



So the years went by. Our Junior picnic at Durand Eastman was a humdinger, where some played baseball while others took

surprise when I saw James Gallo, former East High socialist, as a great reformer in Russia, making speeches on a corner in Petrograd for the next political campaign in which Manuel Weisbuch was running for the presidency of Russia.

Several views of large reconstructed buildings were shown—a Belgian orphan asylum of which Clara Albrecht, Majorie Barker, Elizabeth Coulton, and Loraine Bradley were the chief directors. Rev. Eversley

They were also being remarkably entertained by a modern Doug Fairbanks and Charles Chaplin, otherwise known as Edward Schroedel and Marland Gale, who did all sorts of tricks with their feet and smiles.

West Point graduates were viewed, lined up for inspection by Colonel F. Alton Frasch, who was accompanied by Captain Russell W. Servis and Lieutenant Elmer Frenz.

The next on the program was an animated cartoon by our old class artist, Joseph Jablonski, the Bud Fisher of to-day, who had become famous through the popularity of his two favorite characters, the C. brothers.
