharge treated waste-water into Lake Ontario beyond the outer limit of the Rochester Embayment,

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Historic Newspapers Collection Schools Opening On September 9

City public schools will reopen Wednesday, September 9, Assis-tant Superintendent for Administration Eugene F. Conant announced this week.

Conant said all city public schools will be open September 9, 10, 11 for half day sessions only. Regular full day instruction will begin Monday, September 14, he said.

Conant asked that kindergarten children be accompanied by a parent Wednesday when school opens .. He said only those kindergarten children scheduled to attend morning sessions should report for school Thursday, and only those scheduled for afternoon sessions should report Friday.

Conant said the following regulations apply to children who are new to this school district:

--Children entering kindergarten must be five years old on or before December 1, 1970.

-A kindergarten or elementary school child new to this district who hasn't pre-registered should register at the school he will attend on Thursday, September 3 or Friday, September 4. If the child is unable to register on these days he may register on Wednesday, September 9, between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m.

-- A student entering secondary school for the first time should register as soon as possible at the school he will attend. The student should register no later than Friday, September 4.

--Birth certificates and health information are required for all students registering for the first time. Health information should include proof of immunization for: Diptheria, Whooping Cough, Teta-nus, Smallpox, Polio, Measles, Rubella (german measles).

--A student entering ninth grade from a private or parochial school should bring the diploma from his

former school when he registers. Parents who have questions about what school their child will attend or any other question concerning the opening of school should call the City School District at 325-4560 and ask for the Division of Administration or the Community Affairs Office.

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



Some private insurance companies have been sending misleading advertisements to Medicare beneficiaries in the Rochester area, according to Joseph Tomaino, Social Security District Manager, in an effort to sell them health insurance to supplement their Medicare protection.

Tomaino said that the promotional literature distributed by these companies has been deliberately designed to give the reader the impression that the company is in some way connected with the Social Security Administration, or that it has access to the Federal agency's records.

One company used a window envelope that was almost identical to the envelopes social security uses to send out benefit checks, Tomaino remarked, He went on to say that only careful reading of the fine print in the advertisement revealed the statement that the company was "not an agency of the State or Federal government."

Tomaino stressed that the Social Security Administration does not endorse any privately-sponsored insurance plan designed to "supplement" Medicare benefits. He also emphasized that private insurance companies do not have access to social security records,

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which are confidential by law. Tomaino indicated that most private insurance programs supplementing Medicare offer valuable additional protection and advertise honestly in their sales literature. "However," Tomaino said, "a few companies have engaged in practices which clearly are intended to mislead Medicare beneficiaries,"

Tomaino advised persons who are confused by material they get in the mail offering additional Medicare protection to get in touch with their nearest social security office, or their State Insurance Commission for further information.

Please, No Bottleneck

The "Dutchtown" Expressway which has long since wiped out a way of life for 200 or more families in our area, and split the west side of town in two, now poses new threats to what is left of the neighborhood between Jay Street and West Avenue.

Imagine you're in a foreign country, you don't speak the language, your car breaks down and you have to wait 24 hours to get a needed part,


What a break it would be to run into friendly people who would allow you to put up your tent in their back yard and stay overnight. Well that's exactly what happen-

\$206,000 To Be Spent In Area

District councilmen Andrew Celli and Urban Kress have announced that the 1970-71 Urban Beautification program includes four projects in the Northwest part of the city which have a total cost of \$206,000. These projects represent about 37% of a total city wide program costing about \$556,700. City Planning Commissioner Paul E. Haney (who is also Democratic leader of the Ninth Ward) joined with the councilmen in the announcement and pointed out that the Federal goverment will pay an estimated \$243,802 of the total cost or about 44%

The largest single project in the program is phase two of the redevelopment of Edgerton Park. Edgerton Park is the largest recreational complex in the city serving all age groups. In Edgerton Park, \$125,000 will be spent to improve the track, improve the soccor/football field, relocate utilities, and for other miscellaneous improvements, An additional \$35,000 will be spent for decora-tive paving and other landscape

site work. The recreation area ajoining school 40 on LaGrange Ave. will receive \$30,000 of improvements. These will include two new tennis courts costing \$22,000 and two basketball backstops and an ap-

paratus area costing \$8,000. Other projects in the area include \$6,000 of work in the Rose Garden area of Maplewood Park. It will consist of removing old tree stumps, improving the road barricade, and other landscape work. The objective is to develop a safe area for winter sledding and coasting. An additional \$10,000 is being spent on the second phase of the beautification of the Seneca Parkway mall.

In addition to the specific work being done in the area, the area will also participate in the planting of an estimated 3,000 trees along city streets. This will cost an estimated \$75,000.




