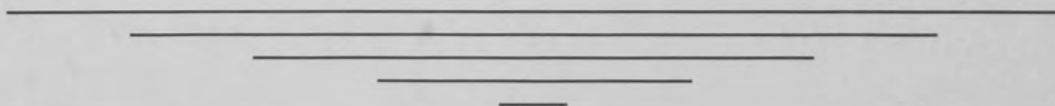

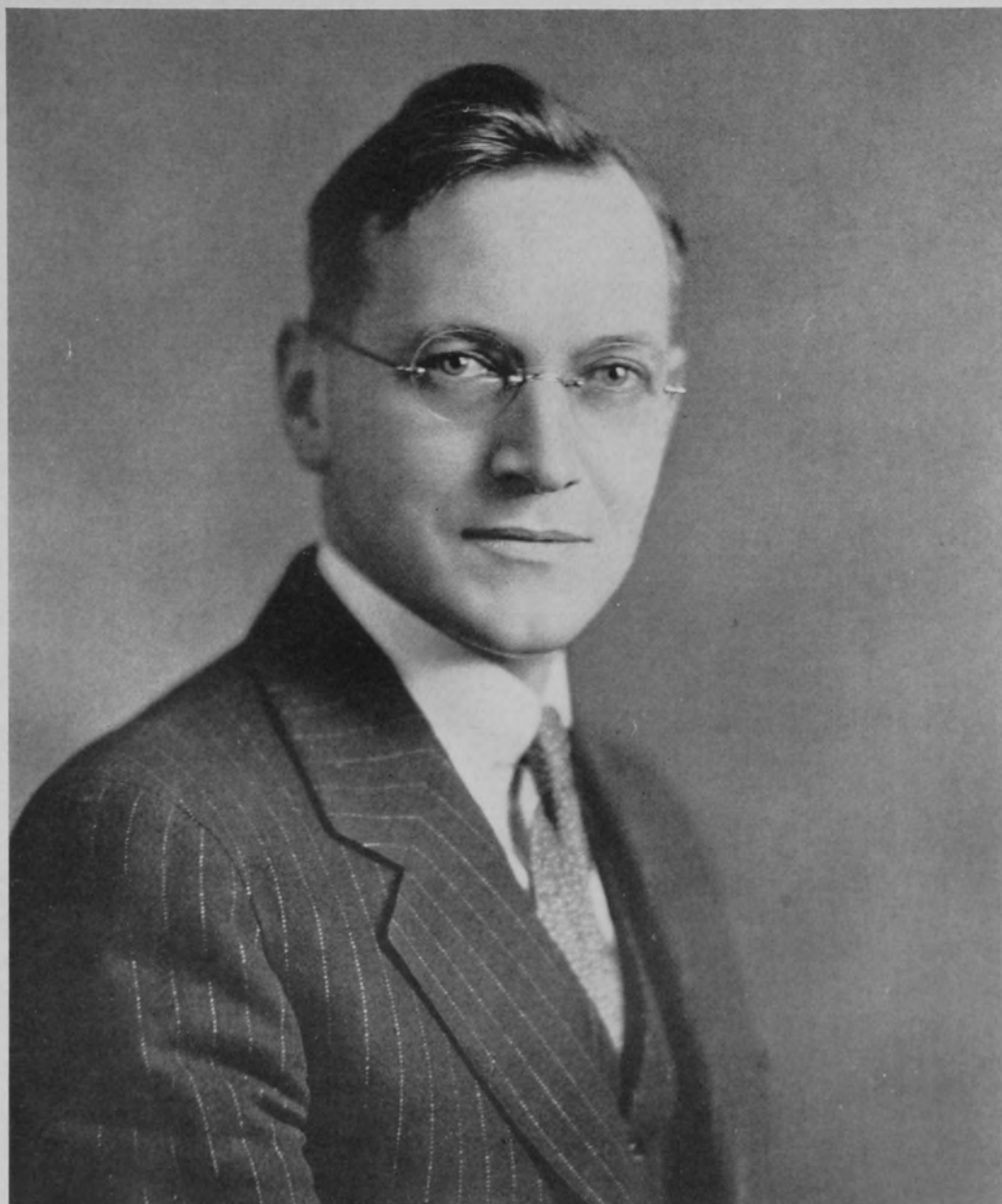

To which she holds the magic key.

