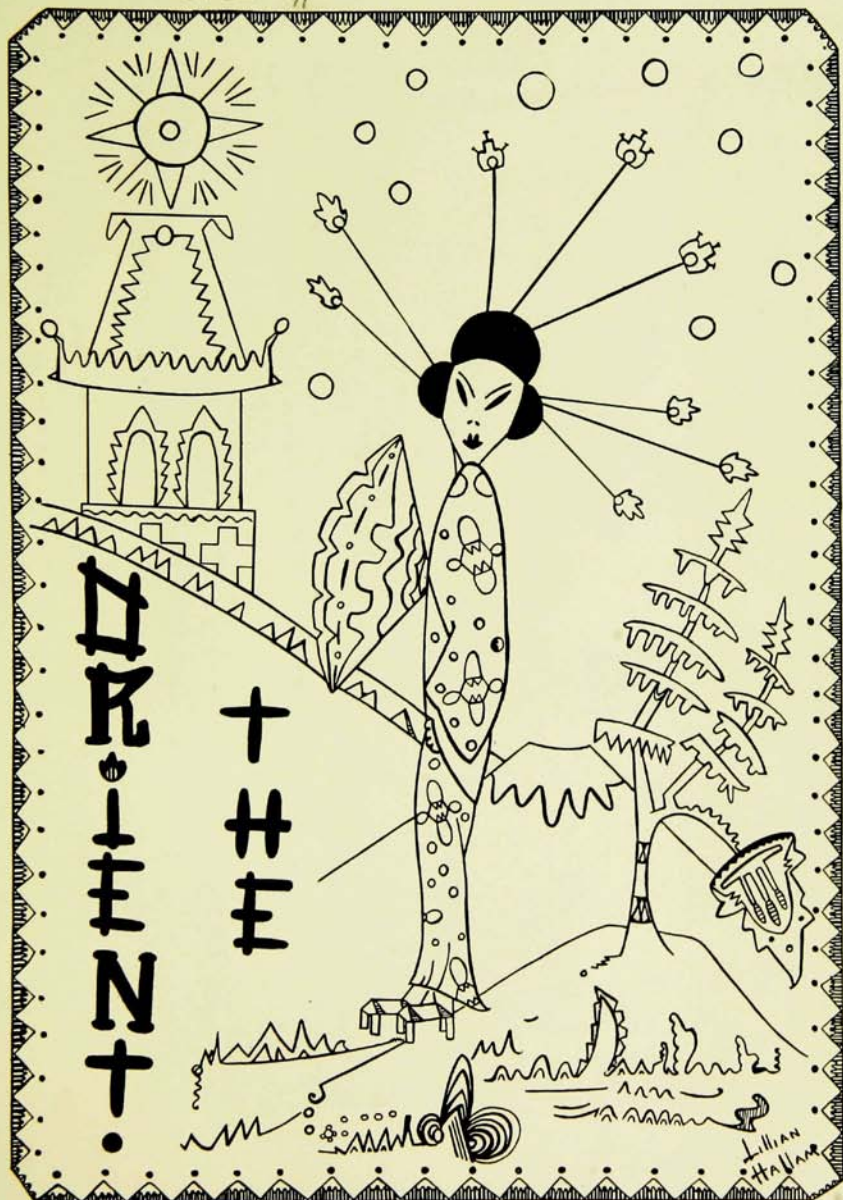

From its apex the wonder to spy.

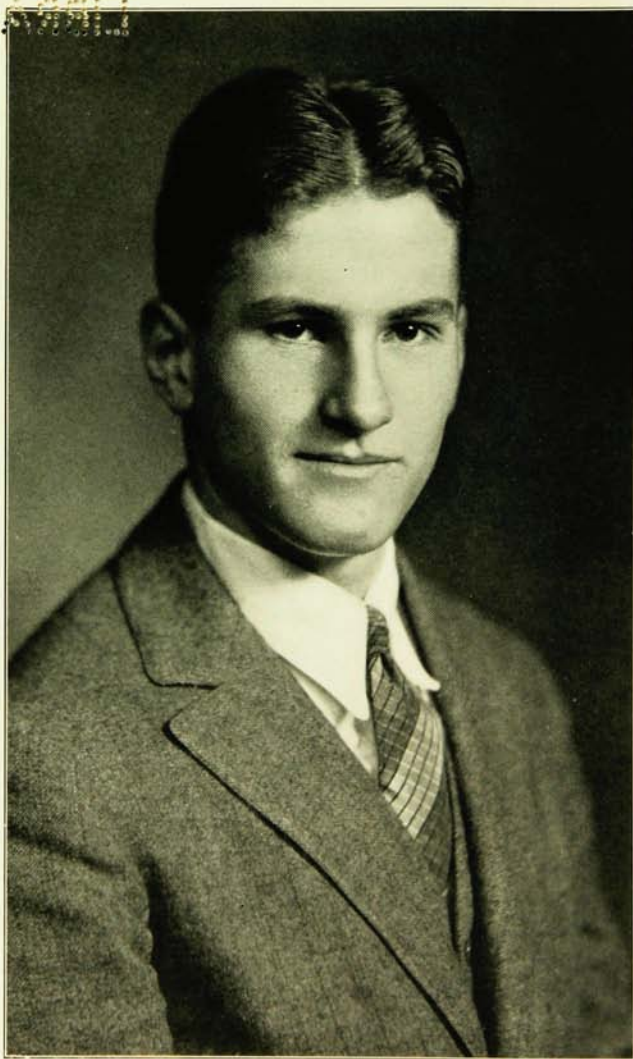
Long was the way and arduous,
