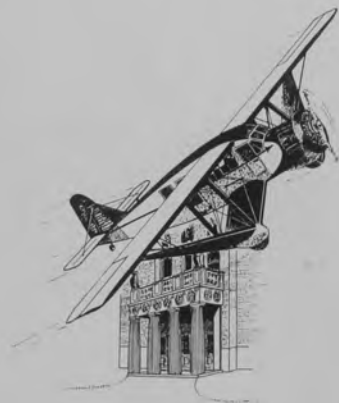


FOREWORD

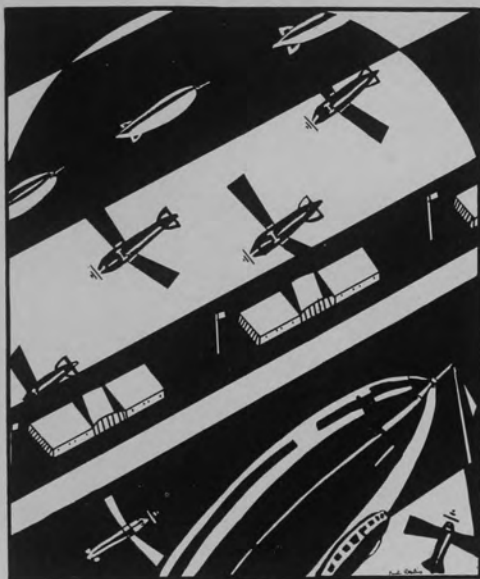

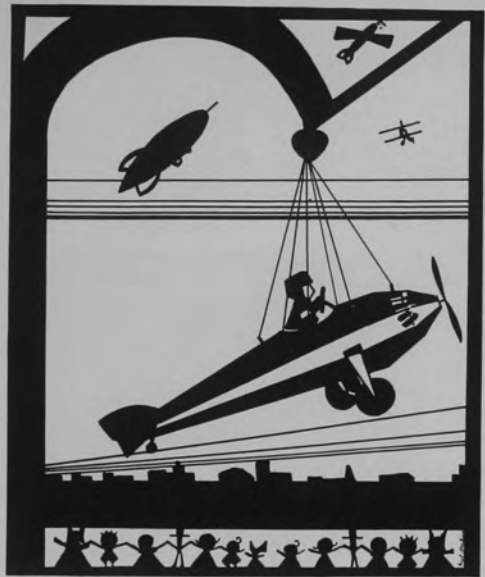