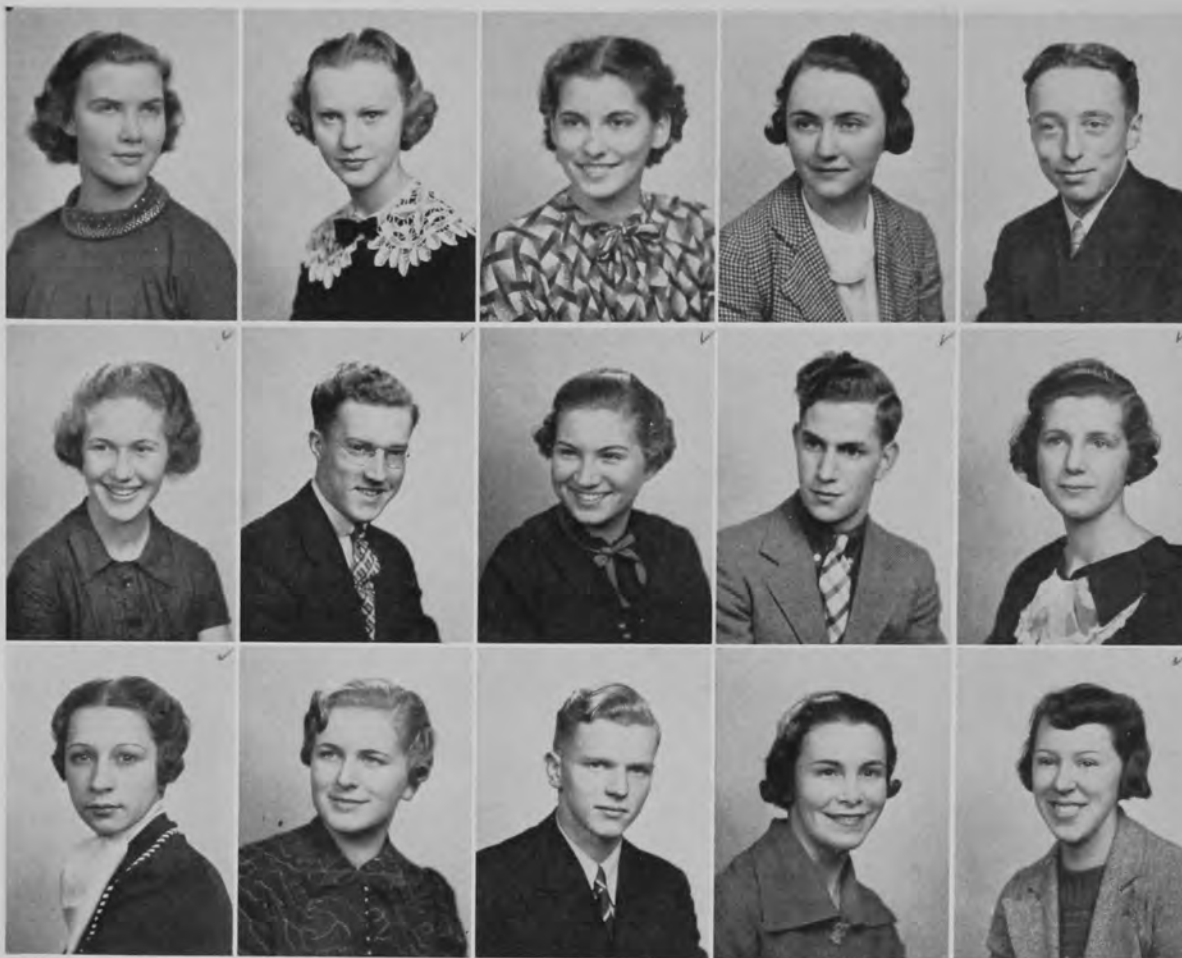
The last part of our high school years

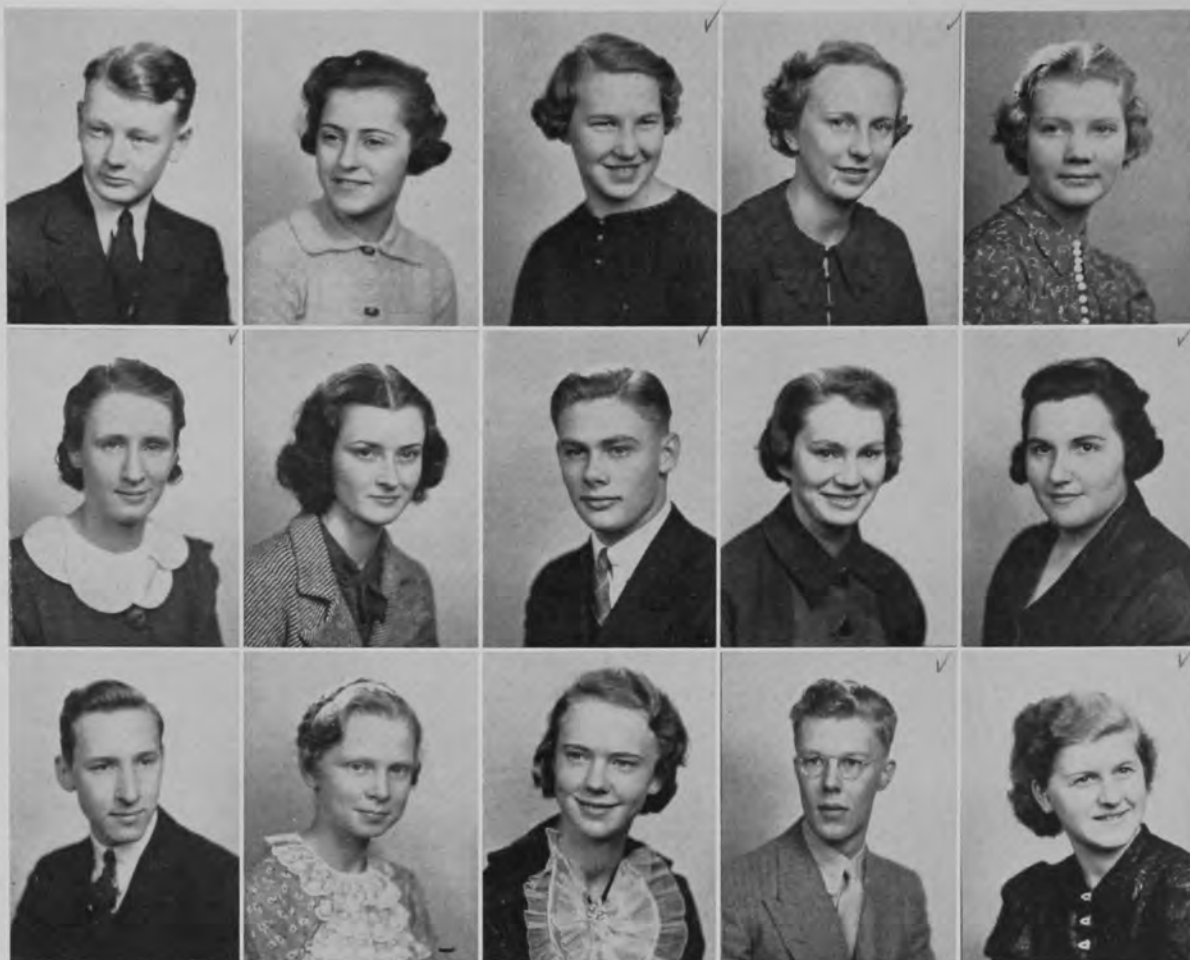
When we of the June Class first entered West High School it was with the feeling that a new adventure awaited us. And indeed it did.

JANUARY CLASS PROPHECY

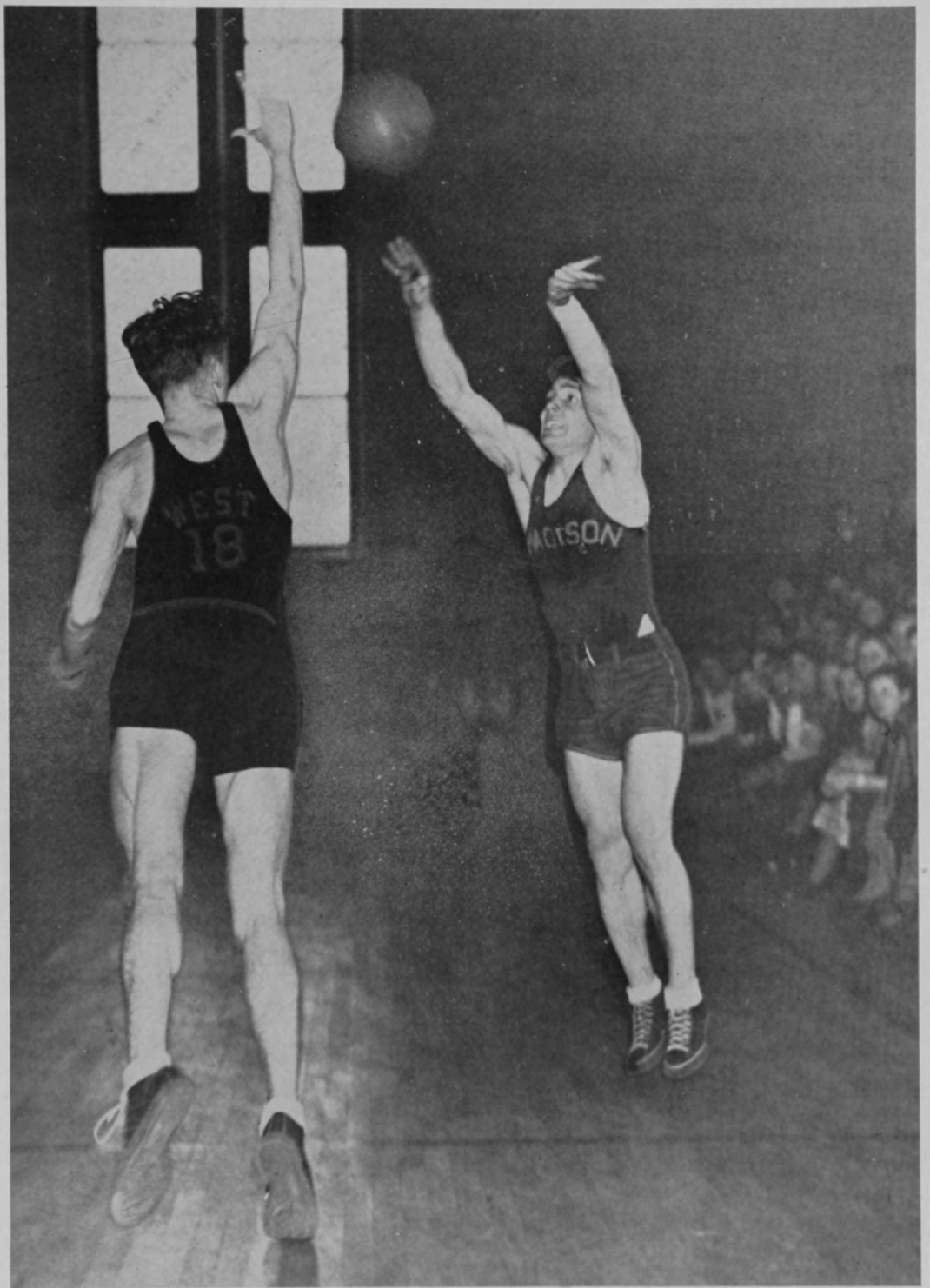

Baseball at West High has had many winning combinations during the past years of interscholastic competition. The lean years have been devoted to building up new teams that have been punctured by either graduation or ineligibility. The 1936 team faced a lean year. Coach Emil Hulek, hampered by weather conditions and the lack of a practice field, was faced with the problem of rounding out a nine to encounter experienced teams on the schedule. The first of the season gave little encouragement, inasmuch as these six games were setbacks. From then on, the old characteristics of the Orange and Black paved the way to several victories. The nine ended well down in the circuit but produced material for 1937.

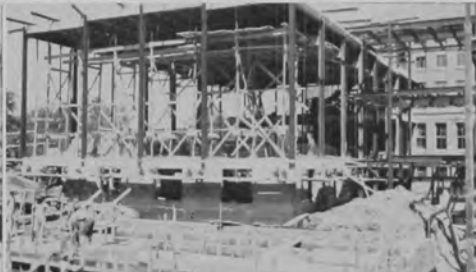
